



### SIMPLE AND PRACTICAL TRAPS TO CATCH RATS

Their Destruction on the Farm and a Few Methods which Can Be Employed-By David E. Lantz.

pest known to man. Its depredations throughout the world result in losses amounting to hundreds of millions of dollars annually. But these losses, great as they are, are of less importance than the fact that rats carry from house to house and from seaport to seaport diseases of all sorts.

Few attempts have been made to collect statistics of damage done by rats in America, but it is known to be very great. Farmers suffer enormous losses, both before and after their crops are harvested, from these pests. Among methods for driving away rats that have proved useful under some circumstances are the follow-

Freshly slaked lime placed dry in all burrows and runs of rats. 2. Freshly made thin whitewash poured into the rat burrows.

3. A strong solution of copperas (ferrous sulphate) sprinkled in runs and burrow entrances 4. Chlorid of lime, loose or in old rags, placed in burrows and runs. 5. Gas tar daubed about the burrow

6. Powdered red pepper scattered in rat runs and burrows Gas tar daubed about the

8. Caustic potash placed in the burrows and runs.

The best bait to use in trapping is usually food of a kind that the rats do not get in the vicinity. As far as possible, food other than the bait should be inaccessible while trapping is in progress. 
