On this date in 1878 the new Conservative ministry was formed, with Sir John Macdonald as Prime Minister. It is the anniversary of the surrender of General Burgoyne, who had marched with an army from Can-ada with the design of cutting off New England from the other colonies, at Saratoga in 1777.

Having annexed Upper Canada—ai though the people of the conqueres territory almost unanimously refuses to admit the authority of the United States—the Washington government immediately planned the conquest of the Lower Province. By October an army of \$,000 men were assembled at Sackett's Harðor, N. Y., for an attack upon Montreal. The Americans were decisively defeated in the battle of Chrystier's Farm, and another invad-ing army was vanquished on the field of Chateauguay. In these two engage-ments some 15,000 Americans were turned back from the descent on Mon-treal by only about 2,500 British and Canadians. himself in favor of a policy of federal aid for provincial highways. When returned to power he attempted to redeem this pledge and introduced legislation to provide for a Dominion erred it was his Tammany friends legislation to provide for a Dominion grant to be expended in improving the provincial highways. This bill was killed by the Liberal Senate.
