MOTOR ACCIDENT A MYTH

London Tragedy Turned Into Laugh on Financiers Who Furnished

London, Jan. 12. - Mme. Humbert's ecord has been rivalled by a young woman who for some time past has been living at the rate of \$30,000 or \$40,000 a year, speculating to the tune of thousands of pounds on the stock exchange, purchasing expensive motor cars, valuable diamond tlaras and other jewelry, hiring country houses in England, Scotland and Wales-all on the strength of her versuasive manner and the non-existent will under which she was to inherit the sum of \$2,500,000 from the late Gen. Gordon, of whom she was no relative, and whose total

estate amounted to about \$11,000. Violet Charlesworth is the girl's name. She is 25 years of age this month. Her astounding story is complicated by her mysterious disappearance, and what now appears to have been a deliberate attempt to cover up her tracks by a simulated motoring

In fact, for the first two or three days last week England was kept ringing with a tragical motor accident, in which the young woman last her life by being hurled out of the car she was driving over a cliff on the coast of North Wales; it was only during the latter half of the week that the affair developed into what is one of the most remarkable stories of deception ever carried out by man or woman.

In every state capital a body of men, equal in number to the number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled, assemble to go through the form of voting by ballot for president in chorus." and vice-president. 

Abdul started the trouble himself by announcing in the address with which he opened the national assembly that certain of his advisers persuaded him to withdraw the constitution of three decades ago on the ground of the country's unfitness for it at the time. The lawmakers burst into a hurricane of passion almost before the words were out of his majesty's mouth. There was no open debate of the question, but among themselves the legislators had tacitly agreed while the initial session was still in progress that fuller particulars must be insisted on from the commander of the faith

Through the members of the cabinet repeated and urgent demands have since been made upon him for a detailed account of the causes which led to the misrule of so great a part of his reign.

Answers Not Given. To the parliamentary leaders who in-

sist so vigorously upon the disclosure no satisfactory answer has yet been returned from the Yildiz Kiosk. There is a suspicion, of course, that Abdul was really affected by no outside influence and simply spoke as he did to the assembly to "save his own face." Still, it is deemed possible that he may have been deliberately misguided. If this is true, it is intimated that the culprits, providing they are

The investigation is being very quietly conducted, because the Young Turks do not care to have it known that friction is occurring between the Sultan and his Government. Enough has leaked out through diplomatic channels, however, to make it clear that in the end Abdul will either have to accept personal responsibility for the people's wrongs or point out the men to blame for them.
