

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



Officials affirm that evertures for a hearing at Convention today were made by Executive Chairman Foster-Issue forced by Government's action.

Members of the Dominion Alliance deny that a committee was againted by that body to wait upon the opposition convention and request a hearing, as implied by a motion adopted by the latter body at last evening's ession. E. N. Stockford of the Alliance said last night that the impression conveyed by the motion was incorrect.

Mr. Stockford said that yesterday he received information from Rev. Thomas Marshall, vice-president of the Alliance, that President Donald Fraser had received an invitation to attend the convention and lay before it the views of the Alliance on temperance legislation desired.

"I told Chairman Poster of the executive committee of the opposition party," said Mr. Stockford, that if the convention wanted to see representatives of the Alliance I would be much obliged if it would set the time. I told Mr. Foster that in my opinion they had been forestabled by the government."
