Coal Men Impressed With Statement of Grievances.

New York, Feb. 19 .- Notwithstanding the statement of President Mitchell and his Scale Committee that the latter had everything in readiness to submit to the operators to-day, no written state-ment of the demands were produced.

The conference did not last very long In about an hour it was announced that President Willcox, of the Delaware and Hudson, and John Mitchell, President of the United Mine Workers, would make statements. Later the reporters were called in, and the following genstatement was made:

There was a full representation of mine operating companies and miners. The meeting was called to order, with Mr. Connell in the chair. Mr. Mitchell addressed the meeting, giving in general terms the propositions desired by the miners, stating that the same had been entirely formulated in detail. operators were very much im-ssed with Mr. Mitchell's speech. After a brief discussion, it was concluded that the miners and mine operators should each appoint a committee to represent them in the future in reference to the matter, the committee to consist of seven members each."

Committees were appointed to represent the miners and operators. Previous to the meeting the operators held an informal meeting in another part of the building. The conference ad-journed about 3 p. m.

Miners Feeling Their Way.

The general impression was that Mitchell and his committee had been simply feeling their way, and wanted to see how the operators stood before presenting a full list of their demands. Both sides said that the conference was harmonious and that there is a general conference was also as the conference was the conferen harmonious, and that there is a general desire for peace. The impression prevailed that, while the employers will neither grant the general eight-hour workday, the closed shop, nor an advance n wages, they don't want to turn down the miners harshly if there is anything on which there will be a disagreement, and both sides wish to avoid a strike, if possible. Some of the operators remained for fifteen minutes or so after the conference. W. H. Truesdale, of the Lackawanna, said after he came out that he thought it would be ten days, or at least a week, before the committees could get togeth-er. He expressed the belief that the miners would formulate their demands and send a committee to the sub-committee of the operators, which will be submitted to a committee of the whole, "I can say nothing," he said, "except

The deed of this land to the Earl of Selkirk contained, however a clause reserving 7,455,552 acres of thi territory for the retired servants of the Hudson's Bay Company. Of the total area so reserved only 152,345 acres ies named, leaving a balance of over 7,000,000 acres, to which Hudson's Bay officers and their descendants are now aying claim.

FOOLED TELLERS.

DID THE SILVER DOLLARS ANGE-LONI MADE AT HOME

For Seven Years He Coined Them, Aided by His Daughter-Not a Bank in New York Ever Refused Them-The Coins Were Perfect.

New York, Feb. 19 .- The World When United States Secret Service agents yesterday arrested beautiful Francesco Angeloni and her father, Giovanni, a pursuit of seven weeks ended, and the Government had captured two of the most skillful counterfeiters in this country. For seven years this girl of 13 and her parent have been coining spurious dollars so perfectly executed that the United States Treasury accepted and passed them.

There is not a bank in New York which has not taken them over its coun-

ters and paid them out unsuspectingly. These coins probably will be in circulation for years unless the Government recalls the mintage of the years 1881, 1899 and 1901 The secret Service men believe at least 10,000 coins have been put out.

So parfect were the coins Angeloni nade that bank tellers argued with the Government agents. They would not be convinced that the dollars which they had accepted were spurious. Secret Service men had to demonst demonstrate by an analytical assay that the coins challenged by the sub-treasur y were only 750 fine. DANISH KING'S BODY REMOVED.

Taken From Copenhagen to Cathedral at Roskilde.

Where It Will be Laid Beside Other Kings of Denmark.

A Copenhagen despatch: The body of King Christian was removed from the Christianberg Church here to-day to the Cathedral at Roskilde, 30 miles from Copenhagen, where it will be buried on Sunday morning among the tombs of the Danish Kings, who for a thousand years have found their last resting place in the ancient capital of the kingdom. The whole of Copenhagen was given up to nourning. Business and work were at a standstill, while emblems of sorrow were displayed everywhere. The enormous black garbed crowds of townspecple swelled by thousands of arrivals from the country districts, thronged the square in front of the Christianberg church, and the route thence to the railway station from early morning, standing patiently for hours in order to pay a last tribute to the dead monarch. The windows all along the route were filled with spectators who paid high prices for seats. Most of the owners of such places of vantage anounced their inter-

places of vantage anounced their intention of devoting to charity, in memory of King Christian, the proceeds of the sale of seats.

Shortly before noon the Kings of Deumark, Greece and Norway, Queen Alexandra, of Great Britain, the Dowager Empress of Russia and other Royal rela-tives of the deceased, and the representatives of foreign sovereigns reached the Christianberg Church where a brief ser-vice was held, at the conclusion of which, he coffin, covered with the Danish standard, was berne high by naval and military officers to the waiting hearse. Then, headed by infantry and cavairy, a simple cortege was formed and slowly proceeded through the three and a half miles of streets between the church and the railroad station." Immediately behind the hearse was led King Christian's favorite riding horse, Jessuf, which will be shot to-night, according to the ancient Danish custom. The procession was closed with carriages bearing the male members of Royal families represented at the funeral, the ladies watching the departure of the body from a neighboring

building.

The bells of all the churches were tolled and minute guns were fired from the arsenal throughout the progress of the cortege and until the coffin was placed on the funeral train.

This was the first time in history that the body of a Danish King has been transferred by railroad to the burial place. At the time of the death of Frederick VIII. the predecessor of King Christian, in 1863, the use of a railroad train for the conveyance of the king' body to Roskilde was not considered suf ficiently dignified.





APPLE HAS A LONG DESCENT.

Traced Back to the Cave Dwellers of Swiss Lakes.

Among the fruits of the rose family raspberries and blackberries. The apple is a fruit of long descent. Among the ruins of the Swiss lake dwellers are found remains of small seed apples which show the seed valves and the grains of flesh. In the year 1286 the royal fruiterer to Edward I. presents a bill for apples, pears, quinces, medlars and nuts. Pipins, believed to be seedlings, hence called from the pips or seeds, are said not to have been grown in England before 1525. The exact in England before 1525. the orange, the russean, the sweeting, the pome water and the reinette. John Winthrop is usually held re-sponsible for the introduction of the apple into the new world. Some of the best of American apples were brought over by the Huguenots, who settled in Flushing, L. I., in 1660, and plant-ed there, among others, the pomme royale or spice apple.

work; a flat rate has been paid for good and bad alike. The hogs fit only to compete with the low American price stock brought quite as much as the sort that competes with Irish and Danish bacon for the highest place on the British market. Whatever may be the extent of the

shortage or the real cause of it, the fact remains that unless producers and packers grapple in sympathetic co-operation with the situation, Canada's valuable bacon industry, which has cost years of strenuous effort to build up,

may become seriously demoralized. In 1890 there were only two packing houses in the export trade with a weekly capacity of some 3.000 hogs while in 1905 the weekly capacity of the sixteen packing houses in operation was some 50,000. While this limit has not been reached within from 10,000 to 15,000 hogs weekly, according to the season, the output from Canada has reached about \$15,000,000 annually, or 20 per cent. of the total quantity of bacon imported by Great Britain. To jeopardize so valuable an industry would be noth-

ing less than a national calamity. If the farmers who have been in the habit of raising hogs will accord the ba-con industry a steady, consistent sup-port begotten of the knowledge that nog raising pays year in and year out, the future has very large possibilities for the Canadian bacon industry. Canadian bacon having won a place on the British market commanding respect, as it increases in quantity and improves in quality, will undoubtedly become a daily necessity of the British consumer. That it may occupy this enviable postion both farmer and packer must of operate, the farmer by producing a steady supply of the right class of hogs, the packer by paying a fairly uniform price from month to month and from year to year; and he must give value per pound according to the quality of the product he receives. Let each do his part and there will be little trouble about the supply of hogs for keeping the factories going at a normal capa-city. What appears to be most needed at the present time is that relations of confidence be restored and maintained


