INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Infants' Home and Infirmary, was held at the Home, 21 St. Mary street, on Friday, November 3rd, at 4 p.m. Ald. McMurrich kindly took the chair, in the unavoidable absence of the Mayor. Short, and sympathetic speeches were made by the gentlemen who kindly moved the adoption of the various reports. Among those present were Mr. Justice Osler, Messrs. Thomas Hodgins, Q.C., Herbert Mason, Henry Cawthra, J. K. Macdonald, Dr. George Ryerson, etc. The Rev. John Pearson opened and closed the meeting with prayer, after which the house was thoroughly inspected by the many visitors, and refreshments offered to their guests by the Managers of the Home.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

Although discouragements and difficulties are inseparable from philanthropic work such as theirs, the Managers of the Infants' Home feel that whatever success or sorrow has befallen the Home during the year just closed, has come to them from the hand of an ever loving Heavenly Father, whom the Managers desire in this report to recognize as the

mainspring of this work of love and charity. How blessed are those years in the life of an institution, when the Secretary in the annual report says, "beyond routine work there is very little to report." Rarely has this been the case with the Infants' Home. Last year our report dealt with many troubles and losses, caused by the terrible scourge of diphtheria. This year, while some few bright gleams have flickered across our path, we have had to contend against much discouragement, illness and change. How little do the general public, when asked to interest themselves in this charity, by donating some small sum towards its support, realize that this Institution is the only idea of home that can ever attach itself to the opening minds of the many tiny creatures sheltered by us within this building. The helplessness of infancy should appeal to all, but owing to the extreme difficulty of disassociating in the minds of many persons what constitutes aid to the destitute and blameless sufferer, and what constitutes a condoning of sin, by making a shelter too easily procured, owing, I repeat, to this difficulty, the Managers of this Home have always an uphill road, and require a larger share of sympathy and support than the average householder is willing to extend, simply because they have not, by personal enquiry, ascertained the aims and objects which, during the past seventeen years, the Managers of the Home have endeavoured to accomplish. The latter half of the title of our Institution is one very seriously overlooked by our friends and the public generally. *Infirmity*, or place for the infirm, is somehow always associated with grown or aged persons. Ours is in very truth an infirmary, but alas, it is for the tiny child with its little life crushed, and well nigh spent in its feeble struggle for a firmer foothold on life.

A poor woman deserted by her husband, or a forlorn and betrayed girl, trying to earn by daily work, the barest necessities of life, must leave her infant to the care of strangers; drugs are freely given to the hapless child, until the mother taking alarm, brings her visibly dying baby to the Home, pleading for its admission, not our Infants' Home, but our *Infirmary* receives the suffering mite, and the few remaining hours of that little life flicker out amid comfortable surroundings and pitying care. Although recognized as dying when brought to our Institution, the Managers, have never in any case, refused admission, although fully understanding that one more name must be added to our sorrowful list; we are really an *Infirmary* and then an Infants' Home.

But with this portion of our work, the Medical report will doubtless deal, and a mournful history of measles, whooping-cough and diphtheria, is undoubtedly shown. If our public spirited men could realize that within this building the saddest of all earthly spectacles is constantly to be seen, that of helpless infant life, collected together in a public Home, because their rightful protectors, through drink or poverty have left them homeless; they would then feel that to get to the reason why this should be so is work that should arouse the sympathy and philanthropy of all right-minded persons. Want of employment for labouring men is, unusual as it may seem to say so in a report of an Infants' Home, one great reason for much of the sickness and death of our inmates. The wives of these men have been obliged to leave their homes and take any household work they could get; the poor infant and older children must be neglected in this struggle for existence, and is it any wonder the weakest goes to the wall. The unemployed man becomes discouraged,

and morose, drink and subsequent desertion of his family are too often the outcome of this state of affairs. How then is it possible that children under these conditions can be properly reared? The poor mother is far too often at work, even beyond her strength, until necessity compels her admission to the Hospital, or she is cared for at her poor apology for a home by some charitable neighbour. Is it not a foregone conclusion that nourishing food is unattainable, the mother has not strength, and is not sufficiently fed herself to properly care for her infant; good milk, the first necessity of a child's existence is an almost impossible luxury. Can you wonder, therefore, that these infants come to us so hopelessly weakened, that it is beyond the scope of the most careful feeding and nursing to undo the evil of these earlier weeks or months of the infant life. For the poor waifs, picked up on our streets, this Home is the only refuge, and the record of these children that survive the exposure and pass from our Infirmary to become nursery children in the Infants' Home, is most encouraging. Several adoptions have taken place from their ranks, and the yearly report invariably tells us of the special talents of each adopted child. The fact that these infants are found deserted in the streets of Toronto, does not necessarily imply that their parents reside in our city, there is no doubt that the majority are deserted by persons from a distance, as in no instance have the police found the perpetrators of this most cowardly crime of child desertion. The reports from our children who have been adopted, are of a most satisfactory nature, over one hundred and thirty have found comfortable homes; the Managers receiving from time to time accounts, such as the following:—

"The little boy Tommy has undergone quite a change. In

the first place, the clothes he had will hardly button on him, he is getting so fat. In the second place, he makes himself very much at home. We have bought him an overcoat, mittens, and rubbers. Our little boy was very frightened of cats and dogs when he came, but is not near so bad now."

Another says:

"My little girl is no trouble, she is well, and doing well, she attends day and Sunday-school, and is a great comfort to me."

A further letter:

"Our boy Willie is more to us than we could ever have hoped or expected. His mother will bring him to see you at Exhibition time."

An enthusiastic woman writes:

"I am sure you want to know how the little girl got home. She was good all the way. She takes great notice, and we all think her perfect. I enclose bits of the stuff for her pinnies and frocks. She looks real cute in some of them, and I have made them all." (About fifteen bits, nearly all large checks, were enclosed with this letter.)

The record of our mother nurses has been, on the whole, encouraging. More than one-third of our admissions during the past year have been deserted wives. One of these was only in her seventeenth year, with an infant of eight months old.

A large proportion of admissions of unmarried mothers to our Home are from country villages, and of girls who prefer factory life and boarding in some cheap, low lodging, to remaining at home under any parental control. This Home, as the yearly report shows, continues to adhere to the strict rule, "No unmarried woman admitted, except with her first-born," therefore our Institution, as far as

possible, acts as Rescue Home, Refuge for the destitute, Hospital for sick and dying infants, and giving home life, as far as may be, to the children of the Home proper. Our nursery children are models of health and strength, showing the treatment adopted in the Home is satisfactory. There is in all this city no refuge for a very young child suffering with an incurable complaint. Our Managers, should such a case survive infamy, cannot do otherwise than keep the child under their care. We have one such child at present, whose father is dead, her mother in the Asylum; no one ever asks for the child, she is helplessly left, and can never walk. The Infants' Home has no appliances for such cases, and no funds for special nurses; but the Managers endeavour to remember the motto on the seal of the Home: "Take this child, and nurse it for Me." A special chair has been provided for this little girl, in which she can push herself about to her great pride.

Cases might be multiplied and this report become wearisome; but if, when placed in the hands of the public by our collectors, what has been said causes even half a dozen persons to think why infant life should be so recklessly tampered with, this report will not have been written in vain.

During this year we have had under our care 166 children and 67 women. Five children have been adopted into good homes, and are the pride and joy of their adopted parents' lives. We have had to send eight of our mother nurses to the Hospital, and find the larger proportion of the women admitted to the Home during the year to have been unusually delicate, making, therefore, very inefficient nurses.

Large sums of money have been expended this year upon our heating and sanitary arrangements. This outlay, the

Keterson Legacy enabled us to meet; for our Maintenance Fund and household expenses we depend upon our yearly house-to-house collections. It will, therefore, readily be seen how essential it is for the well-being of our inmates, and extension of this charity, that the public should be interested in the work of the Home. Once become interested from conviction, the necessity for giving aid to so deserving an institution will become a fixed principle. We have had recent proof of this, from a legacy of \$3,000 which will accrue to the Home at the death of the testator's widow. For thirteen years Mr. Milroy gave a liberal donation to our funds, and the benefits to be derived in the future from Mr. Milroy's practical benevolence can only be realized by managers of charitable institutions.

We have had helpers, as usual, among the young people, for the "Little Maids'" Society continue their annual sale of work, perseveringly keeping in view their self-imposed task of raising \$1,000 towards the endowment of a cot in this Home. "The Canadian Childrens' Cot Fund," progresses slowly. Children can realize a sick child, but a sick baby is something they do not quite understand.

The second yearly report of the Infants' Home says, "It is highly desirable that a separate Infirmary and trained nurse be added to this Institution." We had the Infirmary several years ago, and now can say that a special nurse has been added to our household staff during this year. Nurse Young has charge of the Infirmary, and we do trust that good results from the special care of these delicate infants, may be satisfactorily shown in our next yearly report.

The workroom ladies continue to meet each Monday for the purpose of making the garments for our little and big babies. Miss White is, as ever, our steadfast friend, untiring

in making clothing and toys for these little ones. Our Bible classes are kept up with regularity and faithfulness; and the Clergy of St. Luke's Church and of Holy Trinity, are most kind in conducting services for the women. The Managers are very glad to take advantage of this meeting to publicly thank these steadfast friends for their untiring kindness. Our Medical staff has had some changes; Dr. Dawson has entered upon active duty, and Dr. McArthur has also been appointed upon the staff. Our physicians have, as usual, been our firm friends, and during the trying months of measles, whooping-cough, and diphtheria, were unwearied in their attendance and efforts to relieve and soothe our suffering little ones.

In conclusion may we add, that to support and uphold this Institution is the duty of all Christian and right-minded persons. To raise the fallen, to shelter the helpless, to care for the poverty-stricken, are Christ-like virtues, all cannot work in this special way, but by sympathy much may be done. How powerless are the Managers to stem the tide of human frailty, and with what sad reality does the mournful side of infant and womanly life present itself to each worker associated with this Home. In all this, readers of this report can do much to help us, by the encouragement of kindly words, and intelligent appreciation of what has been accomplished, and above all, by a belief in the power for good that this Institution is called upon to fill. For nearly eighteen years the Managers of this Infants' Home have striven to carry out to the fullest extent the object of their Constitution, viz., "To receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age." During this period we have sheltered, fed and clothed 1024 mothers, and 2412 children varying in age from three days to two years of age. Such

MEDICAL REPORT.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—On behalf of the Medical staff of the Infants' Home, I beg to present the following report for the year ending 1st October, 1893 :—

During this period there have been admitted to our wards 107 infants, which, with 56 in the Home at the close of last year, gives a total of 163 that have received medical care in this building. Of these, 10 were foundlings, and 14 were sent in on city orders.

Among these unfortunate little waifs, as is always the case, has been the largest number of deaths; the previous exposure and neglect having apparently sapped their slender supply of strength, so that they are the earliest victims of any infantile disorders. We have had an unusually large amount of infectious diseases amongst us this year.

Whooping-cough was the first to appear, last December, and ran through the house, but was fortunately not of a severe type.

Diphtheria visited us again in January, and attacked 5 of the children and 2 nurses, all of whom were at once sent to the Isolation Hospital.

A severe epidemic of measles was our next anxiety in March and April, which spread rapidly among the inmates and was the cause of a number of deaths. Finally typhoid fever selected our Institution for a sojourn during a brief period last August, depriving us of the services of our Lady Superintendent and four nurses; all of these were transferred to the Hospital, and we are pleased to be able to add, all recovered and are now doing well.

The highest mortality in any month was during April, and was directly due to the epidemic of measles already mentioned.

The lowest mortality in any month was that of July.

Several changes of food in the infants' dietary have been made; all tending to a finer and more modern class of nourishment. A more liberal supply of sunlight and air has been admitted to the upstairs, wards and corridors, which cannot but be conducive to an improved strata of health of the inmates.

There has been a thorough overhauling of the drainage from attic to cellar. The smoke-test has been frequently applied, and very little, if any, defect in the plumbing has been discovered.

The appointment of a nurse who has constant supervision of the Infirmary and its inmates is, we believe, a very judicious one, and one which has already shown itself of great benefit to the Home.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, their babies shall be admitted free.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Committee of thirty ladies, assisted by an Advisory Committee of three gentlemen, and the Committee shall elect annually their Presiding Officers and a Treasurer and Secretary out of their number.

V.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-laws of the Society, provided one month's notice shall be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the "Advisory Committee."

VI.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at the annual meeting to act as an Advisory Committee. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VII.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, etc.

VIII.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank in the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed :—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President ; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President ; or, in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the general committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each manager taking his duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the weekly committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the weekly committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her service for at least six months to the Institution (or as much longer as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, to be determined by the Board) in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and child.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the lady managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is deemed satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection from such children as are deserted and dependent on charity, and not visited by parents or friends.
