stances have prevented an oppor-tunity of meeting with you and the councillors of London in connection with the question of the London and Port Stanley lease, regarding which I wrote you some time ago. My time has been taken up on

the reorganization of the C., H. and D. Railway, and other important matters, leaving little or no chance to consider the question of this lease. My idea is that the cost of the

bridges over the Thames and Kettle Creek should be paid by the city of London, and my contention is justified by the terms of our present contract. With this question disposed of, we were, as per the advice of Mr. Pyeatt, willing to extend the lease for twenty years under terms and conditions set forth and considered in lease passed by council in 1901. As this proposition, informally discussed with you, did not appear satisfactory. I beg to suggest that the matter be dropped, as in the face of recent value the L. and P. S. ### EGGS STILL SOARING SOON BEYOND REACH

Supply Is Terribly Short and No Relief in Sight.

If the prophecy of those who are interested in the egg market are to be trusted, the common egg is this year likely to take on the nature of a pricetrusted, the common egg is this year likely to take on the nature of a price-less relic. While the prices of all commodities are gamboling quietly upward the prices of eggs are getting on an extra pace that will soon distance all pursuers. What are the causes? is a question that naturally presents itself. The dealers, somewhat ungaliantly blame the domestic hen and claim that she has falled in her duty. If she, in her turn, has reasons of her own, she retains a dignified silence on the matter. There can be no doubt, however, that there is a scarcity. This has been so all along, but in the past month the scarcity has become acute and a buyer can sink a small fortune in as many eggs as he could carry home in a paper bag. Dealers claim that they will yet reach 60c a dozen, and even at that the hens who are responsible for the supply refuse to exert themselves to improve conditions. The western markets are already quoting eggs at 50c to 60c. A dispatch from Hamilton places the price there at 38c to 40c.
