A HOROLOGICAL ACHIEVEMENT. One of the most interesting clocks of the century.

Messrs. William Paton & Sons, the well known clock makers of Leeds, England, have just constructed for that city what is claimed to be the greatest horological achievement of the century.

The clock is a huge one, and in it are combined many features of the most remarkable clocks in the world, such as those at Bern and Strasbourg cathedral.

The huge clock dial, which is of polished copper with the figures inscribed upon it in blue, is flanked upon either side by a mail-clad knight, each holding above his head a battle ax, which serves to strike the gongs at the quarters and hours.

Above the clock, upon a kind of perch, stands a large cockerel. In front of the dial is a platform.

When the quarters of the hour are reached the mail-clad knights strike their gongs. Immediately on the left hand side of the dial a door opens automatically, and there issues forth a British soldier in uniform.

When he reaches the center of the platform he halts and salutes in precise military manner. He then passes on to the left, and is followed by a killed Highlander, who repeats a similar performance when he reaches the middle of the platform.

Then comes an Irishman in the old dress of his country, brandishing a shillelagh; then a Canadian boatman with his paddle, and finally a Hindoo, wearing his turban and loin cloth.

When the figures have passed round the platform they disappear from sight through another door, which closes automatically upon the last figure's exit.

The figures are manufactured of copper, bronze, white metal or the other parts of the clock are made from gun-metal. The escapement is the double three-legged gravity of Lord Grimthorpe, who is probably the greatest living authority on clocks and bells.

There was a glorious yachting week on Thursday last for the race between Miramichi Yacht Club boats. The event for the day was the 12 mile contest of Chatham, for the "golden eagle" prize offered by Colonel R. B. Call.

The wind was strong from the west, veering at times between northwest and west-southwest, so that the sternmen had to be very alert, especially in the windward work.

Macle was out a considerable time, ranging about the river, before Oriana put out from her berth, so that the race, which was booked for 11 o'clock did not start until within a few minutes of twelve.

Starter: Commodore J. C. Miller. The tide set up river against the strong wind making a choppy sea, and as the knock-down puff came and the yachts were heading into the wind the spray flew in the faces of the crews, as manoeuvres were being made for the start. Just as the preparatory signal was given Macle's crew, who had their boat, it then, under main-sail

overhaul her opponent. Macle, however, turned the lower stake-boat with a head of thirty four seconds and on the windward work for the upper turn increased her lead, going round that stake-boat two minutes in advance. The wind had, meantime, again increased and the last run down was "smoother white" one, in which Macle gained still more, turning with over a three minute lead, which, in the windward work up to the finish line, she increased to over five minutes, winning the race by 53 min. 53 sec. actual time. The official figures are as follows:

At 11:15 a.m. 20th Oct. Oriana's crew was actual time, 5 - 53 - 3. The fourth of this season's "Club races and the last for the year. The first three and fourth were won by Macle and the second by Oriana. Macle is now one race ahead of the fleet in the three years' aggregate contest—which is to be finished next year for the trophy given by E. Hutchison, Esq.
