Editorial Brevities.

Piles of trash and rubbish in fence corners and in out-of-the-way places around the yard, or in the attic or cellar, are inanimate "fire bugs" waiting only for the opportune spark or the slower process of spontaneous combustion to burst into flames.

Germany in New York have formed an organization called the "Friends of the German Republic," whose object is the dethronement of Emperor William and the establishment of a German republic. The organization, said to be nation-wide in scope, has established headquarters and has issued an appeal to Germans to help in its propaganda.

Experiments in the use of lalang grass for paper pulp have been successfully carried out in Australia. There are millions of tons of lalang grass growing in Queensland. It produces three crops a year, and is considered a curse to the country. It resembles esparto grass and, when dried, yields as high as 60 per cent. of first-class paper-making pulp.

The Regina Leader says: The announcement that the Dominion Government is to introduce a Bill providing for daylight saving throughout Canada during the summer months is good news. Regina has been a pioneer in this movement, and its Dominion-wide adoption will remove the disadvantages which have been found to exist in local application only.

The very essence of Sir Robert Borden's proposal to Sir Wilfrid Laurier was conscription. Coalition was merely a means to that end, and the promise of a general election after the coalition had signed conscription the law of the land, was merely so much sugar-coating. Sir Robert Borden proposed conscription and coalition. Sir Wilfrid Laurier proposed a referendum or an election, and the Premier said yes to an election, on the express understanding that it be after, not before, conscription was passed by the united parties. "The significance of the correspondence is missed unless that is kept clearly in mind."

Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of Public Works, publicly accused by a Manitoba judge of being party to a conspiracy to defraud the government of Manitoba out of thousands of dollars, has asked and been granted an investigation by an impartial tribunal. Pending a report of this tribunal, Hon. Mr. Rogers sits in a state of participation in politics. Sir Ezekiel McLeod and Hon. Louis Teller, the commissioners selected by the government to investigate the evidence on which Judge Galt founded his scathing denunciation of the former Manitoba minister, are men of the highest character, who can be relied upon conscientiously and impartially to discharge a very disagreeable duty.

Whatever their faults may be, and they are not without faults, these faithful lovers of the horse have a spark of that divine affection which is the essence of Christianity, and which, if it should ever become a universal feeling among men, would invite all animals, the human and the non-human, in one brotherhood, and would transform this blood-stained earth into a near approach to paradise.

A Loyal Town.

England is pointing with justifiable pride to a Yorkshire town—Keighley by name—whose war record is one that the whole Empire may well rejoice over. Within its green Alredale hills, says a recent writer, it nurses the secret of civil courage. Its people have, too, a civic pride, and although Keighley is a place of unromantic occupations—the manufacturing of textiles, lathes and wringing machines—it was the desire of the men who controlled the fortunes of the town that what was made therein should be well made. With this in view, the first English trade school was established there in 1870 by a pioneer group of men of whom Sir John Smith, the present member for Keighley Division, was the leader. When war was declared, seven thousand of the eight thousand adult members of the male population joined the army. Those above the military age began drilling for service in case of a possible invasion. It was a Keighley lath-maker who forced his way into the Ordnance department to prove that he could make a 16-pound shell at half the price then paid for them. His Yorkshire dialect was not too broad to convince the experts, and his price gave the standard for controlled factories. And since then this man, with three of his friends, has managed a National Projectile Factory without fee or reward. Later, when hospitals became necessary, there was no question of commissions or boards or things of that kind. The county needed hospitals for its wounded and sick men, and private homes were opened, and public institutions turned over for this purpose. The business of the place brought to it an added prosperity, and miles of hanki, blue flannel and similar textiles were turned out; but, if prosperous, it was also generous. Keighley has contributed to the Five Per Cent. War Loan £2,250,000, a sum which in proportion to the population is nearly three times greater than that contributed by England as a whole. When the necessity for food control arose, the people got together—men and women—and worked out a system for the place that has been rigidly adhered to, and that has reduced the expenses of the daily living without interfering with the health of the people. A Food Control Committee was formed on which the teachers in the public schools had a prominent place; practical receipts were printed and distributed; pledge cards were signed, and the pledge to assist in the saving of food was kept; the Mayor called and presided at a meeting of the domestic servants, to whom the absolute necessity of the movement was explained and the benefit of their sympathetic co-operation pointed out.

The cupboard is your trench, you must defend it! and if you save your bread it will save you; appealed to the patriotism of the children as well as to many of old years. Keighley men and women are working together for the common good and to bring the war to a victorious conclusion. It is evident that differences, individual likes and dislikes, personal opinions, and personal aggrandizement, have been banished; and that the one desire is to stand honorably and honestly for the Empire and its needs.

Prisoners of War.

Anxiety concerning the prisoners of war in Germany is naturally very great. The Canadian Red Cross, the British War Office and Switzerland are doing all that is possible to overcome the condition that apparently exists. The evidence that food sent from the Red Cross is not reaching its destination, is at times undeniable. Again there is every reason to believe that in some districts a proportion of it does get to the men. Very much depends upon the character of the governors of the concentration camps. Continued victories, it is also said, on the part of the Allies, bring about better treatment of the prisoners. Many persons have become discouraged and feel that it is useless to continue contributions to the fund for the prisoners. Those in charge of this branch of war work in London and Switzerland do not share this feeling, and are working day and night to bring more satisfactory results. There is no question as to the seriousness of the situation, but the only thing to do seems to be to continue along the lines laid down by the Red Cross, and not to abandon these men who are looking to their own people for assistance and relief.

Agricultural Report.

The report of the Secretary of Agriculture for Nova Scotia for the year 1916, published by order of the Legislature, is a volume of somewhat more than five hundred pages. It consists of three parts. The first part includes the report of Principal Camming and associate teachers of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and Farm, including that of Miss Jennie A. Fraser, on Women's Institutions. The second part contains the report of the Superintendent of Agricultural Societies, of which there are two hundred and sixty three, with a membership of 10,523. The subscriptions from members toward the work of these societies was \$20,746.94, and the total grant in aid by the government was \$14,000. The third part is devoted to Fruit Growing. Nearly all the fruit common to the temperate zone are grown in Nova Scotia, such as the pear, plum, cherry, peach, quince and small fruits. But the most important of these, as is well known, is the apple. It is estimated that 40,000 acres of land in this Province are covered with apple orchards. These are found chiefly in the section sheltered by the North Mountain, although many excellent apples are grown on the South Shore and other parts of the Province. The largest apple crop was recorded in 1911, when 1,734,872 barrels were packed and sold. For the past four years the average has been about 713,000 barrels. But this number does not include apples grown in the Eastern part of the Province or those consumed in the home.

There are at present seven Model Orchards, or Demonstration Orchards, and Demonstration Vegetable Gardens in different parts of the Province, which are of great value as illustrations of the best methods to be employed in the raising of their respective products, and in guarding them against their enemies.

One gentleman in Lakeville, this county, tells of an apple tree which is said to be the champion apple tree of Eastern America. He has owned this tree since 1878, and it is now one hundred years old. The trunk is nearly three feet in diameter. The limbs begin to branch about six feet from the ground, and the branches spread over eighty feet. As a rule, this tree bears only on alternate years, or bears a comparatively small number of apples on alternate years. A record of its biennial crop has been carefully kept, from 1878 to 1895 inclusive, and during these eleven bearing years it produced 234 barrels of merchantable fruit, which netted two-dollars a barrel. It is still living and bearing good crops. The owner attributes its growth and fruitfulness to the situation. It grows on the side of a bank of a ravine that makes down from the

mountain, in which a small stream of water runs, the roots of the tree running into this stream.

The Government has erected at Baddeck, C. B., a cereal mill consisting of the following four units: An oatmeal mill, a buckwheat mill, a feed mill and a flour mill. The object of the erection was experimental. One gentleman, who has used some of the products, regards the flour as very much superior to the imported whole wheat flour.

An interesting part of the report is that which gives the experiences of several persons who have been successful in their work in different departments of agricultural endeavor. One of these is a gentleman who came from England in 1897 and settled in Waterville.

In a word, this large volume is filled with information, the value of which cannot be questioned, touching every department of the work of the farmer and orchardist. It well deserves to be read carefully from cover to cover.

Death of Talented Wolfville Lady.

The remains of Miss Hilda Estelle Vaughn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Vaughn, of this town, whose death took place at Dorchester, Mass., on Saturday last, were brought to Wolfville this week and the funeral was held from her parents' home on Wednesday afternoon. There was a large attendance of friends and the final tributes were numerous and beautiful. The service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Borden, of Canisus, uncle of the deceased, and the address was given by Rev. Mr. Armitage, pastor of the church. Dr. Chute and Dr. Manning also took part. The interment was at Willow Bank.

The deceased was one of Wolfville's most popular and clever daughters and was dearly beloved by many friends. She was a graduate of Acadia University in the class of 1908 and of Smith College the following year. In 1913 she was given a fellowship from Smith and took the M. A. degree. She then went south and was for some time a teacher at Hampton Institute. For three years she filled a position at 'The House in the Pines,' at Norton, Mass., and then went to the University of Maine, where she filled the position of instructor of English and afterward

was assistant professor in the same branch. Finding her health failing a year ago she was given a leave of absence for two years. Last November she was obliged to give up work and has since, in spite of every care, failed rapidly. Her mother remained with her during the winter and accompanied the remains to Wolfville. The sad ending of this bright young life is a severe blow to the sorrowing family who have the heartfelt sympathy of all in their sad bereavement.

Special train will leave Annapolis at 6:30 a. m., stopping at all stations to Windsor, arriving at Windsor at 10:10 a. m., and running from there express to Truro, arriving at Truro 12:30 p. m. The regular morning train will take care of passengers desiring to attend this excursion on the Midland Division.

A special will leave Truro at 6 p. m. same day, making all stops to Annapolis, including stations on the Midland Division, and an extra train will be run from Kentville to Kingsport on arrival of the special from Truro. Prof. Cunningham, President of the Agricultural College, is providing a very attractive program. There will be an exhibition of live stock on the college farm and the following animals will attract special attention. The new trotting stallion, Captain Aubrey, generally regarded as the greatest standard bred stallion owned in the Dominion of Canada, and the foremost son of the Emperor of the trotting stallions of the world, Peter the Great, was sold for \$57,000 when he was 21 years of age.

Similar interest is attached to our Clydeade stallions, one of which, Lord Ullin, was first prize and reserve champion at Toronto and Chicago.

In our cattle stable is an Ayrshire heifer that with her first calf will produce nearly 14,000 lbs. of milk this year, and that may, if all goes well, make the champion record of Canada. In the Holstein herd is a cow that gave a high as 113 lbs. of milk in one day, equal to over 44 quarts. The Ayrshire herd is headed by a son of Jean Armour, the first Ayrshire cow is the world to make over 20,000 lbs. of milk a year. A sister of our bull holds the world's three year old record for Ayrshires, i. e., 21,936 lbs. of milk.

There are so many equally fine animals that it is impossible to describe them all in a short announcement.

It is planned to make the day specially interesting to women who will be entertained in the new Science Building. Special attention will be paid to demonstrations on the home canning of vegetables and fruit.

New Professor at Acadia.

Professor R. P. Clarkson, Ivan Curry Professor of Engineering at Acadia University, has tendered his resignation, which has been reluctantly accepted by the Board of Governors. Prof. Clarkson has been at Acadia for five years, and by his published works and inventive genius and work in the class room, has inspired the men with whom he has come in contact. He is the inventor of the Clark son Current Motor, and has been the engineer in charge of the Cape Split development. Professor Clarkson will devote himself to industrial work in the future in connection with a New York firm.

Professor Haley, who is Professor of Physics and Dean of the Department of Applied Science of Acadia has recently resigned the Deanship. He has asked to be relieved of this additional work on account of sickness connected with his family.

To fill these two positions—Ivan Curry Professor of Engineering and Dean of the Department of Applied Science—Professor Frank E. Wheelock, Ph. D., has been appointed. Prof. Wheelock is a graduate of Acadia University in the class of 1905 and a Ph. D. of Yale. He taught one year at the University of Missouri and has been for four years Professor of Physics and Dean of the Department of Applied Science at Mt. Allison university.

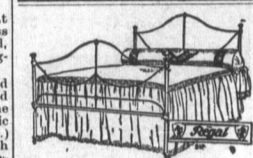
