

WATCH FOR BLISTER BEETLES. Blister beetles occur almost every year Blister beetles occur almost every year and cause considerable anxiety to farmers and gardeners from their habit of appearing suddenly in large numbers and feeding on potatoes, beans, beets, carrots, corn, tomatoes and other vegetables. They are soft-bodied insects—slender and cylindrical, and about half an inch in length. Spraying with Paris green or arsenate of lead, as is done for the potato beetle, will control blister beetles, but in some outbreaks it may be necessary to repeat the application because the beetles which are killed are soon replaced by others. In gardens soon replaced by others. In gardens many of the insects may be destroyed by beating them from the plants into a pan containing water with a little coal oil on the surface.

Ottawa, June 27—Henry B. Thompon, chairman of the Canada Food son, chairman of the Canada Food Board, in an interview today said that supplies of substitutes for wheat flour are obtainable by dealers in all parts of Canada at reasonable prices. He stated that the public should not accept any excuses from retailers, because it is the duty of dealers to obtain and to carry sufficient supplies of such substitutes to meet all requirements.

In answer to questions as to the attitude of the food board in case of any attempt to advance prices, Mr. Thompattempt to advance prices, Mr. Thomp-

attempt to advance prices, Mr. Thompson pointed out that the food board had not the power to control the price of the grains, but he said that unless there were an advance in the price of grains, no increase in the price of substitutes, either by millers or wholesale or retail dealers would be allowed.

"No advance in the price of substitutes is warranted at the present time," said Mr. Thompson. "Millers and wholesale and retail dealers are now operating under license from the Canada Food Board, and any dealer who attempts to take advantage of the order requiring the use of substitutes will be liable to have his Feense suspended or cancelled."

London, June 27-(Via Reuter's Ott BRITAIN MUST FIND tawa Agency)—At a luncheon given by the London Chamber of Commerce in the Cannon Street Hotel, Premier Hughes, of Australia, said the Allies were facing the supreme crisis of the war. The next few weeks were preg-

war. The next few weeks were pregnant with tremendous possibilities. German militarism fully realized that they mist either achieve a decisive victory now or continue a hopeless struggle against daily increasing odds. It would be foolish to underestimate the immediate danger, but it was clear that the enemy was becoming increasingly anxious. The speech of Von Kuchimann, the German foreign secretary, was a clear admission that the recent enemy offensive had been but barren in its gains and that military success, if not impossible, was farther off than ever, and unless victory was gained politically, Germany must prepare for a long war.

war.

The change in the German tone, Premier Hughes opined, was due to a realization of America's great effort. The Germans also knew that the Anglo-French armies were confidently awaiting the next onslaught, while the much-vaunted Austrian offensive had spent itself and any day might see the Austrian armies in headlong rout and the civil population openly rebelling. Germany had completely lost command of the air, and the failure of the submarine campaign was obvious. Great Britain's mastery of the seas was more complete than ever.





Two things were necessary to enable as to hold our own: First, the ability to defend ourselves against our enemies; second, the ability to produce wealth and develop our economic resources of labor and capital, so as to support numbers of virile and happy people. (Ap-

Any policy ignoring the intimate reationship between national safety and acconomic welfare, said Mr. Hughes, was floomed, sooner or later, to destroy the nation adopting it. Hitherto, however, Great Britain had treated these two estates the same and the same an sentials as separate entities. A country's conomic safety and development rested Germany's progress under such a policy has been phenomenal. Germany was today preparing for peace as she did for war. After urging an incessant and most vigorous war against pacifists, who conspicuously or unconsciously were agents of the enemy, Mr. Hughes concluded by saying that effective action by the dominions must await the formation of a clear and definite economic policy by Great Britain. which should be declared without delay.
