LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

AS ADOPTED AT A GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY, HELD IN THE CITY OF TORONTO, ON THE THIRD DAY OF AUGUST, 1855.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARITCLE I.—This Society shall be denominated the "Upper Canada Bible Society," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society, that is—the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II.—This Society shall endeavor to unite all the different Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III.—This Society shall maintain in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all the Bible Societies in connection with it, shall be supplied with the scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV.—The busisess of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, consisting of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, together with twenty lay members; fifteen of whom who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election each year; five of whom to form a quorum. All Ministers of the Gospel, who are members of the Society, shall be entitled to a seat, and to vote with the Directors.

V.—The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and Agents, of all Bible Societies in connection therewith, shall be ex-officio members of the Board.

VI.—At the meeting of the Directors, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, and in the absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that pursose, shall preside.

VII.—Every person paying annually, five shillings, shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying five pounds at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society; or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII.—That each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a Certificate of Membership, under the Corporate Seal of the Company, duly signed by the President and Secretary for the time being, and shall be allowed to receive from the Depositary annually, for distribution, Bibles and Testaments to the value of five shillings.

IX.—That the Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keepers, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs, and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorcorporation.

X.—The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business, once in each quarter, and at any other time when called together by the Secretary, or any three of the Directors.

XI.—A general meeting of the society shall be held in the month of May, in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interest of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the proceedings of the foregoing year presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts, duly audited.

XII.—In the Annual Report of the Society, the efforts of the several Societies in connection with it, shall be distinctly mentioned, as respects the circulation of the scriptures, and the contribution to the funds; together with such other matter connected with them as may be generally interesting.

XIII.—That the General Meeting of the Society shall be opened by reading a portion of the Sacred Scriptures, and with prayer.

XIV.—That no alteration in this Constitution shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the same has been given to the Board.

RULES

RECOMMENDED FOR BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the English copies being of the authorized version only.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE ______ BRANCH BIBLE

III. That all persons subscribing five shillings annually, or one pound five shillings at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than —— other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned Members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly, or oftener; the time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint two of their own members for each District, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, to the purchase of Bibles and Testaments from the Upper Canada Bible Society, to supply this neighbourhood; (which copies of the Scriptures the Committee are to sell to members at a reduced price, to others at cost; and to give, gratis, to those they know cannot purchase;) and that the overplus be remitted, half-yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and supplying other nations, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the —— day of —— in each year at ——, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee, if required.

X. That in the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OP THE

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. The designation of the Society shall be the British and Foreign Bible Society, of which the sole object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment: the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society shall be the authorized version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavors to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British dominions; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan, or Pagan.

III. Each Subscriber of one guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Each Subscriber of ten guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each Subscriber of five guineas annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each Subscriber of fifty pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to fifty pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of fifty pounds, shall be a member for life; of of one hundred pounds, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings; and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednes-

day in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the Accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be considered, ex officio, Members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or Dissenting Minister, who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as Members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meetings, and Meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, (and in the absence of the Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence, such member as shall be voted for that purpose) shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Monday in every month, or oftener, if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVIII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among Foreigners who have promoted the objects of this Society.

XIX. That the whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meetings of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

I. That the Fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the preceding resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha, nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, shall be made to any Society, the books be issued bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

It is with feelings of unfeigned humiliation, but at the same time with feelings of sincere gratitude to God for his great goodness and unmerited favor, that the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society appear before the members and friends of the Society for the purpose of rendering their account for the past year, and reporting the progress of the cause—the interests of which have been, in one sense, entrusted to their hands.

We feel that we have cause for humiliation; for unquestionably we dare not say, either in our individual or associated capacity, that we have done all that we could; that our zeal has needed no increase—that our energies have required no stimulus—or that nothing more could have been done than has been done by us, to take possession of the wide field of usefulness which is spread out before us, and to improve the favorable opportunities which present themselves on every hand of promoting the circulation and extending the influence of God's Holy Word. We desire to acknowledge, and what is more, to feel, that in view of the talents committed to us, the opportunities we enjoy, we are but unprofitable servants. It may also be noticed that the Upper Canada Tract Society issued, during the past year, 9,105 copies, with the metrical version of the Pooles.

It will be observed that the amount of issues for the past year is only 126 in advance of the issues of the previous year. It should be borne in mind, however, the issues for the previous year were greatly in excess of those of the preceding year.

We may remark, too, that during the past year the issues might have been more, but for the circumstance that some of our Colporteurs were for a considerable time employed in connexion with Branch Societies—receiving their supply of Books not from our Depository, but from the Branch Depositories.

STOCK.

The Stock on hand at the commencement of the year consisted of 9,317 Bibles, 6,220 Testaments, 69 Book of Psalms, 12 Parts, and 144 Indian translations—amounting to £1,237 9s. 10d. Received per order from the Parent Society, 15,779 Bibles; 22,308 Testaments; 155 Book of Psalms—value, £2,989 6s. 0d. Received from H. Rowsell, Esq., 200 Testaments and 2,004 Book of Psalms in the Ojibway Language—value, £237 12s. 0d. The Stock on hand, at the close of the year, was 12,662 Bibles; 8,760 Testaments; 123 Book of Psalms. Indian translation—126 Parts, 147 Testaments, and 1,869 Book of Psalms—value £1,905 8s. 3d.

It is believed that several hundreds of copies of the Holy Scriptures have been circulated gratuitously by the Branch Societies, although happily the cases in this land are comparatively rare when it is a matter of necessity to obtain the Scriptures altogether gratuitously. It is proper to mention also, that at a late meeting of the Directors, it was resolved to grant a sufficient number of copies of the Word of God for the supply of the Rossin House, in this city, and other hotels not supplied.

We may here also state, that measures have been adopted by the Directors for promoting the circulation of the Indian Edition of the Book of Psalms, translated by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara, and of the copies of the New Testament which were purchased by the Society, as stated in last year's Report. It is hoped, that these copies may be extensively circulated among the interesting class for whose benefit they are intended.

LABOURS OF AGENTS.

As on former occasions, we have to report in the most ample and satisfactory terms as to the labours of our excellent and devoted Agents, the Rev. Lachlin Taylor and Mr. Johnson, and the beneficial results which have flowed from these labours. They have been indefatigable in traversing the length and breadth of the land-visiting the various branches, encouraging and stimulating the weak, giving valuable counsel to the Office-bearers, and establishing new branches in those localities where none existed before. From the extreme severity of the past winter, the great quantity of snow, and the sudden change which took place towards the conclusion of the usual season of winter, the journeyings of our Agents were more than ordinarily difficult and trying, and made their work all the more laborious. It is with regret that we have to mention that some months ago the health of our beloved friend and Agent, Rev. L. Taylor, was so seriously affected by his arduous labours, carried on with his characteristic energy and zeal, that it was judged necessary that he should have the advice of an experienced physician. The medical friend who was consulted on this occasion insisted on Mr. Taylor's giving up for a time all labours, and taking a few months for rest. Mr. Taylor, with the sanction of the Board of Directors, and with their affectionate wishes and earnest prayers for his health and comfort, sailed, some weeks ago, for Britain. He will have an opportunity of representing our Society at the Anniversary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and of conferring with its Committee with reference to our operations here, and no doubt will then be of service to the hope, the brought

Mr. Johnson travelled about 3600 miles, visited upwards of 100 Branch Societies, and formed 7 new Branches. He received on account of the Society, upwards of £1200. Mr. Johnson also attended the Anniversary of the Montreal Bible Society, as the representative of our Society—a service which was gratefully recognized by our brethren in Montreal.

COLPORTAGE.

The Directors, regarding Colportage as a most important department of their work, have endeavoured to extend their operations, and would urge this matter on their successors in Office, as being most worthy of their attention. The advantages of Colportage are two-fold. It not only is the means of bringing the Bible to those who are destitute of it; but also tends to make known the Bible Society, and draw forth an increased interest in its operations. We would call the attention of our Branches to this matter, and would urge on them the importance of sending the Colporteur into the destitute places around them. In one or two instances, Branches have applied to us for the services of a Colporteur for a definite period, to which applications we have been most ready to listen, and make arrangements for a thorough visit of their neighbourhood, by means of our Colporteurs. This work, now happily begun, will, we trust, go on until the Province has been traversed in all its extents by the bearers of this precious merchandise.

The Colporteurs at present employed, are Mr. Large, who laboured in Vaughan, King, Albion, St. Catherine's and neighbourhood; Mr. Burkitt, in King, Whitchurch, Cartwright, Manvers, and Caledon; Mr. Evans, in Port Dover, Burford, Milton, Mono, Charlottesville, Wellington, Townsend, St. Catherine's, and the country round; Mr. Reynolds, in Adjala, Tecumseth, Erin, Amaranth, Dundas Street, Artemesia, Flamboro', and Puslinch

It should be observed that these are the direct issues by the Colporteurs from our own Depository. Some of the Colporteurs circulated a good many besides from the Depositories of Branch Societies.

OPERATIONS OF KINDRED ASSOCIATIONS IN BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

It gives us pleasure to state, that the other Auxiliary Societies in British North America are making steady progress.

The Kingston Auxiliary has 10 Branches besides 6 Depôts. It has employed 2 Colporteurs during the greater part of the year, and has issued 3832 Copies. Its income from all sources was £445 15s. 5d.

The Montreal Auxiliary is making progress in energy and in results. Its field embraces 35 Counties of Canada East, and 12 Counties of Canada West, embracing a population of 752,240; but of this number about two-thirds are under the blighting influence of Popery.

There are 130 Branches connected with this Auxiliary, and during the past year the issues were—

Not a few copies of the Scriptures were thus introduced among the French Canadians, which we trust will yet bring forth fruit to the praise and glory of God.

The Quebec Auxiliary issued during the past year, 1878 copies of the Scriptures. Its income from all sources was £697 9s. 11d. It employs a travelling Agent and Colporteur, and has about 20 Branches.

The Societies in the Lower Province, we believe, are prospering, although we have no very recent intelligence regarding their progress.

We may here refer to the American Bible Society, which has now upwards of 3000 Branches, and employs 33 Agents. It has done and is doing much to promote the circulation of the Bible, not merely within its own bounds, but in many other lands.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

It remains that we advert to the progress and operations of the Parent Society itself, as presented to our notice in the last Annual Report, which has reached us, viz. for the year ending 31st March, 1856.

In France during the year, 120,644 copies of the Word of God has been put in circulation, a large proportion of these being circulated through the medium of Colporteurs. Active opposition was offered by the Romish Priests in some places, but the Colporteurs, notwithstanding many trials, have been enabled to be patient and persevering. Many very interesting incidents connected with their labours might be quoted did our space allow. In Belgium, the total of issues was 6,804, and in Holland, 20,716. In Holland 5 Colporteurs had been employed during the year.

From the various Depôts of the Society in Germany, and by means of Colporteurs, many thousands of copies of the Scriptures have been circulated, viz.: from Cologne, 153,530 copies; from Frankfort, 55,071 copies; and from Breslau, 43,739 copies.

In Norway, Denmark, and still more particularly in Sweden, where the revival referred to in last year's Report has been still going on, the circulation of the Scriptures has been actively carried on during the past year. The issues from the Depot at Stockholm have been 64,296, being an increase on the preceding year of 7,819 copies.

In Russia, where even the war did not altogether interrupt the circulation of the Bible, 13,276 copies have been issued during the year, besides 3,828 circulated on account of the American Bible Society.

In Switzerland and Northern Italy, the work has been making progress. The issues have been 22,174, besides about 8,000 copies distributed among the Sardinian soldiers. It has been found difficult to obtain the services of a sufficient number of Colporteurs to carry on the work.

At Malta and in Greece, the demand for Scriptures have been unusually large, and the issues have been far more numerous than in any former year. From the Depot at Malta, 20,129 have been

circulated, and from the Depot at Athens, 4,572 copies.

In Turkey a very remarkable change has taken place. In former years it was scarcely possible to prevail on a Turk to accept a copy of the Bible, while now in one year 1278 copies have been circulated, chiefly by sale. Before the withdrawal of the allied armies from Turkey, a large number of copies was distributed among the soldiers and sailors. The circulation of so many was owing in a great measure to the devotedness of

In Syria, Egypt and Abyssinia, chiefly through the exertions of the Bishop of Jerusalem, the pure Word of God is being circulated, and we believe, not without evidence of a blessing accom-

panying it.

In British India the work is still advancing, notwithstanding difficulties which beset the labours of the friends of the Bible. The Calcutta Auxiliary has circulated 46,775, the Madras Society

49,421 copies, and the Bengal Society, 13,406.

In China the work of circulating the Scriptures of Truth has been vigourously prosecuted. Of course the recent war has interrupted, in a great measure, these operations; but we trust that this obstacle will ere long be removed out of the way, that the Bible may soon have free course amongst the millions of China. Until the war broke out Colporteurs were employed in many places, in the scattering of the incorruptible seed.

In Southern Africa, the researches of the distinguished missionary and traveller, Dr. Livingston, will doubtless prepare the way for a large dissemination of the Scriptures of Truth among the numerous but hitherto comparatively unknown tribes of Africa. It is interesting to notice that Mr. Moffat has just completed the translation of the Scriptures into a dialect known to most of the tribes visited by Dr. Livingston. How remarkable is the coincidence, and how interesting the fact, that just when the door is open, the Bible is ready to be introduced in an intelligible dialect.

In the West Indies, in the South seas, and in Australia, the work is being carried on energetically and successfully. In short, there are few regions on the face of the Globe to which the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society are not extended.

From a communication just received from the Secretary of the Parent Institution, we understand that for the year just ended, the Report is exceedingly favorable. The receipts from all sources amounted to £138,749 17s. 3d.; and the expenditures to £138,985 3s. 5d., while the issues of Bibles and Testaments have been upwards of a million and a half, or 1,517,858.

The following interesting particulars are added, to show the progress of the cause in various parts of the world:—

"In Sweden and Norway our Agencies have been particularly active in prosecuting the work of Bible distribution, the year's issues in the former country having been 82,300, and in the latter, 26,000. In the northern parts of Norway the destitution of the Scriptures is still very great; in proof of which I may mention, that as the result of an enquiry, set on foot in the Diocese of Tromsoe in 1855, it was found that in 34 Parishes alone, there were 9000 families without a Bible, and 5000 without even a New Testament; and this in a Protestant land. Should circumstances prove favorable, an attempt will be made in the course of the summer, to remedy this lamentable deficiency. In France, our work has been prosecuted as usual, and with continued success. The Colporteurs meet with a most encouraging reception among the peasantry, and a spirit of enquiry has been awakened in various directions. The main want in France now is a numerous body of devoted evangelists, to carry on and complete the work which our Col. porteurs have commenced. The men are to be had, but alas! the funds requisite for their support are not forthcoming; and in consequence, we do not see the fruit which would otherwise be produced.

"In Switzerland, 23,000 copies have been put in circulation; in northern Italy, 11,300; in Germany, through our three Agencies, 173,600. In Turkey our work is assuming great magnitude, and good is doing. We have been recently informed of the existence in Constantinople, of a small Protestant Turkish Church, comprising 11 members, the Pastor of which is Mr. Williams, himself a convert from Mahommedanism, an interesting account of whom is given at page 259 of the 1st volume of 'The Book and its Missions.' From our two Agents in South America we continue to receive good accounts."

We have received the 47th Report of the Edinburgh Bible Society, from which we learn that the home circulation for the year 1856, amounted to 54,322, being upwards of 6,000 copies above the circulation of the previous year: this of course is exclusive of the foreign circulation, which was very considerable, and embraced numerous grants of Gaelic Scriptures. In the ordinary revenue, there was an increase of upwards of £500 for the year. This Society has, in 77 donations, granted to the British and Foreign Bible Society, upwards of £20,000 sterling.

We have thus taken a survey of the progress which the cause of the Bible is making, not only within our own Province, but

throughout the world. We bless God for the work which he is carrying on. It must be regarded as peculiarly his own work. Let us not with self complacency, rest satisfied with what has been done; but let us continue, yea and increase our efforts, until every house within the limits of our land be blessed with the Word of God, and until that Word shall be brought within the reach of every family and tribe,

"And each remotest nation Has learned Messiah's name."

Let us especially, in the name and strength of God, address ourselves to the work of Bible dissemination in our own land. No barrier, of a constitutional or legal nature, stands in the way. Our laws view with equal favor the rich and the poor, the high and the low, the white and the black. No proscribed race within our borders is excluded from the privilege, or rather from the right, of possessing and of reading God's holy Word. Priestly power may try to erect itself as a barrier between the Bible and some of our fellow citizens. But to these, as well as to others, we are called upon to offer the precious treasure. GENERAL AGENTS OF THE SOCIETY.

TO THE SECRETARIES OF THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY. DEAR SIRS .-

I was so fully occupied with the varied duties of my office, together with the necessary preparations for my tour to this country up to the last moment of leaving home, that I had no time to prepare my Journal in the form in which we usually present it in the Annual Report, viz: by giving a conscise and consecutive sketch of all our visits, with the particular circumstances of each branch formed, re-organized or visited during the year. I must now therefore content myself with a mere synopsis, or brief notice of the work generally, referring our friends in each locality to the tabular view and the body of the report for particulars. In the great and heaven-blessed enterprise in which we are engaged, it is cause of deep gratitude and devout thanksgiving to God, that your agents have been enabled year by year, not only to report some progress, but record the most signal and distinguished prosperity. As a proof of this it need only be stated, that during the last five years the receipts have been nearly quintupled, and happily that which has just ended forms no exception in the history of our noble Society. Although we have not had any novel or special object to put forward as a ground for increased liberality, such as "The Jubilee Fund," the Chinese Million Testament Scheme; or the supply of the various departments of the Crimean Army with the word of life, which have all been made subjects of special appeal, yet the interest which was then manifested by the friends of the cause, has during the past year suffered no abatement. This will appear in the gratifying increase in the receipts of upwards of £750 over the unusually liberal returns of the preceding year; an increase as large in proportion as the £9031 of the Parent Society. This also is the more pleasing when we take into the account the very unfavorable character of the past winter for our operations. During that season we visit the principal portion of the work, and receive more than three fourths of our entire

returns. The very early commencement of the past winter found us unprepared to take immediate advantage of its presence; and its sudden and almost instantaneous disappearance left us more unprepared still, to work successfully in its abscence. Your agent travelled by stage, lumber waggon, sleigh on bare ground, borrowed carriage, on foot, and with a freight train on the Grand Trunk Railroad, and in the same carriage with his horse for a short distance, and at an expense of six or seven dollars a day, and all to overtake his work; but in spite of all these efforts, a few appointments in the Saugeen and Owen Sound division were left unvisited. A fine section of country on Lake Erie, inhabited principally by "the Gael," has been added to our territory during the year, and the wealthy and flourishing Township of Scarboro', east of the city, has also taken its place in our evangelistic and extending operations.

Amidst the toils and fatigues of their arduous labours, it is truly refreshing to your agents to witness the spirit of growing liberality which characterises the friends of the cause; from the old and wealthy to the new and most remote settlements, yea to the very out-posts of Canadian civilization. Although we have not a roll of such princely names as "the Kembles and Buxsons, the Dorwardes and Bishopps, the Hendersons and Farmers," of the Parent Society; yet we have those, taking the infallible standard as our rule, of whom it may be said, "These have cast in more than they all." One or two examples may here be cited.

An aged labouring man in one of our country villages contributes three dollars a year, and so determined is he that his contribution shall not decrease with his declining years, that he gathered together all his available funds, to the amount of twelve pounds ten shillings, and deposited them with a friend, that the interest might be devoted annually as his subscription.

At the visit of your Agent to St. Mary's, the noble Juvenile Board under the superintendence of our friend, Mr. Inner, was at the post as usual. Their youthful president came to the platform and read their report with the dignity of a sage, and their contribution of upwards of twelve pounds twelve shillings was voted this year to the French Canadian Missionary Society. The beautiful purse which contained the money was presented to the agent, and another was handed to him for his colleague. This is the third annual contribution of this Juvenile Association, and the result of the first year's efforts has ere this reached the shores of China; may its reflex benefits be found in some Carcy, or Medhurst, or Martyn or Duff, or Livingstone, being raised up from among the little band who shall yet successfully proclaim, where their bibles have gone, the glorious truths which

My estimable friend, the President of the Blenheim Branch, who donated £25 two years ago, proved the truth of the inspired declaration, "there is that scattereth and yet increaseth," for he found himself in circumstances this year again to renew his noble offering to the same amount. Here we may ask, is there an individual on earth,-yea, is there an angel in heaven, that can calculate the moral effects of one hundred copies of the word of God circulated in the land of "The Moslem," at the present momentous and eventful era in its history. Men speak with rapture of the laurels of the battle field, and of the honors of him at whose grave a weeping and grateful nation is chief mourner; but when this world is burned up, and the heavens depart as a scroll, when it is rolled together, where shall the laurels of Thermopylae, and Blenheim-of Badajoz and Corrunna-or of Waterloo and Sebastopol -then be found. There is no immortality in men's actions except so far as they are connected with the Divine glory; and unless they promote this great end, they shall expire and be for ever lost amidst the ruins of a universe in flames. I would rather be the man that sent a hundred Bibles to Turkey, where they are now likely to be read (for we are informed that the Sultan himself has it read to him that he may know its contents), I repeat it, I would rather be such a man in the day that Immanuel is distributing crowns, than be Duke of The Malakoff—hero of Sebastopol. Who that will for a moment look at the present field of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and especially on that which is prospectively opening out before us, without having his soul stirred within him to pray, that its friends may so come up to its help that it may be prepared through its various agencies to go in and possess the land in all its length and breadth. The field which is to be cultivated by the Bible Societies of United Canada stretches from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the boundary line of the American Republic, to those regions trodden and consecrated by the footsteps of the illustrious Franklin and his band of heroes,-whether to the roving tribes of the orignal masters of the soil in their varied and rude vernaculars, or the hardy and adventurous settlers of the Anglo-Saxon family, who shall yet in tens of thousands, people the vast prairies and extensive table lands of the Hudson's Bay Territory to each and to all of these, to every one in his own tongue, the Canada Bible Societies must and will present "the lamp of life," the sacred oracles of the living God. But if we pass for a moment from our own section of the field, and contemplate the mighty cir-

cumference of that which was assigned to the Parent Society at its first organization by the glorious and now sainted Hughes, in the ever-memorable words, "If we get up a Society to give the Bible to Wales, why not for all England? why not for the world?" Occupying the lofty stand, which the last report furnishes, and looking abroad then on the field which is "the world"; we see every where the signs multiplying, the doors opening, and the omens which beckon us onwards to universal conquest bright as the promises of God. Such are the amazing facilities for communication both by sea and land, that the world may now be considered a great household in which resides a family of nations, the languages of two-thirds of these teeming millions are already mastered, and through that portion of the globe hitherto least accessible, a highway has been opened up by that wonderful missionary traveller, Dr. Livingstone, for his tour of exploration will be the pioneer for a band of devoted and self-denying men from the Missionary Churches of Europe and America, who shall follow and take possession of the field in Immanuel's name; and whether their modes of speech be designated languages, dialects, or patois, all shall be acquired and laid under contribution, to disseminate among these sons of Ham the oracles of the living God. And then with the languages of Africa, a few more dialects of America and Asia mastered, and the Parent Society will possess at their great depository, the primitive pentecostal gift, in earth's many tongues, the sacred word of God. Then all that will be wanting will be the pentecostal power, to sanctify and baptize the instrumentalities, and the world shall speedily be subjugated to God. Oh! I delight to contemplate the filling up of the glorious outline which the heavenly-minded Hughes suggested in the words, "why not for the world"? To the Parent Society is assigned the mighty East, with its swarms of peoples and nations; to us with our noble co-adjutor and our powerful ally, "The American Bible Society," the extended West, with its rapidly increasing population. Without being at all too sanguine, or borrowing an idea from our Millenarian friends, may we not confidently hope that before the next Jubilee of the Parent Society shall have arrived, their agents leaving the shores of China and Japan, having supplied them, and embarking on board of a Bible Society steamship, shall proceed on their voyage of exploration among the islands of the Pacific; and ours having crossed the Rocky Mountains, and reached the shores of the same mighty ocean, shall also steam away on its broad expanse to find out whether there is yet some Juan Fernandez that has not received the word, and while thus engaged in this great circumnavigation of Christian charity, both bands shall meet on some beautiful island among its many groups, and together

The following letter from the Chaplain of the Provincial Penitentiary to our agent, the Rev. Lachlin Taylor; received too late to appear in its proper place, is inserted here as a practical illustration of the good being done in that institution, through the instrumentality of God's own word :-

KINGSTON, April 7th, 1857.

MY DEAR SIR, -I have just received your note of yesterday in reference to the Indian, Mr. Augustus Johnson. I should have written to you when I was in Toronto; but, as I remained there but one day only, I had not time. Augustus Johnson was an Indian of the Tuscarora tribe-a portion of which, from its loyalty to the British Throne, emigrated to this Province after the Revolutionary war, and settled on lands along the Grand River, granted for that purpose by the Government.

Johnson was brought up in pure paganism. Once a year this tribe met by preconcerted arrangement, in the forest, for religious purposes. They built an altar of dried cedar—fastened on it, as a sacrifice to the god whom they worshipped, a dog, wild and white, and then, amidst shouting, dancing, the screams of women and the yells of savage men, the wood composing the altar was set on fire, and the sacrificial dog sent off to bear their prayers and good wishes to the spirit land.

Such was the only religion which had been taught to Johnson up to the age of twenty-six. He had once or twice attended religious services among Christians, but being wholly ignorant of the English, he knew not what it meant. Yet, though he had not learned the religion of the whites, he had acquired many of their evil habits. His besetting sin was drunkenness. He told me that he loved strong drinks to such a degree that he would have sacrificed anything to obtain them. Under the influence of strong drinks he became wild and riotous, and almost phrenzied. In 1851, he had become intoxicated, and in that state he went to the stable of the Inn, took a horse and rode away ten miles. He was at once arrested, and tried; and as he could make no defence, (the judge and jury not understanding a word of his language, and he not understanding a word of theirs) he was convicted, and sentenced to hard labour in the Provincial Penitentiary for the term of five

Here he received his first knowledge of the English tongue. He was put to school for half an hour each day, after breakfast and dinner, and in the

course of two years, began to read and understand the English language tolerably well. He could speak four Indian languages before his imprisonment. Although he attended public religious services three times each week, yet up to 1854 (about two years after his first incarceration), though always attentive, he did not seem particularly interested, nor did he make any special enquiries of his chaplain in reference to religion. About this time a Sunday School was established in the prison, and the convicts were arranged in about forty classes, with a teacher for each class. The chaplain explained a chapter each Sunday to these classes. Beginning at the first chapter of St. Matthew, the Sunday School were instructed from Sunday to Sunday, until they had passed through every chapter in the New Testament. It was thus, while reading the Word of God, while closely examining it-comparing verse with verse-chapter with chapter, and the Old Testament with the New-that Johnson became awakened. It was impossible to describe the admiration and pleasure with which he seemed to read the oracles of Divine grace and truth. He spent all his leisure time in studying the Scriptures, which were making him wise unto salvation.

He often spoke to me of his desire to pray alone. His conduct had been remarkably good, and he seldom complained of any hardship; but he thought it was rather too strict an enforcement of silence when the penitent sinner could not make his confession aloud to the Saviour of men. I may here add that the only reason he ever used for desiring to be pardoned, was that he might go to his aged father and mother and tell them before they died of the Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world.

About this time he became ill, and was kept for several weeks in the hospital, and came under the notice of our worthy surgeon, Dr. Sampson, who took a great interest in him—gave him good counsel, and, what Johnson prized above all price, a Bible with marginal references. Johnson had, for a long time, been desirous of obtaining such a Bible, and it was with no common joy that he received this kindly gift. This, with other books from Dr. Sampson, materially aided Johnson, and filled his heart with gratitude to God, both for the gift and the kind friend who gave it. I may here observe in passing that, though Johnson recovered, the mortality here among both the Indians and Negroes is very great. Last year the per centum of mortality among the Indians was 33½—among the negroes, 10, while it was scarcely 2 per cent. among the whites.

But whether this arises from the feeble vitality of these races, or from the sudden change of habits, I am unable to say. I shall note any facts in this connection with much interest in future.

On Johnson's recovery, he was taken into the dining hall as a waiter, where his labour was not quite so severe, and where he had more time for reading and meditation. Moreover, his good behaviour and his Christian bearing favourably impressed all the officers around him, and the rest of his time passed away in prison with much profit and happiness to himself. The Warden, D. Æ. McDonell, Esq., took a deep interest in Johnson, and gave him every opportunity of instruction which the discipline of the prison would admit of his doing. These opportunities were gratefully and diligently employed by Johnson. He carried his Bible with him, and made himself a "man of one book" indeed. At this time he attended the school kept among the convicts by Mr. Gardner, an able teacher, whose kindly sympathies were all enlisted in behalf of this poor Indian. Among other things which he was here taught, was reading, arithmetic, geography, English grammar, writing, and how to teach. Within six weeks after Johnson first took a pen in his hand, he could not only write plainly and with

case and rapidity, but he composed and wrote to his parents and others, several most excellent letters, replete with scriptural truth and Christian experience—letters which showed an amount of scriptural knowledge, which few indeed under the circumstances would have been able to acquire.

His term of imprisonment was to have expired in October, 1856. But in May a few friends interested themselves in his behalf, and in July his Excellency the Governor General, after enquiry into his case, and ascertaining from his chief officers that Johnson, in their opinion, was a reformed man, was graciously pleased to extend to him the Royal Mercy, and he was accordingly pardoned. Two years before this Johnson had told me that if it pleased God to spare him once more to see his nation, he would devote his life to their instruction and reformation, that he would take the Bible and go from house to house, and from tribe to tribe, and read to the Indians and shew them what the great Father had done for them, as well as others.

This intention seems never for a moment to have been absent from his mind, in his brief hours of study, or in his earnest prayers: and it is certainly remarkable how Providence prepared his way. Within two weeks from the time of his release, he travelled more than 300 miles, visited three tribes of Indians, visited his relatives, and became established as the Teacher, Catechist, and Bibte Reader among the Nation of the Oneidas. Here among these Indians, whose dialect he had to master before he could teach them, from that time to this he has had a school of seventy-five children whom he is daily instructing in secular knowledge, and also in the knowledge of Jesus. His Sundays are devoted more especially to religious teaching. His mornings and evenings are spent in carrying into effect his ancient intentions, of going from house to house among his people and reading to them the word of God. He is himself under the superintendence of the Rev. Mr. Flood, the Missionary to the Delawares, who writes that Johnson is winning, or "bids fair to win the whole nation of the Oneidas."

Johnson is well fitted for usefulness among his people, he speaks, reads and writes the English language, and five of the Indian tongues; we hope and pray that he may be faithful to the grace given him. Still he is liable to fall, but should it please God who is rich in mercy, in the midst of every trial to sustain him, and keep him by day and by night, a "great and effectual door is opened" for his usefulness, and he may turn many to righteousness, and himself shine as a star in the firmaraent for ever and ever!

I could write much more concerning this Indian, but I know that this letter is already too long. However I cannot close without stating that the last of the grant of Bibles and Testaments, made by your society to me, was given to this Indian as he left my door, on his way to his present field of duty, with many prayers that God might keep him faithful, and bless his labours among his own people. He is now engaged in the work which had been pointed out to him before he left, and in doing that work we trust he may be endued with grace sufficient for his day. There is also another Indian here, an Oneida, who is I am satisfied, a converted man, and sincere christian. He reads, writes, and copies well; knows something of Grammar, Geography, and Mensuration. Has studied a little Algebra, and altogether may be said to be a tolerable English scholar. He too is determined to apply himself on being released, to instruct his nation, and to labour conjointly with Johnson to bring them to a knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus.

Bolton, Lloydtown, Newton Robinson, and West Essa-I found all doing well, and all in advance in contributions this year. At Wardsville there is no diminution of interest, our attendance at the public meeting was good, and as the result upwards of \$50 was received on purchase account. Our meeting at Chatham on the following evening was a very interesting one. In no part of the province are the contributions more liberal than here. Our excellent President I found as warm as ever in his devotion to our interests. His contribution of £25 was paid with the intimation that a similar sum was forthcoming so long as God was pleased to continue his prosperity. The collection and subscription was between £60 and £70. Windsor and Sandwich, still holding on, and our valued branch at Ambertsburgh as vigilant and liberal as ever. Their contributions had already been forwarded, but I received £5 additional to the Upper Canada Society. Wallaceburgh still in vigorous operation, after preaching to a very large congregation on Sabbath, we held our annual meeting on the following evening, at which I received nearly £18 on purchase account. Florence, a small village formerly called Zone Mills, deserves special notice, the attendance was very large, many having come several miles to be present at our meeting; as the place is rapidly improving, I made a strong appeal to them on behalf of our Society, to which they responded in the unprecedented sum of \$136 61c., which for so small a place is equal to any liberality I have ever met with since my connexion with the Bible Society.

Port Sarnia.—In this rapidly improving town our Society is still keeping pace with the other features of progress, our meeting was large and very effective. The Hon. Malcolm Cameron who presided, gave us a most admirable opening address, and referred with great effect to the Anniversary of the British and Foreign Bible Society in London last year, at which himself and Rev. Mr. Salter, a devoted minister of the Church of England, were present. Most, if not all the ministers of the Town, were on the platform, and powerfully presented our claims to the generous support of the inhabitants of the town and neighborhood. Our little association at Warwick has considerably improved during the year. addition to a free contribution of £5 to the British and Foreign Society, I received £5 on account of an old debt, with which, however, the present Society had nothing to do, on my giving them a receipt in full, to prevent any subsequent application for the same. In passing through the village of Adelaide, I made some enquiries as to whether an opening might not be found for a small branch, but was glad to find that our excellent friends at Strathroy had already canvassed for subscriptions, and had collected nearly £6, a small branch depository is open there, and for the present they will continue in association together, which during its first year's operations has been highly successful. In addition to a former payment of £14, I received upwards of £11, so that their large stock is not entirely paid for.

Bosanquet.—This new Society has commenced operations with much spirit. Our meeting was large and interesting, I received £12 10s. on purchase account, and at Widder succeeded in organizing a new branch, with the promise of much usefulness. A good subscription was taken up, and a staff of officers appointed. I next organized a new branch for McGillivray and Biddulph, an excellent committee was appointed, and a subscription of over \$50 was taken up, with the prospect of much usefulness in the whole

neighborhood.

Cayuga.—Our meeting, though small, was a deeply interesting one; we were favored with the presence of the Rev. Mr. Dobson, of Kingston, who gave us an excellent address, and informed us of an interesting circumstance connected with the conversion of a poor Indian while in the Penitentiary, from reading the Scriptures, who is now employed as a Missionary among the Indians, and is labouring with great sucess. The Rev. Mr. Hill is desirous to have a branch formed at the village of York, when it can be arranged, as he thinks there is a good opening in that place.

Caist orville.—This small branch is still in vigorous operation. A considerable number of Scriptures has been circulated. The meeting was well attended, and the friends renewed their subscription list with increasing interest. I received £7 on Purchase account.

Caledonia.—This flourishing branch was next visited. During the past year the friends have evinced their continued interest, by a considerable addition to their funds. I received £30 as a free contribution between the Upper Canada and British and Foreign Societies. From Dr. Ferrier I received information of one or two openings for branches, which I promised to attend as soon as circumstances would permit.

Streetsville,-Through some mischance no report of this interesting branch was recorded last year. This is the more to be regretted from the fact, that this is one of our best sustained auxiliaries, and has ever been found liberal in contributions, nor have either of the last two years been behind hand in the good work. Their sphere has become somewhat circumscribed, from the fact that a young but very active association has been formed near them, but the friends there are as active as they have ever been in their earnest and hearty co-operation and aid. At Waterdown I found the position of the society most encouraging and successful. After a drive of upwards of fifty miles, I was just in time for the meeting, which was well attended, and I was delighted to receive from this noble branch upwards of £42 for the various purposes of the Society. The next evening I visited a new branch which had been organized by Mr. Taylor, at a new and very small village called Carlisle. The friends had commenced operations with so much success, that in addition to a large amount for Scriptures. I received £4 as a free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Cumminsville.—Here I found another fruitful branch well susstained, and received, after holding an interesting meeting, up-

wards of £10 on purchase account, and £7 as a free contribution. At Nelson, Middle Road, our friends have had a most prosperous year. Their field of labour is small but well cultivated, and this year has produced a large supply-upwards of £17 as a free contribution between the British and Foreign and the Upper Canada Bible Societies. Arrangements were set on foot by the committee to obtain the services of a Colporteur, to visit the township and ascertain the position of the population with regard to the possession of the Scriptures, and a delightful spirit of earnestness appeared to characterize this town in their co-operation and aid. Cookstown.-Although the operations for the year had been somewhat delayed, yet there was no lack of interest, as the period for making their returns was approaching. I received on the occasion of my visit, the sum of £20 as a free contribution. I then proceeded to Weston, where, notwithstanding the extreme unfavourableness of the weather, the attendance was larger than we could have expected. Our friends are still active and energetic in their assistance. Richmond Hill was next visited, and I was delighted to find this branch, where I had first taken part in the operatious of the Society in this Province, still increasing in influence and importance. After a very refreshing meeting, I received upwards of £36 as a free contribution to the Society. The last place that I visited before commencing the winter tour was Buttonville, and at their first anniversary, I was pleased to find something had been done. The attendance was encouraging, and it is hoped that larger results may be soon seen in this locality. received a payment on purchase account.

Our meeting at Hamilton was of the most interesting character,—never had the attendance been larger, or a more christian spirit of Catholic co-operation been more manifest than was evinced by the various ministers, who pleaded the cause of the Bible with energy and power. in both places were large and encouraging. A delightful spirit seemed to prevail. From these branches I received upwards of £20, free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Bowmanville.- None of our b: anches deserve more honorable mention than this excellent and powerful auxiliary, -not less than £90 was in the hands of their Treasurer, as the result of their last year's operations. While the town is progressing more rapidly than perhaps any other place of its size in the Province, it has one pleasing characteristic, that its public men all appear desirous that the interests of religion should not be suffered to get neglected by their rapid temporal success. We held the meeting in the new Town Hall, capable of seating near 800 persons, which was well filled. Rev. Mr. McKerras contributed much to the interest of the meeting, by a most powerful and effective address, which was listened to with great delight by the whole audience. A subscription of about £60 was taken up at the meeting. At Hampton, I found that my excellent colleague had, at the time of his last visit, succeeded in infusing so much spirit into their officers and friends as to lead them to redoubled exertion in the good cause. I received nearly £10 as a donation to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Columbus, -a very fruitful branch, vigorous, growing, and earnest; year by year making steady progress. Besides keeping on hand £10 for a fresh supply of Scriptures, I received £25 as a free contribution, to be equally divided between home and foreign opera-Brooklyn, though only formed last June, great interest has been taken in our Society. We had an excellent meeting, at which I received nearly £20 for Scriptures, and a free contribution of £3 11s. 10d. to the Upper Canada Bible Societies.

Notwithstanding the fact that the last two named societies are both offshoots from this productive branch, in addition to others previously incorporated, we have still to report our tried auxiliary at Oshawa more zealous and fruitful than ever. Clarke.-For several years this society has worked with much energy and zeal in the prosecution of our enterprise. Not quite so much appeared to have been done during the past year; but a new impetus seemed to be felt at the meeting, which I trust may continue during the year. I received £20 as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society, of which £5 was voted to Lower Canada, and £5 to the Indian Translation Fund. I have found many of our branches greatly interested in this translation, and several have made special contributions to this object. Two years ago, our excellent friend, Rev. T. Short, of Port Hope, insisted, much against their will, upon separating the Township of Hope from the Town as a distinct organization. My colleague, in his report last year, mentioned that the wisdom of this course had been already seen, as the Town had raised more than when both were united. I found our friends in the country thoroughly determined to do all in their power to aid in the good work; the Committee mainly composed of plain, practical farmers, had held a series of meetings in different school houses in the neighbourhood, as the result of which earnest efforts, I had the pleasure to receive nearly £40 as a free contribution between the British and Foreign and the Upper Canada Bible Societies.

Port Hope.—This excellent branch, notwithstanding the offshoot above referred to, I found more vigorous than ever. Our meeting was very large and enthusiastic-the speaking of the highest order. The pastors of all the evangelical denominations zealously co operating in the same glorious cause. I received £78, including a donation of £12 10s. between each of the Missionary Societies in the Lower Province, through our Association. On the following morning I started for Montreal, and found in the cars several ministers and friends bound for the same destination; after a delightful journey, we reached the city in time for their Bible Anniversary. I attended the prayer meeting in the morning, at which Rev. Mr. Green, the agent of their society, gave an interesting account of his labors during the year. In the evening the large Wesleyan Church was crowded; it was calculated that at least 3,000 persons were present. As reports of the meeting have appeared in the papers, I need not refer to it at length, more than to say that everything passed off most delightfully; and one very interesting feature was, that though there were eight speakers, the benediction was pronounced at a quarter before ten o'clock. The

next evening I attended the Anniversary of the Lower Canadian Missionary Society, when the same capacious chapel was again densely crowded to the very doors, while every inch of standing ground in the aisles was occupied. The influence of this Christian fraternization on the protestant community is most marked, and the delightful interchange of Christian sentiment most refreshing. I was charged to convey to our Committee the most affectionate expression of good will and esteem, and the hope that as the facilities for travel increased, that intercourse between the two societies might also increase. The remembrance of my visit will long remain. On my return, I was reminded that there is a dark as well as a bright side to everything in which we engage. The weather, which had been delightful during the whole week, suddenly became as unpleasant; heavy drifts of snow impeded our progress, and we were at length brought to a complete stop about four miles west of Brockville, where we had to remain twentyfour hours,-in consequence, of which I did not reach Port Hope till five o'clock on Monday morning, after passing two days and two nights in the cars. I had fortunately taken the precaution to write to the Rev. Mr. Smith of Grafton, and sent him a copy of the report, hinting that as I had to depend upon the cars, I might probably be detained, and requesting him in this case to hold the meeting without me. This he at once attended to, and I had the gratification to hear from him that the meeting passed off very well. I received from him their purchase account in full, and upwards of £7 as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. I next visited Coldsprings, where I found that something had been done during the past year; I received £6 7s. 4d. on purchase account, and £1 5s. as a free contribution. Baltimore was next visited, and although the organization had only commenced last summer by Mr. Taylor, I found that the friends had commenced with so much energy that I received their purchase account in full, and £20 as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Cobourg, our attendance was large and interesting; about £50 had been raised in subscriptions during the year, but as they have a very large stock on hand, the Committee resolved that all proceeds for the past year should be paid on purchase ac-The Rev. Mr. Short came over from Port Hope and gave an admirable address. We had an excellent staff of speakers. I next proceeded to Brighton, where there has been an excellent society for many years; the past has, however, been their most successful one; the lady collectors had done their duty nobly; a large number of scriptures are annually disposed of. I received nearly £28 on purchase account, and a free contribution of upwards of £9 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Frankford.-I was happy to find this branch, on the whole, in a prosperous condition. We had a good meeting. I received from the president £5 6s. 6d. on purchase account, and from the Society £15 10s. as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. A new Treasurer and Secretary were carefully selected, and I trust the next visit of your agent will find them in a healthy and a vigorous position. At Norwood, owing to the absence of the President, and the removal of the Secretary, no notice of my intended meeting had reached them, though I had taken the precaution to write to both these officers. I met with my old friend, J. Fowles, Esq., at Hastings, a warm friend of the Society, who took me round to his family and workmen, from whom I received £2 10s. as a free contribution to the Society, I also received £5 16s. 3d. on purchase account. I next proceeded to Scarboro', where my excellent colleague had recently organized an association, and never did I witness more earnest desire to discharge their duty than was manifested by the committee on this occasion; owing to the state of the roads it had been decided to hold the meeting in the day time, previous to which the committee had assembled for business. I received the amount of their invoice for the Scriptures and proceeded to Erin, where, after preaching on Sabbath, we held an interesting meeting on Monday evening; this branch is active and earnest in the good work. I received £27 13s. 10½d. as a free contribution between the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies. At Nassagaweya our friends were as usual up to the mark, and as hearty as ever in their manifestation of interest in our affairs; I received £6 19s. on purchase account, and a free contribution of £10 10s. between the British and Foreign and the Upper Canada Bible Societies.

I then concluded my visits to the branches, at Eramosa, long known as one of our best associations. We had a delightful meeting, and from the report we learned that this year's operations had been in advance of preceeding ones; I received £29 free contribution, which was appropriated as follows: £10 for the Indian translation fund, £10 to the Upper Canada Bible Society, £5 of which was for the Lower Canadian Missionary Society, and £9 for the circulation of the Scriptures in Turkey, by the British and Foreign Bible Society. That the God of the Bible may continue to prosper the noble Society, and that the world may soon be adequately supplied with the Book, is dear sirs, the earnest desire of

The Annual Meeting of this society was held on Wednesday evening, 20th May, in the Richmond Street Wesleyan Methodist Chapel. The Hon. Robt. Baldwin presided, and on the platform we observed the following gentlemen:—

The Rev. William Reid, one of the Secretaries, then rose and read the Report.

The Rev. John Gemley then rose to move the first resolution, to the effect that the Report now read should be printed and circulated, and naming the office-bearers for the ensuing year. He remarked that a scene like the present was one of the deepest interest to every pious mind, and that the associations which clustered around the history of this society, must be productive of the most delightful thoughts to all who are interested in the progress of truth. He said that the institutions of any country may be looked upon as the exhibition of their degree of greatness, and that this is especially the case in reference to this nation, on which a gracious Providence has bestowed the rich boon of liberty. The anniversaries of our religious organizations may be looked upon as the festivals of the Christian Church; and Sir, (said he,) I believe I may say, with regard to the present year, that no one has been distinguished by anniversaries of more interest, or of greater promise. This anniversary may be regarded as the chiefest among the chief; for the reason that each different body casts its sectarianism aside; it belongs to all. On this occasion we unite to do honour to the King of kings, by promoting the Bible cause; we do honour to Christ who is the author of the Bible, and we are not to be surprised that every section of the Christian Church is represented in such a cause. I cannot but hail with the greatest pleasure the delightful contemplations which are communicated in the Report of the anticipations of success. Any man with less energy than the Rev'd. Lachlan Taylor would have frequently remained at home, under the pressure of the disease with which he was suffering, and I am sure that as God is blessing the labour of his servants, there is also a blessing in the selection of those servants. The Bible is indeed our all; it is the boon of the world, the enlivener of our hopes; it is our regeneration, our star of promise, guiding us to a richer promise of glory. Every society whose desire it is to promote the welfare of mankind, has had many obstacles thrown in its way by the advocates of error, but our success only furnishes us with additional proofs of the divinity of the Bible. Its power has often been opposed, but hitherto without success; it has stood the fire of the keenest investigation,

while the same fire has burned many a poem of artistic skill, the historical proof of many a book, and of many a work of philosophy. But the Bible remains untouched; not a page of it has suffered. It is a pillar of fire which goes before us in the wilderness; and though many have tried to scare it away, hitherto it has guided us safely, and still holds out to us promises of eternal happiness. And with regard to its adaptation to our wants, the evidence is not confined to the higher ranks of society, but it comes from the humble and the poor. Many of you have read of that extraordinary man who, in his 16th year went up to Paris to complete his studies, renounced Catholicism, adopted the reformed religion, and after gaining a great literary reputation, when on his death bed his last words were, "If I had another year to live, I would spend it in reading the Psalms of David and the epistles of Saint Paul." This is a tribute worthy of being recorded. The Rev. Gentleman concluded his interesting address by referring to the very old Bible in Magdalene College, Oxford, with a silver plate on the cover, on which is an engraving representing Tindal, Coverdale and others, at a table, (on which is a candle) engaged in translating the Bible; by them stood Luther, and on the other side the Pope, and at his side a gentleman whose name he forebore to mention in public, who is trying to blow the candle out, and Luther is represented as saying, "You may try, but you cannot do

(Applause.)

The Rev. John Laing, of Scarboro', in seconding the resolution dwelt on the prospective aspect of the Report submitted. The work yet to be done is great and might well discourage the church. She has now the sure word of promise that the gospel will prevail, and that in the latter days the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established. But past progress gives assurance of future progress-all God's ways are progressive. In creation there were various stages of progression; the same law holds in the production alike of animals and vegetables. In all the works of Providence it operates, and above all in the work of grace. From the time that the first promise was whispered in Eden, till it was accomplished in the advent of Christ, progression is evident, alike in the charms of revelation, and the extent of its objects. But the history of the Christian Church especially exemplifies the law of progress-first planted by Apostles and watered with their blood, established and nourished by miracles; then having its glory eclipsed by the darkness of the middle ages, when almost nothing of the light of christianity was seen; and again bursting forth at the Reformation purified, and more than ever powerful in its influence; then passing through the fiery ordeal of a Rationalistic criticism, and at length coming forth with the Bible, her foundation and her character, more pure, better vindicated, and commanding the attention of all; yet again bursting forth in the age of associations, no longer to vindicate the Word, but to spread it,-not to defend, but to establish everywhere the ordinances of the Gospel. Much has been done; the Bible is now free to all, and within the reach of all. The church has a more intelligent hold of the Truth. The effect on the community is powerfully felt, even in the more public spheres of life. We are too apt to forget our privilege and honour in being connected with the glorious work. Veteran regiments and warriors boast of their victories, and so may christian societies and christian soldiers; and the christian has this advantage, that not one deed of devotedness will be forgotten by his Captain. Much has to be done; but with no faltering step God's church must go on to certain triumph, till every enemy is subdued, and

The above is but a mere outline of Mr. Laing's speech, which was delivered with much energy and was warmly applauded.

BISHOP EASTBURN then rose and addressed the meeting as follows: Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen,-It is now a great many years since, during a summer excursion, I found my way to this beautiful spot, which now, for the second time, I have the pleasure of visiting. And my mind, since arriving here, has naturally revolved the changes that have taken place, during this long interval of time, in the moving world around us. Generations have passed away, and new ones come forward to supply their place. And the individual pilgrimage of each of us to the eternal world has been marked, all along the way, by those desolating sorrows which the arm of death brings, and which leave us in circumstances wholly opposite to those in which they found us. And yet, while I have thought of the object that brought me here, after so lengthened a space of years-and more especially since entering this place, and looking at this large assembly, convened for the blessed purpose of promoting the circulation of God's Holy Word-I have reflected with sweet joy and peace that there is one thing that never changes and that is, God's own blessed revelation. This Book, my Christian freinds remains the same. It is the same in its necessity, as disclosing the only light that shines over the darkness of the grave. It is the same indispensable provision of a Saviour for those who are now living, as it was for those who have quitted the stage. It is the same security for monarchies and republics now, as it was during the years that have passed away. It is the one unchanging and unchangeable medicine for the conscious guilt, the fears, and the sorrows of the world; it speaks the same needed promises in all times, and in all places; it is unmoved while all else is moving; it is in the world, and yet not of the world; and, like its glorious Author, the same "yesterday, and to-day, and for ever." And now Sir, allow me to give tongue to a sentiment, which I have often uttered on occasions similar to the present, and which I cannot refrain from uttering now, and which, I am sure, will find a response from every Christian heart through all this large I beg to speak of the real delight which we ought to feel whenever, consistently with the obligations of preference by which we are bound, respectively, to our own branch of Christ's Church, we can meet, in union with God's true people of every name, for the promotion of the glory of a common Saviour. It really seems to me, my friends, as if, the longer we live, the more, if our hearts are under the influence of the gracious Spirit, must such a spectacle as this to-night awaken feelings of joy and satisfac-And there can be little doubt that the tendency of every year's added experience of the preciousness of the Gospel, is to increase our convictions of the real unity of all who are glorying in that Gospel. I should be the last to depreciate the value of any conscientious differences on points of ecclesiastical order; but I think that, at the outset of our Christian course, we are sometimes apt to commit an error, not in attachment to our own constitution and regimen, but in placing these things out of, and above their true position. But, by degrees, we attain a deeper knowledge of our own sinfulness, and helplessness, and ruined condition-and of that remedy which God has provided for a perishing world, in the sacrifice of His dear Son. And then we begin to feel, that to know Christ as a Saviour is the one thing needful-and that this is that, after all, which is to be the only comfort in death, and the only plea at the great and final day; and that, therefore, every one who is in Christ is really one with all others who are living by faith in Him who is "the way, and the truth, and the life." It seems, then, as if we really ought to rejoice in any occasion which, like the present, affords a

practical demonstration of the fact that the various bands of Christ's redeemed followers, though distinct in the position they occupy, are united by one sacred bond of love to Him who "first loved us." My friends, when the armies of England go forth to conflict, each different regiment has its own uniform, and it has its own colours, and each soldier of that regiment looks with exultation upon the names inscribed upon those colours, of the battle fields upon which, in other days, it has won for itself enduring renown. But, in another respect all these regiments are one. They are bound together by chivalrous devotion to their one Sovereign. They are united by the fact that they are marching against one and the same enemy; and, likewise, their hearts beat with the hope that, after their days of battle are over, they shall land on the shores of the same country of their home and their affections. Now, is it not so with us? Those of us, for example, in this assembly, who are of the Church of England, feel a reasonable joy in being marshalled under her standard. We are more than satisfied with her appointments and arrangements. And our eyes and hearts glow at the record, written upon her banner, of the noble army of her martyrs, who have witnessed for the truths of Protestantism amidst the fury of the flames. But we do not, and we cannot, forget that, towering above all other names upon her standard, is the name of Christ as our leader-and that, accordingly, all who follow Christ are with us, if they are not of us. We cannot forget that the end we have in view is the breaking down of the strongholds of the world and the devil; and that, therefore, all who would bring into captivity to Christ that same enemy are, by that very fact, our brethren and our friends. And is it not cheering, Sir, to feel that we, and all those who are agreed with us in fundamental truth, may, by uniting as we do in this institution. and in any other practicable and concistent way, present a solid phalanx against our common foe? Is it not especially cheering, in these times of warfare with multitudinous enemies? We have, on one side, those who are aiming to palm upon us once more, in these latter days, human authority, in place of God's own word; a sacrificing and absolving priesthood, instead of a band of preachers of the one great sacrifice; and forgiveness through sacraments, instead of justification by faith in Him whom it is our privilege to commemorate at His table. And then, in an opposite direction, we have those who are explaining away the vital doctrine of the atonement of the Son of God, and, with profane hand, beckoning men away from the simple truths of the Bible by the seductions of a rationalizing philosophy. And then we have to contend against the power of Mammon, and the tide of worldly living, and every form either of theoretical infidelity or of practical unbelief: Is not all this a reason for loving, and as far as we can, working with all who "love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity?" Can we not all, in this state of things, see ground for responding to the pithy and vigorous language of the Rector of Helmingham? "Depend upon it," says Mr. Ryle, "all Protestants must hold together, if they mean to 'hold fast that which is good.' " But there is another aspect of this Society, Mr. President, for the sake of which, independently of the great object which it has in view, we ought to rejoice in its existence; and I will take the liberty of detaining you and this audience a few moments longer by adverting to it on this occasion. This Bible Society, and all similar societies, established with the view of sending over the earth the word of God, without note or comment, are a public, decisive recognition of the great truth, that the Scriptures are the only and sufficient rule of faith and practice. What a wide-spread, majestic, all-pervading testimony to this truth, is spoken to the world by that mother of us all, the British and Foreign Bible Society! What a far-

reaching witness is rendered by that national institution of this western world, the American Bible Society! Now, sir, if we did nothing else than this, by thus banding together for the circulation of the inspired volume, we should do a work worthy of the labours and the treasures expended. For, by the very fact of our existence, we say to mankind what the master has already said, and what therefore he would have us to say after him, "Search the Scriptures, for they are they which testify of me." And, my Christian friends, is there no especial need of such a testimony as this, in the days on which we have fallen? For, in this nineteenth century, we have been told once more, that it is not enough for us that, to navigate our bark over the ocean of life into the haven of rest, we are furnished with a light from heaven, shining upon the pages of the written word; but co-ordinately with this, and running down in a parallel line from primitive antiquity, there comes to us the equally blessed illumination of a so-called oral tradition. And we are told, moreover, that this blessed book, revealed as it was to be the guide of the lost, and the light of the blind, needs the Church as the infallible interpreter to make it plain. Now, my Christian friends, it is quite unnecessary to say to an audience like this, that no sound aids to the profitable reading of the inspired volume are to be rejected as useless; but you and I will both say, that they are nothing more than aids. Neither would I deny the value of primitive antiquity; but you and I must say, if we are true to our privileges, that this antiquity is valuable, not as the director of our faith, but simply as a confirming witness to those facts which the inspired pages already contain. Still less, I trust, will any among us, in our desire to send the word of God over the earth, be disposed to leave out of sight the ordinance of the Christiaan ministry. For of the institution of this very ministry the Bible contains the record; and it is God's own appointment for lifting up Christ on high; and, wherever this ministry dispenses the true bread of life, and preaches that word which alone it has been commanded to preach, there God will honour it as the chiefest instrument of promoting his own glory in the salvation of men. But, sir, there are dark habitations of this globe, where the voice of the living teacher is never heard. There are lanes, and streets, and mountains and plains, here at home, where "darkness covers the earth, and gross darkness the people." And how glorious the assurance, made certain by God's own promise, that this book which we are disseminating, penetrating to those recesses of ignorance, and, wherever else it may go, requires no other accompanying power than the Holy Ghost, shining upon its pages, to give man the knowledge of all that is necessary to know, and to bring him to present peace, and final glory! Yes, my Christian friends, God is his own interpreter. His word it is that is truth, and he sanctifies through that truth. Blessed be his name for the promise! Let us rejoice in an institution which recognizes this great principle. It is that principle which the glorious Reformation brought out full before the world. It is that principle which the vigorous pen of Bishop Horsely has illustrated in that noble passage, which ought to be written in letters of gold. "These Berean Jews," says he, "compared the parallel passages of St. Paul's oral doctrine with the written Scriptures of the Old Testament. And we now should with equal diligence compare the written doctrine of St. Paul, and of his fellow-labourers, with the writings of the Old Testament. It is incredible to any one, who has not in some degree made the experiments what a proficiency may be made in that knowledge which maketh wise unto salvation, by studying the Scriptures in this manner, without any other commentary or exposition than what the different parts of the sacred volume

mutually furnish for each other. I will not scruple to assert, that the most illiterate Christian, if he can but read his English bible, and will take the pains to read it in this manner, will not only attain all that practical knowledge which is necessary to his salvation, but, by God's blessing, he will become learned in everything relating to his religion in such a degree that he will not be liable to be misled, either by the refined arguments or by the false assertions of those who endeavor to ingraft their own opinion upon the oracles of God. He may be safely ignorant of all philosophy except what is to be learned from the sacred books, which indeed contain the highest philosophy adapted to the lowest apprehensions. He may safely remain ignorant of all history; except so much of the history of the first ages of the Jewish and of the Christian church as is to be gathered from the canonical books of the Old and New Testament. Let him study these in the manner I recommend, and let him never cease to pray for the illumination of that Spirit by which these books were dictated; and the whole compass of abstruse philosophy and recondite history shall furnish no argument with which the perverse will of man shall be able to shake this learned Christian's faith. The Bible thus studied will, indeed, prove to be what we Protestants esteem it, a certain and sufficient rule of faith and practice, a helmet of salvation, which alone may quench the fiery darts of the wicked. Sir, I have occupied long enough the time of this Christian assembly. I will only say, before sitting down, how grand is the privilege which God has committed to those two great Anglo-Saxon and Protestant nations, England and the United States, to be co-workers with each other, and with Himself, in publishing abroad the knowledge of that great salvation of which this Book of Books is the record. May this union ever go on more and more! May there be no other provocation between them, than the provoking to love and good works. May there be no contest save that glorious contest, who shall be most active in extending the blessings of God's illuminating, healing, and saving word! And, my Christian friends, let us never forget, amidst our labours in imparting the Scriptures to others, the duty of continually reading these Scriptures for ourselves; and thereby insuring, day by day, our personal union with the Saviour whom they reveal. For how melancholy the thought, that any of us should be engaged in dispensing to others a volume, which is not used as the indispensible instru-ment of our own salvation! By individual resort to the Bible, may we be ever keeping alive in our hearts the sense of its value, and thus gain fresh zeal in communicating to the destitute those wondrous pages, which, in the magnificent language of the dedication of King James's Bible, are "that inestimable treasure, which excelleth all the riches of the earth; because the fruit thereof extendeth itself, not only to the time spent in this transitory world, but directeth and disposeth men unto that eternal happiness which is above in heaven!"

He concluded by reading the following resolution:

"That as the Bible, in every country where it has free course, yields the fruit of liberty, intelligence, and virtue, those necessary conditions of a nation's prosperity, and at the same time, by revealing the truth as it is in Jesus, is able to make men wise unto salvation, it is our most bounden duty to provide, as far as in us lies, that every inhabitant of Upper Canada may read, in his own tongue, the wonderful work of God."

Rev. Dr. Wilkes (Montreal) seconded the resolution. He said he had been commissioned to bear to the Upper Canada Bible Society, the congratulations of an older society. not think the Upper Canada Bible Society was quite so old as that. But though a younger sister she is mightier, greater than the other, for she has circulated this year some thirty-two thousand copies of the Word of God, while we below have circulated only twelve thousand, or about one-third of the number. This is a matter not of regret to the Montreal Society, which rejoices to see the younger sister doing better than the elder, and is glad she attends to her duty so well. Allow me then, Sir, (said the Rev. Dr. as he walked towards the Chairman,) to approach you, and let Montreal and Toronto shake hands. The work in which our societies are engaged is a great and glorious work. Dr. Eastburn has set clearly before us its aspect in relation to the interests of Protestantism, and there are so many aspects in which it appears, that it is difficult to choose at which to look-on which to dilate. I would say a few words of that sentence of Jeremiah, (who lived in days when the prophets prophesied falsely,) where he says, "what is the chaff to the wheat? saith the Lord. I send my word like a fire, like a hammer which breaketh the rock in pieces." I was about to call this a noble sentiment, but I will not use such an expression when speaking of the words of the most high God. God's word when used by him, has it not broken the security of many of us, have we not felt ourselves under its hammer, nearly ruined and lost? What a mighty agency it has been in our experience in this matter! how it comes and breaks the stoney unbelief which has grown around our hearts, and which would otherwise crush us and keep us from knowing the truth. You have seen a building in flames, oh! how the fire leaps, and gets through every crevice, and penetrates all. So it is with the word of God, it penetrates the entire man, quickening and enlivening and purifying him. Then when the weary traveller sees through the night, a fire at a distance, he goes in at the open door, warms himself, and feels refreshed; so it is with the word which warms our hears. It is also our lighthouse, our guide through the way; walk ye in it. Then, too, this fire melts metals both common and precious. Gold and silver will not break, but put them into the fire and they will become fused and melted. And so it is with these hearts of ours; which no hammer can break, but which the love of Christ will melt. The work which we are doing, is the scattering of this Bible throughout all countries. We feel it is the thing to make man happy here, and to lead him to the rest his Father in Heaven has prepared for him. I rejoice that the Lord has enabled you to do so much in this work; but should not Canada engage more largely in sending forth the Scriptures to foreign lands? We have done something below for the Chinese, but not so much as we might have done, if we were thoroughly awake to the importance of the matter; of completely evangelising the world by the spirit of Christ.

After a few more sentences the Rev. Dr. concluded an eloquent address amidst loud applause.

Professor Wilson of University College, moved the next resolution:

"That while we gratefully mark the onward progress of this society and acknowledge with heartfelt gratitude how much of this we owe te the earnest labours of our agents, and to the untiring exertions of numerous friendly societies; we also congratulate our sister societies in their growth and usefulness, and rejoice with them in the maturer strength of the parent society, and feeling that all who labour in this great cause are brethren, we bid a hearty welcome to those friends who have favoured us with their presence, and pray God to prosper the work of their hands."

He said the resolution covered a large space. It called upon us to acknowledge the services of our agents, and to express our sympathies with the sister societies in this Province. And we were not to forget that we were branches of that great society which had accomplished, and was yet

destined to accomplish greater victories. And especially would be dwell upon that, and express his hearty thanks to those who had come so far to join in a cordial union with them. He felt peculiar joy in expressing the delight with which they received the reverend prelate from the neighboring State. It encouraged them to know that it was not forgotton there, that they both had their descent from those illustrious confessors and martyrs of England's Reformation, who had made their blood the seed of their church, and when at the stake in Smithfield and elsewhere, had borne testimony to that faith which had achieved such noble victories, in the cause of Christian truth; and therefore did the members of the Church of England feel gratified to unite with their brethren in this cause. The learned gentleman then passed in review different phases in the history of Protestantism, and expressed his disapproval of a new translation of the Scriptures, endeared to us as the one we use is by so many historical associations, and concluded by urging the duty they lay under to supply the Indians with the Scriptures in their own tongues, "so that if it should be our fate to meet them in the future world, we should not be charged with having failed to give to the poor Indians the glorious Gospel of the Prince of Peace."

Mr. S. B. Johnson, one of the agents of the Society, next spoke. He said they would be glad to hear that there were many persons in the backwoods who were striving to better their condition by the aid of the Word of God. One of the most delightful things he had ever witnessed was sixteen or eighteen individuals, most of them past the prime of life, who had assembled at the house of a rich farmer to consult how they best could aid the work of Bible distribution through the entire neighborhood. During the past year more than a million bibles had been circulated among the nations—never had there been a year in which more gratifying accounts had come to their hands. Mr. Johnson then in warm terms reiterated the welcome which had been previously uttered in favour of those gentlemen who had come from a distance, and concluded an energetic speech by seconding the resolution,

After a collection, at which we understand about £50 was received, and votes of thanks to the chairman and the choir, the benediction was pronounced by the Bishop of Massachusetts, and the congregation separated—the organ meanwhile playing "God Save the Queen."

REPORTS OF BRANCHES.

CPPINETY.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AURORA BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

According to public notice, the anniversary of our Society was held in the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel in this village. Joseph Hartman. Esq., M. P. P., was called to the Chair; the meeting was opened by reading Scriptures and prayer, by J. C. Gekie, Esq., of Toronto. The Chairman, after stating the objects of the meeting, called upon the Secretary, who read the following Report:—

Your Committe, in laying before you this their first Annual Report, do so with feelings of pleasure to themselves and gratitude to Almighty God for the measure of prosperity which he has vouchsafed to the Society during the twelve months which have elapsed since its formation. Your Committee felt it a high privilege and honour to aid in any way the glorious work of the Bible Society, which, from its first establishment up to the present moment, has been most abundantly blessed by that God whose word it has so widely disseminated, and take this opportunity of expressing a fervent hope that in this neighborhood may arise to bid it God Speed, and by their earnest prayers, as well as liberal contributions, aid it in its great work of spreading God's holy word throughout the entire world, until, through the influence of that word, that blessed time shall have been brought about when the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea-when it shall no longer be necessary for one to say to his neighbour, "Know ye the Lord," but when all shall know him, even from the least unto the greatest.

Your Committee have endeavoured during the past year to ascertain the wants of this neighbourhood in regard to the Word of God, and when persons were found whose circumstances would not admit of their purchasing a Bible, they have been gratuitously supplied.

The Society has circulated a considerable number of Bibles and Testaments during the year, and the Committee, in order to circulate a still larger number and still further to promote the great object of the Institution, have obtained the services of Mr. James Love, as colporteur and agent, whose business of selling books throughout the county, enables him to dispose of many of the Society's Bibles, and to obtain money donations and subscriptions in aid of its funds which would not otherwise be procured.

Your Committee have only met with two cases in which it was deemed necessary to give them Bibles gratuitously, which was done accordingly. We find that almost every person in this neighbour-

In order that you may be fully acquainted with the present condition of the Society, your Committee would now submit a statement of its operations during the year just closed:—Number of Bibles sold, 83; Testaments, 119; Bibles given away, 2; in all, 204 copies of God's word scattered abroad, which will, no doubt, if not in all, at least in many cases, bring forth fruit to the honour and glory of God.

On laying this statement before you, the Committee is aware that this is but the day of small things with us, but they hope the friends of the Society, encouraged by the results of their efforts during the past year, will put forth renewed and increased exertions, so that like the small cloud rising out of the sea, at first only the size of a man's hand, which gradually increased until it had overspread the heavens, and yielded abundance of rain to refresh the thirsty land, this branch small at first, but rapidly extending its usefulness and increasing its labours, shall be the means of sending forth such a a stream of the pure Word of God, which (clear as crystal, and proceeding from the very throne of God and of the Lamb) shall enable many a thirsty soul to drink of that water which, "If a man drink, he shall never thirst again, but it shall be in him as a well of water, springing up into everlasting life."

Your Committee cannot close their Report without urging the claims of the Society on its friends in our midst, and indeed e on every well-wisher of our race. There is too much indifference abroad, even amongst Christians, in regard to the part which each should take in doing God's work, by diffusing or assisting to diffuse His word.

We are thankful to be able to state that this neighbourhood prospered in every way, is pretty well supplied with the Word of Life, and any deficiency which may at present exist, this Society will speedily supply.

But while much has been done, how much is yet to do. How many millions of our race require and are loudly calling for the Word of Life, and who will provide them a supply but those who themselves possess and appreciate "the pearl of great price." Our responsibility is indeed very great, and God will no doubt reckon with us how we discharge it.

Let all the friends of this noblest of all Societies come forward then and aid its efforts, as well by their liberal contributions as their earnest prayers, feeling sure that if he who in the name of a disciple, offers even a cup of cold water to the poorest of Christ's followers, will not be forgotten by the Lord of Glory. He who in like manner sends forth, or by his contribution enables to send forth, the Word of God to poor, perishing sinners, and is thus the means of pointing him to Him who is the Way, the Truth and the Life, will not lose his reward.

THE SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BLENHEIM BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

There is nothing very remarkable to record in the operations of this Society during the past year. As the neighbourhood is well supplied with the Word of God, the sales have been quite limited: out of a pretty good stock on hand in the beginning of the year, a few Bibles and Testaments remain. A few subscriptions have also been received since the last Annual Meeting. The object of every Bible Society is two-fold, viz. to supply the wants of the immediate neighbourhood, and to send the Word of God to those countries in the world which have it not. To the christian mind these are highly important objects. The Christian must be deficient in vital Christianity who does not feel an interest in these important objects. Our country increases in temporal prosperity, and it is gratifying to find, that the funds appropriated for Bible circulation participate in this prosperity, although it may be questioned if the increase in the Society's means bears a fair proportion to the general increase of prosperity. This Society is an old Society, compared with some; yet many branches, but recently formed, display a vigour and liberality greatly surpassing the older Societies. This is a fact which ought not to be concealed, and the knowledge of which ought to have an important influence on the branches of long standing. The Bible remains imperishably the same in value, and it is well when the interest felt in Bible circulation does not abate, but rather accumulate. This is a pleasing fact in the experience of this Society during the past year. The Annual Meeting of the Committee was numerously attended; some were present who had never attended the meetings of the Committee before. Hitherto the purchases have been limited; only such Bibles and Testaments as were immediately wanted, and were likely to meet with a ready sale; but it will be desirable to keep a larger amount of Stock on hand, and it is probable that the Committee will devise such new measures as are most likely to extend the usefulness of the Society.

The amount paid in at the Annual Meeting was £64, of which there was voted for free contribution, £50; reserved for purchase account, £14.

BRANTFORD BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the Brantford Branch Bible Society was held in the Wesleyan Church in this town. There was a large attendance of the members of all denominations, and the entire proceedings proved highly interesting and satisfactory. The meeting being organized by Mr. James Wilkes taking the chair, the Rev. J. Wood, Secretary to the Society, read the following:

TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT.

"The Committee of the Brantford Branch Bible Society beg to present its constituents and supporters with the regular annual account of their stewardship, and to congratulate them on its completion of the Twentieth year of its existence, and its position as one of the oldest and most promising of the many branches of the Upper Canada Society. Like most, if not all, of the members of this great religious confederation, it had its beginning in feebleness and obscurity; but He who often uses the feeblest instrument for the accomplishment of the greatest results, has been pleased to "ordain strength" out of this little one, and through its agency to sow much seed of the kingdom in the neighborhood for whose especial benefit it was formed. The total issues of this branch during the twenty years of its existence have been 6,836 copies; or, suppose them all to have been preserved, about sufficient to place one in every family in the County. Such a result must be eminently gratifying to all the friends of the Bible cause, especially when we remember the prosperous state of the other branches around us.

Shortly after their appointment at the last annual meeting, your Committee determined on another general canvass of the town, to supply any families which might be destitute of the Word of God. A gentleman, in whose fidelity and perseverance the Committee could repose the fullest confidence, undertook the work, and it is believed that much good will result from it. In the course of his visits, about forty destitute families were discovered, of whom over thirty received copies of the Scriptures gratuitously, while several, from their religious persuasion, declined receiving it. These, with other copies issued from the Depository, make the gratuitous issues of the past year, 41 copies of the entire Scriptures, or 383 copies since the commencement of the Society.

The sales at the Depository for 1856, have reached 662 copies,—266 Bibles and 396 Testaments,—making the total issues during the year, including those already named, as gratuitously distributed, 703 volumes; being the largest number yet issued in any year of the Society's operations. Gratifying, however, as this statement may be, it is still only what ought to be looked for, from the brightening prospects and increasing population of the town. Your Committee would respectfully suggest to their successors in office that, as far as possible, this canvass should become an annual effort of the Society; so that every stranger should be greeted, shortly after his arrival in our midst, with the offer of the sacred Scriptures—his guide through life to immortality, and hence the greatest treasure he can possess.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE SOUTH CAYUGA BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY, FOR PARTS OF THE YEARS 1855 & 1856.

Your Committee, in presenting their Annual Report for the third year, beg to state that their sales of Bibles and Testaments during the past year, exceeded by nearly one-third the number sold during the previous year. The number of copies of the Holy Scriptures sold during that period, amount to 24 Bibles and 28 Testaments, together 52 copies, which added to 136 Bibles and Testaments before sold, make a total of 188 Bibles and Testaments sold by the Society since its very recent commencement; besides which, the Society has annually made a donation to the Parent Society, at Toronto, for the purpose of transmitting copies of the Scriptures to the inhabitants of other lands, where ignorance of the word of life all but universally prevails.

The stock of books of this Society, in the hands of our Depositary, consists of 52 Bibles and 38 Testaments, in the English and German languages, of the invoice value of £13 13s. 9½d.

The Receipts of the Society during the past year, amount to £18 4s. 3d., made up as follows:—Subscriptions, £11 17s. 3d.; sale of books, £6 7s., and the payments to £6—leaving a balance in the hands of our Treasurer of £12 4s. 3d. A few subscriptions remain uncollected, amounting to about £1 10s., but this amount your Committee believe will be forthcoming. Against those amounts there is owing the sum of £9 12s. 6d. to the Toronto Society for books.

Your Committee, in presenting this Report, acknowledge with thankfulness the sustainment of this Society, and its gradually increasing resources, yet they desire earnestly and respectfully to urge upon every member the privilege, as well as the duty of using every exertion to extend the list of subscribers, particularly amongst the younger part of the population, whose interest in the object of this Society it is of such vital importance to enlist; and may the blessing of the Lord attend these labours.

REPORT OF THE CHATHAM BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Mr. PRESIDENT.—The time has now arrived when we are called upon to present our Annual Report. The Report of a Branch, so limited in its operations as ours, cannot be expected to contain much of stirring interest. Still everything connected with the Bible ought to be of interest to us. For, what is the Bible? The Bible is the revelation of God's will to the human race. It is Heaven's letter to every member of the human family. It is a message of love from the upper sanctuary. It comes fraught with intelligence of the highest importance. It tells of a great apostasy- of a fearful fall; but it speaks also of a great deliverance. It tells how a fair inheritance has been forfeited; but shews also how a fairer inheritance may be won. It tells how Paradise was lost; but it shews also how Paradise may be regained. It points out the mire in which man is involved by sin; but it reveals also the way of recovery by Christ Jesus. It makes known the way in which man, who is by nature a child of the devil and an heir of perdition, may become a son of God and an heir of heaven. Such being the nature of the information contained in the Bible, anything pertaining to the circulation of it, even on the smallest scale, ought to be of interest.

In their last report, your committee took occasion to refer to the gigantic contest that was waged between the allied powers and the Czar of Russia. In the good providence of God, that contest has been brought to a close. The sword has again returned to its scabbard. The dark cloud of war has been dispelled: peace again reigns among the nations of the earth. Long may she continue to do so! May her reign be lasting! May it be long ere the demon of war be let loose to ravage and destroy!

In regard to the late contest, while it is melancholy to think it was attended with so much bloodshed and that so many brave men found a grave far away from the home of their youth, it is at the same time pleasing to reflect that so much was done to promote their spiritual well-being. We learn that no less than 150,000 copies of the Scriptures, in the English, Welsh, French, Italian, Turkish, and Russian languages were circulated by the British and Foreign Bible Society among the British sailors and soldiers, among the troops of their allies, and among their enemies and prisoners of war. Who can tell the amount of good that may result from the dissemination of so large a number of Bibles. God's Word will not return unto Him void. In some cases the good seed may have fallen into unproductive soil; we cannot but believe, however, that in others, it has fallen into good ground, where it will bring forth a rich harvest The above, however is but a small part of what has been done by the Parent Society. In various parts of the world during the year it has circulated copies of the Scriptures to the amount of nearly a million and a half in round numbers, The Upper Canada Bible Society, too, has been doing a good work, having, with its various auxiliries, circulated 32,383 copies.

Taylor, the indefatigable and able agent of the Society, preached to a large congregation in our Methodist Church. On the following evening, the public meeting was held in the Town Hall, where, in addition to the speech of Mr. Taylor, addresses of a suitable character were delivered by parties residing in the town and neighbourhood. The meeting was a most successful one: the attendance was large, the speaking was good; but the crowning excellence of the meeting was the subscription and collection, which amounted to about £114, the President heading the list in the hanndsome figure of £25. The greater part of this has been collected. £40 were given to Mr. Taylor, as a free contribution; £30 to the British and Foreign, and £10 to the Upper Canada Bible Societies.

Your committee have further to state, that they have endeavoured to keep on hand at the Depositories, such a supply of Bibles, Testaments, and Psalm Books as was calculated to meet the wants of the community, selling them at cost prices. They have also commenced a canvass of the town, for the purpose of ascertaining the amount of Bible destitution that exists, with the view of supplying that destitution; but as this canvass has not yet been completed, the result cannot be stated at present.

The Committee of the Durham Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society beg leave to report, that during the past year the efforts which have been put forth in aid of this branch in their place, have not been so spirited as might be desired, which circumstance they deeply regret, and they entertain the idea that in order to create an interest in the minds of the inhabitants generally to sustain the valuable institution with which they are connected, it behoves them to bring more prominently the objects the Society has in view, before the public at large, by more frequently holding meetings for such a purpose, and adopting some more active means than at present exists amongst us for the greater distribution of the Scriptures. By a reference to the account of the Treasurer and Depositary now submitted, it will be found that the extent of sales of Bibles and Testaments from the shelves of the Depository, have been but very limited, in contrast with the large amount of stock on hand; in order to dispose of such stock more rapidly in future, your Committee have in view the beneficial results which would flow from the adoption of a system of Colportage, and would heartily recommend the immediate engagement of a suitable person to act in such a

The subscriptions toward the funds of our branch, fall considerably short of those of last year; but it is no difficult matter to account for the deficiency, when we consider how small the circulation of money is in this locality in comparison with that period; in fact, we can with truth declare, that the depression in general business throughout this section of country, is unprecedented.

Trusting, however, that an improvement will speedily take place in matters both sacred and secular, under the guidance of Him who ruleth supremely over the nations of the earth.

Your Committee deem it advisable to state, for the information of any individual not previously acquainted with the circumstances attending the origin of this Branch Society, that it was formed at a meeting held in this place on the evening of Dec. 24th, 1855, by appointment of the Rev. Lachlan Taylor and Mr. S. B. Johnson, Agents of the Upper Canada Bible Society, who addressed the meeting on the importance of Bible Societies and the great good resulting from their formation; after which, according to motion, the necessary officers were chosen, and other steps taken for the complete organization of a local branch, auxiliary to the general Provincial Society. At the close of the meeting, subscription lists were handed round and filled up with a liberality which strongly testified the high sense entertained by all present, of the importance of the object pursued by this Society; upon this object, however, your Committee consider it unnecessary for them at this time to enter, but they may be allowed to mention that the Bible Society of this Province is strictly connected with the great original Bible Society of England-the British and Foreign Bible Society, which has for many years been so efficient an instrument in the hands of Providence for the dissemination of His Word among the inhabitants of the earth.

But, in the formation of all its Auxiliary Societies, every Branch is very properly allowed and expected to make some provision for the wants of its own neighbourhood, with reference to an adequate supply of the Scriptures, and in pursuance of this very reasonable and Scriptural principle, your Committee applied a portion of the funds of this Branch to the purchase of a stock of Bibles and Testaments, which, with the permission of Mr. Thos. Musson, have been deposited at his store in Mimico—he having also kindly consented to act as agent in their sale, for which act of gratuitous kindness, your Committee take this opportunity of tendering their acknowledgment.

In making their selection, your Committee kept in view the description of books which they considered likely to suit the requirements of the neighbourhood generally, and the stock comprises Bibles of a most excellent quality, from the presses of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and of various sizes, and prices from one shilling and three pence upward, and Testaments from 62d. upwards,-prices at which the Scriptures could not be published but through the agency of that invaluable Society, whose interests we are united to promote. The sale of the books, however, has not been so great as your Committee anticipated-the great cause of which is, that the neighbourhood had previously been very generally supplied with the Word of God; they would, however, observe, that by establishing this Depository, a certain amount of good has been effected, inasmuch as a supply of Bibles and Testaments of the best description, and at the lowest rates, has been reserved for sale in the neighbourhood, and placed within easy reach of all who desire them. As this stock will support itself, the proceeds of sales being applicable to its renewal from time to time with fresh supplies, the greater part of the funds henceforward collected here may be at once placed at the disposal of the Parent Society, to strengthen its hands in the great work in which it is engaged, and for which it seeks the sympathy and liberal aid of all Christian people.

In the early part of the year, your Committee met once a month to receive subscriptions and take steps with reference to the Book Depository. During the summer, however, further meetings have been considered unnecessary, but they would state that the cordial unanimity and good feeling which have been displayed at every meeting of the Committee—composed as it has been of individuals connected with various branches of the

year's report, as calling for devout gratitude to Almighty God, "That, so far as we know, all who contributed to the funds of your Society last year, might and may be present with us this evening," and we regret that we have not a similar statement to make to you at this time. Since your last Annual Meeting, death has been at his fell work among us. We have been called to deplore the death of the Society's first Vice-President, William Armstrong, Esq., J.P. He was one of the original founders of the Eramosa Bible Society, and also one of the first settlers in this Township. The deep interest which he took in the evangelical enterprises of our times, and his long steady course of Christian philanthropy, beneficence, and integrity, combined with his intelligence, energy and decision, placed him in the front ranks of the most useful and best men of this district. We deeply feel the loss the Society has sustained, but we bow with humble submission to the will of God. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: yea, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them." We have also to report the death of Mr. Thomas Dickieson, one of your Collectors for last year. He was a young man of fine promise, and had scarcely attained to his majority, when he met with the accident which speedily cut him down. But he had done his work for the Bible Society, and that efficiently, before God, in his inscrutable, but all-wise and good Providence, called him to his eternal rest. travel into the hearts of the nations.

Your Committee have felt, and still feel it to be, not only a duty, but a high and hely privilege, to be connected with a Society which is exercising so important an influence in evangelizing mankind, illumining the dark places of the earth, and in chasing from our globe the places of horrid cruelty. When we take a retrospect of what has been accomplished, in sacred amaze we ask ourselves, "What hath God wrought." When we con sider that in little more than half a century, 80,000,000 copies of the Scriptures have been circulated by the British and Foreign Bible Society alone. That the Scriptures are now published in about 200 different languages, and that whilst in the times of Wickliff, a working man had unremittingly to labour twenty-one years before he could amass sufficient to purchase one single copy of God's blessed book, and that at this present hour, a complete copy of the sacred volume can be had for less than onefourth of a day's work, language fails to express the emotions of the mind at the unbounded goodness of Jehovah in rolling on this work with such a flood tide of prosperity.

Whilst looking over the reports of some of the agents in this good work, there is sufficient to encourrge the most desponding. France is a land dear to many, possessing a peculiar interest to every friend of the Bible. Within her borders have lived, and wrote and died, some of the greatest champions against this precious treasure, alternately under the gloomy influence of the superstition of Rome; or swayed by a wild, a desolating, and a savage infidelity, the nation has throbbed to its centre, and found vent in repeated scenes of carnage and death. But a brighter day is dawning upon France. M. de Pressense writes, that during the last year, 120,644 copies of the Holy Scriptures have been circulated, being an increase of 11,000 over the previous year, and that no less a sum than £1,280 has been spent by Romanists to purchase the Holy Scriptures. Need we any stronger proof that "the man of sin" is being compelled to let go that grasp of the minds and consciences which he has held in dire bondage for so many centuries.

But whilst there is much to cheer, whilst prosperity and progress marks every department of this cause-whilst this Society is throwing into circlation three copies of the Holy Scriptures every minute. Yet there is a very solemn consideration forces itself upon the friends of this Society. There are 600,000,000 of our race to be supplied with the Word of Life, and at the present rate of issue, unprecedented though it be. 450 years must pass over ere this end can be accomplished. How many immortal spirits must pass from this stage of life without ever being privileged with tasting one drop from this well of salvation. The resources of this Society

appear great, but they are but like the dust in the balance when compared with the sums spent in the gratification of a vicious appetite. If the inhabitants of the British Isles alone would abstain from the use of intoxicating drinks but for six months, and apply the sums thus spent to the circulation of the Bible, every one of the human family could be supplied at once. This is a most solemn consideration.

Your-Committee rejoice that the flames of war have been extinguishedthat the sword has been restored to its scabbard, and whilst we look upon war as a most awful scourge-sending wailing and lamentation into thousands of families, we are glad to acknowledge that God has out of this great evil brought good, and has made it the key by which the gates of Islam have been unlocked, and through the wide domain of the False Prophet the Scriptures, as a bright star, is now riding towards the ascendant, and shedding down a clear and distinct ray—the sure precursor of a happier day.

War has been the indirect instrument at different times of introducing the Bible into various parts of the world, which, in its turn, is destined to calm and change the very nature of man, so that war itself shall be exterminated, and "the nations shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not go to war against nation, neither

shall they learn war any more."

In our own native or adopted Canada, the Bible cause is steadily advancing,-like the sun in its march towards its meridian, it sheds a more radiant glory every year. During the past year, there have been scattered through the Upper Province, 32,383 copies of the sacred Scriptures by this Society; and, by the Tract Society, 10,348 copies, with the metrical version of the Psalms-being an increase of 3,550 over the past year.

In our own immediate sphere of action, your Committee are impressed that the importance of this subject is not realized by the public at large. But a comparatively small number of the community attend our anniversary meetings, and an agency is wanted, by means of which the entire public mind should be awakened to the importance of this work, and interested in accomplishing the grand object we have in view, viz: placing a copy of the sacred volume in the hands of every human being upon the face of the whole earth. We believe that the work of Colportage is eminently adapted to the accomplishment of this end, and hope it may not be long ere we have one of this most useful class of labourers, visiting in our neighbourhoods, and carrying the Word of Life to every household. Your Committee believe that very many who contributed to the support of this Branch, misapprehended the real objects of a Bible Society. It is not simply to get Bibles cheaper ourselves, but to raise means whereby it may be sent everywhere. Bibles have not only to be published, sold and given away, but Agents have to be supported-labourers of various kinds have to be sent into this harvest field, and the whole machinery by which this mighty agent for good is kept in incessant motion, is supplied by voluntary contributions, and in some cases, a trifling profit upon the sales of its publications.

The sales at our Depository have been very large in comparison with former years; the total sales for the present year amount to £18 19s. 21d., being an increase over last yoar of £13 16s. 91d. The total number of Bibles being 136; Testaments, 135; Gifts, 2 Bibles. The Stock on hand at present, is £17 7s. 41d., and an order to the amount of £10 has been passed in Committee, which, when it arrives, will make the total Stock within a few shillings of what it was at the commencement of the present year.

duty of Collectors; the sums collected by them amount to £41 3s. 04d., of this sum, £20 has been given as a free donation to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and £20 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

The total amount of our transactions this year, is £69 4s. 2½d., being an increase over the past year of £16 6s. 2d. The increase in the donations over last year, only amounts to 11s.; this is mainly attributable to the sickness of one of the Collectors for Milton, which did not come to the knowledge of the Committee until yesterday evening, when it was too late entirely to repair the damage.

Finally, your Committee in taking a glance over the affairs of our Branch as they appear in this report, think they have every reason to thank God and take courage. In one department or another of our operations, progress is legibly stamped, and we humbly and sincerely pray that that day may never dawn when your Committee shall have to report an ebb in our operations.

REPORT OF THE MANAGING COMMITTEE OF THE OSHAWA BRANCH OF THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, FOR 1856.

Your Committee, in bringing before you the first Annual Report of the Oshawa Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society, beg to acknowledge the goodness of God, who has graciously preserved us, and brought us together to celebrate this anniversary. For many years the meetings of the Whitby Branch have been held in Oshawa, which branch embraced the whole township, and has always been acknowledged an important and liberal contributor to the parent society. In 1855, that indefatigable laborer, LACHLAN TAYLOR, came among us, as the agent. At first we welcomed him, but he came not to fulfil the law, but to break it. He disturbed our repose; he quartered our society, and on the ruins thereof, he built up roun branch societies in the township. He appointed new and inexperienced officers, and left us without a name-to rally our strength,

The first year we only contributed to the Parent Society £21 10s., at which anniversary we named ourselves the Oshawa Branch.

· The Bible cause is one which ought to be dear to every christian's heart. Of the very many benevolent institutions that are now before the world, none ough to have a higher claim upon our sympathy than that institution which has for its object the dissemination of the scriptures of truth. How numerous are the blessings which it has already conferred upon the world. Through its means light from on high has been made to penetrate into many a dark abode. Through its operations, places which were once the habitations of horrid cruelty, are now peopled with worshippers of the true and living God; and by adhering to its precepts, millions of redeemed souls are now safe within the port of eternal bliss, who, destitute of the Bible, would have to meet their Redeemer unprepared.

The past year has been one of comparative peace among the nations of the earth. The sword has been sheathed, and the the din of war hushed. The battle field has been vacated, and many a family has been gladdened by the safe return of its members from the fearful struggle, while others

are covered with the weeds of mourning, on account of their bereavmentthe mangled remains of their loved ones lying strewed on the field of battle and of blood. How long peace will continue, it is difficult to tell. Already indications of trouble are apparent-Prussia threatens war upon Switzerland, and if declared, will involve all Europe. Spain, once mistress of the sea, and a terror to the nations of the earth, is now regardless of the most sacred treaties; her system is founded on error, her recklessness and debauchery may lead her to rain and fall, and open up still new fields for the champion of the cross of Christ to distribute the Holy Scriptures and disseminate the word of life to those who are now morally dark, and sunken in sin and vice. The religion of the Bible is the religion of peace, and those nations who have the gospel in its purity, and the Bible in abundance, are not the aggressors or violators of sacred treaties. Hence, until mankind learn and practice the precepts of the Bible, and do unto others as they would others should do unto them, there will be national hostilities, and the monster evil, war, will be called in to settle the animosities and contentions which exist among the nations of the earth. Had christians done their duty manfully and fearlessly, and given the Bible free and full circulation, those contentions must have been lessened; for we apprehend that the Bible is the grand instrumentality for bringing about that much wished-for period, predicted in holy writ, when men shall be found beating their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks, and learn war no more.

Your committee feel much satisfaction in stating that, through their collecting wards they find a growing willingness among the people to do more than they have done heretofore, to extend the Bible privileges which they enjoy to others; and notwithstanding that more than one-half of the collecting territory has been taken from them, and formed into branch societies, yet the success of the collectors has been such as to enable us to forward to the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies this year, the sum of £34, besides keeping the Depository replenished-which sum is much greater than ever was donated, in any year, by the Township of Whitby Branch Society. And your committee are satisfied that agitation is only required to obtain still greater donations to this most important of all causes—the circulation of the Holy Scriptures.

Your Committee, in conclusion, beg to call attention to one particular point which they find detrimental to their success in collecting. That is:-members of various churches conclude that if they support their own missionary society, that that channel will do all the good that is expected from them. In view of this fact, and believing that similar difficulties exist elsewhere, your committee would recommend the agent to be explicit on this point, for they believe that the Bible Society possesses greater claims on the liberality of the people than any other institution, as from it the missionary obtains, by free grant, or at a very reduced price, the Bibles he may require in the field of his operations,—the Bible being the corner stone and foundation of all his success as a missionary.

It will be remembered, that at our former annual meeting it was believed the proceedings had aroused the Society from the temporary slumbers into which it had fallen, into renewed life and activity; and your Committee entertain the hope, that the following brief report will go far to show that the expectation had not been altogether without foundation.

The first duty which devolved upon your Committee was the selection and appointment of Collectors—accordingly they met on an early day and nominated five ladies to this important department of the good work, all of whom accepted office with a cheerful readiness, that made it manifest that they did not regard the duty as a "begging drudgery," as it is sometimes called, but deemed it an honourable privilege to be made instrumental in giving the word of life to their less fortunate fellow creatures, and they prosecuted their labour of love with an indefatigability worthy the cause they had espoused: which, with their reports of the welcome reception they received, and the disinterested kindness they invariably experienced, shew that Jehovah hath in this locality reserved to himself many "who have not bowed the knee to Baal," but are still influenced by those scripture principles they in early youth imbibed around the family hearth and in the Sabbath School.

The unavoidable delay in making the first collection to pay off an old debt of some £3 15s. 81d., and the scarcity of suitable bibles at the time in the Depository in Toronto, caused it to be toward the end of July before our Depository was replenished and brought into working order. It will therefore require to be borne in mind, that the following statements embrace but little more than six months of the Society's active operations. During this short period your Depositary has sold twenty-one Bibles and twenty-one Testaments, for which he has received £4 18s. 101d. The Collectors have gone twice over their respective districts in course of the year, and have brought into the treasury of the Lord £12 5s. 7½d., which will purchase one hundred Bibles at 1s. 3d., and one hundred and ninety-three Testaments at 71d. each; and if we could trace the history of all these, who can estimate the amount of good these few unassuming females, in the back woods, have in one year accomplished? The total revenue of the Society for the year is £17 4s. 6d., out of which has been paid to the Upper Canada Bible Society for Scriptures, £10 16s. 21d.; to the Tract Society for Family Bibles, £4 5s.; for Minute Book, Carriage, Depositary's Commission, &c., £1 16s. 51d., leaving a balance in the Treasurer's hands of 5s. 10d., which, added to the amount of stock on hand, £13 9s. 81d., makes the Society's net worth to be at this date £13 15s. 61d., and something over ten pounds better than it was at last anniversary meeting!

Your Committee have been called upon to give only one Bible gratis, which they believe will be highly prized and do good. They have also got a few of the Tract Society's superior Family Bibles as specimens, which are likely to be approved of and sought after. Thus far the Lord hath prospered us, and in resigning their trust, your Committee desire to record their gratitude to Almighty God for that measure of success with which He has vouch-safed their feeble efforts; but at the same time, to express their sense of the limited extent of their endeavours, when compared with such noble examples of successful enterprize, on behalf of the word of God, as that of the late Alderman Kelly of London, (by whose instrumentality not fewer than 250,000 copies of the Scriptures are said to have been given to the

nations of Europe, and we had just heard of the terrible repulse the allies had met with on the 18th of June, before the walls of Sebastopol; and the wail of the widow and the cry of the orphan were sounding in our ears. But now, through the sovereign goodness of that God who maketh wars to cease, peace with its train of blessings has been again established—

"No longer hosts encountering hosts, Shall crowds of slain deplore: They hang the Trumpet in the Hall, And study war no more."

And while thus cheered by the return of peace, it is no less encouraging to trace the success that has marked the circulation of the Word throughout the world.

In regard to our own small Branch, it was feared that after the novelty of the matter had worn off, and the temporary enthusiasm, connected with a new undertaking had subsided, our funds and our subscribers would both decrease. Such, however, your Committee feel pleasure in stating, has not been the case. Though the several subscriptions have not, on the whole, been so large as at the first, yet the basis of the Society's collecting operations has been considerably extended, and the number of members and subscribers, as well as the amount realized, has been considerably augmented. The number of members now amounts to over one hundred, and of subscribers to two hundred and forty. The sum raised during the year including the collection of £5 at the Annual Meeting, £1 7s. 6d. subscribed by the Indians of Rama, and £1 7s. 4d. taken up at Coldwater by the Rev. Mr. Johnson, who addressed the people there with great acceptance on a Sabbath forenoon, amounts in all to £38 8s. 101d. Out of this, the sum of £12 10s. was transmitted as a donation to the British and Foreign Bible Society, the sum of £20 to the Upper Canada Bible Society, and the balance of £5 18s. 101d. remains in the Treasurer's hands.

The number of Bibles sold has been 23, and of New Testaments, 26. A large number of Bibles and Testaments, with Psalms and Paraphrases, has also been disposed of. 3 Bibles have been given away gratuitously. These results indeed appear small when compared with the widely-extended and magnificent operations of the Parent Societies. But we are still in our infancy, and this is our day of small things. Let us then be thankful that we have been made able and willing to contribute even a drop to that broad river of Bible truth that is destined soon to encircle and refresh with its life-giving waters, the entire circumference of our Globe. It is no light privilege, to find among the donations presented to the Bible Society, from the poorest peasant up to our truly excellent Sovereign, the name of Orillia, with its offering of £10 3s. 7d. Saints and angels will look upon this mark of love to God's own blessed Word with greater pleasure and interest than to any description of our scenery, however beautiful, or to any account of our national prosperity, however glowing or encouraging.

Your Committee feel gratified in being able to state, that one of our respected Vice Presidents, Mr. John Burkitt, is still successfully employed in Colportage, in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society. They trust that nothing may occur to induce Mr. Burkitt to give up the good work, for which he has shewn so much affection as well as fitness. Along with his fellow-laborers, Messrs. Large, Rolston, and Evans, he has been very useful in giving an impulse to the circulation of the Word. They have, in the course of the year, sold 3950 copies of the Scriptures, and gratuitously distributed 70, making thus a total of 4020 copies. In addition, nearly 30,000 copies have been issued to the various Branches, from the Depository; and

when gratiwerful taking into account the number issued by the Montreal Society, with its 96 Branches and 34 Depots, amounting to 11,484 copies, the 1066 sent forth by the Quebec Society, the labors of the Kingston Society, and the large number disposed of by the Booksellers and others, we consider that there are good grounds for concluding that the circulation during the past year has reached 1,000 a week. But, encouraging as this large number may be, it is not sufficient to meet the wants of a population which, aided by immigration, is every year rapidly increasing. Had it been foretold ten years ago that the Bible would be circulated at the rate of 1,000 a week, it would have been regarded as the devout imagination of some enthusiastic fanatic. Surely, in view of this fact, the friends of the Bible may be invited to gird on their armour, and never cease from their efforts till every family, nay every individual, be he Roman Catholic or Protestant, possess the precious Word in his own tongue.

A new feature in the Society's work has been the purchase of 200 New Testaments and 2000 copies of the Psalms in the Ojibeway language, translated by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara for distribution among the Indians. Your Committee recommend that a few copies of these works be immediately procured for distribution among the Indians of Rama. Considerable grants have also been made to the French Canadian Missionary Society; and at Amherstburg a number have been circulated among the French Canadiaus, though the priests have shown their instinctive hostility to the pure Word of God, by burning not a few copies that have fallen into their hands. And this is but an earnest of the numerous bonfires that would be kindled in every part of the country, were the Province (which may the good Lord avert) under the sway of the Pope.

The two agents of the Society have been, as usual, indefatigable in their labours, the Rev. Lachlan Taylor having delivered about 100 addresses, and travelled upwards of 3000 miles; and Mr. Johnson having visited 80 old branches, and established 27 new (thus making the entire number of branches 185) and travelled between 3000 and 4000 miles. Your Committee, judging from our own case, need but refer to the refreshing and beneficial results of those visits, to show how essential they are to the successful and energetic working of the various branches. How important too are their labours in connection with those of the Colporteurs in diffusing the glad tidings of salvation throughout remote settlements that are nearly or wholly destitute of the means of grace. In this manner they act as a sort of Evangelical Alliance Missionaries for the Church Universal, and become pioneers, preparing the way for the more permanent establishment of gospel ordinances.

The income of the Society has been about £4600, and the circulation of the Word has exceeded that of last year by about 3500 copies.

It may not be an unsuitable conclusion to this Report, to give a brief outline of the work of Bible distribution throughout the world.

In France the good work is carried on with augmented zeal, the circulation having increased from 90,000 of the previous year to 120,000 and upwards for this year. Of this number more than 45,000 were distributed among the French troops, and in addition to 20,000 formerly distributed, and irrespective of what was done in Turkey and the Crimea, so that since the war began about 100,000 copies of the Scriptures have been circulated among the French soldiers—If we have faith, even as a grain of mustard seed, may we not expect that the bread thus cast upon the waters may return after many days.

Our Sardinian allies were also supplied with 20,000 copies, so that none of them need return without a copy of the Sacred Oracles.

Previous to the war, such was the aversion of the Turks to the Divine

presents of Britain and armia beautifu Word that only 35 copies were accepted by them during the past 34 years, and within the past year 1278 copies have been disseminated among them, chiefly by sale. Numbers were also distributed among the wounded and captive Russians. These are effects of war upon which the christian and philanthropist love to dwell, and the seed thus sown in peace amid the emblems of war will in due time spring up and exhibit a harvest of Godliness.

Notwithstanding the evil effects of the war, the issues of the Bible at St. Petersburgh have been nearly double that of the preceding year: and one of the most pleasing acts of the life of the ambitious despot, Nicholas, was the bestowing a donation of £500 on the Bible Society.

In Sweden and Norway, in connection with the revival of religion that has taken place in those interesting lands, the issues have approximated to

In Germany the circulation has been about a quarter of a million, a considerabe impetus having been given to it by the presentation of a copy of the new German Bible. This edition consequently became very popular, and constant enquiry were made for the King's Bible. How important is it then that kings and rulers should identify themselves with the dissemination of the Divine Word.

In Belgium, Holland and Switzerland, the work is not bound, but is everywhere scattered abroad, though amid much oppression.

In Italy the Bible is prized, and more or less openly distributed; a person being occasionally imprisoned for reading it. Francisco Madiai is now keeper of the depot at Nice, in Piedmont.

In India about 120,000, and in China upwards of 80,000 copies have been issued.

The total issues of the British and Foreign Bible Society for the year have been 1,474,394 copies. The American Bible Society has also been labouring with zeal, having issued about 750,000 and having translated the Scriptures into 138 languages, with 160 versions.

Making allowances for the labour of the Edinburgh, the Naval, and Military, and other kindred institutions, in Britain, America and elsewhere, the circulation for the year has reached two and-a-half millions of copies.

Assuming this to be an approximation to the truth, it may give you some idea of the extent of the work, when it is mentioned that three copies of the Scriptures have been thus distributed every minute, or if we remain here for three hours, 540 copies during that short period. We only ask you to realize this simple fact, and you will be able to form some conception of the magnitude of the Society's operations. During the past 50 years the British and Foreign Bible Society has issued upwards of thirty millions of copies of the Scriptures. The American Bible Society more than ten millions; and other Societies, &c, about ten millions more; so that during the last half century for millions of copies of the Scriptures have been published, having thus proved adequate to the supply of a population equal to one-twentieth of

These statistics are given for the purpose of conveying to you some idea, both of what has been accomplished, and of the vast effort that must yet be put forth before every inhabitant of the earth can read in his own tongue the wonderful works of God. But the theme is of such interest that your committee have rather trespassed on your patience.

It has been stated that when an African Prince sent embassies with costly presents to our beloved Sovereign, and asked her in return to tell him the secret of Britain's greatness and glory, she did not tell him the number of her fleets and armies, or describe the vast commerce of the country; but she sent him a beautifully bound copy of the bible and said, "This is the secret of Britain's

The Committee have no facts of deep and special interest to detail; but while the operations of the Society do not on the one hand afford us room for congratulation, neither, on the other, do they give any reason to damp the ardour of its friends and supporters, or cause them to yield to despondency. The free contributions to the funds of the Society have been slightly increased during the past year; not that we have in this any ground for boasting, as it is qestionable whether the increase of our funds has been commensurate with the rapidly advancing prosperity of the neighbourhood, and the growth and importance of our town. The Committee trust that by the appointment of collectors, during the course of the year, in different parts of the adjoining townships, the claims of the Society upon the christian public may be better known, and through the extended knowledge of the importance of the work in which we are engaged, the means of our usefulness may be much enlarged. Four Depots for the sale of books have been established, -2 in Plympton, 1 in Moore, and 1 in Enniskillen, for the purpose of facilitating the supply of Bibles to those families residing at a distance from the town. The free contributions for the current year amount to £53 7s. 3d., which sum has been subscribed by 283 individuals,

somewhat encouraging circumstances.

Your Committee desire to be deeply impressed with a sense of the importance of the work in which they are engaged, and gratefully to acknowledge the success which has thus far attended the operations of this Branch Society. Though but an infant, born last year, it has taken one step, and that a pretty firm one; and is still on its legs, hoping for the continued support of the friends of Bible principles. This Society was formed Aug. 13th, 1855, an excellent and appropriate sermon having been preached on the Sabbath previous, by Mr. Johnson, from the Parent Society at Toronto. THE SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE STRATFORD BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

STRATFORD, 17th February, 1857.

The Seventh Annual Meeting of the Stratford Branch Bible Society was held in the Wesleyan Church, Stratford, on Tuesday the 17th day of February, 1857, when the following Resolutions were ably proposed, seconded and supported, as follows:—

1st.—"That as a people highly favoured by God, and distinguished among the nations of the world, we gratefully acknowledge our obligations to the Bible, and that we are called upon as Christians and patriots to do all that lies in our power to diffuse the knowledge and influence of the Word of God throughout our land, as the only sure basis on which our national privileges can rest."

The above Resolution was ably proposed by the Rev. Thomas McPherson, of the Free Church, Stratford, and seconded by the Rev. Arthur Miller, the Baptist minister of the same place, and unanimously carried.

The second Resolution was proposed by the Rev. Mr. Stephenson, of the United Presbyterian Church, and seconded by the Rev. Solomon Snider, and unanimously carried,

2nd.—"That we deplore the active opposition to the Bible at the present day, on the part both of popery and infidelity, and that their deadly hostility should stir up all evangelical Christians to more zealous devotion to the cause of the Bible, and to more faithful and vigorous endeavours to defend and spread abroad its inspired truths."

The Rev. Lachlan Taylor then addressed the audience at considerable length, on the subject of both resolutions, giving a cursory account of the operations of the Society, as well as of the Parent Society, for the past year

The adoption of the Financial Report of the Treasurer, A. F. Mickle, Esq., was proposed by the Rev. Mr. Jackson, Wesleyan Methodist, and seconded by Mr. Edwards, showing that 78 Bibles and 378 Testaments had been sold during the year.

"In the name of our God will we set up our banners." The Committee of the British and Foreign Bible Society are permitted to meet their constituents once more in the spirit of devout thanksgiving and joyful praise. They have the satisfaction of feeling that the present Report will bear an unimpaired testimony to the power of divine truth, and be replete with facts of the deepest interest.

FRANCE.—If there be one country more than another to which the Committee can refer as affording indubitable proof of the divine blessing on their labours, that country is France. The record of the year's operations will exhibit a circulation of 120,644 copies, and yield satisfactory evidence that the divine promise still holds good—"My word shall not return unto me void, but shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

M. de Pressense writes-

"The first fact which I shall name relates to the number of copies of the Sacred Scriptures which have been put into circulation through your Agency in Paris, from the 1st of April 1855 to the present day. This number is very considerable, seeing that it has reached 120,644 copies, namely, 9029 Bibles and 111,615 Testaments.

"It will be seen, that since the date of the establishment of your Paris Depot, the issues from it have amounted to 3,342,112 copies of the Sacred

"The total of Bibles and Testaments diffused in France by your instrumentality now amounts at least to 4,150,000, or 4,200,000 copies."

M. de Pressense alludes in his report to the special work of the year in relation to the military. Authority was given by your Committee for gratis distributions of the New Testament to such men as were proceeding to the Crimea, and gave evidence of a desire to possess the Scriptures, while to others copies were to be offered at a greatly reduced price. Your Agent has availed himself of the liberty thus accorded to him, and various measures have been

adopted to give circulation to the Scriptures in the camps, and at the ports of embarkation. A very considerable distribution has thus been effected in France by your Society. Private individuals have also laudably aided in the good work.

The records of colportage in France are, as usual, replete with facts of touching and beautiful interest. An extract from the correspondence of M. de Pressense will not be unacceptable.

"'Ah, my dear sir,' said a villager to one of our friends, 'that is the book they call the Bible, and of which I have heard so much: then placing herself in the middle of the street, she called all her neighbours with a loud voice, and they came running towards her. 'There is the Bible,' she exclaimed, holding the volume high up above their heads: 'in that is found all that God would tell us about Himself—about ourselves—about heaven—about earth: let us all buy it—let us all read it—let us all believe it—and we shall all be saved.' 'And what will M. le Cure say?' exclaimed a woman. 'What he pleases. If he says what God says in this book, we will listen to him: if he says otherwise, we will do without him.' 'Amen,' said the women present, buying some copies."

Belgium.—Mr. Kirkpatrick continues to superintend the Depot at Brussels, and has the sole charge of all matters relating to the printing and circulation of the Scriptures. His report presents a detailed account of the labours of the year, during which 6804 copies have been dispersed by his agency, making a total, since 1835, of 217,150 copies.

AMSTERDAM.—The issues from this Depot, during the year, have amounted to 20,716 copies. The Depositary, Mr. Van der Bom, writes—

"Twelve and a-half years have now elapsed since the Society commenced its operations in this country, and in that period no less than 395,654 copies of the Sacred Volume have been distributed, through your instrumentality, in the Netherlands and its Colonies. In addition to this number, how many copies have, during the same period, been disseminated by the Dutch Bible Society; and these may, in some measure, also be regarded as the result of your labours."

GERMANY.—COLOGNE.—The Committee have deemed it right to change the relation of Mr. N. B. Millard to the Society, from that of Depositary to fully-accredited Agent.

The sum total of the distributions from this Depot have now advanced to 494,477 copies.

On occasion of the visit of the King of Prussia, last autumn, to Cologne, for the purpose of laying the first stone of the noble bridge which is to span the Rhine, your Agent Mr. N. B. Millard, sought an introduction to His Majesty, that he might offer for his acceptance a copy of a new edition of the German Bible just completed at Cologne on account of this Society. His Majesty was graciously pleased to honor Mr. Millard with an interview, and received him

Your directly tion no lation is with marked courtesy. The Bible was accepted; and the King was pleased to express his royal satisfaction at the efforts made by the Society for the circulation of the Scriptures in his dominions.

FRANKFORT.—The Depot is still efficiently superintended by the Society's tried and venerable Agent, Dr. Pinkerton. The report which he has forwarded supplies a clear and succinct view of the operations of the year. From this interesting document it appears that the issues have amounted to 55,071 copies. In twenty-five years nearly one million and a half of copies of the Scriptures have been circulated in connection with Dr. Pinkerton's labours.

In some cases the labours of the Colporteurs have been arbitrarily suspended by the authorities; and in many others the severe privations which the poorer classes experience have had an unfavourable influence on the sales effected. The journals of the Colporteurs breathe an excellent spirit, and the numerous incidents connected with their arduous duties prove at once the need and success of the work.

Breslau.—The Agency at Breslau, conducted by Mr. E. Millard, continues to afford your Committee sincere gratification, and they cheerfully bear testimony to the energy and zeal which have marked the operations of another year. The sphere of labour assigned to Mr. Millard is large and important, and, by the extent of circulation effected, gives ample proof how much it needs the friendly aid of your Society. The hostile influences with which the Breslau Agency has to contend are neither few nor insignificant, yet, in spite of vexatious difficulties interposed to counteract his plans and to intimidate his Colporteurs, Mr. Millard has carried his issues far beyond those of the preceding year. They amount to 43,739 copies. The copies issued have been distributed in the following provinces:—21,393 in the province of Silesia; 2802 in the province of Posen; 800 in the province of Brandenburgh; 8718 in the province of Pomerania; 8549 in the province of Prussia; 1477 in other parts.

BERLIN.—The Committee have had the usual correspondence with their excellent friend, Mr. S. Elsner, who continues to superintend, with undiminished interest, the plans that have been long in operation for the supply of the Prussian troops with Scriptures. During the year 7750 copies have been voted to him on the usual terms, together with the sum of £300 towards meeting the cost of an edition of 12,000 Testaments and Psalms in German, to be appropriated for the same object.

Your Society has been honoured to effect, both directly and indirectly, a great work in Germany. By its own immediate operation not fewer than 2,080,138 copies have been brought into circulation in that country; and the stimulating and encouraging efforts

But still your Committee have it in their heart to attempt an enlargement of their work, for which, indeed, there is ample scope. A population of 50,000,000 is, as yet, very inadequately furnished with the Scriptures, which constitute the only effectual antidote to the incredulities of rationalism, and the debasing influence of superstition. The satisfactory state of the finances, and the assurance of continued liberal support from their friends, have induced the Committee to authorize the Agents in Germany to adopt such measures as are practicable to extend the work of the Society into those parts which have hitherto received little or no benefit from its labours.

DENMARK.—At the request of the Committee, several gentlemen have kindly consented to form themselves into an Agency to superintend all necessary arrangements connected with any printing and distribution of the Scriptures that may be undertaken by this Society.

The last Report of the DANISH BIBLE SOCIETY states that the issues for the year had been 750 Bibles and 7082 Testaments; making a total, since the establishment of the institution, of 230,256 copies.

SWEDEN.—Your Committee are enabled to refer with feelings of peculiar gratification to the present active and efficient state of the Agency at Stockholm.

The entire issues of the year from the Depot at Stockholm amount to the very large number of 64,295, being an increase on the previous year of 7819 copies.

Norway.—The several Agencies established in this country have again rendered efficient service in the work of the Society, and are enabled to report a considerable increase of circulation as compared with the previous year. The Assistant Foreign Secretary, after his visit to Sweden last Summer, arranged for a short tour in Norway, that he might have an opportunity of friendly conference with the Agencies on the various plans they are so vigourously prosecuting.

CHRISTIANA.—During the year this Agency has completed the printing of 10,000 copies of the Bible, 10,000 copies of the New Testament, and 5000 copies of the Testament with Psalms. Other editions are being proceeded with. The issues have been 3046 Bibles, 19,045 Testaments, and 2993 Testaments with Psalms; making the total of copies dispersed 25,084; or 9265 in advance of the preceding year.

DRONTHEIM.—The number of Bibles and Testaments put into circulation in Drontheim, and in the country districts, have amounted to 3493 copies.

STAVENGER.—This Agency issued in the course of last year 2495 Bibles and Testaments, in addition to 1700 New Testaments forwarded to other Depots. The printing of an edition of 10,000 New Testaments has been completed.

CHRISTIANSAND.—By the valuable co-operation of thirty-seven Correspondents, in different parts of the district, the Sacred Volume has become very accessible to the population. In compliance with the urgent request of their friends at Christiansand, the Committee have gladly placed at their disposal 100 Bibles and 200 Testaments for gratuitous distribution amongst the very poor.

Russia.—Since the withdrawment of the Rev. Mr. Ellerby from St. Petersburgh, the affairs of the Society have been directed with great care and efficiency by A. Mirrielees, Esq., to whose valuable services the Committee are deeply indebted. He has sedulously employed every opportunity favourable to the work of the Society, and his efforts have been attended with gratifying results.

The issues for your Society during the year have amounted to 13,275 copies, being 6458 in excess of the preceding year. But Mr. Mirrielees has also put 3828 copies into circulation on account of the American Bible Society, thus bringing his total issues to 17,104 copies.

ODESSA.—Mr. Melville has remained at Odessa since the period of the last Report, prosecuting his work so far as the limited opportunities at his command have permitted. From a tabular statement supplied, it appears that 1884 copies have been circulated during the year through Mr. Melvill's agency.

SWITZERLAND AND NORTHERN ITALY.—The operations of the year, both in Switzerland and Northern Italy, furnish gratifying evidence of a progressive work, an increased appreciation on the part of the people of the value of the Bible, and a corresponding desire to possess it. The number of copies dispersed amounts to 22,174, exclusive of 3500 copies furnished by him for distribution among Sardinian soldiers proceeding to the seat of war, and of 4767 Italian Testaments forwarded to the Malta Depot for the same object.

In referring to the appropriation of Scriptures, Lieut. Graydon states that 4,463 copies were purchased by the Lausanne Bible Society, for dispersion throughout the Canton, through the medium of 86 small Depots.

PIEDMONT.—Your Committee have endeavoured to employ in

Sardinia whatever advantage exists for the circulation of the Scriptures, and they believe, that so long as the work is prosecuted on the simple principles of the Society, and unmixed with proselytizing efforts, the authorities will interpose no difficulties or impediments.

During the year 5,324 copies have been circulated in Piedmont, principally through the agency of colportage and Depot sales. It will afford matter of sincere gratification to the friends of the Society to be informed that the Depot at Nice is confided to the care of M. Francesco Madiai, a name prominently associated with attachment to Bible truth in Italy. The issues from this Depot, principally by sale, from the 28th November 1855, when it was confided to M. Madiai's charge, to the end of March, amounted to upwards of 1,000 copies, and the circulation is rapidly increasing.

MALTA, GREECE, &c.—The Agency at Malta has occupied a most important position during the year. The Rev. I. Lowndes has had valuable opportunities of promoting the objects of the Society in consequence of the large influx of shipping at Malta, in transit to and from the seat of war. Every attention has been rendered to the various classes touching at the island, or remaining for a time; and,

in the distributions effected, provision has been made for sailors and soldiers of the allies, Russian prisoners of war, invalids stationed in the hospitals, Italian muleteers, &c.

The number of copies sold and sent from the Malta Depot during the year is 20,129, exceeding those of the preceding year by 7,662. There have been issued from the Depot at Athens 4,572, exceeding last year's distribution by 2,453, making the surplus issue above the previous year 10,115.

During the past year, Mr. Lowndes, at the request of the Committee, undertook a journey to Egypt, Syria, &c. This journey occupied three months, and very full details were furnished in the correspondence of Mr. Lowndes. In every spot visited he perceived pleasing proofs of religious progress, as compared with the period when he had previously passed over the same district of country.

GREECE.—Your Committee continue the work in this country, as far as the limited means of circulation permit. During the year an edition of 5,000 copies of the Modern-Greek Testament has been printed at Athens, and the supply will be rapidly exhausted. A much larger edition is in the course of preparation. The issues from the Depot at Athens, as above stated, have amounted, during the year, to 4,572 copies.

TURKEY.—Turkey is a land on which the eyes of the whole world have been intently fixed. On the subject of issues Mr. Barker says—

The issues of Scriptures during the first six months of 1855, from the Depots under my charge, amounted to 11,541 copies, and those of the last six months reach the astonishingly large figure of 30,000 copies, all which, with the 2,045 copies circulated in Wallachia by Mr. Mayers, and which do not appear in the enclosed accounts, form a total of 43,586 copies disseminated in these countries in 1855, or the average distribution of six former years before 1854.

"Of this vast circulation of the Scriptures, I must direct your attention to the following distributions:—10,657 copies disposed of in the Crimea, principally by Mr. Duncan Matheson, and aided in part by Mr. Sellar, the Society's Colporteur, who also sold and gave away at Constantinople, before he became ill and left the country, 2,023 copies more. All these Scriptures were distributed among the allied troops, especially those of Sardinia. Mr. Costabel, our other Colporteur, dispect of, by sale and gratitously, to soldiers, sailors, &c., of France, 3866 copies in 1855. The distribution by Agents of the Society, Missionaries and their Colporteurs, Chaplains, French Pastors, and many other individuals, amount to not less than 13,430 copies, of which, however, about 4,500 were disseminated in the distant Missionary Stations amongst native Protestants and others."

The following editions are in the course of preparation at Constantinople, some of which will be speedily completed, viz., 2,500 Greco-Turkish Bibles; 1,000 ditto Testaments; 3,000 Armeno-Turkish Bibles; 1,000 ditto Testaments; 3,000 Modern-Armenian Bibles; 1,500 Ararat Armenian Testaments; 1,500 ditto ditto with ancient Armenian in parallel columns.

It will be deemed a fact of weighty and joyous significance, that, during the year 1852, twelve hundred and seventy-eight copies of the Turkish Scriptures were disseminated, principally by sale.

An additional fact is worthy of being recorded—the presentation of a copy of the entire Bible to no less a personage than Aali Pasha, the Grand Vizier.

From Bucharest more vigorous operations are being directed to the Danubian Principalities. An edition of 5,000 Wallachian New Testaments has been completed during the year, and your Committee are happy to state that the copies are being rapidly dispersed, and it may soon be necessary to make arrangements for carrying another edition through the press.

Syria.—Jerusalem.—The Committee have been favoured with communications from Bishop Gobat, who is vigorously pursuing his various plans of Christian usefulness. The Bishop of Jerusalem has now eight Schools, containing about 300 children of both sexes, i. e. about 80 girls and 220 boys, all instructed in the pure Scriptures of truth.

ABYSSINIA.—Hitherto the opportunities of distributing the copies have been very limited. During the past year a communication has been received from the Lord Bishop of Jerusalem, which encourages

the hope that something may be accomplished for this desirable object. It appears that there is a disposition on the part of the people to accept and peruse the Sacred Volume; and it is stated that the present King of Abyssinia adopts the admirable practice of daily reading the Scriptures in the vernacular Amharic.

INDIA.—The last Report announced that fresh inquiries had been forwarded to India, for the purpose of eliciting the sentiments of the different Auxiliaries with regard to more comprehensive measures of Bible circulation. Replies have been received from your Auxiliaries at Calcutta, Madras, Bombay, Agra, Colombo, and Jaffna, presenting elaborate and carefully prepared statements of the views severally entertained. The communications thus kindly furnished concur in judgment on most points affecting the work of the Society in India.

As all the Auxiliaries are desirous to try on a large scale the effects of colportage, and as many difficulties will be experienced in enlisting competent labourers, the Committee deemed it expedient to recommend the practice of Missionaries themselves undertaking journeys on behalf of the Society, for the purpose of carrying the Scriptures into those localities where little or no effort has been made to christianize the population.

CALCUTTA.—The Report makes reference to certain changes in the officers of the Auxiliary, some of whom have been removed from their labours by death.

The entire New Testament in Bengali was completed early in the year; so that the following editions have been published since 1st December 1854, viz., Gospel by John, 6,000 copies; Acts, 7,500 ditto; Luke and Acts, 2,500 ditto; Four Gospels and Acts, 2,500 ditto; New Testaments, 2,500 ditto.

The number of copies circulated amounts to 46,775; viz. from Calcutta, 36,003, and from Monghyr, 10,772.

AGRA.—The occasional journeys of Missionaries for Bible distribution will be encouraged, and the Secretary, the Rev. J. L. Scott, in adverting to the subject, remarks—

"The Committee are thankful for the aid which the Parent Society are willing to afford us, and will endeavour to carry out your views, by prevailing upon Missionaries within our bounds to make journeys with special reference to Bible distribution. I am myself just about to start to-morrow morning on such a tour. I go out accompanied by four experienced Catechists, taking with us only the Bible and parts of the Bible."

MADRAS.—The Committee of the Auxiliary has experienced the loss of several of its members by removal, suspension of labour, or death.

Under the head of Scriptures printed during the year, the Madras Auxiliary reports—

"There were printed during the past year, at the different presses, 3,000 copies of the Tamil Bible, and 13,000 portions, together with 20,000 portions of the Teloogoo Scriptures. A further large supply is still in the press, consisting of 4,000 copies of the whole Bible, 8,000 of the New Testament, and 77,000 of separate portions in Tamil, together with 3,000 copies of the Old Testament, and 10,000 of the Acts, in Teloogoo."

The issues amounted to 49,421 sopies of Bibles, Testaments, and portions.

BOMBAY.—The work of the Society is evidently exciting a deeper and wider interest in this Presidency.

The statement of Issues bears gratifying evidence of progress, the circulation exceeding that of 1854 by 5,047 copies, and amounting to 13,406.

The Bombay Auxiliary has received grants from the Parent Society as below—

560 Bibles, 3,500 Testaments, in English,

500 " 350 " and 500 Psalms, in Hebrew,

And the sum of £100 towards the expenses of the Depot, from the Jubilee Fund.

CEYLON.—JAFFNA.—The Report of this Auxiliary states that 1,376 copies had been distributed in 1855.

COLOMBO.—The revision of the Singhalese Scriptures is proceeding very satisfactorily, that of the Old Testament having been carried as far as the Prophecy of Isaiah, and the New to the Gospel of John.

CHINA.—SHANGHAI.—Various communications have been received from the Rev. Dr. Medhurst, who writes on behalf of the Corresponding Committee. From a very full and specific table of issues, it appears that the Committee circulated, in 1855, 35,541 copies of Scripture.

The Committee are happy to state that the Delegates' version of the Old Testament is completed, and that an edition of the entire Scriptures has been carried through the press. A specimen copy of the work was transmitted, with the information that the cost of production was at the rate of 1s. 6d. per copy.

Believing the version prepared by the Delegates to be a faithful translation of the inspired oracles, the Committee have authorized the printing of 50,000 copies.

Hong Kong.—The Secretary, the Rev. Dr. Legge, has kept your Committee informed of the state and progress of the work at Hong Kong. The portion of the first quarter of a million copies of the New Testament allotted to Dr. Legge has been completed at the press of the London Missionary Society. The issues for 1855 have amounted to 30,488 copies.

CANTON.—The Committee have been requested to sanction the formation of a Corresponding Committee in this city. The issues during the year have been 16,006 copies.

From this retrospect of the Society's operations amongst the Chinese, it appears that 81,940 copies have been put into circulation, during the year, by its Agency. The number may strike us as somewhat insignificant in comparison with the undertaking to which the Society stands pledged. But the Committee believe that all that was practicable has been accomplished. No opportunities of circulation have been neglected through deficiency of zeal or lack of The Committee are not insensible to the great responpromptitude. sibility devolving upon them; and although at present there may be but a slow approximation to the grand idea of "a Million copies," yet they cherish the hope that existing obstacles will soon vanish, and that, with a Native-Christian Agency to work, and unfettered intercourse with the interior, each succeeding year will witness a rapidly-increasing circulation, till England's promise of a Million New Testaments to China shall be more than fulfilled.

AUSTRALIA.—The Rev. M. H. Becher and Mr. Charles, appointed by your Society as a Deputation to visit the Australian Colonies, after a voyage somewhat perilous, arrived safely in Sydney in the early part of last year, and, since that period, have been actively engaged in promoting the objects of their important mission. The duties confided to them are arduous and responsible, and the Committee feel assured that the result will be such as to open a most encouraging sphere of operation in the immense Colonies to be visited. Everywhere the Deputation have been received with a thoroughly cordial and Christian welcome.

NEW SOUTH WALES .- SYDNEY .- The last Report of the New South Wales Auxiliary describes a state of continued prosperity.

The Report observes—

"During the past year the sales at the Depot have been 6,634 Bibles and Testaments, producing the sum of £508 17s. 7d., and the sales by the Colporteurs have been 2,186 Bibles and Testaments, producing the sum of £205 1s. 7d. The entire sales throughout the year have been 10,015 Bibles and Testaments, producing the sum of £941 4s. 11d.

A second application from Sydney for Chinese Scriptures has been cheerfully complied with on the part of your Committee

On June 35th a highly-influential and enthusiastic meeting was held at Sydney, for the purpose of introducing the Rev. M. H. Becher and Mr. T. Charles, the Deputation now on a visit to the Australian Colonies on behalf of your Society. His Excellency the Governor-General, Sir William Denison, presided, and expressed his cordial approbation of the objects of the Society The various Christian denominations were ably represented, and a succession of speakers attested that earnest attachment to the British and Foreign Bible Society has taken firm root in the colony.

The GEELONG Auxiliary has ordered 875 copies in Chinese, and other Scriptures to the value of £100.

The South-Australian Auxiliary, at Adelaide, is progressing most satisfactorily with its circulation and finances. The issues of the last year amounted to 2,900 copies, and the Subscriptions had nearly doubled in twelve months.

South Seas.—Rarotonga.—The Committee had the satisfaction of presenting at the last Annual Meeting a copy of the revised Rarotonga Scriptures. Of the edition thus prepared, 4,900 copies have been placed at the disposal of the London Missionary Society, and will be forwarded to their destination by the return voyage of the "John Williams" in June next.

MANGAIA.—Mr. Gill states that the sale of Scriptures has produced 11,000th of arrow-root, which had been duly forwarded by the "John Williams," to be converted into money. The amount realized by the consignment was £128 7s. 10d.

MAURITIUS .- The Scriptures issued during the year amounted to 3,874 copies, being nearly threefold the total circulation of the two preceding years. The Auxiliary sustains two Colporteurs, natives of Madagascar, who have visited the country districts and sold many Bibles to persons who are described as having been previously ignorant of the existence of such a book. Special efforts have been

made for the circulrtion of the Holy Scriptures amongst the Cooly immigrants from the Madras Presidency, who are located in the island to the number of many thousands. Two Agents sent by the Madras Auxiliary Bible Society have zealously laboured in a species of colportage for the benefit of these poor benighted pagans.

SOUTH AFRICA.—CAPE TOWN.—The Rev. G. Morgan, Secretary of the South African Auxiliary, in referring to their Annual Meeting, describes it as one of the most satisfactory ever held in the colony. The Report furnishes the usual detail of issues.

"The number of books issued from the General Depository in Cape Town during the last twelve months has been 2,540 Bibles and 1,755 Testaments; in all, 4,295 volumes.

"The amount remitted to the Parent Society has been £600, viz. for sale of Scriptures £428, and Free Contributions £172.

"The total issues of the Auxiliary, since its establishment in 1846, have been exactly 39,000 volumes; and the total amount of remittances to the Parent Society, £4,329 0s. 2d."

Graham's Town.—The amount of receipts during the year had been £234, a sum very far surpassing that of any previous period. The Auxiliary has remitted £105, and has ordered 2,507 copies.

SIERRA LEONE.—The Committee have little to report from this Auxiliary. The frequent changes that take place are unfavourable to vigorous operation. The Rev. Mr. Maxwell, of Freetown, writes in acknowledgement of a grant of Scriptures voted by the Parent Society, and remits the sum of £80; of this amount £32 14s. 9d. is a Free Contribution.

In compliance with the request of Miss Hehlen, a supply of Scriptures was placed at the disposal of that lady for distribution in hospitals, &c. The copies have been judiciously and usefully appropriated, some being retained for permanent use in the sick wards, and others given to such patients as manifested concern for their spiritual welfare, and expressed a wish to possess the Sacred Volume. The Committee have cheerfully placed another grant in the hands of Miss Hehlen.

South America.—Although unable to accomplish all they desire, the Committee have at length the satisfaction of stating that they have secured the services of Mr. A. J. Duffield, of Birmingham, who will proceed to New Granada, and, making Carthagena his centre, operate from that point, by visit or correspondence, on such parts of Spanish South America as may be available for his labours.

DEMERARA.—Mr. Ketley has remitted the sum of £59 2s. 11d., and 1,600 additional copies have been ordered for his Depot.

The Committee have received the liberal denation of £250 from a friend in Demarara, in furtherance of the general objects of the Society.

Honduras.—Mr. Crowe, of Belize, having represented that various facilities are possessed by him for the circulation of the Bible, especially amongst the Spanish-speaking population, and that it is his intention to make short excursions into the interior, and along the coast of British Honduras, for the purpose of distributing the Scriptures, a supply of 250 copies, in various languages, has been placed at his disposal.

JAMAICA.—The Depot at Kingston remains under the management of Mr. Henderson. The issues during the year have been 4,318, and supplies have been sent to replenish the stock, to the extent of 671 copies.

Antigua.—The Rev. G. W. Westerby, in writing on behalf of the Auxiliary, states that there is an increased demand for the Scriptures, and regrets that there is so little ability to aid the Parent Society by Free Contributions. Copies to the number of 624 have been sent, and £32 received in payment for supplies.

BARBADOES.—An application having been made for a grant of Scriptures on behalf of Schools, your Committee have voted 250 Bibles and 750 Testaments for this purpose.

UNITED STATES.—New York.—Your Committee observe with peculiar interest and satisfaction the noble work which is being so vigorously prosecuted by the American Bible Society.

The receipts of the past year, for the general objects of the Society, amount to \$346,811, being a decrease from the year preceding of \$47,528. It is, however, still somewhat in advance of the year before.

The entire number of copies issued during the year is 749,896, being 65,503 less than the year before. Of this large number there have been circulated 673,059 in the English, Welsh, Irish, and Gaelic languages; and the remaining 76,837 in various foreign languages. The grand total of issues since the formation of the Society now amounts to 10,653,647 copics.

British North America.—The Bible is being largely circulated throughout the length and breadth of this flourishing portion of the British Empire. Thousands, who have been living in remote localities, with scarcely any means of access to the Scriptures, are now brought within the range of the various Auxiliaries and Branches which are springing up in all directions.

CANADA WEST.—TORONTO.—In this important Auxiliary there are the symptoms of undiminished energy and steady progress.

Greatly as the operations of the last exceeded those of the preceding year, the issues and results of the year closing on the 31st of

last March have been on a scale of magnitude far greater than ever. The number of copies circulated during the year amounts to 32,476, being 3,643 in excess of the previous year. The total issues since the first establishment of the Auxiliary have been 319,902 copies.

To sustain the operations of the Auxiliary in full vigour it has been necessary to furnish the Depot at Toronto, during the year, with 39,045 copies.

CANADA EAST.—MONTREAL.—From the Report of this Auxiliary your Committee learn that the issues of the year have been 4,683 Bibles and 6,801 Testaments, making in all 11,484 copies; and the total issues since the formation of the Society now reach 188,000 copies. The aggregate Income of the Auxiliary has amounted to £1,399 12s. 3d.

The Montreal Auxiliary has now 130 Branch Societies and Depositories, many of which, especially the Montreal Ladies' Association, render valuable assistance in the collection of funds.

This Auxiliary has received 12,614 copies during the year, and has remitted to the Parent Society £400 on Purchase Account, and £324 13s. 3d. as a Free Contribution.

QUEBEC.—The circulation during the year 1855 has been 1066 Bibles and Testaments, being a slight increase above the preceding year, and bringing the total issues to 13,509 copies. The financial statement exhibits very satisfactory progress.

During the year, 4,345 copies have been dispatched to Quebec.

Nova Scotia.—The receipts of the year amounted to £493 2s. 3d.; and 3,119 copies of the Scriptures were put into circulation, being 204 in advance of the preceding year.

The following sums have been remitted to the Parent Society, viz. Free Contributions £223 16s. 10d.; Purchase Account £131 17s. 3d.

The Fredericton Auxiliary has remitted £136 4s., of which sum, £80 is a Free Contribution.

The MIRAMICHI Ladies' Auxiliary, at CHATHAM, has remitted £21 12s. Free Contribution; and 104 copies of Scripture have been circulated in the year.

PRINCE EDWARD'S ISLAND.—The Auxiliary at Charlotte Town has been furnished with 1733 copies during the year, and the sum of £91 7s. 10d. has been remitted to the Parent Society.

NEWFOUNDLAND .- The report of the Auxiliary of St. John's is

replete with encouraging details, and bears ample proof of the earnest zeal which presides over its management. The issues amounted to 2,616 copies, being an increase of 1,267 on the circulation of the previous year; and the receipts were £297 6s. 7d.

Domestic.—Funds.—The entire receipts of the year amount to £130,438 7s. 10d. From this, however, must be deducted £1,712 17s. 9d. additional contributions to the Jubilee and China Funds, leaving £128,725 10s. 1d. as the year's Receipts from ordinary sources, being £4,247 0s. 7d. in excess of the previous year.

The Receipts for Bibles and Testaments have amounted to £63,-100 16s. 4d., being an increase of £2,277 0s. 2d. on home, and of £1,223 13s. 11d. on foreign sales.

The Expenditure of the Society has amounted to £134,813 0s. 10d. The Payments on account of the Jubilee and China Funds, included in the above, have been £9,714 0s. 9d., viz. Jubilee Fund, £4,046 7s. 5d.; China Fund, £5,667 13s. 4d.

The Issues of the Society have surpassed those of any former year, reaching the unprecedented number of one million, four hundred and seventy-four thousand, three hundred and ninety-four copies.

The Total Issues of the Society now amount to Thirty Mil-LIONS, EIGHT HUNDRED AND SIXTY-THREE THOUSAND, NINE HUN-DRED AND ONE COPIES.

The Engagements of the Society amount to £89,910 5s., including £42,000 for Bibles and Testaments ordered to be printed in this country.

Domestic Agency.—The number of Societies established in the last year is 151. The present total of Societies in England and Wales, 3,394; viz. Auxiliary Societies, 490; Branch ditto 387; Bible Associations, 2,517; Total, 3,394.

COLPORTAGE.—Sums amounting in the whole to £928 1s. 8d. have been voted during the year for this object.

School Grants.—Grants of Scriptures for Day, Sunday, and Ragged Schools, have been continued during the year, and 12,670 copies have been dispersed amongst these institutions in England and Wales.

The Committee have had the satisfaction of complying with the requests of the NAVAL AND MILITARY BIBLE SOCIETY to furnish such grants as were necessary to meet the numerous and urgent demands made upon its resources by the departure of troops and vessels for the seat of war.

RUSSIAN PRISONERS.—The Committee have continued to make grants on behalf of Russian prisoners brought to this country.

THE WAR.—The total number of copies issued by the Society in immediate connection with the war, between February 1854 and April 30, 1856, amounts to 204,569.

Scotland.—The Rev. W. Swan, of Edinburgh, continues his valuable superintendence in connection with such operations as are practicable; and, with his sanction, 3,199 copies have been placed at the disposal of Correspondents in different parts of Scotland.

IRELAND.—The Hibernian Bible Society, during the last year, issued 102,213 copies, being 17,161 in excess of the previous year. Of this number 32,276 have been dispersed by the agency of forty Colporteurs spread over different parts of the country. The receipts amounted to £4,097 11s. 1d. The total issues of the Society, from the commencement, have been 2,482,054 copies.

To the SUNDAY-SCHOOL SOCIETY FOR IRELAND grants have been made to the extent of 30,500 Bibles and Testaments, as well as 7,150 Bibles on Purchase Account. The total number of schools in connexion with its operations, on the 1st of January last, was 2,851. There were, at the same period, 213,909 scholars in attendance, receiving instruction through the zealous services of 19,677 gratuitous teachers.

Conclusion.—What a source of infinite blessing has the Bible Society opened to the world! How impossible to estimate the extent of influence it has exerted! What is the object contemplated and aimed at? The circulation of a Book, a holy, heaven-inspired Book, which in God's gracious purposes is destined to work such benificent changes amongst our fallen race as shall fill the world with light, and purity, and gladness.

The bow of peace spans the political horizon of Europe. The sword is replaced in the scabbard. War laid upon your Society grave responsibilities: may not peace bring with it responsibilities still more momentous? We labour at no peradventure. We rest upon the immutable promise of the everlasting God. The work to which the Society is solemnly pledged must ultimately succeed. "God shall bless us, and all the ends of the earth shall fear Him."

EXTRACTS FROM SOME OF THE COLPORTEURS IN CONNECTION WITH THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

Mr. James Evans labouring in the County of Elgin, writes as follows :--

"DOVER, 4th June, 1856 .- I have laboured chiefly during the last month in the Township of Charlotteville, the roads being better in that Township than elsewhere. I have been generally well received, and though I am generally told at my first interview, that no Bibles are wanted, yet I seldom leave a house without selling less or more. I then endeavour to convince them that the object of the Bible Society is not to make money, but to circulate God's word in order that it might have an influence on the heart in pointing them to the Lamb of God who taketh away the sin of the world; and where I find it practicable or prudent I conclude with prayer, and am frequently requested to call again. I cannot give you a better idea of my

proceedings than to quote one or two items from my journal.

"May 27 .- One family I visited to-day was Roman Catholic; when I told my object the man cooly said he wanted none, that he had a Bible, and retired to another room where his wife lay ill after her accouchment; the room door being open, and perceiving he was Irish, I spoke to him in that language; he answered me, and immediately we were brothers; I told him I loved my countrymen, and therefore I wanted them to read God's word; I read a few verses in several parts of both Old and New Testaments, and asked him was it not good, why not read such good advice; he acknowledged that nothing could be better; then said I, why not read it. The wife appeared more to oppose, and said ours was not like their Bible; the man handed me his prayer book; I read some out of it and shewed it agreed with our Bible and theirs; we had quite an interesting conversation for some time; the wife at length insisted I should stop for dinner; I consented, and afterwards kneeled down by her bed-side and prayed; never were there more hearty 'Amens' to every expression than were uttered by him and wife; I rose to leave amid their thanks and earnest entreaties to call again. I have long been convinced that the best way to do good among Roman Catholics is, not to attack their errors, but to convince them that he who lives in sin is not of Christ's church, but the Devil's, and to point them to the Saviour who only can save sinners. If they will be led to experience Scriptural salvation, they no doubt will soon see the rubbish heaped on simple truth by Popery.

"May 31st.—Visited eleven families and sold six Bibles and five Testaments. In one house I found a young man apparently not far from death, in a liver complaint; I spoke to him on the great necessity he now had to seek the comforts and support of religion. I asked him the ground of his hope; he said he had none, and that he was aware he should have it in order to be happy; I exhorted him to look by faith to the Saviour, He, even at the eleventh hour was ready and willing to pardon the sinner. We, with the mother and more of the family kneeled and prayed; God was present with us, and almost all arose in tears, which largely fell from the young man, who, I felt, was not far from the Kingdom. They begged I would put up

my horse and stop for dinner, but it being only 11 o'clock I declined, and after enquiring my name and where I lived I left them with earnest entreaties to call again. In another house a boy about ten years old wished for a Testament to bring with him to Sabbath School; his mother had no money or she would have bought it; the poor fellow cried because he could not get it; I presented him with a small one on his promise that he should immediately commit to memory the 13th chapter of 1st Corinthians. Saturday evening and last of the month I returned 18 miles to Dover."

"One pleasing consideration is, that there appears a general desire to possess and read the Bible in almost every house. My own soul is blest as I go along, though the body is frequently jaded. My only desire is that I may be of a little use in God's vineyard, and that glory may redound to Him."

"Saturday, June 28th .- I was told that a family in the neighbourhood never went to a place of worship, nor sent their children to school, and that certainly there was no use in my calling on them; I however resolved to try. When I shewed my books to the wife she sent for her husband to the field he came, and we entered into conversation, and after a time he purchased one Bible and five Testaments for his children. I believe they had neither Bible or Testament in the house previously. I endeavoured to persuade them to study the Bible, at least to read one chapter daily. Oh, thought I, if the Clergymen would but do their duty and visit people in their houses, how much more good would be done-pulpit duties are not half the work. Here was a family, their neighbours look on them as practical infidels, but no one calls on them in a religious capacity, they never go to a place of worship, and no one cares for their souls. We had a solemn season at prayer before I left them. If any one would look after them who can tell but that they would be burning and shining lights, though at present viewed as Galleos by their neighbours. In another house in the vicinity, with an old woman, her daughter-in-law, and children, the power of God was present with us at prayer. I left them both in tears, though when I commenced talking with them they appeared dead and careless to those things. Earnestly requesting to call again I left them."

"August 23rd.—Visited 13 families, and sold 6 Bibles and 12 Testaments. I visited one poor widow who had no Bible except half of an old one; gave her a Bible, 1s. 3d. I conversed some time with her and children and another woman, after which I read and prayed; tears flowed down and sobs were loud; God was felt among us. O, sir, said she in parting, God sent you in here this morning, will you call again, may God bless you, &c. Indeed I frequently hear such language used, and am urgently requested to call again-thus God rewards as I go along; it is often laborious to the body but is refreshing to the soul; one such season as I had in this house repays for a week's labour. In all houses visited to-day I was well received, and in consequence of having been in the neighbourhood a few days previously, I was generally expected, (I had to go for a fresh supply of books) and by several people was invited to stop and spend a night with them, at all events requested to call again. In one house where was a corpse, I got the husband of the dead woman and about a dozen others, with whom I read a chapter, spoke a little, and prayed. All appeared deeply affected, and

most of them were in tears when I departed."

Mr. John Burkitt writes as follows:-

"31st May, 1856.—Another month having elapsed I beg leave to lay before you an account of my labours in that good work which has been assigned me. The first part of the month was engaged in visiting the remaining part of the Township of King. In that Township I found much ignorance, and in one particular locality an awful destitution of the means of grace. There were some famishing for the bread of eternal life, some longing for the means of grace and had it not. Sabbath after Sabbath would pass, but no messenger of the Most High ever gave them a passing visit, inviting them to partake of those rich blessings which are offered to all without money and without price. O, when shall there be a sufficiency of faithful labourers who will go out into the highways and hedges and carry the good tidings of a full and free salvation. But to proceed: after labouring in King I passed over to the Township of Whitchurch, which has occupied my time ever since, and here as in King found a destitution of the means of grace and Sabbath School instruction, which made me sad. I have been through that part situated between Bogart Town and Uxbridge, and there were many careless and at ease as regards their immortal interests; many never hear a sermon the whole year round, and what is worse they appear as though they loved to have it so. O, when shall that day dawn when we shall see the houses of God studding the beautiful landscape scenery. May God in his good time bless the seed of his word which is now being scattered through the length and breadth of the land. I have been able to visit 218 families during the past month; have sold 124 Testaments and 62 Bibles, have given away 3 Testaments and 1 Bible, making a total of 190; the proceeds of sales amount to £9 0s. $7\frac{3}{4}$ d.; have met with a few Roman Catholic families during my travels in the past month, but could get no opportunity of speaking or reading to them, for I find generally they are quite averse to say anything more than yes or no; but one case I found different from the rest. Roman Catholic family gave me a little opportunity of speaking of the Scriptures; they took my Bibles in order to look at them, but as soon as they found them to be the Protestant version they started with horror and told me to take such books away. I endeavoured to reason with them, I told them that it was the best book they ever held in their hands; no, they said, it is a bad book; I asked them how it was bad and who told them it was bad, but they would not answer me; they wished me good day and seemed glad when I took my departure; they were awfully ignorant and I could not but pity them, but I record another instance more pleasing although the family were Roman Catholics. Some time ago I entered a lonely shanty by the wayside; found only the daughter at home; found them very poor; she appeared an interesting young girl, and told me that she wished to get a Testament but was not able to pay for it, for sickness and affliction had greatly depressed them. I said I would leave one with her for the use of her mother and would not charge her anything for it; she expressed herself very grateful but did not tell me they were Roman Catholics; I promised to call again soon, when I hoped her mother would be in; she was a poor widow, having lost her husband some years ago in a distressing manner. I was enabled a short time afterwards to call in again, when I found the mother at home, she then told me plainly and respectfully that she was Roman Catholic, and therefore she had better return the Testament although she liked it very much; her daughter had been reading it to her. I said she had better keep it, and conversed some time with her on her trouble, and endeavoured to point her to the only source of comfort, begged

She said if her daughter wished to have the Testament she might; she spoke up almost with tears in her eyes and said she would like very much to have it, thus I have been enabled to leave a copy of the Scriptures in one Roman Catholic family and may God bless it to the opening of their dark benighted understandings. Another family where I left a Testament, it was not a Roman Catholic one, but a pitiable case, none but the father could read and he was glad when I told him that I would give him the Testament as he was not able to pay for it, although he had the Scriptures in the house but such small print that he could not see to read them. Oh, the pleasure the poor man shewed in receiving such a treasure was truly pleasing; he said I must write his name in it and who was the giver. May he read it to his family and may a blessing attend it. They were far from any school or any means of grace, living on the confines of a large tract of bush; two of the children were cripples and growing up in ignorance not having any school to go to. Thus far I have been enabled to labour, and as twelve months have passed away since I commenced the good work of Colportage, I would give an account of Bibles and Testaments sold or given away during that period from May 1855 to 31st May, 1856: 505 Bibles and 996 Testaments have been sold, 4 Bibles and 15 Testaments have been given away, making a total of 1,520. Besides scattering this amount of good seed of the word of God, I have read and prayed with several families, especially in cases of sickness and affliction, and almost every Sabbath day have held Divine Service in destitute places, thus endeavouring on every day of the week to be doing good. May God bless my poor feeble efforts and make me more faithful, more devoted in the good work, may I never grow weary in well doing. I must say with gratitude, that in all the Townships I have laboured in I have found great kindness and hospitality, hoping this statement of my labours will prove satisfactory to the Committee generally."

"31st October, 1856 .- The closing of another month reminds me of my duty, viz., to lay before you an account of my proceedings during the month. This report will embrace a portion of September as well as October, as no report was sent in for the former month. Since I last addressed you I have been engaged in a part of Mulmur and Mono towards the latter end of September, but had soon to leave that part finding it was already visited by one of your Colporteurs, and having met with him found that all the Townships around that part of the country had also been visited and well supplied with the word of God. I resolved upon returning by way of Mono Mills and going to Garafraxa as that had not been visited. That Township has now been thoroughly canvassed, and I have great reason to be thankful that I have been favoured with fine weather, good roads as well as good health, and have likewise been cheered on my way by finding as in other Townships many friends shewing me kindness for the sake of that blessed cause in which I am engaged. The Township of Garafraxa I find to be the main leading road to many Townships West where the tide of emigration has set in, and now the Colporteur with his precious treasure is following in the van scattering the leaves of the Tree of Life. O, that those precious leaves which are intended for the healing of the nations be blessed to the healing of many wherever they fall. In my several travels during the past month I could not but think how emblematical the falling of the leaf in the forest was to my work, as the leaves of the tree fell they enriched the earth, so in like manner the leaves of the Tree of Life as they fell, would, if watered by the Spirit from above cause life and vigour in the souls upon whom they fell.

May God grant that as his word is spread and so well received may be read and prayed overmore than it has been. I found the Township of Garafraxa to be a large Township and in some parts well settled, but many of the concession lines not being opened could not be visited, but all that could be travelled I visited, and scattered many copies of the Scriptures, but perhaps before proceeding with an account of my proceedings in Garafraxa, I should just give some account of my travels first of all in Mono and Mulmur, for I had the pleasure of meeting with several families in that quarter. The first day I commenced I travelled along the Town Line dividing Mono and Adjala, steering a course for the Township of Mulmur towards evening of the first day. After calling upon several families, I called in as I went along to a small tavern where I only found the woman of the house, who was very civil, and said she was already supplied. Accordingly I was on the eve of leaving when a young man accosted me and asked me what sort of Bibles I I showed him a neat Pocket Bible when he soon convinced me that he did not want one, and that he little valued such a precious book, for he began to find fault with the paper of which it was made, and when I said that I thought it to be good and that it was of British manufacture, he got angry and denied everything I said. Finding that he only wished to cavil and not to purchase I said it was not worth while to argue any further and was about leaving when he said I ought to be ashamed to go from house to house and making myself a liar wherever I went. This I found to be trying to flesh and blood, but thank God was enabled to bear all with meekness. This person was not a Roman Catholic but nominally a Protestant and quite sober. His history I was afterwards made acquainted with from the family that I put up with that night and only a short distance from that tavern, where I met with him. This I believe is the first and only instance in which I have met with such treatment since I commenced my Colporteur work. This is a great thing to be able to say, but the treatment I received from the family that I stayed with that night fully made up for all unpleasantness or unkindness previously received, they were so kind and appeared to enjoy religious conversation. There was also an intelligent person boarding there, a schoolmaster, with whom I spent a most agreeable evening. They all enjoyed hearing of the success that had attended the Bible Society. I hope our mutual Christian conversation may be blessed to each others good. On the same route I found a Sunday School in good operation and giving great encouragement to all those engaged. Visiting the few families that I called upon in Mulmur, had reason to think I was more particularly sent to one family, for, having called in upon them they pressed me to remain with them that night, which I agreed to do, and had reason to be thankful that I did, for I found the mother of the family suffering from the loss of one of her children a few months ago, but blessed be God she was, though suffering, not murmuring, but meekly praying to be supported. I endeavoured to console her by pouring into her wounds the oil of consolation from the Gospel treasury, and especially did I commend that family to the tender keeping of their Heavenly Father, when we all knelt around the family altar that night. May God support and strengthen them under all their trials. Thus do I lay myself out in all my visits, to comfort those who are in sorrow as well as offer the word of God to all who need it. Now to proceed with an account of my visits in the Township of Garafraxa. There also I found some in sickness and in trouble, with whom I read and prayed. The first I met with was a poor but pious family crowded in a small space. I found the daughter looking very pale and sickly when I entered; upon enquiring whether she was sick I found that she had been a great sufferer

for some time. I sat down in the midst of the family and endeavoured to direct their attention to the Heavenly Physician and was much pleased to find they were believers in Jesus; that amid all their poverty and afflictions they were happy, enjoying that consolation which religion alone can give. There was a meekness and resignation about the daughter who was sick, that much pleased me. I remained some time with the family and read a portion of Scripture, then commended them to the gracious care of one who has promised never to leave nor forsake those who trust in him. daughter expressed a wish to have a Bible in the Gaelic language but she had no money to pay for one; having some with me I thought I should be fully authorized in giving one to her which she accepted with much thankfulness; the mother had one which had been given her before leaving Scotland by a lady, and which she prized very much. In calling upon one family on the 8th Concession I was much gratified at finding a warm friend to the Bible cause in one who had been a Collector for the Fergus Branch of the Bible Society for some years, and who gave me a general invitation whenever I came that way to call and I should always find a welcome. In passing on from thence I found several kind Christian friends in several families that I called upon, and who took a warm interest in the operations of the Bible Society. One family in particular, finding that I was likely to be in their neighborhood that night, invited me to return after visiting the several families in their locality, which I was enabled to do, and spent a pleasant time among them, speaking of things which concern our souls' welfare. Being informed of a thickly settled settlement on the other side of the Grand River situated on the 6th and 7th Concessions, I resolved upon visiting them. Visiting the several families as I passed along I found in one house a pious couple, the husband quite blind and infirm, and the wife suffering from bad sight and very indifferent health. She seemed to hail my visit with delight, and told her husband that I would read for him, for which he seemed very thankful. I sat down with them and read a portion of Scripture, then engaged in prayer. They both appeared to be enjoying the comforts of religion, and shewed great interest in the work in which I was engaged; they both wished me God speed and they wished the blessing of the Lord might attend me in my work. The wife expressed a wish that I should make it a point of duty to go in and see an old man who was sick, and who had led an intemperate life, as he lived not far from them. I promised to do so accordingly in the evening. Finding that the house where he resided was contiguous to the one where I was sojourning for the night I went to see him; there I beheld an old man of three score years and ten, bowed down by sickness brought on by his intemperate habits, and his partner in life a partner also in the same habits of intemperance; they received me kindly and seemed very thankful for my coming to see them. I staid some time with them and endeavoured to set before them the evil nature of sin, and although we had sinned there was mercy for the vilest; God was willing to pardon. I called upon them seriously to think of the judgment to come, and how necessary it was at once to flee from the wrath to come. I saw this family once or twice after this but could not gather a single expression from either of their lips to give me the least hope that the word read had done them any good. O, may God touch their hearts and lead them to seek for mercy before the door of mercy be closed for ever. The old man purchased a Testament with large print as the Bibles he had were of such small print that he could not read them. Upon leaving the Testament with him I urged him to make good use of it, and not only to read it, but pray over it. I met with a few families where the father of the family

One that I stayed with one night told me he could neither read nor write, but seemed much pleased when I proposed reading the word of God before retiring to rest, and in the morning, although he was much hurried he was the first to propose my reading a chapter before going to breakfast. Thus I have endeavoured to set before you an account of my several visits among the sick and afflicted as well as the hale and the strong, the young and the old. I have visited 152 families, have sold 79 Testaments and 32 Bibles, given away one Testament and one Gaelic Bible, making a total of 113 distributed."
