ITALIANS GAIN FROM TWO TO SIX MILES

Fighting With Austrians Has Grown More Violent—Russian Submarines Engaged Ten German Warships and Did Damage

Rome, June 9.—Gains of from two to six miles are reported for the Italian army which are at grips with the Austrians over a front stretching from Gassio to the Gulf of Trieste. The fighting has grown more violent around Tolmino on Isone River, where the Austrians are strongly entrenched. The fierce assaults of the Italians are weakening the Austrian line between Monte Nero and Tolmino and the capture of Tolmino is expected. German troops and German guns are reported to have been rushed into Tress for the defence of the city of Trent against the Italian armies of invasion.

ATTACKED GERMAN WARSHIPS

Petrograd, June 9.—The Army Messenger referring to the naval engagement June 5 off the Gulf of Riga, says that Russian submarines engaged no fewer than ten German warships, attempting a sortie into the Baltic. The explosion on board some of these led to the belief that damage was done by the undersea boats. A German second-class cruiser, was struck by a mine on June 4. She did not sink, but was towed into Libau. A German steamer, the Hindenburg, was blown up by striking a Russian mine.

BOARDSHIP OF VENICE FROM SKY

Venice, June 9.—One person was killed and several were wounded by bombs dropped yesterday morning. Austrian aeroplanes which flew over the city. The property damage was not heavy and no historic buildings suffered. The residents fled to St. Mark's square. Apparently they were not concerned about their personal safety, but chiefly lest damage be done to the famous Basilica, the rebuilt Campanile and the Palace of the Doge. However, no bombs fell in this district.

UNCLE SAM NERKY.

The resignation of Secretary Bryan is the sensation of the hour in the United States, and is generally accepted as meaning that President Wilson and the other members of his cabinet have determined upon vigorous action in the case of Germany.

There is naturally much speculation as to the action to be taken by the United States in the event of a declaration of war. Readers on this side were amused to note some time ago that some English papers expressed a hope that the United States would not declare war. It seems perfectly obvious that if she came to the aid of the Allies the quantity of munitions of war manufactured for them in the United States would be enormously increased.

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Major-General Hughes wants another 85,000 men. Recruiting must go more briskly if New Brunswick is to furnish its quota. Why not enlist the aid of the ladies as recruiting officers?

The Austrian official report sneeringly describes the Italians as "plundering Garibaldians." If the latter live up to the name of Garibaldians, they will make it hot enough for Austria.

Who does the Standard expect to believe its yarn that parliamentism has not marked the administration of affairs of the militia department? Its own readers know better and so do the Liberals. The Standard simply makes itself ridiculous.

When the Standard says the Times advanced a coalition government for Canada, it says what is not true. This paper has urged, however, that Sir Robert Borden accept the offer of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and instruct his followers to cease all partisan activities until after the war, a policy in the carrying out of which the Liberals would most heartily join.

By a vote of 808 to 74, the Presbyterian General Assembly has agreed to send the question of church union to the presbyteries and congregations. The vote shows a large gain for union since the last meeting of the Assembly. At a time when Paget, Mohammedan and Christian are fighting side by side in a cause which Canadian Christian churches believe to be the cause of humanity and of God, the trifling differences which separate sects do not appear to be of very great importance.

It is certainly a remarkable list, but the Scientific American goes on to remind us that science and invention are still young, and that "what we have witnessed is but a mere episode in the evolution that still lies before us," and that "if we compare ourselves with those who will record the achievements of science a century hence, we in this day may seem to have progressed but, little beyond the stage when the moon and the stars were to mankind but lanterns hung on a great tent wall and not separate worlds in infinite space."

Remembering what practical science has accomplished in the last seventy years he would be indeed a bold individual who would venture to predict what the next century will develop, when the great world war is ended and peace established on a basis that will render human ingenuity free to pursue new paths of discovery in the world of science. **LARGE GAIN FOR CHURCH UNION**

Kington, Ont., June 8.—By an unprecedented vote of 368 to 74, the Presbyterian General Assembly agreed this afternoon to send the question of church union to the congregations and presbyteries. Great enthusiasm was manifested when this decision was announced. The returns, as compared with those of the last assembly, show a large gain for church union. The best vote secured at last year's assembly against union was 20 per cent, this year the "ants" got only 18.7 per cent of the assembly. Principal McKay, of Vancouver, in moving a resolution denouncing the political patronage system, said that these were elders in the church who ought to be expelled on account of their corrupt practice in politics and business.

A resolution was also passed commending the progress of temperance in the western provinces, and expressing regret that the government in the east have not gone further in this direction.

On a motion by J. K. MacDonald, Toronto, it was decided that ministers now on the aged and infirm fund will be entitled to increased annuities.

**ALLOWANCE OF \$20,000 A YEAR NOT ENOUGH FOR BABE**

**Mrs. J. J. Astor Makes Statement to Court**

**SOME OF THE BILLS PAID**

More Than \$63,000 Spent in Support and Care of Child in Its First Seventeen Months of Life

New York, June 9.—The upbringing of John Jacob Astor, infant son of the financier who went down with the Titanic, is costing more than \$800,000 a year, according to an accounting filed in the Surrogate's Court by the boy's mother and guardian, Mrs. Madeline Taltier and guardian, Mrs. Madeline Taltier and guardian, Mrs. Madeline Taltier.

The document sets forth that more than \$63,000 was spent in the support and care of the child in the first seventeen months of his life. Of this amount \$20,000 was spent for toys and clothing.

Mrs. Astor says that she has not changed the infant with any part of the rent paid on her summer home at Bar Harbor, Me., nor for the cost of automobiles which they have used and of which she adds "he has received substantial benefits and with a reasonable portion of which expenses, as I am advised by my counsel, Mr. Gilchrist, the said infant might properly be charged."

The figures given by Mrs. Astor all tend to show that the \$20,000 a year allowance which she receives from the proceeds of the \$3,000,000 trust fund left by her father, is not sufficient to meet his expenses.

In fact Mrs. Astor says she spent \$20,000 out of her own funds on her son in addition to the \$20,000 allowed by the court, between the date of his birth, August 14, 1913, and December 31, 1914. The accounting in several places leaves the inference that an increase in the annual allowance would not be refused.

In one place Mrs. Astor sets forth that the taxes on her city home, at No. 840 Fifth avenue, were \$60,000 in 1913, and \$88,000 for the year following, and that the expense of maintaining the establishment between the date of the infant's birth and December 31, 1914, amounted to upward of \$90,000.

"I have been advised by my counsel, Henry A. Gilchrist, the report continues, that it is proper and reasonable that there should be charged to said infant on account of his share of the maintenance of the establishment at No. 840 Fifth avenue, and one-third of the taxes paid on the premises." And such a charge was accordingly exacted.

In another place the report reads: "From this it will be seen that the expenditure I have incurred for the benefit of said infant are far in excess of the money received by me, as appears in schedule A."

Approximately \$8,000 has been spent on the Astor heir for professional services of physicians, lawyers and others. Schedule A of the accounting shows that Mrs. Astor received \$40,000 so far from the income of her son's estate.

"By the provision made in the will of my late husband," the report continues, "for the creation of a trust fund of \$8,000,000 for the benefit of each child that might survive him, it clearly appears that it was his intention to provide a sum for the maintenance and support of such infant ample to secure everything for the comfort and education of such child that money could provide."

Mrs. Astor sets forth her charges against the infant's account as follows: "One-third of maintenance of No. 840 Fifth avenue, \$80,000, one-third of taxes, \$21,000; physician's fee, upward of \$8,500; lawyers fees, \$8,000; cost of bond for \$120,000, \$380, account of merchants and others, \$8,000. This makes a total of \$64,000.

**ROSENTHAL'S WIDOW LIVING IN POVERTY**

**Charity of Her Hairdresser in Days of Luxury Keeps Her Alive**

New York, June 9.—Of all the women benefit through the killing of Herman Rosenthal in 1913, the one who probably suffered most keenly is Mrs. Lily Rosenthal, widow of the murdered gambler.

Following his death, Mrs. Rosenthal tried to make a living by conducting a rooming house, but she failed. Her next venture was the opening of a little moving picture house. Again failure was the result. Desperate, she sold or pawned everything available, and, moving to the Bronx, opened a boarding house. Within six months she had to give it up.

A reporter found her in an out-of-the-way town in New Jersey, living on the bounty of a former hairdresser. The latter woman, who may be mentioned here only as Diana, since she does not want her family name revealed, has the consolation for a poverty-stricken and unemployed woman, that she is the mother of two children. When she learned of the dire straits Mrs. Rosenthal was in, she opened her scanty furnished home to her former mistress.

"I thought I'd completely hid myself from the world," said Mrs. Rosenthal. "I did not want any one to know of my poverty. If it were not for the charity of Diana, who was my hairdresser more than fourteen years, I don't know what would have become of me. I was being without a cent in my pocket and no home, and you will realize my position."

"I wish I'd never had a cent and always had worked hard. Then I would know what to do. But I always had every luxury, and now it has been swept away."

"Since last October I have been living on charity. Diana came to me and offered me a home with her. You may imagine what I suffer, not being able to pay her rent."

"Not one of the 'friends' who used to enjoy the hospitality of my husband and myself has raised a hand to help me. I tried hard while my money lasted to make a living, but it was an easy matter to rob me."

"I feel sorry for Mrs. Becker, but she will never suffer as I have, because she is a young, strong woman, clever and capable of making a living for herself. She will suffer great pain no doubt, but at least she will not have to beg."

ITALIANS CHEER UNDER HEAVY PACKS AS THEY GO TO WAR

London, Monday, June 9.—An interesting description of how the Italian soldiers have gone into the war is given by the correspondent of the Daily Chronicle who visited the Friuli front, overlooking the battle of Isonzo, where the Austrians are being gradually pushed back. The correspondent, who caught a glimpse of King Victor making his way to the battle front, writes:

"It is possible to travel for miles in the neighborhood of the old front without seeing signs of war. The countryside wears the usual summer aspect. Hay is being carted from the fields and the hillside vines are being sprayed. When one touches the main road, however, he has no longer any doubt as to the nearness of the fighting line. Long lines of motor lorries block the road in every direction, some going up the line with food and munitions, others coming down empty.

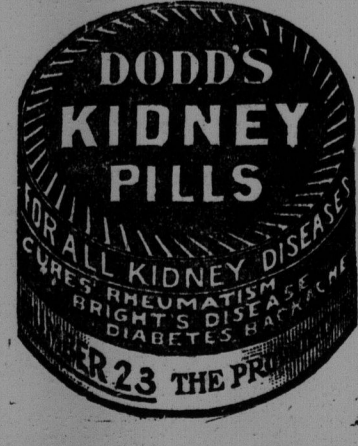

## Two More Regiments and One Battery From Maritime Provinces; Canada Wants 35,000 More Men at Once

Montreal, June 8.—Thirty-five thousand more men are wanted to go from Canada to the firing line in France as quickly as they can be trained and equipped. Major-General Hughes made this announcement here tonight.

This new force is to be composed of twenty-seven regiments of infantry and six batteries of artillery. With its organization the number of men raised in Canada for war service will total nearly 150,000.

The new regiments are to be recruited as follows:

Four Highland regiments, one from Vancouver, Victoria, and Winnipeg, a second from Ontario, and two from the province of Quebec and the maritime provinces; two regiments from Alberta, two from British Columbia, two from Saskatchewan, one from Manitoba, two from the London division, four from the Toronto division, two from eastern Ontario, (the district between Kingston and Ottawa); four French-Canadian regiments from Montreal and the provinces of Quebec, including the 57th and 69th battalions, for which recruiting commenced a short time ago; two regiments from the maritime provinces.

The six new batteries of artillery, according to the announcement, will be organized as follows:

One from eastern Ontario and Quebec, one from the London district, two in the Toronto and Hamilton districts, one from the maritime provinces and one from western Canada.

General Hughes stated that the militia department is giving opportunity to officers desirous of attaching themselves to these corps to send in their applications to the district or divisional officers for a course to further qualify them, and that thus no officer will be in a position to state that he has been overlooked. In the meanwhile, temporary commissions in the Canadian militia will be granted to eligible men not already attached.

The corps will be sent overseas, the minister stated emphatically, as they become efficient, and not in order of number.

## WAR HAS BROUGHT HIM TO THE FRONT

Events Forced Salandra Into Line—light in Italy to Giolitti's Discomfiture

Rome, June 8.—Until last year Signor Salandra was a secondary figure in Italian public life. A brilliant advocate and jurist, he was looked upon as the most promising of Baron Sonnino's lieutenants—Baron Sonnino, the recognized chief of the cabinet, witty and powerful Giolitti. But that was all. No one dreamed that this political lieutenant was to be Italy's man of destiny, who was suddenly to throw over the steering wheel and alter the whole course of the national policy. When he took the prime ministership not many months ago it was only as Sonnino's agent. Baron Sonnino himself did not enter the ministry probably because it was only a stop gap government, as the parliamentary majority was pro-Giolitti.

Later on the death of the Marquis di San Giuliano, Baron Sonnino came in as his successor at the Foreign Office. By that time the negotiations with Austria and Germany were in full swing. Sonnino's entry meant a change of policy at the helm, and the development of events was at once accelerated.

Two months ago, the parliament gave the Salandra cabinet carte blanche until it reassembled in May. The understanding was that Italy's demands and aspirations must by that date have received satisfaction, by pacific methods if possible, but if necessary by the assertion of Italy's will as a great military power. Matters came to a head toward the end of April. France was unwilling to see Rome had not brought even the minimum satisfaction required by the awakened national sentiment. The Emperor Francis Joseph, ever loath to part with any of his domains, was slow to yield to the pressure of his more sagacious and far-seeing Teutonic ally. The delay was fatal. All the time the diplomats of the Entente Powers had been busy and on April 26 an agreement was said to have been signed in London by the Triple Alliance and Italy whereby Italy was guaranteed all that she could reasonably hope for in the Tyrol, Trent, Dalmatia, Albania and Asia Minor, and Italy in return pledged herself to enter the European struggle on May 20 with an army of 1,000,000 men.

Then Giolitti suddenly intervened. His intention was to be "the god in the machine." In sudden flight Austria had at last been persuaded to increase her offer enormously. Prince Bulow, instead of communicating Austria's proposals to the government handed them over to Signor Giolitti. With Austria's surrender in his pocket and counting upon his faithful majesty in the Chamber, the dictator came to Rome. He had carefully chosen the most dramatic moment for his descent upon the capital. The suddenness of the coup was designed to add to his prestige. But events had run ahead of the dictator, who suddenly found his dictatorship gone. Signor Salandra presented him with the fait accompli—and resigned. Had Giolitti taken office he would have found himself in an impossible dilemma; on the one hand Italy's honor pledged, on the other the certainty of a terrible revolutionary outbreak in the northern cities. The king, too, was in no less difficult a position. A Giolitti government was out of the question; the only course open to the crown was to decline Signor Salandra's resignation. Italy's fate was decided; her dreams were to be fulfilled; her long and anxious period of indecision was over; the hour of Italy's self-realization had arrived; of her definite entry upon the world's stage as a great power.

## SAW BRITISH SINK TURKISH TRANSPORT

Made Short Work of Prey—Panic Among Those Aboard Prevented Any Attempt to Save Lives

Constanza, Roumania, June 8.—An eye-witness, who has arrived here from Constantinople, gives a vivid account of the recent attack by the British submarine E-11 on Constantinople. My informant early one morning intended crossing from Pera to Stamboul, and instead of walking over the bridge, took a small boat.

"The sea," he said, "was beautifully smooth, with hardly a ripple on it. I suddenly noticed, about 50 yards from the landing place, what appeared to be a stick floating upright in the water and moving toward the bridge. The sight struck me as the current was obviously setting in the contrary direction. I looked hard and saw a white train gliding swiftly through the blue-green water.

"I instantly flashed through my mind that the object was a torpedo. I rose hastily and in my excitement nearly upset the boat. I could clearly follow the course of the deadly engine as it made straight for a big Turkish army transport called the Stamboul. There was a shattering explosion, an enormous quantity of water was flung up and the wounded ship settled down by the stern. A second explosion followed amidstships of the transport, and in a few minutes nothing was to be seen but a tangled mass of half-submerged wreckage. A third torpedo hit the custom house quay, without, however, doing any damage.

"I took out my watch; it was 8:40 a. m. There was a terrible commotion on shore. The boatmen looked
