

As a farmer, I listened to the speech of Sir John A. Macdonald at St. Marys on Saturday last with disgust and disappointment. With equal feelings I read his speeches, and that of Sir Charles Tupper at Toronto and other places. I am amazed at the audacity of these men in flaunting the National Policy in the face of farmers, and declaring that they are prospering under it as no farmers in the world are prospering. And am more deeply amazed at the gullibility of some of our farmers, who must know and feel that in almost every department of their business they are curtailed, cramped and crippled by this same National Policy. Some of them cheered to the echo sentiments which are robbing them of the profits and emoluments of the farm. I ask, by what magic wand is it possible that reading, intelligent farmers will still support a policy which they have found in ten years' sad experience to have worked disastrously to their best interests. "Is it party?"

Then it is time to call a halt. Surely it becometh those engaged in farming in this country—a calling which is at the foundation of all prosperity in this land—to stop and think whether they are not riding their political horse to their own destruction. 
Grand Liberal Victory in Hamilton.

Hamilton, Feb. 25.—Hamilton never saw such a lively Local election as that fought yesterday between the forces of Gibson and Stinson. Everything went with a rush from the last stroke of the hour of 9 o'clock. Both parties were undoubtedly well organized, and in each division the work went on almost like clock work. The country friends of the Reformers and Conservatives brought in hundreds of rigs, from the handsome phaston to the mud-splashed democrat wagon, and in these the larger portion of the veters were taken to the polls. So much energy was shown that it was estimated that by 11 o'clock in many divisions fully two-thirds of the voters had east their votes. About 11 o'clock rain began to fall, and it kept coming down all day. The rain, however, did not dampen the ador of the Reformers, and they continued to work like beavers until every vote was polled. The Liberal central committee rooms, on King street east, were crowded by the enthusiasts all day long, and they extended out upon the sidewalk. The best of order prevailed; in fact, all were too busy harvesting votes to dispute with anyone.

At 4 o'clock the voting was practically over. It was pretty well understood by that time that Mr. Gibson had received a majority of the votes—it was vaguely surmised from 75 to 200. Not one of the Reformers was prepared to hear of the magnificent majority that was rolled up as the returns came in from the various subdivisions. At the Conservative committee rooms on King street 100 or so of the Stinson men stood cut in the rain anxiously walting for an opportunity to cheer when a majority was announced. They had very few opportunities to give vent to their rejoicing, for out of 51 divisions the Conservative secured a majority in thirteen only.

I have been asked by friends to give the public the exact duty on sugars and syrup from England and the United States. I beg to say that on June 10, 1890, my firm mported an invoice of yellow sugar, cost

Had he been better posted in the market he could have given us further information. In the Price Current of the same date granulated is quoted for April delivery at 4½ cents per pound, and yellow at 3½ cents 4½ cents per pound, and yeilow at ½ cents to 3g cents for April delivery. The reason for this is that on that date the duty on raw sugar entering the United States will be taken off. The United States had some reason for having a high protective duty on sugar in order to protect the sugar growing State of Louisiana, while here in Canada the duty is imposed only to enrich a few individuals connected with two or three refineries. The duty on syrup coming from the United States is also 100 per cent. We bought a good sugar syrup on June 18, 1890, at 184 cents per gallon; the duty we paid on same was as follows: One cent per pound on eleven pound wine gallon, 11 cents; 30 per cent. on the long price, which is equal to 23½ cents per gallon actually paid on this invoice, and this is not called high grade syrup either.
