# RUSSIA FORCES WAY INTO HUNGARY THROUGH TWO PASSES

Capture Important Station In the Mountains, Taking Huge

Stock of War Munitions—Another Success Is Claimed In Bukowina.

LONDON, April 5 .- 10:50 p.m. - Public attention today is almost entirely directed toward the great struggle for the Carpathian passes, where the Russians apparently are making very steady progress despite the obstinate resistance offered by the Austrian and German troops. The Russians are on the Hungarian side Genoa is Aroused By Subof both the Dukla and Lupkow passes, and with the aid of continual reinforcements are gaining the heights which dominate Uzsok Pass. Even the Austrian official report admits that fighting is now taking place in the Laboreza Valley which is south of Lupkow Pass, while the Russians tonight announce the capture of Cisna, an important station on the high mountains between Lupkow and Uzsok passes, where they captured a great stock of war munitions and provisions.

The Russians also are advancing from Dukla Pass on Bartfeldt, which is at the head of the line of railway running south in uary 22 with a cargo of coal for Genoa. Hungary, and fighting not far from Mezolaborez, another important railroad head.



S OME years ago a new type of telephone transmitter was brought out by the Bell Company, Until that time the people of London had the old-Istyle Blake transmitter. Evidently the company replaced the Blake instrunent in order to perfect its service, and to bring about more economical management. But, on the strength of this "modern" improvement, for some years it has been collecting an extra annual sum of \$5 from each subscriber for the new transmitter. If a subscriber cared to keep the old instrument he did not have to pay the extra charge, but if a new transmitter were placed in his home he paid the extra charge, and although the cost of the new equipment on good authority is said to be less than the annual charge, the subscriber is taxed with the extra \$5 each year. Nearly 400 saloons, it is estimated, will be closed should the anti-saloon forces win. In addition to the saloons many beer peddlers' licenses in villages may be affected by the vote.

The anti-saloon forces are pinning their hopes on the woman's vote, while in many localities the businessmen are being rallied to the license ticket on the argument that to force out the saloons would drive valuable trade to other



## TELLS CLERGYMEN TO FORGET PEACE

Former Diplomat Holds That War Is Not Horrible Or Indefensible.

"MOST RATIONAL THING'

Philip Marshall Brown Thinks Pulpit Has Not Right To Interfere.

[Canadian Press.]

NEW YORK, April 5.-War was defended and the clergy were criticized for their world peace propaganda, by Philip Marshall Brown, professor of international law at Princeton University and former minister to Honduras, before the annual meeting here today of the Alumni Association of Auburn Theological Seminary, at Auburn, N.Y. The speaker held that war was not horrible and indefensible, but "the most rational thing that can happen at

Professor Brown declared that by denouncing the war the clergymen are in danger of being "thrown off the track." Continuing, he said:

"War is not brought on by the evil in men's hearts. Will Italy go into this war, if she does go into it, from evil passions? Certainly not. She will go into it after careful consideration and to accomplish certain definite ends. It is not from malice that men in war at one another, but for a national idea. It is a sin to call war a horror. Men go into war actuated by a wonderful spirit of self-sacrifice."

Mistake of Clergy.

The speaker declared that the clergy GET LAST OF EIGHT IN had made a mistake in dwelling too much on the propaganda of world peace and that affairs of state should be left in the hands of statesmen.

'Any sentimental ideal propaganda for peace results in a derision that hurts the whole movement of Christianity," he continued. "Christianity is in the hearts of individual men, and you should not try to run the universe Pacific Railway passenger and telewhen immediate cases are crying for solution. We have had labor warfare at home in West Virginia and Colorado. What have you done to keep peace here? What are you doing to keep peace in New York? Would we intrust that task to preachers?




