TECHNICAL SCHOOLS

The Times yesterday quoted some remarks made by Inspector James L. Hughes of Toronto on the subject of exhibition halls in English school buildings, and the exercises there conducted. The inspector visited eleven English and thirty-eight continental schools, and returned to Canada much impressed with the need for further improvement in the Canadian educational system. What he says on the subject of technical education is particularly interesting and important. We quote:—

"I gave a great deal of attention to the study of the German technical schools, especially those at Berlin and Munich. English and American experts had also been investigating this system some time previous to my visit, and were so favorably impressed that they reported for its adoption in their respective countries. Its main principles are that every boy who has reached the age of 14, having completed his high school course, must attend one of the many technical institutes provided by the government nine months each week, three afternoons being reserved by law for this purpose. During these hours and on until he reaches the age of 18 a boy is being trained for his life-work at some trade. In reality, this compulsion enables him to choose his calling, and then equips him in the very best manner. That is what we want. It is what I shall advise the board of education to adopt."

"Universities are provided for the professions; we should also have special institutions to train our workmen. This will improve the standards of tradesmen, and as a natural consequence result in the increased value of raw material. This is surely good common-sense from both individual and national standpoints. Its results are seen in Germany, where workmen of the highest class are attracting orders from all parts of the world, and are thus increasing the international and material importance of their country. To show how important a place technical education holds in their school system, I need only mention the fact that at Charlottenburg, near Berlin, they now have a school of this class which cost them \$5,000,000."

"Our national well-being demands our attention to this subject. If we spend \$300,000 on an institution, at which attendance is optional, and consider the results of it as quite satisfactory, how much better an investment would a technical school be, at which attendance would be compulsory, and whose objects would be positively invaluable to the arts and crafts of our country. These institutions further give not only a practical knowledge to workmen, but they also teach the workman and thus give them a sound, scientific acquaintance with the materials they handle."

Inspector Hughes said that in England he admired among other things the attention given to physical culture. "Swimming, for instance, was taught in most schools, many being provided with special baths. One small town visited had no less than fourteen of these aids to cleanliness, and physical culture and swimming competitions between the schools were regular features."

Summing up, says the Toronto World, Inspector Hughes said that the age demands that all training shall be mainly along utilitarian lines. Knowledge should make a boy better fitted for some particular sphere in life, not merely cram him with promiscuous facts; should train a girl to become a good housekeeper, and so the nation would develop along stable lines and its future progress be placed on firm foundations."

THE POST OFFICE

Some time since the statement was made in this paper that in fourteen years nine employees in the St. John post office had become insane. The item was copied by many newspapers, and in Ottawa an official of the post office department cast doubt upon the accuracy of the statement. The controller is now in this city, on business connected with the post office. The Times suggests that he make enquiry on the spot. He can easily get the facts, and the names of the men who became mentally deranged. He will have no difficulty in discovering that the St. John post office, frequently under-manned, has long been unsanitary, ill-lighted and unfit to be the daily abode of the large staff of clerks employed there. The persons who have lost their reason might have suffered a mental breakdown in other employment, but the fact is worthy of attention; and whatever may be done to make the post-office building bright and clean, and in all respects what a public building should be, ought to be done without delay. It was announced some months ago that this would be done at once, and plans are said to have been prepared. The controller will be able to testify that the work is needed."

A Japanese admiral remarks that newspapers cannot take too much care in writing upon the subject of international relations; especially at a time when such relations appear on the surface as somewhat strained. He would probably agree with the European statesman who is quoted by Mr. Stead as having said that it would be a good thing to hang a few editors. Beyond question, the yellow journals, both of the United States and Japan, are perniciously active at the present time, but there seems no real danger of war."

DR. EDWIN GILPIN Halifax, N. S., July 10.—Dr. Edwin Gilpin, deputy commissioner of mines for the Nova Scotia government, died tonight as the result of a stroke of apoplexy, which he sustained yesterday. He has been for thirty-two years connected with the mines department, for the past nine years as deputy commissioner. Since the commencement he has been inspector of mines, the duties of which he continued to perform. He was a son of the late Dean Gilpin, and was fifty-five years of age. For only a month he had been in poor health, and was proposing a holiday.

THE SCHOOL BUILDING

The city council yesterday refused to agree to the construction of a school building costing \$60,000 on the Weldon lot. They ignored utterly the statement of the trustees and of Supt. Bridges that more room is urgently needed, and that a thousand more children than formerly require school accommodation. Nevertheless, the new building may be erected. The school board are responsible for the housing of all children of school age, and the necessary provision must be made. If they are satisfied that the additional building is needed, and can satisfy the government that the claim is just, they can probably get authority to raise the money. It is utterly folly to assume that the citizens of St. John are either so indifferent or so frightened of a tax bill that they are prepared to refuse the children of any citizen the privilege of attending school, and this implies a proper school building, well-lighted, well-ventilated, well-kept, well-furnished, sanitary and safe.

MARKING TIME

The council has decided to ask Mr. D. C. Clarke when he expects to have his wharf contract completed. The work of putting up warehouses, putting down tracks, and all other work in connection, is held up until Mr. Clarke finishes what was to have been completed within a very short period at the completion of the dredging. It is true that the dredging was not completed at the time specified, and thus Mr. Clarke was delayed, but there has been ample time, since the site was made ready, to have the wharf completed. The citizens must again take measures to galvanize the council into an active state. The members are able to meet and crack jokes, discuss points of order, and consider such matters as whether the chief of police shall go to Montreal, or whether \$400 apportioned to City Road should be expended on Union street; but they pass up such urgent matters as the wasteful delay on the west side and the important question of securing a competent director of public works. It is not time the board of trade took into consideration the danger that threatens next winter's steamship business at this port?

The by-election in Hants County for a seat in the legislature is one of the bitterest political fights that has occurred in Nova Scotia for some time. The chief issue appears to be prohibition; although the general policy of the Murray government is assailed and defended with great vigor. The names of each candidate is O'Brien, and each is conceded by his opponents to be a good citizen. As the nominations took place yesterday, the issue will not long remain in doubt.

No finer tribute to the popularity of King Edward could be paid than the splendid reception given to him and to the queen in Dublin yesterday. However bitterly the Irish people may resent the failure of parliament to grant "home rule," they appreciate the high qualities, as a ruler, of King Edward, and, with characteristic impulsiveness, they gave him a royal welcome.

The awarding of contracts amounting to nearly \$1,000,000 for I. C. R. rolling stock has not been done too soon. All the locomotive works and all the car shops in Canada cannot keep up with the enormous and growing demand of the railways for motive power and cars. The shortage is felt in New Brunswick, as well as in the western provinces, and will be more acute as the season progresses.

If the matter of the destruction of the stream Crystal Stream is left where it was dropped by the coroner's jury, and no action taken to guard against future disasters of the same kind, then the public must not only regret the loss of valuable lives, but feel that the sacrifice was utterly in vain.

Discussing the question of the new school building, Ald. Hamm says there are lots of empty houses. He might have gone further;—Doubtless there are also some empty barns.

The price of gas may be an alluring topic, but when an alderman proposes to divert to his ward a few dollars apportioned to some other ward, it is at once discovered that the country is in danger.

Congratulations to Fireman Drake on his fiftieth anniversary as a fire fighter, and on the high esteem in which he is held by the department and the citizens.
