DR. R. H. FITZ DEAD

Discovered Appendicitis as Definite Disease—Member of the Harvard Faculty for 38 Years. Dr. Reginald Heber Fitz of Boston

Dr. Reginald Heber Fitz of Boston, professor emeritus at the Harvard Medical School and a foremost authority on appendicitis, died on Tuesday evening in the Corey Hill Hospital, Brookline. The cause of death was ulcer of the stomach Dr. Fitz practically discovered appen-

dicitis as a definite disease, and with his article in the American Journal of Medical Science in 1886 begins the real

Medical Science in 1886 begins the real history of its diagnosis and treatment. He gave the disease its name and but for his modesty it would have been known as "Fitz" disease."

Dr. Fitz was born in Chelsea, on May 5, 1848, the son of Albert and Eliza Robert (Nye) Fitz. In 1864 he was graduated from Harvard College and in 1867 he received the degree of A. M. and the year following that of M. D.

He began practice in Boston and almost at the start, in 1870, he entered on his connection with the staff of the Harvard Medical School, which ended only with his retirement in 1908.

He taught pathological anatomy as instructor from 1870 to 1878, as assistant professor from 1878 to 1878, as professor

professor from 1878 to 1878, as professor for a year and as Shattuck professor from 1879 to 1892. He was then appointed to the Hersey professorship of the theory and practice of physic, which he held until 1908. He was granted the title of professor emeritus.

The eminence of Dr. Fitz in his pro

fession was recognized when, in 1905, he was awarded the honorary degree of LL.D by Harvard University. He was a fellow of the degree of the d fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, prominent in the
