J. Morris, Esq., moved the adoption of it, and following resolution :

" That as the visiting and relieving the poor during the winter months

as contained in Poor Relief Report, have been the means of aiding so many destitute families; the meeting considers this as another reason for appealing to the friends of the Institution for increased liberality in aid of this fund."

Seconded by C. Alexander, Esq., and carried.

4th Resolution, moved by W. Luna, Esq.,

"That this meeting learns with much pleasure that the board of management of the Protestant House of Industry, have so favorably received the application of the Executive Committee to provide Rooms for the Industrial Branch of this Institution in their new building as it will greatly promote the efficiency, and enlarge the means of usefulness of the Industrial Rooms."

This Resolution was seconded by the Rev. Mr. Frazer, and carried unanimously.

The Secretary of the Poor Relief Fund, in connection with the Home and School of Industry and the Industrial Rooms, begs to present the following Report of the assistance given from the above Institution, in articles of food, clothing and rent since Nov. 4th, 1863.

The assistance given from this fund has been conducted on unsectarian principles, as the Report will show. 80 families have been relieved during the winter months; many of the applicants were cases of great destitution, and have since gratefully expressed themselves, regarding the relief they received.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE  
HOME AND SCHOOL OF INDUSTRY.

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The Committee of the Home and School of Industry, in presenting to the Public their Sixteenth Annual Report, are happy in being able to state, that since the removal of the School from Jurors to St. Antoine st., the anticipations of increased usefulness and comfort with which the last Report closed, have been in great measure realized; the number of children having increased from twenty-nine to thirty-eight; and notwithstanding the additional rent, and the diminution of the Government Grant, the Funds of the Institution are in a prosperous condition.

The Committee record, with gratitude to the Giver of all good, that they have received supplies from sources totally unexpected, and, as will be shown by the Treasurer's Report, the balance in hand is now larger than in any former year, being sufficient to defray the expenditure for several weeks to come.

Since the 27th of May last, eighteen children have left the Home, some having gone to service, others returned to their friends; twenty-four have been admitted, and, in addition, eighteen day scholars attend the weekly school, where they receive the elementary instruction of plain education.

The greater number of these children are very poor, and of those admitted into the Home as inmates, several have been rescued from extreme misery. Three little girls, in particular, whose father had left them, and whose mother was in the utmost destitution, have been for some months improving, and happy among their schoolmates. Two of these children were supplied with clothing from the Cathedral Clothing Society; and the mother, now in respectable service, is able to contribute to the maintenance of the youngest child.

The generality of the children being so poor, payment for board is received for very few, but the Committee feel, that the inability of the parents or friends to pay for their support, renders it more requisite to extend to these unfortunate little ones instruction and care. Eight very young children have lately been received into

the Home, most of whom would otherwise have been sent to Convent Schools, and with the view of providing for the maintenance of these children, Miss Hervey commenced a special collection, but the donation of \$100 from the District Savings Bank, rendered it unnecessary to proceed with this.

During the last six months, different clergymen have kindly visited the school, and have expressed much gratification at the cheerful and healthy appearance of the children, and the knowledge of Scripture evinced by them in the course of examination.

By the blessing of God the inmates have been continued in the enjoyment of health, and the Committee advert with much pleasure and satisfaction to the economy and excellent management of the matron, Mrs. Mitchell.

The teacher, Miss Godkin, discharges her duty with energy and fidelity, and the Committee especially notice the improvement of the children in needle work.

Miss Hervey and Mrs. Cornish return their thanks to the gentlemen from whom they collected in the fall; and thanks are also offered to Dr. McCallum for his kindness in giving, gratuitously, advice and medicine.

The Committee gratefully acknowledge the donation above referred to of one hundred dollars from the District Savings Bank; and trust that the friends of the Home and School will kindly continue their support and subscriptions; as it is only by the strictest care and economy, that so large a number of children can be maintained in the institution.

The Committee, in concluding their Report, desire to express their sense of the many mercies experienced through the past year with the steadfast hope that they may not be weary in well doing, but be enabled by the exercise of that charity, which never faileth, to be the means of bringing many children to the knowledge of God, and to the practice of every Christian virtue.

The Committee desire to tender their cordial thanks to Mr. Dougall for his kindness in giving the children a Pic-nic treat for the last few years; to the Rev. W. M. Inglis for his sermon preached in aid of the school; also to Mr. Lovell for his continued liberality in printing the report.

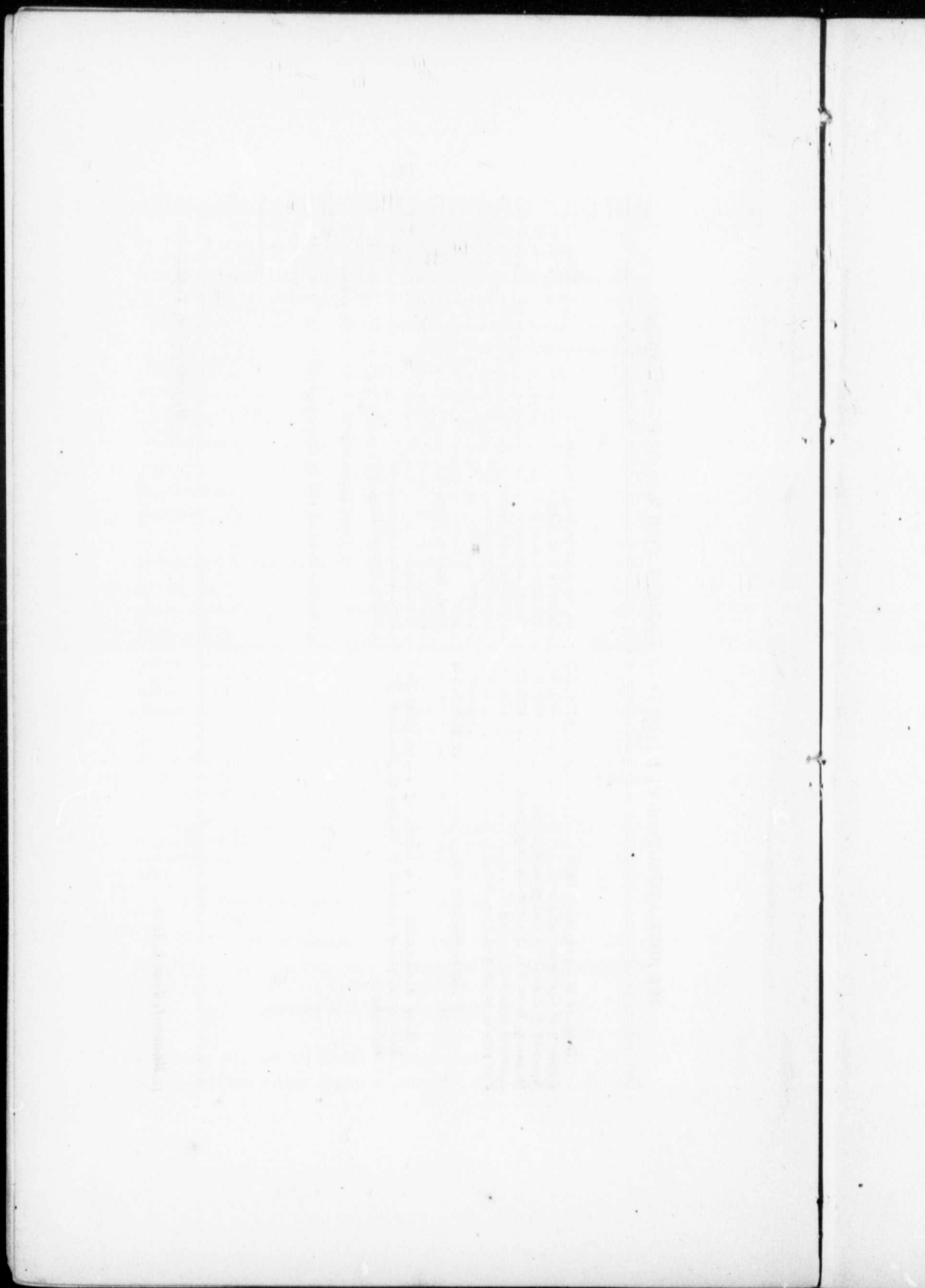

## REPORT OF THE INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

---

THE Executive Committee of the Industrial Rooms present their Third Annual Report to their friends and patrons, with the hope that the results of the labors of the past year will be found satisfactory and encouraging.

The Committee believe that the employment given from the Industrial Rooms is of great assistance to those who receive it. Habits of industry have been formed and aided, improvement in sewing and knitting has frequently been perceptible; the Ladies, according to the rules of the Society, have visited the women applying for work at their own homes, and the weekly "Mothers' Meetings" conducted in turn by several of the ladies, have been numerously attended.

It was the care of the Committee in the month of January to consider the expediency of a change of situation; but No. 22 St. Antoine street, having proved suitable, and as well fitted for the purposes of the Institution as any other house then to be procured, the Committee leased it for a second year; and the arrangements made in February, 1863, respecting the appointment of a lady superintendent to regulate and manage the business of the rooms, have been carried out with good effect.

Since the last annual meeting the number of applicants for work have been 115; of these belong to the Church of

In addition to these were 12 irregular workers, making the total number employed 127.

It is the intention of the Committee, as in former years, to do only ordered work during the summer, that the funds may be reserved for winter use.

The Committee much regretted losing the valuable services of the late matron, Mrs. Churton, but have entire confidence that

Mrs. Russell, who in the beginning of May arrived from Quebec, to succeed to the situation, will be found perfectly qualified in every respect to fulfil the duties required.

The receipts of the Rooms, as will be shown by the Treasurer's report, have been large, but the high price of materials counter-balances the advantage to the Rooms.

The annual Bazaar was held on the 15th and 16th of March, and by the kind assistance and liberal patronage with which it was favored, the sum realized was most satisfactory, as the following statement will show:

The expenses amounted to \$120.41.

It is requisite to state that the sales at the Stock Table barely repay the cost of the materials, and the price paid to the workers.

With regard to the Commission Table, the Committee consider it will be expedient in future to receive only such articles as are made by persons in reduced circumstances.

The Committee desire to return their grateful thanks to those friends who so kindly contributed work and refreshment towards the Bazaar, and the ladies who assisted at the different tables, also to the gentlemen who acted as stewards on the occasion.

On the evening of the 17th of March, a Tea meeting took place in the Mechanics' hall. The room was filled with the women who had worked for the rooms; their families and friends, and by the exertions and liberality of the supporters of the Industrial rooms, Mr. J. P. Clark in particular, the assemblage was amply provided with refreshments, and enjoyed a most pleasant evening.

Money collected by Mrs. Wenham (from her friends) towards



the tea meeting, \$17.25, and the Committee return many thanks for the supply of bread, meat, tea, sugar, milk, &c., &c., sent by different friends.

Miss Hervey having organized a Poor Relief Society, it was unnecessary to grant donations of bread and meat so freely as before from the Gratuity Fund; but the most needy workers were allowed to purchase clothing at reduced prices. The Gratuity Fund being very small, this involved a loss to the institution to the amount of \$40.50.

The kindness of the Hon. Mrs. Rollo in obtaining the attendance of the military bands at the Bazaar, and her liberal contributions from the sale of photographs of \$24.80, are acknowledged with gratitude, as are also the donations of bread and meat for the poor, continually received from a military friend.

The donations of \$100 from the District Savings Bank, and of the sum of \$50 "From a Friend of Industry" are gratefully acknowledged.

Rooms, in the building about to be erected, and the application having been favorably received, the Committee look forward to being relieved from the expense of house rent, and other charges, which now weigh heavily on the working of the Industrial Rooms.

The Committee return their best thanks to the editors of the Montreal Gazette, the Herald, Daily Witness, Transcript, and the Telegraph, for their frequent insertion of advertisements and notices, and to Mr. John Lovell, for his liberality in gratuitously printing the report.

In conclusion, the Committee would humbly acknowledge their thankfulness to Divine Providence, trusting that by the blessing of God on their endeavors, they may still be enabled to go on and prosper.
