

We should not have noticed the silly paragraph in the Patriof at all, but that we are republishing liberty to believe, in purely chronological matthe articles of the Sun, and, as it is perfectly notorious that every one connected with the Courier is a staunch member of the Church of England, and, therefore, not at all likely to make the journal " a vehicle of infidel ideas," it appears necessary that we defend ourselves by supporting Mr.

We may remark, in the first place, that it is not just to make Mr. Gliddon responsible for the Sketches" in the Sun, with which he has nothing to do, and, therefore, cannot be responsible for any blunders, if such there be, which those articles contain.

In the second place, if the Editor of the Patriot had ever read any of Mr. Gliddon's works on Ægypt, he would know that the author is a sincere Christian, and that one of the main objects of his works is to use hieroglyphic lore to confirm the authority of the Sacred Scriptures, which it does in a most remarkable degree.

Mr. Glidden's sole fault appears to be that he does not choose to accept as authority the chronology of Archbishop Usher, tacked, by Act of Parent, to the English version of the Bible; nor do we, and, therefore, we defend Mr. Giiddon's position. Mr. Gliddon does not differ from the Bible, because he will not believe, with Archbishop Usher, that the Deluge took place in the year 2348 B. C. Tue Bible itself is perfectly wilent on the subject; if, to every event recorded the inspired writer had affixed a date, then we, as Christian men, should have been bound to take the date, as well as the fact, as undeniable truth. The Bible being silent, we must grope our way through the mist of ages for dates in the best way we may, and who shall dare to say that we are

"infidel," because we choose to take another series of chronological tables in lieu of those of Archbishop Usher. Now the date chosen by the Archbishop for the

Deluge is only one among three hundred opinions, other, on Biblical chrone logy. Mr. Glidden takes the Septuagint chrone lagy, which places the Creation at 5586 years before CHRIST, by which he gains 1582 years over Usher, who fixes the Creation at 4004 years B. C. We may observe, by the way, that the three most authentic manuscripts of the Septua-gint in existence place the Creation of the World at above 5000 years B. C., and that Clemens Alexandrinus among the ancients, and Hales among the moderns, agree with them. Now the Septuagiat version, Josephas, and Hales, all place the Delage at above 3000 years before Christ. No one will deny that Hales was learned and pious Churchman, and his computaagrees with that of the Septuagint, followed by Mr. Gliddon. To show how various are human opinions on a date, of which Scripture makes no mention, we may say that the highest epoch given for the Creation is that of the Altables, which makes it 6984 B. C., and the lowest in that of Rabbi Lipman, who makes 11 3268 years ! The birth-time of our Lond and Mastea himself, computed by thirty-six Christian authorities, cannot be defined within ten years, and the very day kept hely as the Nativity was not determined till the year 325 after. What nonsense then to talk of "infidelity," because a man chooses to take one set of tables rather than another, all of human computation. The fact is that the whole of the discrepancy between the 250 B. C .- and the Hebrew copy, arose from corruption of the text by the Jews, about the time of the Seder Olam Rabba, in A. D. 130. The text was corrupted to throw the older prophecies concerning MESSIAR out of date. Usher's tables are now relinquished by the ablest modern chronologists as utterly irreconcileable with the rise of the Assyrian, Egyptian, Indian, and Chinese Empires, which suggests a very different date for the Deluga. It gives at least a period of some 1000 years to come and go on. Every event recorded in hieroglyphic history can be contained within this period, and so confirms Scripture, though the time is so short that it is enough to confound belief, when we think of what was accomplished within it. Moreover, there is a vast gap in the records of Scripture.
