SCIENCE ON THE EVE

OF TALKING WITH OTHER WORLDS THAN THE ONE WE INHABIT.

Teala, the Great Electrician, Declares We shall Talk With Mars in a Short Time.

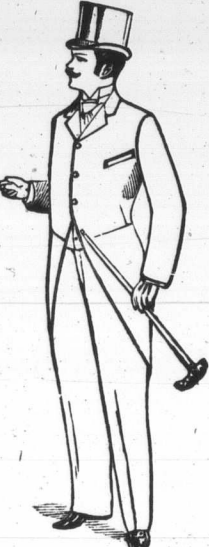
