EXPLANATION.—Look at the left hand side of the Table the month, on which the given time commences; then draw your finger from that month upon a straight line, till it come to the square that lies perpendicularly under the month, in which the given time terminates, and the figures contained in that square will be the number of days from one day of the former to the same day of the latter month. For instance I want to know the number of days from May 9 to December 9; I carry my finger in a straight line from May till I come to the square under December, where I find 214, the number of days required.

B. Two pence farthing is allowed for every grain under or over

weight on English, Portuguese and American Gold; and two pence 2½ of a penny on Spanish and French. Payments in Gold above £50 may be made in bulk; English, Portuguese and American, at 50s. per ounce; French and Spanish at 87s. 8½. deducting half a grain for each piece.

To turn Sterling into Currency, add one ninth part of the Sterling sum to itself, and the amount will be Currency.

To turn Currency into Sterling; subtract one-tenth part of the sum Currency from itself, and the remainder will be sterling.

To turn American money, viz. dollars, cents and mills, into Currency; divide the sum by 4; the quotient will be pounds and decimal parts of a pound, which decimal parts must be reduced to shillings, pence and farthings in the usual way. Thus 191 dollars and 74 cents divided by 4 equals £47,935 decimals; which, 935 decimals reduced to shillings, pence and mills, is 18s. 8½. So 191 dollars and 74 cents is equal to £47 18s. 8½ Currency.

To turn Currency into dollars and cents, is the reverse of the above viz. Reduce the shillings, pence and farthings in the given sum to the decimals of a pound, annex the decimals to the pounds, and multiply by 4 the product will be the amount in dollars, cents and mills. Thus £47 18s. 8½ expressed decimally stands thus, £47,935; which multiplied by 4 equals 191 dollars and 74 cents.

 small letter *m* stands for forenoon, and the small *a* for
 noon.

EXPLANATION.—The preceding Table of Interest is far the best ever published. It gives the interest at 6 per cent. on any principal sum whatever, and for any term of time whatever, to the utmost possible degree of exactness; and, in complicated cases, with less labour and fewer mistakes, than any other method which shall arrive at the same degree of accuracy.

To persons acquainted with decimal fractions an explanation will not be necessary; but to those unacquainted with them the following directions are given.

The Interest of the several sums contained in the Table is the interest for the day only, and is expressed in farthings and the decimal parts of a farthing. To ascertain then the interest of any sum whatever, take from the Table the Interest per day of the given sum, multiply this daily interest by the number of days contained in the time, for which the given sum is to be paid interest, and from this product separate the three right hand figures by a comma, and the figures at the left hand of the comma will be the interest required in farthings.—N. B. If in the product the first figure at the right hand of the comma is greater than 5, add an unit to the first figure at the left hand of the comma.—An example or two will make this plain and easy.

Before I constructed the above Table, I never found an Interest Table, from the use of which I could derive any benefit; but I generally calculated interest by the rule, which is commonly called *Interest by Decimals*, which is performed by this Theorem, $TRP + P = A$, which was first discovered by John Ward. See Ward's Mathematics, page 245. But I now use the above Table in preference to all other methods; with which I am acquainted; and am confident that every person who will give it a thorough trial will find it preferable, both as it respects expedi-

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tion and accuracy.—As the best method of casting interest has always been a grand desideratum amongst men of business, I hope it will be found that I have not said too much in favour of this Table.

USEFUL DIRECTIONS.

The best method of making and preserving Ink.

Put your Ink Powder into rain, river or snow water, and simmer it over a moderate fire two or three hours; put this ink including the powder into your ink bottle.—Then with rain, river or snow water and common salt make a brine as strong as possible, and put as much of this brine into the ink as there is of the ink already in the bottle, and the ink is then ready for use. The superior advantages of ink thus made are these:

1. It will not be injured by freezing in the winter.
2. It will not be injured by mould in the summer.
3. It will not spread upon paper, nor strike through it, as ink in the common way does.

I have made my ink for more than twenty years in this manner, and know it to be the best way, and that the salt completely preserves it from deterioration. Spirit of any kind ought not to be put into ink; it makes the ink spread upon and strike through the paper. S. BINGHAM.

To clarify Quills

Scrape off the outer film, and cut the ends off; then put the barrels into boiling water, wherein is a small quantity of alum and salt; let them remain a quarter of an hour, and then dry them in a hot pan of sand or an oven.

To harden Quills.

In order to harden a quill that is soft, thrust the barrel into hot ashes, stirring it till it is soft; and then taking it out, press it almost flat upon your knee with the back of a pen-knife, and afterwards reduce it to a roundness with your fingers. Another method to harden quills is by setting water and alum over the fire, and while it is boiling, put in a handful of quills, the barrels only, for a minute, and then lay them by.

AGRICULTURAL

LUCERN.

From C. W. GREGE's Essays on Practical Husbandry.

THIS artificial grass, a native of Media, has been introduced into this country. It succeeds both upon strong and light soil; but the light is preferable for its culture. The best method of management, is to sow it in drills, thirty inches apart. When the plants are up, they must be thinned, so as to stand a foot distant from each other in the rows. It may be sowed broad-cast; but, as it requires to be kept clean from weeds, the drill will be found preferable. The seed may be sown in beds in the spring, and transplanted into rows. When that is done, the tap roots are shortened, and the top of the plants cut off about the middle. The quick growth of this grass in the spring is sufficient to recommend it to the Farmers, for feeding their pigs, lambs and calves. It will be nine inches high, when the other kinds make their appearance. In favorable years, it may be cut four or five times. A quart of seed is sufficient for an arpent, when drilled; two quarts when sowed broad cast. The hay made of lucern is managed as directed for clover; (no animals should be allowed to graze on it, as they are apt to eat off the head of the plant,) as such, one arpent of lucern, is equal to four arpents of those grasses, now under culture.

TO MAKE ELDER WINE.

TO nine gallons of water, put three pecks of Black Elder Berries; boil them for half an hour; then strain the liquor into a tub: dissolve two pounds of maple sugar to each gallon of liquor: when it is cold, put half a cup full of yeast on a toast made of bread; if yeast cannot be procured, put into the liquor a cup full of milk. When it is working, skim off the froth as it rises; after it has done working, put it into a cask, where it will rise to the bung-hole. That it may work over, when it is done hissing, put one quart of spirits, four ounces of ginger, and four of allspice; then it may be bunged up.—This wine is bottled off in March; it is generally warmed to drink in the winter, and is very fine to drink cold in the summer.

TO MAKE RASPBERRY WINE.

ONE gallon of Raspberry Juice to one gallon of rum or gin. It is sweetened to the taste of those who make it. Should it not fine, put a little milk to it, and it will fine down.

Currant Wine, white or red.—To make nine gallons.

Squeeze three pecks of Currants and one gallon of Raspberries; wash them, and squeeze the fruit; put the liquor into a barrel that contains nine gallons: fill it near the bung-hole with cold water; dissolve two pounds of maple sugar to each gallon of liquor. When it has done working, put two quarts of brandy or spirits; it will be better for the brandy. Put a quarter of a pound of sweet and a quarter of a pound of bitter almonds. Let them be blanched and bruised: then put them into the cask, and bung it up.—It will be fit to drink in January, when it may be bottled off for use.

WILD GRAPE WINE.

The grapes when perfectly ripe, are gathered and squeezed; two gallons of juice to one of reduced spirits. Refined sugar, allspice and ginger, are boiled, and the wine is sweetened to the palate. Let it be bottled off, and in three months it will be fit to drink.

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THE BEST TIME TO CUT BUSHES

IS in the last of the month of August, just as the leaf comes to maturity and before it begins to turn yellow. The summer's growth exhausts the roots, and its vigour is renewed by the ascent of the sap, in the cold weather of the fall. The roots of all plants are most vigorous and perfect in the fall, after the leaves and stalks have decayed. On this account medicinal roots are dug at this season. Trees cut in the winter and early in the spring send up more vigorous sprouts than those that are cut late in the summer or early in the fall. Cut your bushes in the last of August, and you will find the next year's sprouts feeble and small.

Cut thistles and weeds while in the bloom, before the seed ripens. Cut the fern, alder and other bushes just when the leaf comes to perfection, or just before it begins to turn of a yellow colour. This is the time when you will most effectually destroy the root and future growth: some require an earlier cutting than others.

SHEEP.

There is, perhaps, no branch of husbandry, that will better reward the farmer for his care and attention than the Sheep; Yet as far as my acquaintance extends, there is no part of husbandry so much neglected as the Sheep. I am not now going into this subject at large; I will only suggest to farmers one mode of treating Sheep, which from my own experience I have found to be extremely important.

Take about an equal quantity of tar and hogs lard, and melt them together. Drezze this ointment on the Sheep's back bone from the head to the tail, first parting the wool on their backs with your hands, so that the ointment may come directly in contact with the skin. This unction must be performed in the months of November and March. Sheep treated in this manner will never be distempered, nor troubled with ticks; and they will yield from a quarter to a third more wool, and of a much better quality.

The expense and labour of managing sheep in this way is at least a mere trifle; it is nothing in comparison to the far greater profit, which the farmer will receive from sheep.

CARROTS.

Considering how much is said in England in favour and raising Carrots, it is surprising that the country farmers do not pay more attention to this branch of business. The English farmers' state, that Carrots are not only good for feeding cattle and hogs; but they aver positively, that Carrots boiled are the best food yet known for fattening hogs; and also, that pork can be made with them with less expense, than with any other food. I have but little experience in raising them; I however state the following, hoping it will become benefit.

In the year A. 1815 I sowed a small piece of Carrots, about the eighth of an acre. After firstly ploughing the land, I harrowed in the carrot seed, just as I would wheat or oats. The soil was very favourable for them; it was a deep sandy loam without any hard pan; had been well dunged the spring before, planted with Indian Corn, and the weeds thoroughly subdued. I found when the carrots came up that I had not sowed more than one eighth part as much seed as I ought to have done; the carrots were very thin. I however had a fine crop. The carrots were of a prodigious size and length; one of them, in consequence of a small bet, that was made upon the length of it, was accurately measured and it measured three feet two inches, exclusive of the tops.—These car-

rets were principally fed out to milch cows. They make a great quantity of milk, and of a superior quality. I had not then read the English accounts of their being good for fattening pork. From what little I have experienced of raising carrots I don't hesitate to say that fifteen hundred bushels may be raised on one acre of land of a suitable quality for them, and properly prepared.

From GREECE'S Practical Husbandry. **RUTA-BAGA OR SWEDISH TURNIPS.**

RUTA-BAGA, was introduced on the River Ottawa by me, 1804: the settlers have found them very advantageous. There is not an animal from the horse to the pig, but what is fond of them. They require a deep light soil, on account of their tap root. As such deep ploughing is required; in other respects they are managed as turnips; except that they should be sowed in May, to come to maturity. A Canadian gentleman has assured me, that those turnips had been put in a barn, and remained in that state during the winter; in the following spring, they were perfectly good and fit for the table. A person who had some seed of me and was first that sowed them in the upper settlements, on the Ottawa, informed me, that his crops of Ruta Baga were incredible on new cleared land: his Indian corn having failed one year, his pigs were wintered on that root, and looked as well as when fed with grain. I recommended this species of turnip, in the year 1807. The result of an experiment was published in the Quebec Gazette, proving their faculty, of wintering in the open field; there is great difference between land screened by the forest, and the former. A field was prepared in 1806, and sowed in July with the blue and white turnips, & Rutabaga; each in separate lands. In October when they were ready to be gathered, one land of each kind was left, to try the effect of wintering out. Some cattle broke into the field and gnawed some of the Rutabages. In the spring, when the land was uncovered, and unfrozen, the blue and white turnips were all rotten; but the Rutabaga was as good as in the autumn; even those that had been gnawed in the fall were perfectly good. Those Rutabagas that were put in the cellar had become spongy. This points out to the farmers a very essential assistance for stock in the spring, when green food is scarce; particularly for those having young.

Recipe for destroying Caterpillars on fruit trees.

THE following method for destroying caterpillars has been tried in France, and found successful.

Take a chafing-dish, with lighted charcoal, throw some pinches of brimstone, in powder, on the coals, and place it under the branches that are loaded with caterpillars:—the vapour will not only destroy all that are on the tree, but prevent it from being infested again.

FEATHERS, Bones, &c. may be coloured blue, red, green, yellow, &c. by the following process.—after boiling them in alum water, steep them in an infusion of red wood to form a red—in a blue pot, or juice of elder berries for blue—in lime water and verdigris, or nitrate of copper, for green—and in a tincture of saffron for yellow.

THE ADVANTAGE OF RURAL LIFE.

AN EXTRACT.

The Book, from which farmers, if they will read, can receive the best fund of knowledge is constantly open before them. Scholars may

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peruse the works of the learned, mechanics may study the arts of ages—
but the farmer has the best means to be wise, for his daily employment is
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the finger of God. The Astronomer, in tracing the courses of the systems
that harmoniously range in the unlimited fields of ether, may be lost in
the sublimity, the power and beneficence of Him by whom all were crea-
ted, are preserved and governed; but in every blossom and flower, not
less wisdom, glory and goodness are displayed. Every object that strikes
the senses, is a fountain of information. On each blade of grass are in-

RECEIPTS, &c.

Chinese Method of mending China.

Take a piece of flint-glass, beat it to a fine powder, and grind it well
with the white of an egg, and it joins china without riveting, so that no
art can break it in the same place. You are to observe, that the com-
position is to be ground extremely fine on a painter's stone.

New-invented Composition to be used instead of Yeast.

To make eight quarts of this composition, boil in common water eight
pounds of potatoes, as for eating; bruise them perfectly smooth, and mix
with them, whilst warm, two ounces of honey, or any other sweet, and
one quart (being the eighth part of a gallon of yeast) of common yeast.
And for, making bread, mix three beer pints of the above composition
with a bushel of flour, using warm water in making the bread; the wa-
ter to be warmer in winter than in summer; and the composition to be
used in a few hours after it is made; and as soon as the sponge (the mix-
ture of the composition with the flour) begins to fall the first time, the
bread should be made and put in the oven.

Dutch Method of preparing Goose Quills for Writing.

The process consists in immersing the quill, when plucked from the
wing of the bird, into water almost boiling; to leave it there till it beco-
mes sufficiently soft to compress it, turning it on its axis with the back
of the blade of the knife. This kind of friction, as well as the immer-
sions in water, being continued till the harrel of the quill be transparent,
and the membrane, as well as the greasy kind of covering, be entirely
removed, it is immersed a last time to render it perfectly cylindrical, which
is performed with the index finger and the thumb; it is then dried in a
gentle temperature.

Cautions in visiting Sick Rooms.

Never venter into a sick room if you are in a violent perspiration
(if circumstances require your continuance there for any time,) for the
moment your body becomes cold, it is in a state likely to absorb the in-
fection, and give you the disease. Nor visit a sick person (especially if
the complaint be of a contagious nature) with an empty stomach; as
this disposes the system more readily to receive the contagion. In at-
tending a sick person, place yourself where the air passes from the door
or window to the bed of the diseased, not betwixt the diseased person and
any fire that is in the room, as the heat of the fire will draw the infecti-
ous vapour in that direction, and you would run much danger from breath-
ing in it.

Valuable concise Rules for preserving Health in Winter.

Keep the feet from wet, and the head well defended when in bed; avoid too plentiful meals; drink moderately warm and generous, but not inflaming liquors; go not abroad without breakfast. Shun the night air as you would the plague; and let your houses be kept from damp by warm fires. By observing these few and simple rules, better health may be expected than from the use of the most powerful medicines.
