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

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

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

PEBBLE DUST AND CEMENT FINISH.

Plastering buildings on the outside with pebble dash or cement is sometimes known as stucco work. It may be used for veneering new buildings or for covering old structures. It is quite desirable and seems to be a very satisfactory method. As a rule two coats are used, the first a scratch coat composed of five parts Portland cement, 12 parts clean, coarse sand, 3 parts lime, and a small quantity of hair, The second or finishing coat is composed of 1 part of Portland cement, 3 parts of clean coarse sand, and part of slaked lime paste. Should only one coat be desired, the finishing coat is used. Some masons prefer mortar in which no lime is used, but this requires more time to apply.

In applying stucco to brick or stone structures, clean the surface of the well, wet thoroughly, and plaster one and one-half inches thick. For a finish, either smooth with a wooden float or by rubbing with burlap. In using stucco on a frame structure, first cover with two thicknesses of roofing paper. Next put on furring strips about one foot apart, and on these fasten wire lathing. Apply the scratch coat one and one-half inches thick and press it partly through the openings in the lath, roughing the surface with a stick or trowel. Allow this to set well and apply the finishing coat one-half to one inch thick. This coat half to one inch thick. can be put on and smoothed with a wooden trowel or a large stiff fiber brush if a spattered dash finish is desired. A pebble dash finish may be obtained by using 1 part of Portland cement, 3 parts coarse sand and pebbles not over onefourth inch in diameter; throw on with a trowel.

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

COMPARISON OF AMERICAN AND CANADIAN PAVING.

Canadian and American paving brick have been put under comparative tests at Toronto, Ont. cost of Canadian vitrified brick at the lowest ruling prices was 941/4 cents per square yard, as compared with 97 cents for the American vitrified block. The standard abrasion test showed, after 1,000 revolutions, a loss of 17.7 per cent. for the Canadian and 11.8 per cent. for the American product. After 2,000 revolutions the losses were: Canalian, 26.2 per cent.; American, 17.6 per cent. In making the tests 110 samples of Canadian and 160 samples of American pavers were Out of 41,656 square yards used. of brick pavement constructed in Toronto in 1905, 10,415 square yards was laid with Canadian vitrified brick and 31,241 square yards with American vitrified block.
