HAVOC VERY GREAT

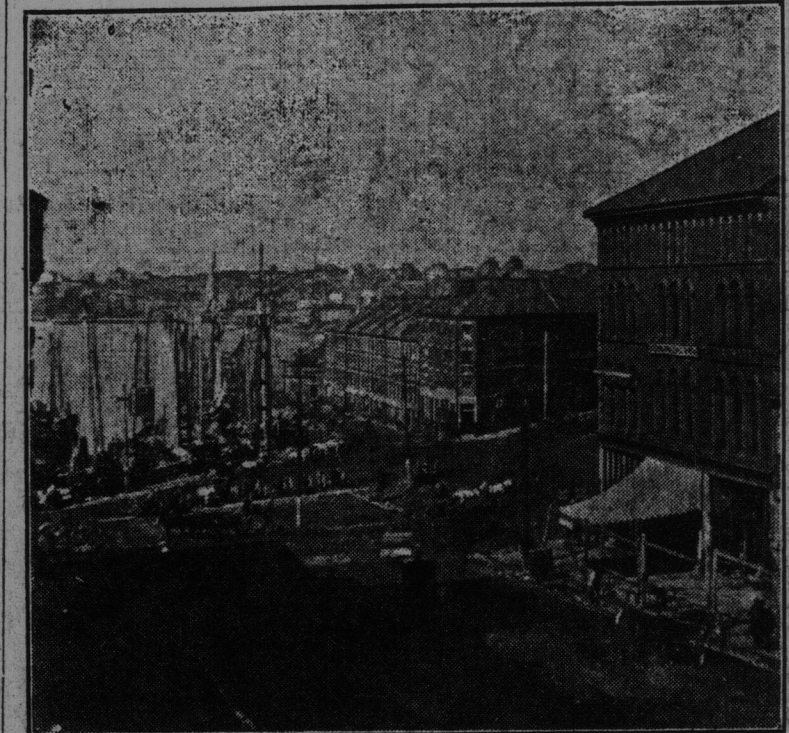
As Wreck Emerges From Waters Heavy Coral-Like Growth is Seen Encouraging Warship—Big Guns Found Undisturbed by the Explosion

CANADIAN BURNED AT THE STAKE

Mexican Bandits Put Robert Swazey To Death By Fire

HAD TREASURE SECRET

Refused to Disclose Hiding Place—Fatal Accident in Toronto's Amusement Park—Aviator Dying From Injuries in First Trip as Pilot

(Canadian Press) Shawnee, Oakland, June 30.—Robert Swazey, a Canadian, was burned at the stake by Mexican bandits near Fort Sumner, N. M., on June 15, according to a letter received yesterday from Mrs. Emma Bingham, mother-in-law of the dead man.

Swazey was killed because he refused to reveal the hiding place of a large amount of money that had been left in his care by a Mexican railroad which employed him, the letter said.

Swazey was fatally injured yesterday while in the first trip as pilot of a biplane. The machine plunged to the earth almost immediately after rising and the lieutenant was taken from the wreckage terribly injured.

W. B. FARRIS HAS A PART IN GREAT PROJECT

Correspondence on the Columbia River Navigation Scheme—A Letter From Hon. Mr. Pughley

Nelson, B. C., June 30.—W. B. Farris, proponent, on the Nelson board of trade, of the Columbia river navigation scheme, has received a letter from Hon. William Pughley, minister of public works, stating that the proposal for Canadian cooperation with the United States government in the matter of making the Columbia navigable in its upper course, is receiving the government's consideration, and that he hopes to have provision made for an early survey of the Columbia from the Windermere to the international boundary.

This confirms the intimation made last fall, that the government would make an estimate of the cost involved.

A. B. McKenzie, secretary of the Associated Boards of Trade of Eastern British Columbia, has just issued from Rosland a circular to the chambers of commerce throughout the states of Oregon and Washington, inviting information as to the commerce to be developed, and the influence this great water route would have in the determination of railway rates between the salt water and the interior.

The American government is constructing works at Kettle Falls and at the Dalles, and at the present rate of progress will have the great river completely navigable to the Canadian boundary in a very few years.

On the Canadian side the river is navigable to Robson, thirty-two miles, where the level is four feet above dead low water, and from Robson to Arrowhead, a distance of 128 miles, it is broadened into the Arrow lake. From that point to the Windermere is 700 miles, traversing a country of great native wealth. A mere tithe of what the American government is spending will give a great portion of the Kootenay access to the sea.

HON. MR. EMMERSON IN SPEECH FOR RECIPROCITY

Charlottetown, P.E.I., June 30.—(Special)—Strong pro-reciprocity speeches by Hon. H. R. Emmerson, J. W. Richards, M. P., for Prince county, Premier Palmer and other prominent Liberals were features of the annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal Association in Summerside yesterday. Mr. Emmerson said he believed ninety per cent of the people in this maritime province favored the measure. He will address the West Prince Liberal Association at O'Leary today.

Barlin, June 30.—Firth, the German aviator, who, with a passenger, started from Munich last evening, arrived here this morning. His flying time was five hours and forty one minutes. He wins a prize of \$12,500.

SEVEN MEN ARE BURIED WHEN BUFFALO BUILDING COLLAPSES

Buffalo, N. Y., June 30.—Seven workmen were crushed to death and seven others seriously injured this morning in the collapse of the roof and other portions of the Buffalo Water Department's new pumping station.

YORK MUNICIPALITY PAYS OFF LAST BOND

(Special to Times) Frederickton, N. B., June 30.—The municipality of York is now free from debt. Secretary Bites having paid off the last indenture of \$2,200. This was part of \$20,000 issued in aid of the Frederickton Branch Railway in 1908. It is likely the council next week will celebrate the event in some way.

John Byers, of Bellefleur county, died on Wednesday from ptomaine poisoning from eating canned goods. Supreme court judgments will be delivered this afternoon.

THREE PRIESTS ORDAINED

(Special to Times) Chatham, N. B., June 30.—In the Cathedral yesterday, three young men were elevated to the priesthood by Bishop Barry. They were: Rev. Benedict Murdoch, nephew of Rev. E. S. Murdoch of Campbellton, and Rev. Mr. Cormier of Campbellton. It is not known yet where the new priests will be placed.

TRAVEL IS HEAVY

The Eastern Steamship Line Captain Austin, Captain Pike, arrived this morning with 400 passengers. The boat had fine weather all the way down. The Union Depot was a very busy place this morning. About 300 of the boat passengers went through to points along the I. C. R.

STRIKE MAY DELAY SIR WILFRID AND CANADA'S TROOPS

(Canadian Press) Liverpool, June 30.—Despite all concessions made the strike situation showed no improvement today. The dockhands are now demanding a guarantee that the wage advances will not be merely temporary.

The shipping federation threatens to take steps that will result in laying up half the shipping tonnage of the country.

The White Star Line today declared a lockout against all the men employed on the Liverpool steamers except the officers and engineers, and is trying to obtain union workers.

The Red Star liner Zeland joined the strikers this morning. Up to noon none of the dock hands had been at work on the cargo of the Empress of Britain or the Carmania.

NOT DECIDED BUT HAS LITTLE HOPE TO SAVE COLLIERY

(Special to Times) Halifax, N. S., June 30.—The water had risen to within 202 feet below the No. 2 level in the Port Hood coal mine on Wednesday night. Deputy Commissioner Donkin has received one report of the advance of the water but he is not yet able to come to any conclusion.

HAY CROP IS SHORT

Ontario Will See Reduction to a Third or a Half of Normal (Canadian Press)—The hay crop in Ontario is short. Dry, hot weather in May following a winter that killed out clover in many parts of the province, made a marked decrease in yield.

Reports indicate a reduction from normal to one-third to one half. Cutting was begun in southwestern Ontario two or three weeks ago and next week will see harvest in full swing in all parts of the province.

Boston Tunnel Bill Killed (Canadian Press)—A bill providing for the connections by tunnel under the harbor, between the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad and the Boston & Maine railroad was killed in the legislature yesterday.

LORDS ADOPT AN AMENDMENT TO THE VETO BILL

(Canadian Press) London, June 30.—The House of Lords, by a vote of 192 to 49 passed Lord Cromer's amendment to the government's anti-veto bill. The amendment affects the clause empowering the speaker of the House of Commons to decide what a money bill is, substituting a committee of seven members from each house and permitting the speaker and the chairman to cast votes. The amendment is designed to prevent the passing of general social legislation under the guise of financial measures.

GREAT SHIPMENT OF TEA

Tacoma, Wash., June 30.—(Canadian Press)—Sixteen hundred tons of uncolored tea, the largest shipment of the new crop to reach Puget Sound this year arrived from the Orient yesterday. Under the prevailing regulations, tea from the orient must be uncolored.

The Imperial celebration has withdrawn attention to some extent from the national holiday in Canada, but the citizens will nevertheless rejoice tomorrow in the fact that another national year has closed in peace and prosperity, with a wonderful outlook for the years to come.

SIMPLIFIED SPELLING

Simplified spelling, which has been regarded more or less as a joke or a fad, presents a new aspect as a result of the resolution adopted at the Imperial Education Conference in London in April and May of this year.

The resolution adopted by the Conference was as follows: "That this Conference is of the opinion that the simplification of spelling is a matter of urgent importance in all parts of the Empire, calling for practical steps in every country as may appear most conducive to the ultimate attainment of the end in view."

The Simplified Spelling Bulletin, published in New York, is encouraged by the action of the Conference to make these observations: "Thus for the first time the leading educational officials of the British Empire have put themselves upon record as believing that the simplification of English spelling is a matter of urgent importance, calling for practical steps toward the solution of the problem and for the formation of an enlightened public opinion to enforce the solution that the educators may finally reach."

Here are some samples of simplified spelling, as given in the Bulletin: "Have, effective, prejudis, friend, refered, others, thru, campain, practis, fonetic, foren, establisht, considerd, catalog, vittles, interes, colleg, explosiv, publish, execut, gush, alfabet, ascertain, receiv, reacht, discust, pamphlet, caid, tentativ, insted, tung, lerning, ahead, etc."

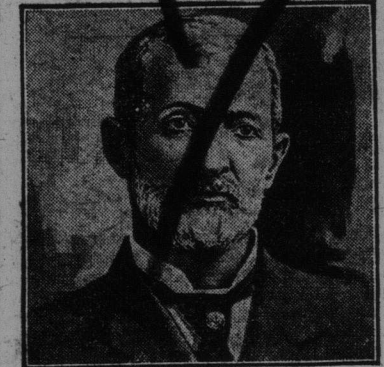
It is announced that the Simplified Spelling Board and the Simplified Spelling Society of Great Britain have agreed to appoint delegates to a conference to be held in London, beginning Monday, September 4, 1911. The purpose of the conference is to settle upon common principles and a policy of common action, and thus to inform and to unify public sentiment.

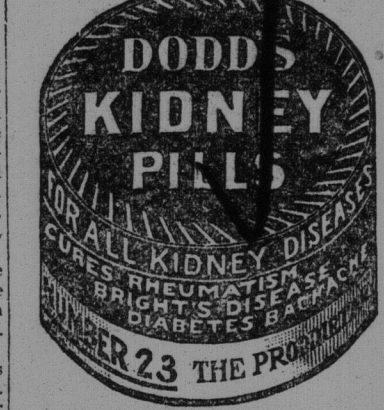

WESTERN FARMERS ARE STRONG FOR RECIPROcity

Toronto, June 29—That it will be easy for the Liberal candidates in the prairie provinces to win the coming elections is the opinion of J. G. Turritt, M. P. for Assiniboia, expressed to your correspondent today after his tour of the west in the interests of reciprocity.

Mr. Turritt held six meetings in Manitoba, beginning on May 29, and fifteen in his own constituency and in Saskatchewan during June 29, and declares that throughout the west he found in every place the

farmers are very much in favor of reciprocity. Being near the boundary line, he says, they see the difference in prices, so it is not necessary to explain that part to them.

Daily Hints For the Cook

LETTUCE STEWED WITH GRAVY
Pare off the shabbiest outside leaves from four heads of lettuce. Boil them in plenty of water for five minutes. Drain the water off and put them in plenty of cold water. Then press the water out carefully, divide each head of lettuce in two equal pieces, form them nicely into shape by folding the leaves over and arrange them in an earthen baking dish. Put a thin slice of fat salt pork over each lettuce, put two cups of boiling water in the dish and cover the whole with a round of buttered paper and put in a moderate oven to bake for an hour. Then if desired to serve transfer the lettuce carefully to a hot platter, add a tablespoonful of beef extract to the gravy in the dish and stir thoroughly. Then pour it round the lettuce.

PEAS WITH BACON
Cut four ounces of bacon into small dice and put it on the stove in a saucepan. Add a large tablespoonful of butter and fry slightly brown, add a small tablespoonful of flour and stir thoroughly. Add a cupful of boiling water and two pints of fresh shelled green peas. Add a small bouquet of parsley and two green onions tied in a small bouquet. Close the saucepan, and stand the whole for ten minutes. Then slowly for 30 minutes. Then if ready to serve remove the bouquet, add a few grains of white pepper, if needed, and half a cupful of cream. Pour into a deep hot vegetable dish and send to the table.

ST. JOHN MAN IN THE WORK ON SUNKEN MAINE

(Continued from page 1.) The huge mass of wreckage which has been always visible above the water is now found to have been torn from the forward part of the ship and folded backward, falling upon and crushing the engine room superstructure amidships. In the place normally occupied by the displaced mass is now nothing but water to a depth of twenty feet, leaving a great gap between the midship section and the bow, distorted portions of which are now revealed above the water. No girders and twisted are the parts that it is difficult to identify them. A notable thing observable is that while the after part of the ship seems intact, though deeply encrusted with barnacles and, at least in the portion which was near the surface, where the water is more aerated, more corroded by the years than had been expected. The after turret, which is on the port side, is in the place, with its guns firm upon their bearings and pointing aft, away from Havana. A notable thing observable is that while the after part of the ship is listed some seven or eight degrees to starboard, the midship section, which is the bulk of the ship, showing that there is a break aft instead of under the stern of the ship, not expected to find. It is now easy to see why the officers had all but two, made their escape, giving rise to the villainous lie that they were ashore at the time of the explosion. The after deck, containing the officers' quarters, was not damaged by the explosion, all of its companions are now high out of water, and as that part of the ship settled very slowly, they had plenty of time to get out with their lives, though with nothing else. As the wreck slowly emerged from the slithering water under which it has so long lain concealed, those in charge of the work were sorely puzzled to find the after deck covered with what seemed to be mud, drifted in places to a depth of four or five feet. When, however, a gang was set to work yesterday with a hose to wash off the mud it was found to be a mass of coral-like marine growth which, mixed with mud and shells, forms a hard concretion, which will take a good deal of work to remove. Unionist M. P. Says Many Agree With Him
STRONG PRONOUNCEMENT

The Imperial Conference And Its Work and Other Empire Topics in Letter from London—Not Concentration but Co-operation The Note

(By Dr. J. A. MacDonald)
London, June 17.—At the date of this writing the Imperial Conference, which has been attracting considerable attention in London and throughout Britain, is within sight of its close. Nothing new or unusual is likely now to be introduced. Already sufficient has been done to furnish a basis for a just judgment. The sessions were not open to the press, but fairly full official statements have been issued daily, and of these the essential materials have been called to Canada by the Canadian Associated Press. The comments on the Conference and its work, from the point of view of the overseas dominions, which have come from the newspapers in Canada, have been, with few exceptions, as intelligent as any that are issued in London. The Conference has provided opportunity for the manifestation of the unstrained remainder of London journalism as regards conditions and sentiments in what Mr. Joseph Chamberlain once called "the sister nations" of the Empire.

Conference Effective
Those who are members of the Conference, the overseas dominions and their delegates, and the members of the House of Commons, who have shared in the discussions, are all agreed in expressions of grateful satisfaction. The Conference has been effective beyond their expectations. Some of them regarded it beforehand as possibly useful, just because the members came together and talked over their various problems. They did not expect anything like intelligent consent leading to common action on any important question. But now that the work is practically completed they are all enthusiastic, not only for the general agreement on fundamental things, but even more for the real contribution the Conference has made to the solving of imperial problems. This was accomplished, as Viscount Balfour, who attended very regularly, remarked yesterday, because the Conference was "more like a Cabinet, and each member felt responsible not only for his own Dominion, but also for the whole Empire."

Co-operation The Note
The note of the entire Conference as to the British Colonial Secretary's speech today, has been "not concentration, but co-operation." Never before did the fact come home so forcibly to the British people who give thought to Imperial affairs, that the statesman and people of the overseas dominions are resolved to make good Mr. Chamberlain's descriptive phrase, "Sister Nations." Many of Mr. Chamberlain's latter-day followers and supporters had not appreciated the real significance of that phrase. They were in the habit of using Kipling's words about Canada being "mistress in her own house," and they passed it as a fine, Imperial figure of speech that would never require interpretation. Recent events began to trouble them; and now this Conference of the Premiers has quite disturbed their content. The Premiers quietly granted the plain truth of Kipling's words. The dominions are loyal and loving, and everything that daughters should be to their mother's house, but they each have inherited so much of the mother's blood and temper that they assume without question the errors and obligations of being mistress each in her own house, on the overseas estate of the Empire.

Hard on Tory Traditions
One is bound to say that this is all rather hard on the old Tory notions, which still survives and which nowadays finds expression in old time terms of concentration and centralized authority. Indeed the words "Empire" and "Imperialism" are used in something of their old Roman sense, and the dominions are thought not as "sister," but as "subject" nations, though, of course, not so described. It has therefore been something of a shock to find this Conference of Premiers behaving as though "Empire" did not mean Empire in the old Tory tongue.

The premiers never flinched. They went right along day after day acting as though each of their dominions were in very truth a "free" nation as well as a "sister" nation. They resolved to keep full control of the machinery of immigration so that even British subjects, whether the units from British cities or the blood aliens from unfree dependencies, if regarded as undesirable, should be refused entrance to overseas dominions. They favored a final court of appeal, but insisted on the independence and the integrity of their own judicial courts. They each approve of all coming closer together, but none of them is willing to surrender any part of national autonomy. The integrity of the several parliaments of the dominions cannot be weakened even though general organization is delayed or deferred. There by. Not only is each dominion to be consulted in the making of British treaties which may involve colonial interests, but the British government is asked to secure relief for the dominions from the terms of treaties made before the days of overseas self-government. So, too, in matters of defence, the dominions retain the right to say whether any actual war is in which they have an interest, such as might justify their participation. And now, all crowning it all, is a thorough investigation and report on the resources, conditions (Continued on page 8, fifth column.)

POLICY TORIES SAY IS ABSURD WAS THAT OF SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD

An Interesting Quotation From Speech on Canada's Participation in the Wars of Britain

(Ottawa Free Press).

In view of the policy that the Canadian Conservatives are making these days over the principle laid down by Sir Wilfrid Laurier that Canada's participation in British wars should be discretionary rather than automatic, it is interesting to note that this was also the idea of their old party chieftain Sir John A. Macdonald. In an article contributed to the Nineteenth Century in 1885 by W. E. Foster, the founder of the Imperial Federation League, we find this statement:

"Sir John Macdonald, the premier of the dominion, made a very short speech at the last federation conference but there was a passage well worth remembering. He said he believed 'that the whole policy of Great Britain was opposed to aggressive war and in any other war the people of Canada would be ready to take their share of the responsibility and the cost.'"

"Sir Wilfrid's attitude seems to be judicial. Of course in any war that involved the honor of the empire Canada would, in the first place, be compelled for self-preservation to participate and, in the second place, it would desire to take its share of the 'responsibility and the cost.' But, as has been pointed out by the Toronto Star, Britain has always more or less involved in petty wars and as to whether this country should participate in these is a question for the Canadian Parliament to decide."

"Sir John Macdonald's statement in 1885 was hailed by the foremost apostle of imperial federation as a great concession. Up to that time it had never been expected that Canada would take any part in British wars. Now when Canada has by practical proof shown its intention of abiding by the policy laid down by Sir John, the party which knew him as leader is pleased to pronounce that policy absurd and traitorous."

The fact is the opposition of the Canadian Conservative party to the attitude of Sir Wilfrid on imperial federation is the opposition of the Conservative party to a policy of reciprocity with the United States.

MILLIONAIRES INDICTED IN "WIRE TRUST" CASES

New York, June 29.—Nine indictments charging restraint of trade in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, were returned by a federal grand jury here this afternoon against a number of associations and a long list of individuals comprising the so-called "wire-trust," affiliated with the industry.

Prominent among the defendants are Herbert L. Satterlee, a son-in-law of J. P. Morgan, and Wm. H. Palmer, president of the American Steel & Wire Company, a subsidiary of the United States Steel Corporation, and Frank J. Gould, the well-known railroad financier.

"What this suit charges," said District Attorney Wise, "is a trade agreement in restraint of trade." The government does not seek to establish a physical or fiscal control of the properties or interests indicated, but a series of pools to maintain prices and apportion territory, in elimination of competition, and so in violation of the Sherman act.

NO INCREASE IN FREDERICTON RATES

W. M. Jarvis, Peter Clinch, R. W. W. Frink, H. B. Robinson and B. R. Armstrong, of the N. E. board of fire underwriters, returned last evening from Fredericton, where they appeared before the city council with reference to better fire protection. Mr. Jarvis said that the report sent out that rates were to be raised and that the meeting was inharmonious was quite incorrect. The insurance men asked for eight inch mains on the side streets instead of three inch mains as at present or six inch pipes as proposed. This point, said Mr. Jarvis, the council concurred and Ald. Farrell, chairman of the water committee, afterwards agreed on the kind of pipes to be used. It was also recommended that the shingle roofed ell on Queen street buildings be covered as soon as possible and the council agreed that this should be done.

The desirability of purchasing a chemical engine was also pointed out, its great effectiveness in saving the city when the water service gave out in St. John in December, 1907, being cited. The council also promised consideration, although they intimated that this suggestion might not be met immediately.

Mr. Jarvis said that the meeting was most harmonious and the aldermen met them in a conciliatory spirit.

WOMAN'S METHODIST MISSION WORK

The annual district convention of the women's Methodist Missionary Society was held in Sussex yesterday. Delegates were present from every Methodist church in the St. John district and papers were read dealing with the different methods of carrying on the society's work. and prospects, industrial and commercial of the whole empire, and of each part are asked for so that some intelligence may be put into the discussion of an imperial trade policy.

Selborne Idea Repudiated

"These are the finger-posts along the way over which the imperial conference of the government of Britain keeps step with the governments of the overseas dominions. What does it all mean? It means beyond all question that 'Empire,' after the notion of the Jingo imperialists, is both undesirable and impossible. If anything is done, the nation persists, as was illustrated by Lord Selborne in his recent tariff controversy with Hon. W. S. Biddling, if Lord Selborne's argument means anything, it means that Canada has not the right, in view of imperial obligations, to exercise fiscal autonomy. Not only Canadians, but most intelligent British readers, repudiate that notion. One of the foremost statesmen in Britain, as to me the other day:

"If Lord Selborne's view prevailed, Canada's autonomy would be gone, and if there is no autonomy for Canada and the other dominions there can be no empire." That is indeed the case, but it is decided already.

What the protectionist press of London, led by The Morning Post, demands, via "consolidation of the empire on the basis of a protective tariff" is more hopeless today than at any time in this generation. An instance was given this week when a Canadian member of the British parliament, a Unionist, openly declared in the presence of five well-known Canadian Conservatives, that the Unionists would soon throw over the food tax, and that if he speaks on the question in the House of Commons he will support the proposed reciprocity agreement with the United States. He declared, too, that many Unionist members agree with him. He did not hesitate to say that a tax on wheat is out of the question for Britain, but he did not convince me that his party could win without their old friends, the agriculturalists, or that without a tax on wheat any possible preference would be of much interest to Canada.

Protection Losing Ground

The fact is protection is crumbling in the hands of its British friends. President Taft's idea, that Canada is now "at the parting of the ways," and must choose between better trade relations with the United States and a tariff preference in Britain, is seen here to be even more improbable and more theoretical than it

seemed when viewed from Canada. The facts of trade in Britain and the conditions in the overseas dominions of the field of Bannockburn, so celebrated as revealed through the imperial conference, make it plain that Canada will have no such alternative. EASY TO BUY POISON IN COUNTRY STORES

What the N. B. Pharmaceutical Society Proposes to do to Curb the Evil

As before reported, at the outing of the members of the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society at Ben Leonard on Wednesday, the matter of the sale of powerful poisons in general stores, throughout the province was discussed at some length, and it was finally decided to look into the matter further, and that if the present laws were not stringent enough to stop the practice, that amendments should be sought that would cope with the evil.

The question principally applies to country stores where almost everything is kept for sale. At the present time it is possible for one to purchase quantities of strychnine, iodoform, cocaine and other powerful poisons in these stores, and it is the aim of the N. B. Pharmaceutical Society to prevent this.

Under a new law which will come in force in very few months the sale of cocaine, opium and all other such drugs will be greatly restricted and druggists will have to keep records of all sales of these articles. It is also expected that legislation will be secured before long which will prevent the sale of these drugs excepting in drug stores. The sale of iodoform, acid, and other deadly acids would also come under this law.

The New Brunswick society proposes to begin an active campaign to bring about these reforms.

PLANS FOR BAPTIST CONVENTION IN JULY

Meeting Will be Held in Hartland—Some of the Topics—Maritime Conference in August

The Baptist ministers of the city, including Rev. F. S. Porter, Rev. D. Hutchinson, Rev. Miss McLaughlin, Rev. W. Camp, Rev. B. H. Nobles, Rev. Mr. Wentworth, Rev. Wilber Williams, and W. R. Robinson, will go to Hartland on July 11 to attend the provincial convention. The delegates to be elected soon will follow on the next day to attend the regular sessions. The officials of the convention are Rev. H. G. Kennedy, of Woodstock, moderator; Rev. H. H. Saunders, of Sussex, assistant moderator; Judge F. W. Emmons, of Moncton, secretary; and James Paterson of St. John, treasurer.

The convention for the province will meet in the Baptist church there on Wednesday, July 12 at 10 a.m. The ministers are ex-officio members of the convention, and laymen are entitled for election from all the churches, according to the rate of two delegates from each church of 100 or under one for every fifty of additional membership.

Two sittings of the ministers' conference will precede the regular sessions, commencing at 2:30 p.m. on Tuesday. At this conference important matters bearing on the denominational work will be considered. A paper will be read on the problems of a country pastor, by Rev. F. G. Francis of Salisbury. Rev. G. A. Lawson, of Moncton will read a paper on the intellectual and spiritual work of the pastor. The pastor in his co-operation with his denominational interests is the subject assigned to Rev. H. H. Saunders, R.D., Sussex. The exegetical sermon will be preached in the evening by Rev. A. Perry.

The convention will continue its sessions for three days. Questions of a denominational character will be considered. The program for the convention proper will be announced soon.

The Maritime Conference will convene in Milltown during August. The union of the foreign mission work with Ontario and Quebec has been voted upon and it is expected that union will be first declared at this convention. Similar action will be taken at the convention of Quebec and Ontario in October, and after that date the foreign mission will be under one board.
