London, April 24.—The Queen was very much pleased with her stay in Florence, and her health and spirits have both been much benefited.

British Parliament.

LONDON, April 24.—The House of Commons resumed consideration of the budget this evening, and approved the Govern- gration. ment's proposition to reorganize the death duties by consolidating the probate account, estate, legacy and succession duties into one class, to be called the estate duty.

Panic in a Parisian Church. Paris, April 24.-The congregation of the Church of Notre Dame were panicstricken last night by the firing of four shots from a revolver during the services. The man who did the shooting arose from his seat and began firing without a word of warning, and men, women and children ran shricking to the doors. Nobody was wounded by bullets, but several children were burt by being trampled upon. The man was arrested.

Army Inefficiency.

LONDON, April 24 .- Capt. Norton has done well to call the attention of Parliament to maladministration in the army service, and something will have to be done to amend the present system, which is undermining efficiency and proving most injurious to the service in every way. It has long been a source of complaint among army doctors that the director-general was more or less a figurehead, and that all matters relating to their personal comfort and the distribution stations were left in the hands of civilian officials. The evil has been intensified under the regime of the present director-general.

Marine Disasters.

QUEENSTOWN, April 24.-The Norwegian bark Saga, Capt. Rasmussin, has drifted ashore at Castle Townsend. She will probably be a total wreck. Her crew have landed.

London, April 24.-The British steamer King Alfred, from Ferdinandina, before reported ashore at Uist, has gone further on the rocks. Her bottom is crushed to within a yard of her "tweendeck."

A large vessel, bottom up, is reported as being sighted April 19. London's Latest Police Sensation.

London, April 23.—The arraignment of the Anarchists Francis Polti and Emile Carnot (otherwise Guiseppe Ferrari) in the Bow street police court to-day was attended with a great deal of excitement. The police had been informed that an attempt would be made to kill Poli while he was en route causing the death of Hugo Ralph, 17 years taken. The proceedings in court included the readings of letters and documents in Polti's handwriting, disclosing his intention to cause a dynamite explosion on May 16. These documents showed that Politi had expected to meet his death on that occasion, and letters of farewell, which he had addressed to his parents and others, bore the date of May 16. Both prisoners were remanded.

Whacking at the Lords.

London, April 25.—Henry Labouchere Commons a bill providing that if a measure is passed by the House of Commons and sent to the House of Lords and is not returned to the former body within two months from the time it was passed by the House of Commons, then it shall become a law, the same as though the House of Lords had acted upon it. The bill also provides that the House of Commons shall have it in its power to finally decree whether amendments made to bills by the House of Lords shall be accepted.

LONDON, April 25. - To speculations about Rosebery's Ludas winning the Derby is now being added a great deal of gossip about the Premier's marriage intentions. PROTECTION " AGAINST CANADIANS

De Barry, of Buffalo, Invested With Still Further Powers.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 24.—Inspector of Immigration De Barry received from the department this morning a circular addressed to the immigration officers along the frontier of Mexico, the Dominion of Northern Railway Strikers' Committee in future all immigrants from those countries are to be treated the same as immigrants from Europe, and subjected to the same rigid examination.

Under this ruling every Canadian who comes into the United States to work in future will be detained for examination every time he attempts to enter the country. Conductors of trains and captains of vessels will have to furnish the same manifests of passengers as are now furnished by the ocean liners, and these manifests must be sworn to before a United States customs efficer or an inspector of immi-

Inspector of Immigration De Barry today notified the captains of boats plying between here and Canada of the requirements of the department, and also served notices on the railroad companies.

Mr. De Barry said that the new regulations would put a stop to Canadians slipping in without the knowledge of the immigration officers, and would have a good effect of putting all immigrants under oath as to their being qualified to enter the United States before permitting them to land. It would prevent people living in Canada from working in the United States, as every time they entered the country they could be detained for examination.

CHICAGO, April 24 -The 4,000 employes of the Pullman Palace Car Company at Pullman will probably strike on May 1. Reduction in wages is assigned.

Connellsville, Pa., April 24 - The men at a dezen or more coke plants laid down their tools this morning, causing a complete shut-down, while at two-thirds of the remaining plants part of the men came out, and the remainder will join them in a day

BRAZIL, Ind., April 24.—The refusal of the bituminous coal miners to join the big strike caused a clash to-day between them and the block miners, who have joined the strike. Many were injured. Columbus, Ohio, April 24.—Secretary P.

A. McBride reports the miners of Northern Illinois as firm in favor of the strike. He puts the number of miners out on strike today at 135,000.

Uniontown, Pa., April 24.—The first break in the ranks of the operators came tonight when the Atlas Coke Company signed the scale as demanded by the strikers. One hundred and fifty men will go to work to-morrow morning.

HOW ENGLAND VIEWED CORBETT Not as a Fighter, But as an Actor-Not

Very Favorable to Him. New York, April 24 .- The Sun says: The solemnity with which Corbett was viewed in England when he appeared there created a smile in this city. The heavy critical reporters of London were present in the stalls, and many of the most crudite and profound writers in Great Britain on theatrical subjects sat in solemn judgment upon Mr. Corbett's efforts. In this country he has always been regarded as a prize-fighter who chooses to show himself for money under the guise of an actor, but nebody ever attempted to criticise his actions seriously. and andiences confined their enthusiasm to his exhibition of sparring and training in the latter part of the play. It was supposed by Americans interested in Corbett's theatrical tour that the sporting papers of Great Britain would show some keenness over the appearance of the prize fighter when stripped for the ring and over his general style and form of fighting, but no such flippant and light-hearted way of viewing the matter was taken by the London critics. His technique and his art came in for a liberal piece of profound discussion, and hardly any mention was made of the pugilistic part of his performance. It must; have been rather startling to Corbett, particularly as the weight of the heavy critical comment was

not in his favor. AFTER A LONG CHASE. The Alleged Murderer of an Old Lady

Captured-Damaging Testimony of an Accomplice. GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., April 24 .- Last February Mrs. McKendrick, an aged woman, was found dead in her home, gagged and bound, and several hundred to a blight in the hay. dollars missing. After a long chase by detectives Charles Macard, a Grand Rapids man, was run down in San Francisco charged with the murder. The evidence against him at the police court hearing was strong, but entirely circumstantial; but yesterday the police paralyzed the defense by bringing Henry Prame, a Chicago dockwalloper, who confessed he was one of the murderers, and implicated Macard as the

other. Prame was captured in Libertyville, Ill., where he was working as a farm hand. He pleaded guilty in the Superior Court last night, but sentence was deferred. He will appear against Macard. Prame had led a straight life until he met Macard while working on the World's Fair docks, and Macard, as he confesses, induced him to come here and do the job. He declared he had no intention of killing the woman. Prame is 34 years old and single.

Macard is a man of iron nerve. When told in his cell of Prame's arrest and confession not a nerve quivered, and he said calmly: "The man is a liar; I have never even heard of the name of Prame before, and I know absolutely nothing of the murderer. When he connects me with the case he lies, and I shall fight to the last."

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

-Our oil men will be interested in the annual report of the United States geological survey upon the production of petroleum, just issued. The chief features are the decline in the production of petroleum in the older fields and increase in the newer fields. Other features are the decline in stocks held at the wells, increase in price of the raw material over the previous year, increase in exports and successes attained in the refining of limestone oils. The total production for the year was 48,412,666 barrels, valued at \$28,932,326, against 50,-509,136 barrels, valued at \$25,901,436, in 1892. The year 1891 marked the highest output of petroleum, the production being 54,291,980 barrels.

-Ottawa, like London, is arranging for the future lighting of its public streets. The corporation of the capital has just received an offer to enter into a contract for ien years for \$76 50 per arc lamp, and to the privilege of doing business. This proposition, if accepted, will save about \$2,400 upon the annual cost of lighting the city's streets, compared with the terms of the present contract, on the basis of the number of lights now maintained. At present the price paid is \$80 per lamp. The disposition in London, in view of the vote in favor of municipal ownership, is not to enter into a contract for a long term of years, but there seems to be no doubt that petter terms than now enjoyed will be made under a new contract.

-Municipalities with water power easily available have distinct advantages in the matter of electricity. A striking example of this fact is chronicled by the United States consul at St. Etienne, France. He says that a company operating American electric machines under American patents has established a good horse-power plant at a waterfall eight miles from St. Etienne, and is transmitting the power from the dynamos that distance over cables, driving over 60 looms and with a large increase projected. In large factories there the power is also being distributed to the looms from the steam engines by means of interposed dynamos and motors, doing away with belting and shafting and securing certain other important economics. We are but at the beginning of the new era of motor power.

THE QUADRENNIAL DISPOSAL OF THE SEPARATE SCHOOL

QUESTION.

In response to public opinion, and with what promises to be the friendly cooperation of those immediately concerned, the Ontario Legislature yesterday afternoon indersed Mr. Conmee's bill to enable separate school supporters to elect their trustees by ballot when so ever a majority of them so desire. This places the election of separate school trustees on a level with the public schools in this matter, though it has to be confessed that until recently there was little demand for changing the law. The Liberals, supported by Mr. McNaughton, the Patron member for North Bruce, voted for the measure, which was indorsed by a majority of 22. The details are left to be arranged by a select committee of the

The fate of the bill introduced by Mr. McCallum, P. P. A. member for East Lambton, was sealed with an even more decisive majority, though Mr. Meredith and all the members of the Opposition voted for it, except Sol White, of Essex. Mr. Mc-Naughton again stood by the Liberals, and the measure was thrown out by a majority of 25. The intention of the bill was to compel the election of both public and separate school trustees by ballot, and there were other provisions in the measure plainly at variance with the Confederation Act, interference with which, it is needless to say, can not be undertaken by the Legis-

The course pursued by the majority of the legislators is the correct one. No good can come of the attempt to force the ballot-in many cases at considerable expense, and in districts where the people are poor-whether the electors desire it or not. Local option in this matter will best promote that peace and concord which but firebrand politicians must acknowledge is necessary to the welfare of the populace, whether they are supporters of the public or of the separate

A great deal of hay was pressed and imported during the fall and winter, and large quantities of wheat were fed to live stock, more especially to swine.

Fat cattle are hardly as plentiful as usual, and buyers appear to be shy in most quarters, as several correspondents state that fewer beeves than usual have been sold for May shipment.

Store cattle are plentiful with some and scarce with their neighbors-in fact, the cattle industry appears to be in a most unsettled condition, except in the case of fresh cows, which are in better demand than ever for the dairy.

Pells yesterday received a carrier pigeon which was flown from an ocean steamship, evidently just outside Sandy Hook, by Mr. Jethro Worden, of the Grand Opera House Hotel, this city. 



Contention that Witnesses Before Committees Must Be Sworn

Finally Acquiesced In by Sir John Thompson.

Proposal to Reduce the Governor-General's Salary One-Half.

Thursday to be Taken for Government Business in Parliament.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) OTTAWA, April 24 .- The going into committee on the tariff resolutions was delayed to-day by a motion respecting the obstacles the Government are throwing in the way of the investigation of public accounts. Among the preliminary business was the

Dr. Sproule introduced a bill to compel detective corporations and mercantile agencies to become incorporated. The names of the incorporators must be filed with the Secretary of State together with \$10,000 security. The bill makes various provisions respecting mercantile agencies, one being that they shall not act as collecting agen-

cies. The bill was read the first time. Mr. Mulock introduced a bill to fix the salary of the Governor-General, Mr. Mulock dwelt upon what he termed the excessive cost of the office, which has been \$114,000 a year since confederation. The bill provides for a reduction of the Governor-General's salary by one half, or a reduction to \$25,000, to take effect on the expiration of the present incumbent's term of office. The bill was read the first time without further discussion.

Mr. Laurier protested against a motion made by Sir John Thompson to take Thurs-days for Government business, pointing out that it would block consideration of several important public bills.

Sir John Thompson consented to exempt this week from the operation of the motion and Mr. Laurier thereupon agreed

On the motion to go into committee of ways and means, Sir Richard Cartwright brought up the action of the public accounts committee in refusing to allow Mr. McMullen to examine witnesses under oath respecting the Bering Sea expenditure. Sir Richard Cartwright, alluding to the fact that investigation was refused this morning by a majority, made up of members of the Cabinet, condemned the practice of a large number of Ministers having seats on that committee. Conmee's Separate School Bill Again Discussed,

And Secures a Majority of 22 on a Division.

Mr. Fraser Speaks and Votes in Favor of the Measure-Mr. McNaughton's Name Among the Yeas.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.]

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, TORONTO, April 24.—The debate on Mr. Conmee's Separate Schools Bill was continued to-day. The House held its first morning session. Mr. Fraser attempted to proceed with his argument, so prematurely stopped yesterday, but had not gone far before he was again forced to take his seat. He was followed by Mr. Clancy and Mr. White. AFTERNOON SESSION.

Mr. White, resuming his speech, accused the Commissioner of Public Works of being recreant to his duty regarding separate schools. He maintained that the bill was only a half way measure, and said he had no objection to a compulsory ballot.

Mr. Balfour said he knew the minority in the constituencies of Mr. White and Mr. Clancy would not accept them as the true exponents of Roman Catholic opinion on this question. He pointed out that Mr. White would not have secured a seat in the House last election had he not disavowed the school policy of his leader and run as an independent candidate upon that question. Mr. Balfour then referred to the intolerance which Mr. Meredith had always shown. The latest evidence of this was seen in the class of men who surrounded him at his nomination a few weeks since-Mr. Essery and Mr. Coo-men ever ready to raise cries of bigotry, and to misrepresent all that Catholics held most dear. The Government did not court the enmity of anybody, but it was not going to ally itself with such an organization as that to which the persons mentioned belonged. He challenged any member of the Opposition to denounce the teachings of the P. P. A. on the floor of the House. (Cheers.) Protestants were strong enough to do justice to the Catholics in this Province, and that was the reason he intended to favor the bill.

Mr. Clarke (Toronto) said-speaking solely for him he would like to see the separate schools abolished. He would not like to see this done, however, without the consent of the laity of the Catholic Church. He thought a curriculum should be formed which would meet with the approval of both Catholics and Protestants, so that all children could be educated at public and national schools.

Mr. Meredith said while Mr. Conmee was ransacking history yesterday to show the unflinching loyalty of Catholics to their sovereign his (Mr. Conmee's) mind was at a Donnybrook fair calling upon the Opposition to tread on the tail of his coat. (Applause.) When members of the Govestants should unite as against a common sire for office. If he had wanted office he would have secured it long ago. But there was no office in Canada tempting enough to make him swerve from what he owed his conscience. Mr. Meredith concluded by maintaining that there was nothing more calculated to divest the coming generation of the bitterness which has characterized past years than that all the children of the Province should sit together in the same schools.


Sir Oliver Mowat, referring to Mr. Meredith's boast that he could have had office long ago, said that he did not know what the honorable gentleman could do that he had not already tried in order to gain power and place. He had adopted every policy and principle in sight; changed so often, in fact, that even his own supperters did not know where he was. Sir Oliver expressed his approval of the ballot system-he thought it should be adoptedbut he was not going to be a party to forcing it upon Catholics. Catholics were the best judges of what they wanted, and Catholics, he knew, were largely against the

Mr. Fraser spoke for a few minutes. He said that if he had any doubts at first of the stand he should take, those doubts, after hearing Messrs. White, Clancy and Meredith, had been entirely dissipated. According to the position they took, he understood the Catholics were to have no option in the matter, but were to be deprived of the rights and privileges with which they were now constitutionally clothed. He did not propose to indorse that position-he did not propose to help the agitation of the Opposition by giving his vote against the bill. He perferred to retain a final discussion until some future time, until he saw what amendments were made. He would vote for the second reading. In conclusion Mr. Fraser said that upon constitutional grounds he believed the House had no right to er force upon Roman Catholics the compulse ballot in separate school trustee elections.

The vote resulted in 52 year and 30 nays -a majority of 22 for the bill. Messrs. last night.

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W. O. SCHOOL OF ART.

A Successful Year in the Institution's history-Public Interest Wanted -A Free Exhibition of Work to be Held.

The annual meeting of the Western Ontario School of Art was held in the school room, Mechanics' Institute yesterday afternoon. President F. E. Leonard occupied the chair, and there were present Mr. J. H. Griffith (secretary-treasurer), Mrs. Macbeth, Mr. Fred Henry and Mr. James Griffith, R.C.A.

Mr. Griffith presented the annual report for the year ending April 29, 1894. It was pleasing, he said, to have to report con-tinued success to the school. The number of pupils attending the various classes was 187 during the year. The curriculum of studies as required by the Educa-tional Department had been strictly earried out. Thirty-one certificates were awarded to pupils at the examination in May last. There was an evident increased desire on the part of pupils to perfect themselves in industrial and ornamental designing. Several were now completing original designs for wall papers, work in china painting, etc. The expenditure amounted to \$587 36; the receipts, \$598 58; balance in bank, \$11 20.

In the discussion of the report it was decided to add the fact that the World's Fair exhibit from the school had not been shown as a whole, but the different articles were scattered with the exhibits of other schools. The names of the exhibitors will also be added to the report, with the fact that the World's Fair pictures were not

properly hung. President Leonard stated that in comparison with other years the financial part of the institution had been successful, as they had a slightly larger balance on hand. According to a decision of the directors some years ago he had made a distribution of \$55 to the two teachers in proportion to the number of lessons given by each, which is satisfactory to them. He regretted that Mr. Munnock's class did not increase in attendance, and as he was paid by fee the remuneration amounted to little or nothing for the many evenings he devoted. Mr. Leonard thought a special effort should be made to induce scholars to attend his classes, as skilled mechanics and draftsmen in the city of London were badly needed. The school had had a fair ottendance during the year, and he did not think that it had retrograded any in efficiency. Still a change of a radical nature was necessary to interest the pupils, and the president recommended the striking of a committee to solicit money for prizes for the incoming year, to distribute to the scholars according to their abilities, as shown at the examinations. During the year he had communicated with the Minister of Education re the presentation to successful students of the school at the Columbian Exposition with extra diplomas, but from the tone of the letter received there did not appear to be much chance of getting them. During the year Auditor J. S. Dewar resigned, and the books had been audited and signed
