



The United States, because of its vast undeveloped wealth and increasing population, has been able to flourish under a very high tariff. Canada, for the same reasons, can now stand a larger dose of protection than at any time in her history. The Liberal party, however, has no idea that the Canadian Manufacturers' Association is going to frame the next tariff. It looks to the Government to remember that there are consumers as well as producers in the country, and that there are many producers whom no tariff can protect. We are to have maximum and minimum tariffs, and a British preference below the minimum tariff. Admitting that Canadian manufacturers should have an advantage over their rivals our highest tariff should not be a prohibitive tariff and our lowest tariff should be a competitive one. The country is growing rich, but it cannot afford to pay any price for the protection of home industry.


