LOST IN THE JUNGLE.

In that chain of mountains sometimes called the backbone of the American continent, and of which our Rockies form an important part, the lowest of a range of mountains extends to the south of the United States, and in the state of Virginia, Central America, where it spreads itself out into a perfect labyrinth of lower hills, with a few prominent peaks here and there almost to the Atlantic sea. Well over toward the Pacific coast the two large lakes of Managua and Nicaragua, and from the latter comes the largest river of that country, the San Juan, in a southerly direction to the Atlantic.

Through this country it is proposed to cut an interoceanic canal, by the natural waterway of the San Juan, Lake Nicaragua, in connection with short artificial passages, locks, etc. Several important estimates and surveys have been made for this purpose, one dating as far back as 1820, but the first one or the route finally decided upon was run some four years ago, and during the winter of 1887-8 more extensive surveys of this line were made. It is with this last survey that we are here to-day concerned.

The corps of engineers, assistants, etc., being broken up into several parties and stationed along the route of the canal, the work in hand was divided up among them. These parties, however, were not all of equal importance, and the only party of communication between them was by the San Juan, the river, the surrounding country being an almost impenetrable wilderness, with here and there a few scattered huts of the natives, and a few straggling huts of the Spaniards.
