GREEKS ENTER ALBANIANS

TERRIFIED ALBANIANS FEARING MASSACRE BY THE GREEKS ARE FLEEING FROM THEIR HOMES

Repeated Protests Have Been Made to Peace Conference Against Greek Advances Into Territory Awarded To Allania-122,000 Albani ans Leaving Koritza District. | Government Fixes Day For

Paris, Sept. 15.—Albanian refugees arriving in Paris from Koritza and the surrounding district bring reports of the terror inspired by the advance of Creek troops into that territory, which formerly was controlled by the French, who entered the district in 1916, and gave pledge that it would be considered a part of Albania.

Repeated protests have been made to the peace conference against Greek advances into territory awarded to Albania by the London conference, but no replies have been forthcoming, and lack of information concerning the plans of the Entente, ft is asserted, is causing much uneasiness to the Albanians, who are in fear of some secret agreement as regards Albania.

Why is a hiccough like the popping of air from a cup?" was asked me in all seriousness. The annswer, of course, is that a hiccough is not like that. It is the association of ideas; of connecting a man in his cups with the other name of hiccoughs, such as "hiccups," that promoted that odd query.

It is also recalled that when you have hiccups or hiccups, the sudden expulsion or popping out, the belching forth of the stomach gases—gastritis by the way, means inflammation of the "gastrum" or stomach, and has nothing to do with gases—sounds like "git up" or "git out" or "hic cup."

Be that as it may, a hiccough is a sudden, short, convulsive sucking or "breathing" in or swallowing of air attended with the characteristic sound you know. This sound is produced by






