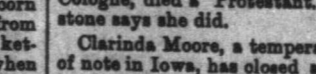

At 3 years (Fig. 40), loss of the trifolium shape of the inferior middle and beginning of wear on the upper nippers.

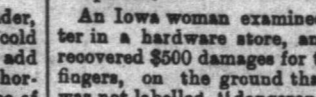

At 4 years (Fig. 41), superior nippers are five eighths of an inch from the jaw, and the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth.

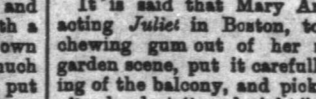

At 6 years (Fig. 43), the lower corners are replaced by the permanent ones, the nippers and middle teeth being somewhat worn.

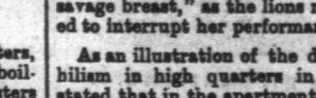

At 7 years (Fig. 44), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

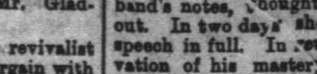

At 8 years (Fig. 45), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

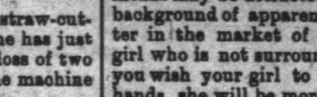

At 9 years (Fig. 46), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

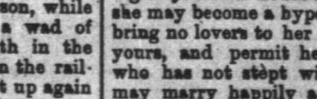

At 10 years (Fig. 47), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

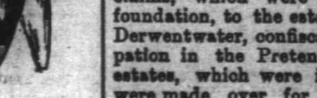

At 11 years (Fig. 48), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

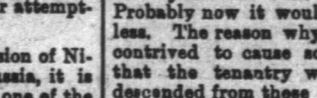

At 12 years (Fig. 49), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

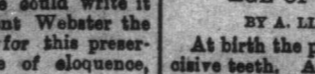

At 13 years (Fig. 50), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

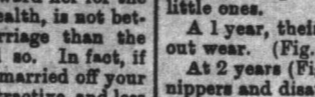

At 14 years (Fig. 51), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

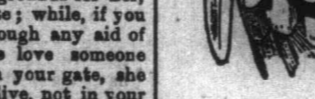

At 15 years (Fig. 52), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

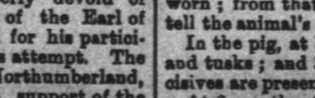

At 16 years (Fig. 53), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

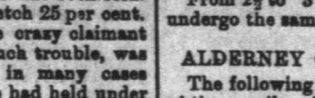

At 17 years (Fig. 54), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

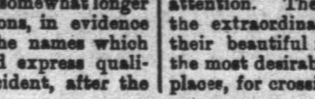

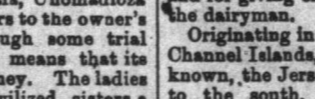

At 23 years (Fig. 60), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

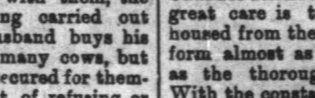

At 24 years (Fig. 61), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

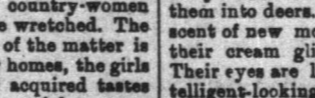

At 25 years (Fig. 62), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

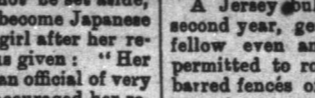

At 26 years (Fig. 63), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

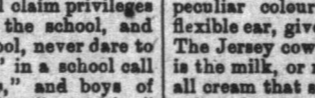

At 27 years (Fig. 64), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

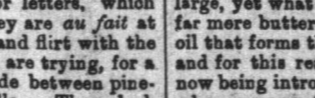

At 28 years (Fig. 65), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

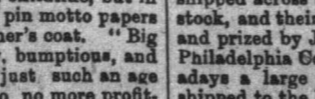

At 29 years (Fig. 66), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

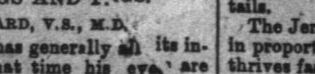

At 30 years (Fig. 67), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

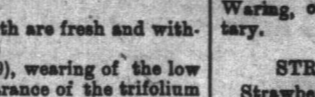

At 32 years (Fig. 69), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

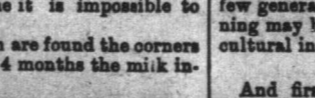

At 33 years (Fig. 70), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

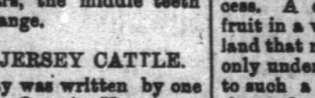

At 34 years (Fig. 71), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

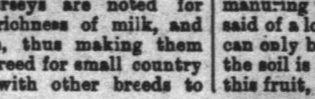

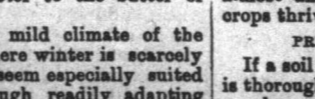

At 40 years (Fig. 77), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

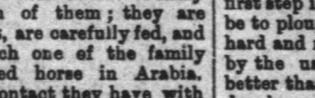

At 41 years (Fig. 78), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

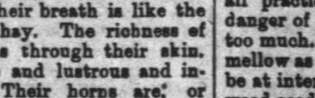

At 42 years (Fig. 79), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

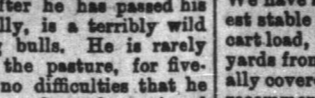

At 43 years (Fig. 80), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

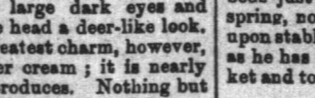

At 44 years (Fig. 81), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

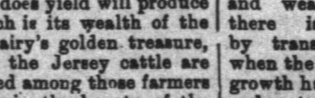

At 45 years (Fig. 82), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

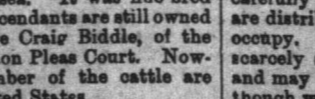

At 46 years (Fig. 83), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

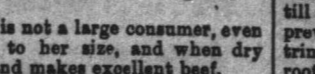

At 47 years (Fig. 84), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

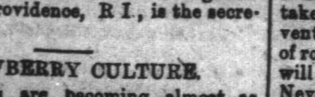

At 48 years (Fig. 85), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

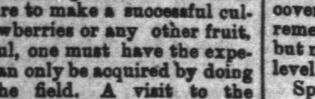

At 49 years (Fig. 86), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

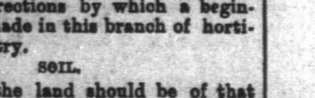

At 50 years (Fig. 87), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

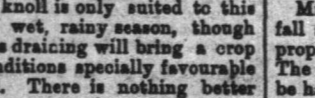

At 51 years (Fig. 88), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

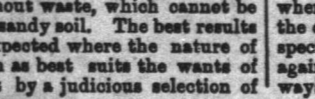

At 52 years (Fig. 89), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

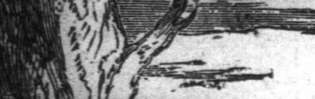

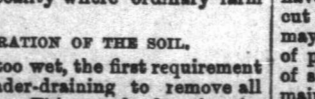

At 57 years (Fig. 94), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

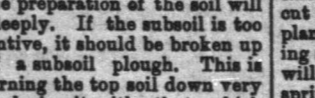

At 58 years (Fig. 95), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

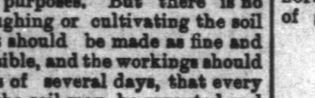

At 59 years (Fig. 96), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

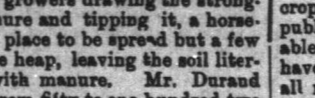

At 60 years (Fig. 97), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

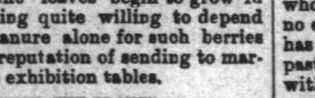

At 61 years (Fig. 98), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

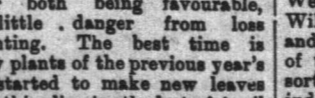

At 62 years (Fig. 99), the inferior nippers are replaced by adult teeth, and the middle teeth are replaced by adult ones.

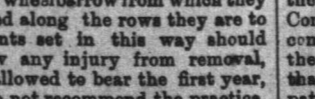
