Dealing with the cost of the commis-sion form of civic administration, he said that the assessment from 1903 to 1912 increased \$216,962. From 1913 to 1922, under the commission form, it increased \$1,061,041. Valuation in-

1922, under the commission form, it increased \$1,061,041. Valuation in-creased between 1903 and 1912 from \$22,742,500 to \$30,624,800. Under com-mission from 1913-1922 it increased from \$30,624,600 to \$54,079,300. The tax rate, he said, increased from \$1.62 in 1903 to \$1.96 in 1912 and under com-mission from \$1.96 to \$2.98. Equality, certainty, convenience and economy were the four principles of taxation laid down by Adam Smith, he said. With these in mind he had come to the conclusion that it was quite within range of reason to pro-vide for these principles in the prob-lems of taxation here. He would ex-empt income taxes up to \$1,500 with payment of poll tax. He would have a quarterly payment scheme for taxes. One payment, he said, would qualify a person to vote. This was not pos-sible without the sanction of the peo-ple of the city, however. It would support the restoration of the Court House, he said, but not ex-penditures for a great Municipal Build-ing.
