

SAXONY'S KING

His Majesty Passed Peacefully Away at the Castle Last Evening.

st of the Generals who Com manded German Army in 1870.

Dresden, Saxony, June 19.-King Albert died at 8.05 p, m. to-day. His Majesty passed away peacefully at the castle of Sibyllenort.

King Albert of Saxony was the last of the generals who commanded the German army of 1870. As His Majesty grew older he shared in the idealization which influenced the group of great statesmen which surrounded William I. His sober life produced few incidents, and his unobtrusive support of his own church, the Roman Catholic never caused a conflict with popular opinion. The vast majority of the inhabitants of Saxony are Protestants. Emperor William always referred to King Albert as fatherly friend.

It is understood that the Emperor will at once suspend his tour of the Rhine, and return to Berlin to take part in the funeral of the dead King. The death of King Albert will certainly limit the regatta festivities at Kiel the latter part of this month, when it was proposed to hold a series of banquets. It is now not regarded probable that Emperor William will attend the Kiel regatta.

LOOKS SURE

Strike Almost a Certainty on the Toronto Street Railway--Men Meet To-day.

Toronto, June 19 .- A strike of the street railway employees as the result of a meeting to be held to-mor-(Friday) night, to hear the report of the committee which conferred with Manager Keating, is almost a certainty.

A statement was issued to-night by ot A, E, Ames, and the Board of Trade committee of mediation, statng that the men's committee will not take the responsibility of recommending the company's offer for accept. ance, and adding that after a further conference with the railway officials this afternoon, they are assured the terms are the best that can be

This means that the issue remains with the men who are expected to vote to-morrow night by the necessary two thirds majority for a strike. Both sides are getting ready gor struggle, and the company is bringing in men from all over the country. It is said also that non-union strikebreakers are being engaged in the United States despite the provisions

of the alien labor law. The company to-night issued a statement to the public, the purpose of which is to throw the responsibility of, a strike upon the men. The company admits the usefulness and good intention of the Board of Trade, but says it has firmly but courteously declined to allow the Board to arbitrate as to the relations between the company and its employes. In conclusion, the company says that if its employees decide upon a strike, everything possible will be done to give the puban uninterrupted service.

It is said that the Winnipeg car emiployes have offered to strike also when the trouble begins in Toronto.

THE BOER ARMY.

When the Boer army was in its first phases the enemies of Great Britain delighted to sneer at Great Britain because it could not hold its own own against a handful of "embattled farmers." The Boers were said to number variously from 20,000 to 40,000 men. It turns out now that there must have been over 80,000 Boers in their army. These men not only knew the country in minute detail, but were armed with the most modern weapons. It is no wonder that such a force of hardy irregulars fought so successfully against the British forces, the bulk of them unversed in war, and encumbered with tremendously long lines of communication which they had to keep open. After all there was not so much disparity in the numbers of men actually in the field opposed to each other.

ALGOMA IS SAFE.

The evanescence of earthly please ures is illustrated by the recent experience of Acting-Premier Harcourt with the constituency of Algoma. At the general election Algoma was carried by Mr. Smyth, the Liberal-Conservative candidate. Why this accident was permitted to occur it is impossible to say. Probably the gentlemen who stuff ballot-boxes and spoil hallots were so busy elsewhere as to be unable to give the district the attention it deserves. But great joy pervaded the legislative halls on Tuesday. The Minister had discovered that Mr. Smyth, the elect of the pecple, was a postmaster, and that he was therefore disqualified to sit in the House. Before announcing this valuable find, the Government telegraphed to Ottawa to make sure. Mr. Smyth might have resigned to advance, and in that case he could hold his seat.

Had he resigned, or was he still the postmaster? Back came the message that the victim had not resigned; and, as some of the papers reported, there was at once jubilation in the Parliament Buildings from cellar to roof. 55A It was assumed either that the minority candidate could now claim the seat on the ground that the elected member was not a valid candidate, or that there could be a new election a which the machine could repair the neglect of which it had been guilty in the former contest. Pleasure and hope inspired the Ministers, until some unnamed person suggested that the law be more carefully examined. A search was thereupon made in the Revised Statutes of Ontario, with the result that another discovery, to wit, a clause setting forth that while postmasters in cities, towns and incorporated villages could not become candidates, those elsewhere were eligible to stand as such, and if elected to sit as members. Mr. Smyth is one of the "elsewhere" postmasters, His village is not incorporated, and his election is thus perfectly valid. Assuredly he is not if the letter published in the London press, and purporting to be a copy of a letter which he addressed to the speaker of the commons, under date of Paris, June 4, is from his pen. After excusing his delay in appearing to claim his seat in the house while peace was not yet concluded, avering that his course in the Boer war had not been determined by any base feelings, that a new era had dawned which all hope may be brighter and which he had expected should be attended by a

general amnesty, he concludes: "Be that as it may, I wish to place myself at your service. I had hoped that I would prove myself no unworthy member of the House of Commons; that I there could work at all those great national, industrial and educational questions upon the future of the British dominions depends, and that with the ance of helping in the solution of the problems of Ireland I could say, more modern spirit than that of Themistocies, to those members of the House who were hostile to me: 'Do

not strike me, but hear me.' Evidently Col. Lynch had hoped to make his appeal from the floor of Parliament to the British public. This has been denied him. He will, however, have the opportunity of making his defense in the British courts, where justice sits enthroned with veiled vision holding an even balance, and no right common to the humblest or highest subject can be refused to him:



A HIVER UT LAND.

Astonishing Amount of Earth That Flows Down the Mississippi. "The capacity of the Mississippi for filling up canals and old channels is something awful," says John Swain in Ainslee's. "Government engineers have found that the amount of solid matter annually carried past Vicksburg in susension is enough to make a block of earth 300 feet high and a mile square. Fifty feet off the top of this is spread around on the valley between here and the sea, and the rest goes out into the gulf of Mexico to build up more conti-

"Think what that means. Instead of a river of water this is a river of land. It would make a solid stream of earth five feet deep and nine feet wide, flowing night and day as fast as a man can waik, four miles an bour, all sliding down off the northern half of the country toward the sea. Year in, year out, that endless line of earth goes on. It would take a force of more than 50,000 men working in eight hour shifts to throw the dirt into the stream, supposing the river bed were rigid and an inexhaustible supply of dirt on the bank. It would make 25,000,000 wagon loads

every year. "But here-what are the use of such figures? Below Vicksburg-and above it, too, to an extent-we have the earth itself to speak for it. Except for the occasional fragments of the line of bluffs along the eastern, edge below here which bob up at Fort Adams, at Natchez, at Grand Gulf, at Baton Rouge, at Port Hudson, there is nothing about the level of the high water river except the artificial levees. These are in places miles back, great earthen banks, sometimes thirty feet high or more, sodded and free from trees, which protect the wonderfully fertile

region behind them. "And all this level country which the river overflows and fertilizes is constantly increased by this river of dirt which the Mississippi brings down from the inner region, gathered all the way from the Rockies to the Alleghanies. Sometimes the river starts to eat away this land that it has made. In a single summer, if it will, it eats away half a mile of it out of some bend. It cuts it out sometimes an acre at a bite and takes with it forests, houses,

levees and all else. "The river is not a uniformly moving stream. One side or the middle moves swiftly; the other parts are still or sluggish. Sometimes even these run up stream. The swift part is the channel current and runs in the deepest sections. It makes crossings whenever driven off shore by a promontory. These crossings are dumping places for the surplus earth the river has picked up in the bend it is eating."

One of Field's Crazy Jokes. In his biography of Eugene Field Slason Thompson says that shortly after the humorist's arrival in Chicago it occurred to him one bleak day in December that it was time the people knew there was a stranger in town.

So he arrayed himself in a long linen duster, buttoned up from knees to collar, put an old straw hat on his head and, taking a shabby book under one arm and a paif leaf fan in his hand, he marched all the way down Clark street, past the city hall, to the office. Everywhere along the route he was greeted with jeers or pitying words, as his appearance excited the mirth or commiseration of the passersby.

When he reached the entrance to The Daily News office, he was followed by a motley crowd of noisy urchins, whom he dismissed with a grimace and the cabalistic gesture with which Nicholas Kooran perplexed and repulsed Antony van Corlear from the battlement of the fortress on Rensselaerstein. Then, closing the door in their astonished faces, he mounted the two flights of stairs to the editorial rooms, where he recounted, with the glee of the boy he was in such things, the success of his joke.

Praise of Work Well Done Perhaps there is nothing else so productive of cheerful, helpful service as the expression of approval or praise of work well done, and yet there is nothing so grudgingly, so meagerly given by employers. This evinces but a poor knowledge of human nature, which is always hungering for approbation. 

MOOSE JAW.

Centre of a Wonderfully Fertile Prairie District-Amazing Yields-some Good-Luck Farming Stories.

There was a time when the setlers at Moose Jaw, N.W.T., proposed to get them another name, in the belief that the prospects of the town were injured by such a back-in-the-woods title as Moose Jaw. There is no such idea now. The Moose Jawians are proud of their town, name and all. It is largely a railroad centre at present, being the divisional headquarters for a long stretch of the main line of the C.P. R., as well as the Soo line leading down into Dakota. It has 2,200 of as comfortable-looking people as there are in western Canada, the men tall and bronzed by exposure to the winds of the prairie, the women pret-

ty and fond of fine clothes. Moose Jaw is essentially a home town, with a fine situation on the northern bank of the stream from which it takes its non and which affords opportunity for boating at favorable seasons. How young it is may be best learned from the statement of a gentleman of a statistical turn of mind, who said that when he came to the town in 1895 there were only eight unmarried young ladies above sixteen years, while there were between 400 and 500 unmarried men. The chief import for a long while was young ladies, and now in Moose according to one of its merchants, it is necessary to carry a large line of baby carriages, child-

Granting the one thing needful, moisture, of which there has not been any lack in recent years, there seems to be no limit to the productiveness of the land, which is a rather stiff clay, without the black surface mould of the Indian Head district. The average wheat yield last year in the district was 35 bushels to the acre, probably 95 per cent. being No. 1 hard, of a peculiar-ly bright color much sought after by millers, and produced, it is believed, as a result of the dryness of the air during the season of ripening. A yield of 50 bushels of this sort of grain in spots here and there means

enormous profit to the grower.

The return to the farmer, when everything is down to the lowest basis of cost, will be most gratifying. Even now there is nothing to gramphic over grumbie over. Here are some good-luck stories: A farmer last spring luck stories: A farmer last spring bought a quarter section of land, agreeing to pay \$1,920. He put 100 acres of it in crop, and got an average of 40 bushels, his money return being over \$2,000. Another crop like that will more than pay for the land and leave a handsome surplus. Another man, an Englishman, near Drinkwater, on the Soo line, bought some land last May, planted eighteen acres of flax about the first of June and got twenty bushels of flax seed an acre, worth over \$1.90 per bushel. 
