Rally For St. John At Board of Trade On Monday

DISCRIMINATION AGAINST US

What Has Caused Change of Plans of Steamship Companies? C. P. R. Had Provided Extra Facilities for Additional Passenger Business Here—Time for Prompt United Action

The amazement and indignation which have followed the realization of the meanness of the blow to the business and labor interests, as well as the prestige of this port which has been struck by the announcement that the mail steamers will not come to St. John this winter has crystallized in a demand for a public meeting at which steps to avert the disaster may be arranged for.

Protest Against Blow to Port

The movement is the result of a spontaneous outburst of indignation on the part of the citizens irrespective of politics and typifies their determination not to allow this blow to the port to fall if it is at all possible to prevent it.

What Cause Change?

The C. P. R. has always handled its passenger business at this port and its year preparations were made for increased rather than reduced traffic.

MAY BE NO MORE WORLD'S SERIES

Inter-League Post Season Games Instead

HERMANN FAVORS CHANGE

Shorten Regular Season to 112 Games and Then Each National League Team Play Eight Games With Each American League Club—Trouble Over Writers

(Canadian Press) New York, Oct. 3.—This year may be the last to see a world's series, according to interesting baseball gossip here. In many quarters agitation for abandonment of a world's championship each fall and the substitution of an inter-league post-season series in which all the sixteen major league clubs could share, has been going on for some time.

Write His Own Story

"If any player wants to write a bona fide story for a newspaper during the world's series, let him go to the headquarters of the National Commission after the game. We will furnish an expert stenographer, to whom he can dictate his story. The types will make two copies, one of which the player can send to the newspaper, the other we will keep for comparison."

Japan Satisfied with the Chinese Course.

Pekin, Oct. 3.—The Japanese legation denies that Japan is making fresh demands on China, and points out that China has satisfactorily complied with the original requirements with the exception of the punishment of the officers commanding the offending troops and the execution of the soldiers who killed the Japanese in Nanking. Japan, it is added, recognizes that it will take time to make a proper investigation by the Chinese government, and anticipates no erosion of these points.

## CREW OF 54 FROM BURNED STEAMER REACH BALTIMORE

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 2—Fifty-four shipwrecked persons from the British freight steamer *Templemore*, which was burned at sea 800 miles east of the Virginia Capes, were brought here tonight by the Hamburg-American steamer *Arctica*. No lives were lost, and no one was seriously injured.

The hull of the burned vessel is believed now to be beneath the waters of the Atlantic. The value of the vessel and her cargo is estimated at \$700,000, covered by insurance.

## Things Not of This Earth

(Sir Oliver Lodge, famous English scientist, has just stirred the whole world by declaring that not only do we keep on living after death, but that it is entirely within the cold province of science completely to prove this! In America a master brain is also at work in attempting to solve the strange import of "things not of this earth." He is Hamlin Garland, famous writer, author of "The Shadow World" and leader in a great national society for psychical research. Garland, in his years of investigations of the occult, has met with many astounding and apparently inexplicable experiences—things involving deeply mysterious phenomena. And now he himself has selected and written the greatest of these for the readers of this paper. In this article he tells a weird story regarding the "tests" in this world of Edward MacDowell, a famous composer.

Famous American Author of "The Shadow World," "The Tyranny of the Dark," Etc.

In all my investigations I have always paid only secondary attention to the personality of the "spirits" who wrote or spoke to me, for I was always trying to discover the way in which the "tricks" were done. I had noted marvelous examples of mind-reading, thought-transference and telepathy, and hence doubted and, of course, must still "doubt" the value of the messages which came to me unthought.

Nevertheless, in March, 1908, Henry B. Fuller, a Chicago novelist, and myself held a series of sittings with a psychic in Indianapolis, wherein the personality of the manifesting "spirit" became all-absorbing. The experiments took place in a cheerful, well-lighted cottage on consecutive afternoons and without hocus-pokus.

I began these sittings alone and with the idea of developing a highly complicated "case" I wrote on a slip of paper (while the psychic was out of the room) these words:

"Edward MacDowell, give me proof of your identity by writing a few bars of the 'Sonata Nagaia.'"

This paper I folded and placed in an inside pocket.

The psychic never saw it—even at a distance.

Almost immediately after the psychic's return I began to jot down on the closed school-slate—which we held beneath a small table in the usual way—pertinent messages for MacDowell, accompanied by bars of partially composed music.

Perceiving that the chief value of the experiment was to be in the quality of the music, I invited my friend Fuller, who is a fairly competent musician, to have the sittings with me.

Almost at once the "powers" started in to confound us both. One of my sisters (whose name I had written on the slip) sent a very convincing "message" and Fuller had "communications" from distant relatives who had died, but we held to our purpose—which was to secure from the chief "spirit" musical proof of his identity.

Under test conditions in supra-normal fashion we got and recorded a complete phrase of a little piece which "MacDowell" said was the beginning of a composition to be called "Hungaria."

After the second sitting "MacDowell" whispered to us, apparently from the air, and directed us to take the piece to the piano.

He told Fuller how to play it.

He corrected it while Fuller and I held the slate ourselves.

The psychic was not even touching it.

For two hours of the last sitting "MacDowell" was in complete control of the situation. He was like himself—

alert, concise, humorous, masterful. The music grew ever more complicated, ever more characteristic and the mode of its production ever more mystifying, and when Fuller played the wailing, sweet and haunting melody under the spirit composer's direction it seemed to me that at last I had secured one of the most beautiful as well as one of the most convincing proofs of immortality, for the whispered promise was that the fragment would be found among the composer's manuscripts.

With all this material in hand I hastened to New York to enlist Mrs. MacDowell's co-operation—alas! none of it seemed to be true. There was no such fragment. There was no publisher such as the "spirit" had named—but there remained one very marvelous fact!

On one of the slates had been written the name of "Edward McDowell" in a fine, flourishing hand. I had paid very little attention to this, because Edward always spelled his name MacDowell and his signature as I knew it was bold and plain. Nevertheless, when Mrs. MacDowell saw this, she cried out in astonishment: "That is the precise way Edward signed his name when I first knew him in Germany!"

I then recalled that I had once seen the signature on a certificate, and, looking round the room, I found it framed and hanging on the wall over the piano. In some occult way I had conveyed that signature to the psychic—perhaps my mind had impressed it on the slate.

So much at least was absolutely true. I could not—nor can I now—account for this peculiar experience.

## Daily Hints For the Cook

### Quince Honey

Pare and core 5 quinces and put the quinces through the fine food chopper. Put the skins and cores in kettle to boil in 1 pint of cold water. When they are tender strain the liquid off and add cold water to make a pint of juice, then pour that juice into a preserving kettle with 5 pounds of fine white sugar. When dissolved add the quinces (that have been through the food chopper), and after they begin to boil just boil hard for 15 minutes and put into tumblers. This makes several tumblers.

### Pea Soup

Wash well a pint of split peas and cover them well with cold water, adding a third of a teaspoonful of soda. Let them remain in it over night to swell. In the morning put them in a kettle with a close-fitting cover. Pour over them three quarts of cold water, adding half a pound of lean ham or bacon, cut into pieces, also a teaspoonful of salt and a little pepper. When the soup begins to boil skim the froth from the surface. Cook slowly for 8 or 4 hours, stirring occasionally until the peas are all dissolved, adding a little more boiling water to keep up the quantity as it boils away. Strain through a colander and leave out meat. It should be quite thick. Serve with small squares of toasted bread, cut up and added. If not rich enough add a small piece of butter.

### SCHOOL NURSING

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Graduate Nurses' Association opened in Halifax yesterday. This association was incorporated in 1910 and has now a membership of 130 certified graduated nurses. Under its auspices a registry for private nurses is maintained at "Restholm" also a well organized "sick benefit fund," managed by a board of directors.

Among the speakers yesterday was Mrs. Lina Rogers Struthers, of Toronto, who gave an address upon "School Nursing" (with lantern illustration). This is Mrs. Struthers' first visit to Eastern Canada and the first occasion upon which the subject of "School Nursing" was presented to an audience in Nova Scotia.

New York was the first city in the world to introduce school nursing under municipal control, when in 1902 Mrs. Struthers was asked to organize the work there under the auspices of the "board of health. School nursing in New York has become a potent factor in the welfare of that large city and a recognized necessity in their great public health service. In 1910 Toronto asked

## ROCKWOOD PLAYGROUNDS

A delegation from the Playgrounds Association appeared before the city council at city hall yesterday afternoon, regarding the large playground at the entrance to Rockwood Park. Some time ago the council was urged to have this playground drained. The old council had voted \$2,000 for use there and this money is available. The mayor has permission from the I. C. R. to have the drainage carried by the railway tracks, and the playgrounds executive feels that the work should be done at once. While there are certain difficulties to be overcome, as the tide backs up and when it recedes there is the overflow from Lily Lake, still it is quite practical to drain the ground.

G. Murdoch after looking over the ground suggested a 36-inch main of reinforced concrete, and drew plans showing a baseball diamond and running track. The whole thing could be done, he said, draining and preparing the ground, for \$4,800.

The members of the council are in favor of developing the playground and yesterday decided to consult their own engineer and see what can be done.

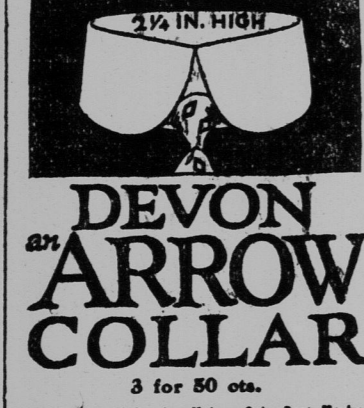
