

ANTI-JAP SITUATION IN THE UNITED STATES

The More Conservative Japanese Papers Urge Patience in the Face of Trying Conditions—Sensational Press However Endeavoring to Make Trouble—Church Federation Approves Roosevelt's Action.

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 10.—The Church Federation of Los Angeles yesterday passed a resolution expressing hearty approval of the action taken by President Roosevelt in regard to the proposed Japanese immigration and protesting against any action by the state legislature not in harmony with the general policy of the national government.

It is believed here, however, that the question of the Japanese situation here and of the better classes, who absolutely control Japan remains unchanged. The Japanese press is unable to distinguish between the various nationalities of the foreigners in Japan and considered alike.

WAKE UP, ST. JOHN

If the people of the Miramichi secure the Dominion exhibition grant, the citizens of St. John must needs congratulate them upon their success, but at the same time blame themselves for contributory negligence in having the great fair located where it will not do the most good to the greatest number.

MR. TODD'S SPEECH

The following paragraph from the speech of W. F. Todd, M. P., in moving the address in answer to the speech of the governor general is of special interest to eastern readers: "I come from the far east, from a country bordering upon the sea. I come from New Brunswick, where we have also rich farming lands. Still, we know that the immigrants from the old world are more likely to be attracted by the western prairie lands, which have lain fallow for centuries, and which will give the farmer the maximum of profit without subjecting him to the expense of adding to the soil the fertilizers which are found necessary in the west. But no doubt the day will come when the immigrants from the mother country will see in the eastern provinces lands which, scientifically cultivated, will give a handsome return on the investment, besides enjoying the advantages of being near a central market and having cheaper transportation facilities."

OUR FRIEND THE YAK

We are informed that Canada is to have a herd of yaks, and that Mr. Thompson Seton, who was formerly known as Mr. Seton-Thompson, or something like that, approves of the venture. At once we become interested in yaks. What are they? Are yaks related to yaws, or yams, or yahoos or yabbers? Do they yowl or yodel? Are they in any way related to the yakus or yakubs? Somewhere from the chambers of memory comes a school-boy recollection of the picture of a hump-backed animal with a fringe of long hair reaching almost to the ground. Instantly the light dawns. The

yak is an old friend, associated in our minds with the Grand Lama, and the mysterious tablelands of the "roof of the world." Turning up the dictionary we learn: "The yak is a bovine ruminant of the higher regions of Asia, intermediate between the bison and the true oxen, with long hair fringing the shoulders, sides and tail; extensively domesticated in Central Asia for its milk and hair, and as a beast of burden. The tall furnishes the choicest or fly-mappers used in India. The domesticated variety, or long-haired yak, is the inseparable companion and most trusted servant, not only of the Tibetans, but of tribes in Cashmere, Ladak, Tangut, and Mongolia, even as far north as Uru."

EXPECTS A BOOM

In the course of an article in which it forecasts great development in the province of British Columbia, the Victoria Colonist presents these pointed reminders:

"When John Wilson, of St. Andrews, New Brunswick, five years after Stevenson had driven his first railway train, told the people of that little seaport town that the day was not far distant when a railway train would run thence to the town on the St. Lawrence, he was set down as a dreamer of dreams. When Judge Halliburton not many years later spoke of a railway from Halifax to Esquimaux as a possibility and, indeed, as an imperative necessity, wise people said such a suggestion could only have emanated from the author of 'San Sals.' When Samuel Osmond said he would run a line of steamships across the Atlantic he was laughed to scorn, and the most practical of his critics, Dr. Laidner, delivered a lecture, at Oxford, we think it was, in which he demonstrated beyond the shadow of a doubt that Osmond's proposed ships could not by any possibility carry enough coal to last throughout the voyage."

Boldly taking his place among the prophets, the Colonist begins by asserting that British Columbia has already accomplished much within its "border lands" which would be realized for two or three generations, and then proceeds to tell of the great and wholly unimproved parcel of railway building, which will be carried on in the province by the Canadian Pacific, the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern, opening up territory, attracting settlers, building towns and developing trade. It is a rosy picture, and if the Colonist is anywhere near the mark, the Pacific province will soon be one of the most vigorous and progressive in all Canada. East or west, growth helps the whole country.

The attitude of the government, as shown in today's despatches, with regard to turning rights on the I. C. R. will be commended by the country. More than one of the transcontinental roads will want such rights, and the question must be approached from that standpoint. Moreover, any arrangements made must also take account of the fact that the I. C. R. itself will be reaching out after more western business.

Hon. Sydney Fisher spelled a political sensation yesterday. Mr. Blain made the fearless discovery that \$150 had been paid for a hog. "Clearly," said Mr. Blain to himself, "there must have been a fat slice here for the rafe-off men." But Mr. Fisher explained that the owner of the hog in question was a prominent supporter of Mr. Borden. Mr. Blain's bristles subsided.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux's bill providing compensation for lost registered letters and parcels has passed its second reading. The measure is a reasonable one and at the same time will not add much to the expenditure of the department. The proportion of lost letters, thanks to the careful postal service, is small.

Mr. Carvell, M. P., is quite within the mark when he says that, by placing \$450,000 in the estimates under the head of capital account, Hon. Mr. Pughley has made the most important move ever made to ward the development of St. John as a national port.

Albert county Conservatives have adopted resolutions endorsing Dickson, Prescott, Fowler, Hazen and portions of the road act. There is really something pathetic in such wholesale devotion.

It is announced that if the city council seeks legislation to disfranchise those citizens whose incomes are exempted from taxation, it will be met by a bill which would qualify those who pay poll tax to vote at civic elections.

King Edward and Emperor William declare themselves ardently desirous of peace and friendship between England and Germany. The time is opportune for the meeting and the friendly amusements.

THIS CASE CALLS FOR ACTION AT ONCE

Mrs. Martin Doyle Linked to a Worthless Husband is Being Cared for by Neighbors—Something Should be Done.

A case of almost inconceivable cruelty of a husband towards his wife has been found at 16 Pond street, where Mrs. Martin Doyle, barely out of her teens, being 20 years old, has been forsaken by her young husband, aged 22. The young woman is in a delicate state of health and is saved only from the pangs of hunger and the bitter cold by the kindness of neighbors, among whom is the landlord, E. S. Duggan.

Through Mr. Dibble's generosity Mrs. Doyle is enabled to have coal and food. In her present condition Dr. Morris, who is attending her, has instructed that she be not left alone, and Mrs. John East, a neighbor has been staying with her during the nights and other neighbors during the day time.

A Times man who called at the Doyle home yesterday found the unfortunate woman huddling over the kitchen stove to keep warm. She was quite ill and it was apparently a great effort for her to talk.

Mrs. Doyle very reluctantly unfolded the story of her unhappy life with her husband. Her maiden name, she told, was Rose Ashley, and she and her sister Emma, came to this city as immigrants about six years ago from Birmingham, England. They first lived at the Lancaster Home. The two drifted apart and Mrs. Doyle says that she does not know where her sister is now, or whether she is alive or dead.

She has lived as a domestic in a number of places since coming here and met her husband more than a year ago. She is a Protestant and her husband a Roman Catholic. By agreement, they were married by Rev. Gideon Swim, of the Waterloo street Baptist church, the understanding being, according to Mrs. Doyle, that they would each attend their own church. They first lived at the Lancaster Heights, Fairville, and Mrs. Doyle says she worked at the hotel for her board. About two months ago they took up their abode at their present quarters.

According to Mrs. Doyle her husband has never been a good provider, she having received but \$11 from him during all of their married life. She believes that he has not worked since Christmas. Anything he has brought home, she says, he has given to her at Dibble's store, or has brought a few things from his home in Fairville.

During the last two weeks he has seen her but little.

Thursday night she was so ill that she was sent for but he remained only that night. He returned again Saturday having been drinking. She remonstrated with him for his conduct, and she stated that he struck her in the face and left. At that time he brought a piece of meat bone and a small parcel of sugar. Mrs. Doyle says that she has her husband's father and mother in Fairville, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Doyle, are harboring him as is his sister, Mrs. Craney.

MONCTON NEWS

An Interesting Liquor Case—Sandy Ferguson Leading Revival Meetings
