DYNAMITE IN THE CARGO

French Ship Narrowly Escapes Destruction in Mid-Ocean.

San Francisco, Aug. 4.—An attempt to blow up a ship in mid-ocean has been reported by Capt. C. Touze, of the French ship Astieres, which has arrived here from Swansea, England, loaded with coal. He left that port in January last, and six weeks later, when far out at sea, a dozen capped fuses, such as are used by miners to explode charges of dynamite, were discovered in the hold of the ship among the coal.

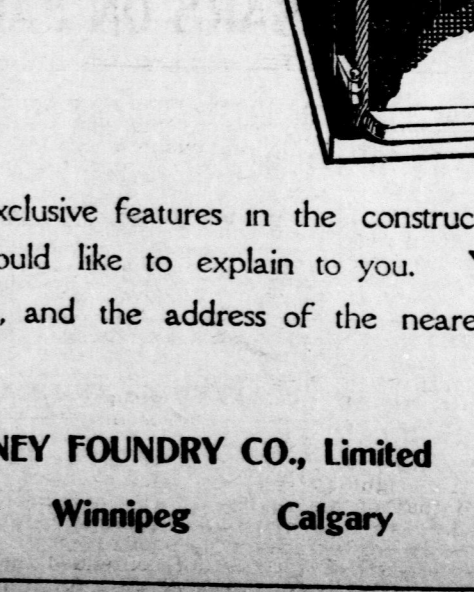

**LOCAL HOTELMEN PRECLUDED FROM SELLING CIGARS ON SABBATH**

Continued from page 1.


But because a hotelkeeper chooses to annex to his business of a hotelkeeper that of a dealer in cigars (in view of the profits which he derives from it, or of the enhanced opportunities for the sale of such a commodity as is afforded him) it does not therefore follow that the business of dealing in cigars is incidental to or forms part of the business of a hotelkeeper. An hotelkeeper or innkeeper (and both terms are synonymous in this country) has many burdens and also has many extra privileges and rights under the law, but I cannot find any thing to justify me in arriving at the conclusion that he has the right to annex another business to that of his business of hotelkeeper, and to say that because he does so he is entitled to carry on that first-mentioned business on the Sabbath Day, although others engaged in the same business are debarred from so doing.

It must not be forgotten that many others in this city are engaged solely in the business of dealing in cigars and tobacco, and it is not for a moment contended that these parties are privileged to dispose of their commodities on the Sabbath Day.

If I were to give effect to the view contended for by the defendant in this matter it would open the door to numerous violations of the Lord's Day Act. For instance, the druggist, who is by law entitled to keep his shop open on portions of the Sabbath, has also for sale in his drug shop cigars, chewing gum, candies and other articles. Is he therefore entitled to deal in and dispose of these articles? I should consider not, and yet by a parity of reasoning, if the hotelkeeper is so entitled, the druggist would undoubtedly have the same right.

It is not contended that a cigar can be regarded as a food or as an article of a necessary character, or that it can be bought under any such head.

**ELDER EVANS THROWS A LIGHT ON THE NOTED "BOOK OF MORMON"**

Shows The Advertiser Copy of the Rare Work—Does Not Indorse Polygamy.

Sealed by the hand of Moroni, and hid up into the Lord, to come forth in due time, by the way of Gentile, the interpretation thereof by the gift of God; an abridgement taken from the Book of Ether.

"Also which is a record of the people of Jared, which were scattered at the time the Lord confounded the language of the people when they were building a tower to get to heaven, which is to show unto the remnant of the house of Israel how great things the Lord has done for their fathers, and that they are not cast off forever; and also to the convincing of the Jew and Gentile that Jesus is the Christ, the Eternal God, manifesting himself unto all nations. And now, therefore, I write these things, that ye may know that ye are not cast off forever, and that ye may know that ye are not the things of God that ye may be found spottless at the judgment seat of Christ."

At the back of the book appears the following:

"Be it known unto all nations, kindreds, tongues and people unto whom this work shall come, that Joseph Smith, the author and proprietor of this work, has shown unto me leaves of which he hath spoken, which contain the appearance of gold; and as many of the seals as the said Smith has translated we did handle with our hands; and we also saw the engravings thereof, which were made by the appearance of ancient work; and this was in accordance with words of soberness which the said Smith has shown unto us, for we have seen and hefted and known of a surety that the said Smith has got the plates which we have spoken. And we give our names unto the world to witness unto the world that which we have seen, and we lie not. Joseph Smith, Jacob Whitmer, Hiram Page, Joseph Smith, sen., Hyrum Smith, and Daniel H. Smith."

Elder Evans explains that the word Mormonism is derived from the word Moroni, who was the last prophet of the tribe who were confounded at the building of the Tower of Babel, when the Lord caused them all to speak different languages because of their presumption in attempting to reach heaven. The plates referred to above were hidden by Moroni, in Ontario, that, according to the Book of Mormon, and the First Book of Commandments, the original of which Elder Evans also has seen, were hidden in a cave in Babel and lived in power and alliance until such times as their whereabouts should be revealed by the Lord.

Elder Evans pointed out to the reporter that Joseph Smith, in his translation, did not countenance polygamy, nor was polygamy even countenanced openly by the Mormons of Utah until 1876, when they had the book revealed, at the marriage ceremony was struck out.

"Mormonism today, outside of Brigham Young Mormonism," said the Elder, "does not recognize polygamy. The marriage law is as sacred to the good Mormon as to the adherent of any other church. In the plates referred to in the book, the whereabouts of which were revealed to Joseph Smith by an angel which appeared to him, there is not one word which countenances polygamy."

"What became of the plates?" the reporter inquired.

"I know it's difficult for you to believe what I am going to tell you," he said, "it's the absolute truth. They were mysteriously taken away by a messenger from the Lord. You find this hard to believe, and yet you believe in the visitation of angels when you read it in the Bible in the stories of times gone by. But ask yourself this question: If angels appeared to men a thousand years ago is it not reasonable to believe that they may appear now? Or do you regard God as a vacillating Almighty, who changes with the year? Are not the men of today as much his sons as were the men who lived a couple of thousand years ago?"

Elder Evans left today on a trip to Cleveland, Boston, Fall River, New York, Brooklyn, Philadelphia and other points.
