





As your delegates we beg leave to report as follows in regard to railway

We proceeded to Montreal, and there had an interview with Messrs. Kingsland, Weldon and Tiffin of the Canadian National Railway System, with a view of having restored the fast train service recently taken away and diverted to the main line. We were received courteously and the subject was gone into quite fully. We were told that the reason for the change was the falling off in business and a desire to economize. We questioned the wisdom of the change and presented arguments against it. Finally we were assured that the management were awaiting the report of man whom they had sent specially to investigate this matter, and if the report were favorable we could hope for a restoration of the service.

We then proceeded to Ottawa and had an interview with Mr. Hanna who gave us a most attentive hearing and informed us that the subject was being given his most serious consideration; and later on in the day Mr. Pius Michaud, the federal member for this constituency informed us that in his opinion the service would likely be restored at once, and on our returning again to Montreal, we were informed that the "report" was likely

to be favorable. In Regard to the Federal Building Through the efforts of Mr. Pius Michaud we were able to have interviews with the honorable, the Minister of Public Works in the morning after our arrival in Ottawa, and with the Honorable the Minister of Finance and the Secretary of State in the afternoon of the same day. The Hon. Mr. King, Minister of Public Works, after hearing our case, admitted that this town was in need of a federal building for Post Office and Customs House purposes, and promised his best efforts in that behalf, but intimated that it would not be an easy matter to obtain a grant this session. The Hon. Mr. Fielding, Minister of Finance, gave us a very attentive hearing, and finally admitted that our case was unanswerable, but on account of a rule which the government had laid down for this year, providing against the expenditure of moneys for public building this year, he could not promise any aid at this time, but that at our earnest request, he would bring the subject up again in Council when the supplemental estimates were being considered. Hon. A. B. Copp, Secretary of State, who was also present with Mr. Fielding

assured us of his sympathy and sup port. We also saw some of the pri vate members of the House; namely Messrs. Baxter, Hanson and Dr. Mur ray McLaren, all of whom stated that they were familar with our needs and expressed their intention to speak or the subject in the House when the proper opportunity presented itself in the consideration of the main estimates. Other work done to strengthen our case, about which is it un-nesessary to go into details, and be-Fore leaving we had the assurance of dairy, fruit and general farms for sale our representative, Mr. Michaud, that on easy terms. he would leave no stone unturned to

obtain a grant this season. In concluding we may say that in our interview with Messrs Kingsland et at, we were informed that the Campbellton trains would run to and from Edmundston.
