

You may perhaps find hard to believe me when I say that have seen the sanitary men, as they ainly tried to cleanse the filth accunulated at the sewer mouth, still fore vainly try to drive these poor hildren away from the spot where all his corruption was being stirred up; et you may take my word for it that what I say is true. These are things which hundreds of people must have een as they passed up and down this street, yet nobody before me has, I elieve, taken the trouble to reflect pon what they saw. There is a ast difference between seeing and

bserving, and between observing nd reflecting, and between reflecting and protesting, and between protesting and keeping on protesting. I shall endeavour, if I am given the hance, to keep on protesting. Gold on a Desert Island.

There is no mystery inherent gold. It is merely a convenient standard, in terms of which we can effect our bargains, and by which we can exchange labour for labour, or rather the fruits of labour.

It so happens that gold, being rare metal possesses qualities admirably suited to make it a sign of value. At the same time a man on a desert island with a pile of gold would not be a farthing richer; he could not eat it, nor indeed use it in any way gerated notion of the importance o gold owing to its being a token of value-we confound it with the good things it will bring us.





Special to the Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5 Immigration from and to Canada is the subject of a statement just issued by the U. S. Immigration Dureau. During the 12 months ended March, 31st last, there were 74,912 arrivals of citizens from Canada for permanent residence in the U.S. against 61,517 during the previous 12 months. In the same period there 103,789 depart. ures of citizens from the United States into Canada for permanent cesidence, against 59,832 for the previous 12 months. Citizens arriving were not counted during the whole of 1909, and it is estimated that 15,000 arrived during the year. That number has been included in making up the total of 61.517 arrivals.

#### Why London Police Allowed Dr. Crippen to Escape.

Scotland Yard has issued the following defence of its methods in allowing Dr. Crippen to escape from London after suspicion of him had been aroused:-

A statement issued by an official of Scotland Yard recently defended the action of the police in the Holloway

mystery. 'People are asking why we allowed he man to remain at liberty, and why we did not arrest him immediately upon visiting the house. The question seems a very simple one now that it is known to be a case of murder, but before the public pass any condemnation they should try to place themselves in the position we were in before there was any evidence or any definite suspicion of foul play. Until that time the only intimation we had in our possession was that Mrs. Crinpen was missing. Well, now, in the ccurse of a week we receive in London alone about one hundred cases of missing people, about whom we are called upon to make inquiries. In this case, upon receiving communications from friends of the missing woman we interviewed Crippen, who told us by a Vengeful Maniac. that his wife had gone off with Count. He spoke in a very off-hand manner, and in effect told us that he did not care in the least that she had gone off with the Count, since he had the typist to take her place. 
