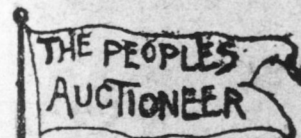

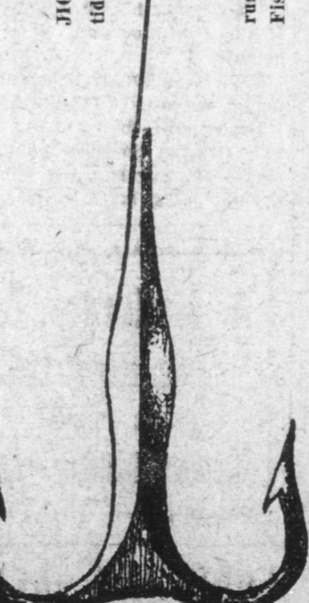

I remember I used to hate poetry in school and wonder why people didn't say what they had to say in good, straight prose, instead of rhyming it and sing-songing it. How is it that you are so fond of poetry?"

Answered the other, "Because I've always heard it since I was a baby. Before I could talk mother used to read and repeat poetry to me. And as soon as I could talk at all, father taught me scraps of poetry—not silly shynets—but beautiful bits like 'The world is so full of a number of things, I'm sure we should all be as happy as kings.' Often I didn't understand the things at the time, but the meaning came to me afterwards, and I always liked the sound."

The ability to really enjoy good poetry is undoubtedly rare in this prosaic century.

Culture seekers often deliberately acquire it. But everyday folks more often regard poetry to the end of their lives as a foolish way of saying in rhyme and sing-song what could be quite as well said in straight prose.

Household Notes.

Many an overflow of the kitchen sink is caused by grease. There is no better way to keep the pipes of a sink in good condition than to let the hot water faucet run for five minutes after dishwashing.

Care should be taken in drying bread to be used for crumbs. Do not let it remain in the oven long enough to brown, for cutlets or croquettes rolled in overbrowned crumbs will not brown when frying.

To remove wrinkles from clothes, hang the articles in the bathroom, shut the door and windows, turn on the hot water to fill the room with steam and leave the clothes for an hour or two. Dry in the open air, if possible.

If the boiler to your kitchen range once becomes badly rusted, there is nothing possible but a new one. It pays to take precautions. At least once a week run the water off from the boiler until it comes entirely clear.

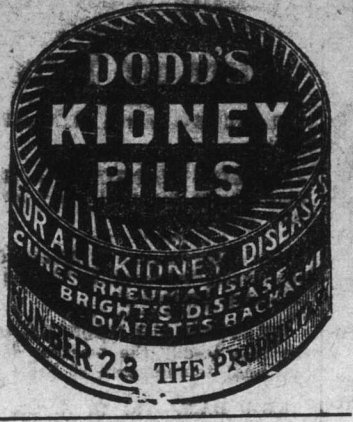

procure some chlorine water, dip linen rags into this and rub the spots which are scorched. The marks will disappear.

When going into a house that has been closed all summer see that the cellar windows are opened, and that all the faucets are allowed to run for at least an hour. Poisonous gases often collect, and one cause of typhoid fever in the autumn is neglect of such precautions.

When the rubber plant droops and its leaves turn yellow and drop off, mix a teaspoonful of mustard in a cup of boiling water, cool a little and pour on the soil in the pot. Sometimes a long black hard-shelled worm comes to the top, and if this is killed the plant will generally recover.

Keep a glass jar on the work-table, and when canning fruit and making jelly rinse all dishes used and pour clean through a cloth and empty into a large jar or keg, and you will have an excellent vinegar in a short time. Add a little vinegar to start it with.

Coal dust is wasted unless the misers sees that it is burned, and yet it makes beautiful fires. Have a galvanized iron scuttle for the purpose. Add sufficient water to the coal to make it moist. When a fire is burning brightly bank it up with this wet dust and you will have a clear fire which will last for hours.

If a water pipe is but slightly frozen it may often be thawed by pouring hot water on the outside. On bitter cold nights let the water run a thin stream in the faucets connected with the outside pipes; freezing will not be so probable.

Mr. Aitkens' saw mill, situated near the site of the proposed new saw mill, has for some time been sawing out the material for the Nfd. Pine & Pulp Co. new mill.

Grand Bank being the terminus of the Fortune Bay branch.

PEKIN, To-day.
Premier Yuan Shi Kai's new cabinet has been named in an Imperial edict, but it is questionable whether it will stand. One of the members expressed amazement at his appointment. It is believed that few of the new ministers have been consulted and it is expected that a number of them will decline to serve. Several members of the new cabinet are known to be strong sympathizers with the revolutionary movement. The Organization Cabinet as it now stands, is evidently an attempt to include in it personal representation of all parties. Reports reach here of the murder of a German in Shen Si and of a French priest in Sze Chuen Province, but these are isolated instances of harm coming to foreigners.

BERLIN, To-day.
Sharp earthquakes occurred last night at Munich, Strasbourg, Mayence, Frankfurt, and Stuttgart. The shocks were felt quite severely at Stuttgart and Frankfurt. At Frankfurt several houses were badly shaken and half clad people rushed into the streets. Big cracks appeared in the walls of several buildings at Stuttgart. Household furniture was overturned and pictures fell from walls.

NEW YORK, To-day.
Smaller battleships and cruisers are advocated by Sir William White, the former Chief Constructor of the British Navy, in an address at a meeting of the Society of Naval Architects in regard to merchant ships. Sir William said the upper limit in size had been reached for Transatlantic service in the largest steamers already.

ST. PETERSBURG, To-day.
As no reply has been received from the Persian Government to the Russian ultimatum of Nov. 11th. It is officially announced that the Government has ordered the immediate despatch of troops to Persia. They will be concentrated for the present at Harbin, 90 miles N.W. of Teheran.

MONTREAL, To-day.
The waning of the power of the church in relation to the community as a whole was admitted by Rev. Mr. Campbell, pastor of the City Temple, London. His address was made at a luncheon at the Congregational Club.

LONDON, To-day.
Both Vienna and Constantinople report that Italy has consented to postpone naval operations in Turkish waters. This is the result of the protest of the Powers.

LONDON, To-day.
To render more efficacious the National War against consumption, the Local Government Board has issued an order making notification of the disease compulsory.

The Lieutenant-Governors of all the neighbouring provinces, as well as a brilliant gathering of society leaders, were present. The appointment of a Tariff Commission, and Dominion co-operation with the provinces, with a view to securing better highways, were the two important items of constructive legislation in the Speech from the Throne.

If indeed, they have no library, they could not, I am certain, do better than lay the foundation of one by acquiring the new Encyclopaedia.

Fourth Event of C. L. B. Anniversary.

BANNER NIGHT FOR EX-MEMBERS AND LADS.

Last night in the C. L. B. Armoury, Harvey Road, a very pretty scene was witnessed when about seven hundred members, both past and present, sat down to tea. There were thirty-five tables filled up with all the good things provided and seventy-five lady friends of the Brigade waited on them and made every one enjoy themselves. Rev. Canon White, Chaplain of the Brigade, acted as Chairman for the concert, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all, the performers being encouraged repeatedly. Before the concert ended Mr. Kenneth Ruby, Chairman of the ex-members' committee, with Mr. T. Hallett as Secretary, presented Lieut.-Col. Rendell with the handsome sum of \$700 collected by them to go towards the fund for lessening the debt on the new armoury. Mr. Rendell and the other officers were agreeably surprised on receiving this sum and heartily thanked the ex-members for their generosity. The new armoury cost to erect \$20,000, but through the efforts of the members of the Brigade and kind friends the debt had been reduced to \$2,000. Serjt. S. J. Ebsary, Chairman of the W. & N. O's. mess, then came forward and handed to Lieut.-Col. Rendell a cheque for \$400, collected from the Warrant and Non-Commissioned officers who have to date contributed over \$1,000 to the armoury fund. The Lieut.-Colonel again heartily thanked these officers for their good work. Heartly cheers were then given to the Lieut.-Colonel and ex-members of the Brigade, and at the conclusion of the concert tea was served and all enjoyed themselves. After tea had concluded the second part of the concert was proceeded with, after which the Lieut.-Colonel thanked the ladies for their kind assistance. Later about 400 persons assembled in the gymnasium and enjoyed themselves dancing until 3.30 this morning. Last night's event concluded the celebrations which mark the 20th anniversary of the C. L. B. Commander, officers and present and former members worked well and are deserving of congratulation on the success of the anniversary.

Shipwrecked Men Arrive.

The crew of the schooner Renow which was lost in mid-Atlantic a few weeks ago, arrived by the Carthaginian last night. The vessel, flat laden, was on a voyage from Burgeo to Oporto, and her crew were Capt. F. P. Fitch, mate, Mr. Donald, Mr. Barter, and W. King, seaman, and cook, A. King. These men go to Burgeo, where they belong, on the first opportunity. One of the seamen named James Courtenay is ill in hospital at Bremerhaven with a growth on the forehead.

The Renow was owned by Crosby & Co. of Halifax, and was laden with fish at Burgeo by R. Moulton. She left there on August 13th, and experienced fine weather, but the run over is days. She left for Halifax with a small cargo of onions on the 25th September, and for several days had fine weather until morning of the 11th day out, a hurricane of S. E. wind sprang up with a mountainous sea and this weather continued for several days. On the second day the vessel was heeled by the run in the early forenoon the bowsprit, foremast head and all the head gear and sails were carried away, the bulwarks of either side were smashed, the stern was badly damaged and the ship began to make water rapidly. The pumps were manned and though the crew worked night and day the water gained rapidly and it was seen that the vessel was doomed. Distress signals were run up, and during the evening a light breeze which proved to be the S. S. Glenmay from Baltimore to Bremerhaven hove in sight and only with the greatest difficulty did the crew manage to board the rescuing ship. A terrible sea ran as the men left the vessel in their own boat and they were very thankful when they found themselves on the Glenmay's deck safe and sound. Before leaving the vessel the crew set fire to her to prevent the possibility of the schooner becoming a dangerous derelict on the high seas. The crew were treated well on the ship and reached Bremerhaven on October 17th, where they were looked after by the British Consul, placed in the Seamen's Home, and later were sent to North Shields, thence to Glasgow and later to Liverpool where they joined the Carthaginian. The Renow was a fine new vessel of 78 tons.

SMALL PASSENGER LIST.—The S. S. Carthaginian brought only seven intermediate passengers and two in steerage.

The receipts will probably reach the sum of \$2,000 when all the money is in. Dancing was kept up till 3 in the morning.

Man Gocs Overboard.

About 8.30 last night a man named Silas Legge, an inmate of the Poor Asylum who had been on board the scho. Togo, at Ayre & Sons wharf, had a narrow escape from drowning. He left the vessel to go ashore at the hour named after spending the day on board, and in the darkness while rushing on deck, threw him a rope which he managed to grasp and then drew him up on the wharf. The man was chilled from his immersion, was very much exhausted, and Head Sparrow and Const. Lawlor who were quickly on the scene brought him to the police station and later drove him to the Poor Asylum.

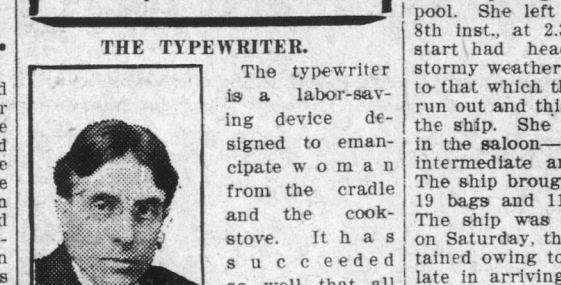

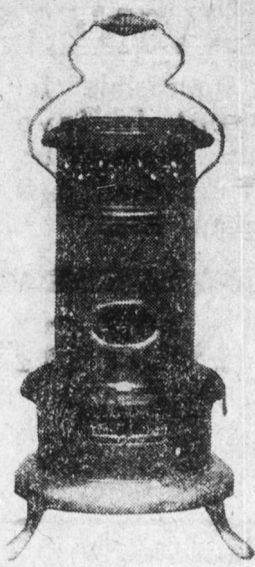

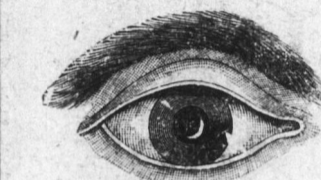
