## TAKES HIS CUE FROM NAPOLEON

Kuropatkin Striving to Prevent Junction of Japs.

### ZASSALITCH HAS BEEN RECALLED

Relieved of His Command for Disobedience to Orders in Fight On the Yalu.

St. Petersburg, May 5. - Attempted landings are now momentarily anticipated near New Chwang and the head of the Korean Bay. Occupying an interior line and pursuing the tactics of Napoleon, Kuropatkin's problem will be to prevent a junction of the enemy's forces. It is necessary for him to await the development of the Jap-anese plans and ascertain the direction, strength and whence the other column will come, before deciding how to fight his adversary in detail. It is believed here that the Japanese plans for concerted action have been embarrassed by their failure to block the entrance to Port Arthur Tuesday. and a repetition of the attack on the Russian Gibraltar is momentarily expected. Vice-Admiral Togo's fleet was sighted off Port Arthur last night, and indeed unconfirmed rumors say he attacked at daylight this morning, and that fighting is now in progress there. At least the cutting off of Port Arthur, if not the fate of the fortress, depends in the opinion of the general staff upon Gen. Kuropatkin's preventing a junction of the Japanese forces,

It is understood that Gen. Zassalitch has already been relieved of his command for disobedience of orders, and that his action is under investigation. In connection with the obstinate stand made by the Russians at the Yalu against instructions, and in face of an overwhelming superiority of men and especially of guns, an interesting bit of history of what occurred during the maneuvers near St. Petersburg last summer is being recounted, which illustrates this in Gen. Zassalitch's character. He commanded an infantry division and insisted on storming the heights commanded by artillery and in the face of a fire which theoretically wiped out his command. The judges were so disgusted that they rewarded the blunder with a zero mark against the general's name.

Newfoundland asked for \$820,000 a year in cash and the assumption by the Dominion of services which cost Newfoundiand annually \$860,000. The island's debt was relatively large, amounting to about \$16,000,000, of which \$6,000,000 was represented by railways. The Canadian debt was about \$50 per head and the Dominion Government refused to allow Newfoundland a greater ratio. The population of the island was then 207,000 which, at \$50 per head. would make its share \$10,-350,000. This would leave about five and a half millions of debt to be borne by the people of Newfoundland, or, at 4 per cent interest, \$220,000 a year. Newfoundland proposed that Canada should assume \$8,350,000 of the debt and pay 5 per cent on \$2,000,000 more. The total cash subventions which Canada would pay would be:

He made no at-tempt to estimate the Japanese losses, merely stating that they must have been colossal. The magnitude of the Russian losses had an almost stunning effect on the authorities and aroused general grief, mitigated only by satisfaction at the bravery displayed by the Russian troops. Not for a moment was there any intention to pay such a terrible price for delaying the enemy's crossing of the Yalu. This fact was known throughout the city, and gave rise to renewed reports, attributed to official sources, that General Kuropatkin had officially censured Lieut.-Gen. Zassalitch. 
