### CANADA'S VIEWS GIVEN TO U.S.A.

Canada's views in the matter of a new treaty to regulate the strengtu of naval vessels on the Great Lakes have been placed before the American Government as the basis for a draft treaty and unless an invitation is received from Washington to send a minister there, it is not thought likely that a'further official visit will be

required. During the summer, when the Prime Minister and Hon. George P. Graham, Minister of Militia and Defence, were in Washington they placed before the American Government their ideas as to how the Rush-Bagot treaty might be revised and brought up-to-date. These representions were made through the usual channels of the British Embassy, and since the return of the Prime Minister to Ottawa a draft was forwarded to Washington setting forth officially what Canada wanted.

In the framing of a proposed treaty by the Washington Government, however, it may develop that certain changes in the Canadian draft are asked which will necessitate the visit of a Canadian Minister in which case it is thought that Hon. George P. Graham, as Minister of National Detence, will be the likely man to conduct the negotiations.

The decision of the British Govern nent to leave the matter in the hands of Canada direct will, it is expected, be one of the matter for discussion at to-morrow's meeting of Cabinet Council and a decision may then be reached as to the sending of a Minwhen the necessity arises,



The month is now more than halfway over and the shuffle has not yet taken place, but political circles are expecting some move will soon be

The axle upon which the changes will revolve is the Lieutenant Governorship, and there also is a Senatorship open for New Brunswick, while changes in the Supreme Court bench have been persistently rumored.

Hon. William Pugsley's term as Lieutenant Governor will close on November 8th next. He was appointed on November 2nd, 1918, and sworn in on November 8th of that year. It has been variously reported that he will re-appointed and that he will go to the Senate.

The vacant Senatorship is that held by the late Hon. Frederick Pemberton Thompson, of this city. It was said at one time that there were ore than thirty names on the long list of Liberals in New Brunswick who figured their party services and prominence made them deserving of this appointment, and no doubt the list has since been increased.
