The appli cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son. daughter, brother or sister of intending

Daties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the lend in each of three years. A homesteader may liv. ithin nine miles of his homestead on m of at least 80 seres solely owner

In certain districts a homesteader good standing may pre-empt a quarter

Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-emption six months in exch of six years from date of home stead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fift

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas \$3.00 per acre. Duties. Must resids six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house
