

Next door to the store kept by Mr. Berryman was a large retail and wholesale clothing establishment which flourished under the management of Messrs. Near the head of North wharf in the building seen there, was a drug store successfully conducted by "Tom." M. Reid, who was in later years mayor of the city. Nearby was a hardware establishment owned by J. N. C. Black.



Really "see," I mean, not merely "look at."

It seems to me that trees are one of the wonderfully lovely things in nature, whose beauty few of us appreciate.

In Vienna, however, the name of this family is not beloved. For the people of that gay capital can never forget that it was Field Marshal Prince Alfred Windischgraetz, the grandfather of the present Prince Francis, who subjected the inhabitants to all the horrors of siege, martial law, and bombardment in 1848, when they hal revolted against the crown and government, massacred several of the ministers, including the unfortunate Count Latour, and had driven the imperial family from the metropolis to seek refuge in the stronghold of Olmutz.

It was Prince Nicholas Windischgraetz who was directed by the Court of Vienna to escort, as principal chamberlain, Archduchess Marie Antoinette to France, on the occasion of her marriage to the dauphin, afterwards Louis XVI., and so fascinating was the prince's wife, that the courtiers at Versailles transformed her name, so difficult for them to pronounce, noto "Madame de Vingt-Mille-Graces" (Madame of the twenty-thousand Graces.) When she afterwards returned to Vienna, Emperor Joseph II, became her most decoted admirer, and is reported by historian to have been completely subject to influence.



The Eucharistic Congress, which been in session here for several days, reached its climax yesterday in a great procession, which started at 3.30 from the church of St. Jerome in which Monarchs are crowned, and crossed the capital to the palace in great pomp and splendor.
