The River Du Loup Railway.
To-day the first rod of the River du Loup Railway is turned, and henceforward, no doubt the works will be pushed vigorously forward. The promoters of the road are among our ablest and wealthiest business men and most successful railway contractors; the aid extended to the enterprise by the Legislature is most liberal; the country through which it will pass is exceedingly fertile; and the movement altogether is in the interests of trade and the development of the country. While it is feared by some that contractors and the Company may individually profit largely, and is held by others that the Company has been meddling rather freely in political affairs; and while there is a wholesome dread of the overshadowing influence of large Railway Corporations on the Legislature of the Province, it is still difficult to point out a mode of undertaking such great public works without being obliged to run risks such as those alluded to. It is, we believe, the desire of the principal members of the Company to keep clear of all political entanglements, and although their counsel did not seem to prevail with others of the Company, it is to be hoped that in the future there will be no cause for complaint. The Company can not afford to incur political enemies. It is not only the moral as well as financial aid that is procurable; it must succeed far better with public sympathy entirely in its favor than with a portion of the public in opposition. That it will keep clear of political complications in the future we have every reason to believe. All its energies will be directed to the work in hand;—the construction of the road, the filling up of the mill race and a half acre of land with settlements, and the subsequent running and management of the great Highway. Along its route there is a magnificent country to be opened up, a splendid trade to be developed. If the Company set themselves to their work in a patriotic spirit; if, while seeking fair returns for their outlay and the risk incurred, they also keep steadily in view the higher interests of the country, they will probably find that the two classes of interests are not opposed,—that, on the contrary, they are intimately connected, and can be profitably worked out together.

Concerning the Distribution of the Savings Bank Profits.
The following, on this subject, should be read with interest.—
The fact that our city has suddenly received the very nice little sum of forty thousand dollars, to be appropriated for public purposes, does not seem to excite our citizens in the slightest degree; and one might readily imagine that the large amount of stock, which has been exhibited on this occasion, had hitherto favored us over much, and that had been the frequent recipients of Fortune's largesses. Now, it is very true that forty thousand dollars, regarded as a sum of money, is not so enormously large as to cause us, and that, even in our moderate circumstances, we can conceive it possible for a private individual to amass as large a fortune in perhaps a fraction of his business life time; but, when we consider what a prodigious amount of scrambling would be caused if such an amount were annexed upon us, and how hard would be the task of officers in the event of an effort being made to raise as large a sum by private subscription, we do think that public interest should be awakened in our present good fortune. Were an individual learns unexpectedly that he has been remembered in the will of some wealthy departed one, and that a respectable legacy only awaits his asking, the first question that suggests itself to his mind is "What will he do with it?" And we should imagine that the desirability of solving the same problem would, in an analogous case, occur to a community. It would appear, however, that the old rule, "What is everybody's business is nobody's business," is so well determined that not even the requisite caution can be found to prove its truth, and, while small sections are entirely awake to their own interests, the united public will not move a hand or foot in the accomplishment of a possible good by which itself will be effected. Only contrast the lively excitement which our young friends in the dry goods business created, when they originated, supported and carried the early closing movement, with the apathy which exists among us as to the appropriation of this forty thousand dollars; in the one case the columns of the papers were filled with earnest appeals, in the other scarcely an individual takes the trouble to express an opinion. It may perhaps have a little fine, trouble and paper to individual genius, to leave matters of this kind to accident and the Press, but chance is not always a good director and the Press would far rather act as the mouth piece than the autocratic ruler of public opinion. If, however, the public will not come to the rescue, the Press must take the matter in hand at once, and then, although opinions will be restricted in number, the chances are that they will be really of value.

MATTERS IN GENERAL.

Grand Buffalo Hunt at Niagara Falls.
THE LATEST ATTEMPT AT "RAISING THE WIND."
[NIGARA FALLS MIRROR, April 29th, 1872.]
In answer to the thousands of enquiries respecting the Buffalo Hunt announced to take place at Niagara Falls on the 24th of May, I beg leave respectfully to inform the public that the Hunt will certainly come off at the place mentioned, and at the time suggested, in such case that the money should be expended in a bronze statue of the leader of Her Majesty's loyal opposition to be placed on King's Square; and, as a matter of course, an amendment to this would be offered, in the shape of a proposition to adopt the first part of the idea, but for the leader to substitute the patron saint of the Bay Verte Canal; while our other brothers would doubtless respectively support the chains of Amnaxation, and the divinity of Sectarian Schools, wherever that may be, to the occupancy of the pedestal. In such a state of affairs there would be nothing left for us but to insist upon the formation of a group of all these things, and then our citizens would be able to gaze upon a work of art indeed. We summon to our mind's eye the lovely spectacle of Bay Verte with his symbolical spade and dipper, clasping Sectarian Sectarians, the two supported on either side by Amnaxia and the honey lipped orator, with a charming group of new boys in kazoos referring to the base.

We do not really think, however, that the public should exhibit some little interest in this appropriation, and, while we condescend to having formed some ideas upon the subject, we would rather withhold them until we learn those of our fellow citizens, and the Press, as usual, will willingly lend the use of its columns to persons who can offer suggestions in this regard. There are, it is true, three principal propositions before the public; but the one that the money should be expended in the purchase of a piece of ground for a park; the second that it should be spent in the establishment of a public library; and the third, that it should be used for the formation of a gallery of art; but while these three ideas possess strong recommendations, we do not think that any one of them should be adopted without a discussion of the details of all.

We trust that under the circumstances our citizens will under the desirability of giving this matter careful and immediate attention.

P. E. Island Matters.
The Island Papers received yesterday bring Charlotte news to the 24th inst. The Legislature has hastily passed a Revenue Bill, as the Act enabling the Government to collect a Revenue expired May 1. The duties on flour, cornmeal, rice, molasses, and fire bricks are repealed, and the duty on imported and home manufactured spirits increased.

The sense of the Legislature was largely in favor of extending the railway to Saurin and other points mentioned in the Queen's letter, and the late Government most bitterly for building a railway at all, had decided to carry the works on even more rigorously than their opponents proposed to do.

There is a good deal of debate over the land donations paid by the late Government. *The Herald*, which has a special hatred of Mr. J. S. Carvell, says—
Hon. members had objected to the running of the line across the principal wharves; but, in his opinion, it was a wise policy. If not done now, the time was not far distant when it should. In the meantime, the price of lands would have run up, and the right of way far more difficult to purchase. In building a Railway, a Government should consider the general good of the country, and, in his opinion, nothing could be of so much advantage to the farmers as the running of the line across the wharves. See what a convenience it would be to the farmers! They could send more than the twenty six acres that would be the case were the station, as in other places, outside of town.

The whole amount disbursed by the Government for land donations appears to have been about \$35,000, including lands for stations, etc.—not a very large sum when it is remembered that the railway passes through the most valuable parts of the Island. It had been estimated that the total amount required to be expended in this way would not exceed £10,000.

Report of the Grand Trunk Railroad.
In the Grand Trunk Report for the half year ending on December 31st, 1871, there are many indications of improvement in the condition of this important enterprise. The gross receipts for the half year were \$293,241, against \$270,749 in the corresponding half year of 1870. The working expenses for the same time were \$172,133, against \$161,284 in the corresponding half year of 1870. The charges for renewals were, however, increased from \$136,101 to \$154,157, and we know the condition of the road and the rolling stock.

Cheating a Legislature.
Our readers will remember the forgery that was exposed in the New Brunswick Legislature during its late Session in the case of a Bill passed by the Session of Victoria County granting aid, on certain conditions, to the River du Loup Railway Company,—a fraud that the Company's officers had solemnly repudiated. Something similar has occurred in the New Jersey Legislature.

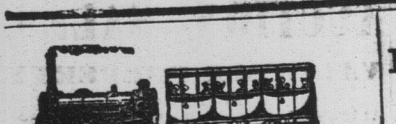
