Golden Wedding

Yesterday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. John N. Lake of 175 Park-road, Rosedale, entertained their friends in their new residence, commemorating the 50th anniversary of their marriage. The house was profusely decorated with palms and flowers, and Mr. and Mrs. Lake opened their home also, where refreshments were served, as it communicated by an archway thru the halls. The tables were finely decorated and the wedding cake was elaborately trimmed. Many of the ministers of the city and from some outside points were present and friends from the city and surrounding places came to the number of 250. They were all received in the parlor. At the time of their marriage Mr. Lake was in the Methodist ministry—had just finished his probation at Ingersoll and been ordained. They were married at Burford at the home of Mrs. Lake's father, Mr. Lake's eyes failed him and he was obliged to retire from the ministry. In 1870 he opened a real estate office here, there being only two other firms in the business at that time. In 1881 he was elected to the city council for the old ward of St. Thomas. He has been a member of several general conferences and treasurer of many of the funds of the church, the union church relief fund in particular, for 28 years. He was the organizer and first superintendent of the Sherbourne-street Sunday school for eleven years and he laid the cornerstone of the present church in 1886. Both Mr. and Mrs. Lake belong to the third generation of Canadian Methodists. Mrs. Lake's grandfather being the late Rev. Thomas Whithead, a prominent pioneer in the early part of the last century. Mr. Lake's grandfather

was the leader of the first class formed by Lowe in the Township of Ernestown in 1792. All the relatives in the city and some from Trenton, Tillsonburg, Hagersville and Napane, numbering about 250, spent the evening together. Congratulations were sent from California, Colorado, Vancouver, Saskatchewan, New York, St. Louis, Kingston and Picton.

First Woman Doctor

A glance at an early register of the Ontario Medical College reveals the fact that Jenny K. Trout was the first woman licensed to practise medicine in Ontario. 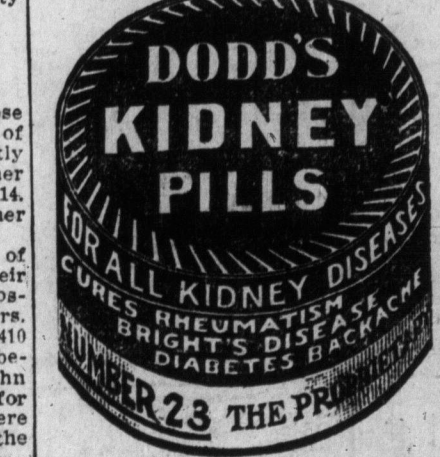

BAN ON LICENSEHOLDERS

Western Methodists' Policy on the Liquor Question.

EDMONTON, Alta., June 9.—(Special).—The report of the temperance and moral reform committee was adopted by the Methodist Conference to-day. It set forth that prohibition is the only solution of the liquor traffic and members will do their utmost to elect temperance men to the next legislature. A request will be made to the government for a local option law and abolition of intoxicants at clubs. An effort will be made to prohibit licenseholders securing a seat in municipal councils or in the legislature.



THE CANADIAN ORDER OF FORESTERS

THE THIRTIETH ANNUAL SESSION OF HIGH COURT

The Year 1908 Was the Most Prosperous in the History of the Order A Large Delegation in Attendance

The thirtieth annual session of the High Court of the Canadian Order of Foresters opened in the City of London yesterday afternoon with a large attendance in attendance, including High Court officers and delegates representing subordinate courts of every province in the Dominion.

After the usual opening ceremonies and the appointment of several standing committees, the High Court officers reported on their activities during the past year.

The High Chief Ranger, J. A. Stewart of Perth, Ont., after extending a hearty welcome to the representatives present, submitted his report, which was read with facts and figures relating to the growth and extension of the order during the past year.

The year closed with a membership of 79,717. The increase in the Insurance Reserve during the year amounted to \$302,249.67. On January 1, 1908, the amount on hand in this branch was \$2,438,606.87, and at the close of the year \$2,738,940.54.

The report of George Faulkner, High Secretary, covering the general work of the society, was next in order, and showed in detail the large volume of business transacted through the Head Office at Stratford, Ontario.

The amount of insurance premiums received during the year was \$97,273.16, which with the large sum of \$10,833.83 derived from donations on investments, made the total receipts in this branch \$699,131.49.

The Sick and Funeral Benefit Branch of the order also showed a marked advance. The amount of fees received during the year was \$19,861.10, and interest earned \$5,174.49. The total receipts, therefore, amounted to \$14,686.61.

There were issued from the High Secretary's Office 6,758 Insurance Certificates and 6,047 Membership Certificates, or a total of 12,805. In addition there were endorsements made on 1,288 Insurance Certificates.

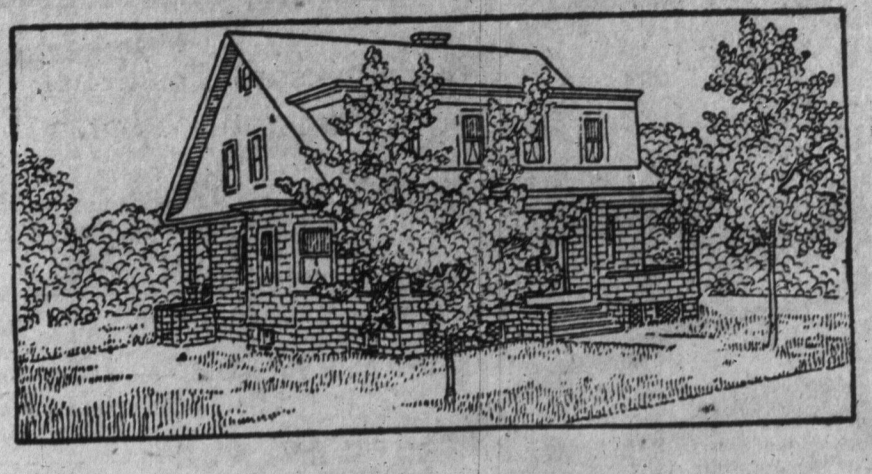
The report of Dr. U. M. Stanley, who has been Chairman of the Medical Board since the inception of the order, shows that the death rate during the last year was only 5.53 in the thousand. The average death rate for 20 years is but 5.12 in the thousand.

The report of W. G. Strong, Superintendent of Organization, showed that during the year there were 6,597 initiations. There were 27 new courts instituted, with a membership of 732.

Only three votes were registered at the four registration sittings to-day. Neither political parties had representatives present at the courts. The Brunswick, 15 in Prince Edward Island, 12 in Manitoba, 63 in Saskatchewan, 23 in Alberta and 16 in British Columbia.

The question as to whether the lands should be owned by the municipality or the government was left undecided.

OTTAWA, June 8.—Hon. Mr. Parent, chairman of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission, denies that the cost of the Port Arthur to Winnipeg section has tripled the estimate, as reported, but there has been an extra \$600 per mile spent.

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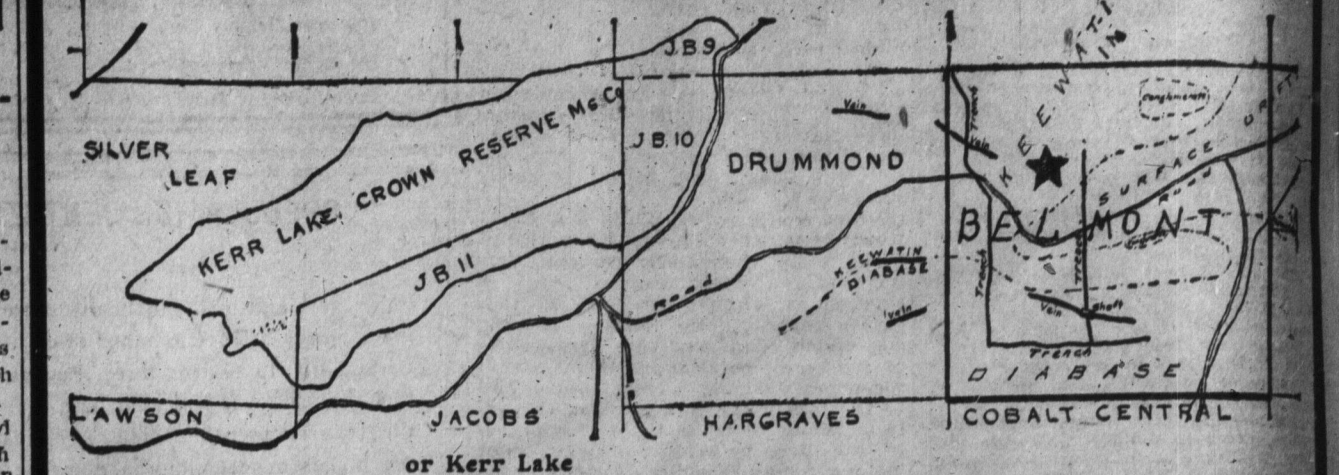
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BELMONT SILVER MINES OF KERR LAKE, LIMITED

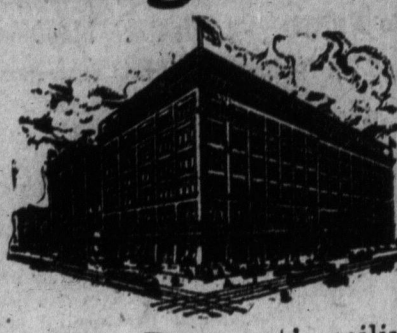
