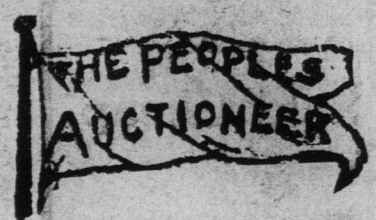

### Something Wrong.

A few days ago I heard that the husband of a dear little friend of mine was seriously ill. Yesterday, when I called on her to ask for the invalid and inquire if there was anything I could do, I was astonished to find her alone. Her husband had gone back to work that morning. Of course I congratulated her on his quick recovery. Her eyes blazed. "But he hasn't recovered," she cried. "That's the terrible part of it. He ought to be right here in bed, and he's gone back to work because he's so afraid of losing his job. Why even when he was the sickest and suffering agony he was still worrying about that job. When I think of it I get so angry that I see scarlet. Oh no, not angry at him, of course; just at things in general. It seems to me something must be dreadfully wrong when a man who knows how to work and wants to work as much as Jack does, isn't perfectly sure of a good place somewhere."

Something is dreadfully wrong. And how anyone can blink that fact is beyond my understanding. I have a friend who is a large employer of labor. He is a kindly, intelligent man, devoted to his family and generous to his friends, and yet I have heard him assert over and

over again that things are all right, that this social agitation is nonsense, that there is no foundation for the feeling of unrest in our working classes, and that practically all laborers get as much as they earn.

Can you understand such an assertion on the part of an intelligent kind-hearted man? I cannot.

When men fight over jobs as if they were bones, as Jack London puts it, when an intelligent man who wants to work finds a position in which he can support a small family, when a man at death's door must worry about his job, when some women work nine and ten hours a day for a wage on which they can barely support life, and cannot possibly save for sickness or old age, when other women wear diamonds in their heels, and spend enough on their pet poodles to support a large family in comfort, when other men manage to earn a billion dollars in a lifetime—things are not all right, they are somehow terribly wrong.

I don't pretend to know just where the trouble is, or how it can be corrected, or if it can be entirely corrected while human nature is human nature, but this I know—that things are not right, that a great many men and women do not get what they earn, and that a great many men and women do get what they don't earn.

And anyone who can sit back calmly content with things as they are, is either blindly selfish or selfishly blind.

Consorts of Sovereigns that has ever assembled on one occasion. There will be present two reigning Sovereigns and three Heirs-Apparent, the former being King George and the King of Norway, the latter the Prince of Wales and the Crown Princess of Sweden and Norway, while the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha is a reigning prince. In many ways the Royal gathering will be a very notable one, and they will assemble on the evening of the marriage when the King and Queen propose to give a "family" dinner party in their private dining room at Buckingham Palace.

Internationalizing The Azores.

A proposal is being considered by the British, United States and German Governments, to make the Azores in mid-Atlantic an international neutral zone. The opening of the Panama Canal will greatly increase the carrying trade in the North Atlantic, and the leading sailing courses will naturally be from north-east to south-west, and vice versa. A glance at the map of the western hemisphere shows that a necessarily important part of the Azores or Western Isles will now play. The Azores belong to Portugal and are regarded by her as a province rather than as a colony. The interest to maritime and commercial nations of the proposal to make them a neutral zone centers in the fact that at the city of Horta on the island of Fayal is a joint cable station occupied by the following companies:—The European Azores (British), the Deutsch Atlantischen Telegraphen Gesellschaft (German), and the Commercial Cable Company (American). These three companies have already eleven ocean cables anchored there and in active service doing business with all commercial countries in the world, as they are connected directly and indirectly with all other ocean cables of both hemispheres. Under all circumstances free access to this station, together with the right to the use of these cables, is of the utmost importance to all the vast interests connected with the navigation and commerce of the Atlantic. The existing laws would be no protection to the great interests in case of a war in which the countries concerned might be involved. Here it is proposed that a joint treaty should be arranged between Portugal and all other civilized nations, by virtue of which a neutral international zone should be established and strictly maintained in the archipelago. The neutrality should be unconditional so that all vessels, regardless of nationality, should within the zone be protected against attack or seizure and be allowed to receive provisions and fuel.

A French Scotland Yard.

I gather from conversation with an expert attached to the department who happens to be in London just now that the Paris detective force is to be very considerably reorganized so that it will approach more nearly in the distribution of its functions to Scotland Yard.

were made under this head by M. Leprie before his recent retirement from the control of the force, but Ministerial and other changes at the time in France prevented their being carried into effect. One reform, which may be expected greatly to facilitate Anglo-French co-operation, when necessary, will be the drawing of a sharper distinction between the purely political and ordinary criminal duties performed by French detectives. Leading detectives of both nationalities have seen more of each other of late because of the pearl mystery than has been usual, and it may be believed that London recognises as well as Paris that the two forces have something to learn from each other.

The Thracian Frontier.

Military men are keenly interested in the statement that while under the new frontier settlement the Turks are to retain Adrianople and Kirk Kilisse Mustafa Pasha is to pass definitely to Bulgaria. It is thought, that although the Turks made no good use of the latter it will be remembered that it was evacuated promptly at the commencement of the late war the Bulgarians may succeed in turning their possession of it to very distinct advantage, more especially if the Turks show their usual procrastination in restoring the fortifications and armament of Adrianople and Kirk Kilisse to at least their former level of strength. When the Bulgarians retired from Adrianople they took with them all the best guns, and with these properly mounted and manned Mustafa Pasha may rapidly assume in the hands of Bulgaria a two fold importance as a nut hard to crack and a well-situated frontier vantage point in regard to possible future offensive operations. It almost goes without saying that in war a place of which one side can or does make little use may be of immense practical value to the other. But postulate is often disregarded, and there are not a few who think that our ready transfer of Heligoland to Germany is a case in point. That Mustafa Pasha will be one is anticipated by those who are conversant that notwithstanding all pessimistic estimates of his present straits, it will not be long before the dour and unforgetting Bulgar is making another attempt to secure Adrianople, this time 'for keeps.'

Sir Alfred Mond.

Sir Alfred Mond, of chemical industries fame, left London on September 24, for a business tour in Canada, where he will remain for two months. There is a persistent rumour that he will shortly be raised to the peerage.

### The Contest in Bonavista.

The eyes of the people of the whole country have been focussed on the Bonavista election contest for some considerable time. It was recognized that the contest in this district would show up more clearly than in any other district the political strength of the F. P. U. At the last election, Bonavista put in the candidates of the People's Party by record majorities. Ever since 1889 when Mr. Samuel Blandford was the only liberal elected, no liberal had been elected for this district, and the Tory candidates have always been returned by large majorities. But the majorities of 1909 exceeded all of them. Mr. Blandford's majority being 2506, Mr. Winsor's 2481, and Mr. Morrison's 2454. Mr. Coaker and his colleagues faced a situation which appeared from these figures to be well nigh hopeless. Indeed, so strong were the expectations of the People's Party in Bonavista, that the charge was made that Mr. Coaker was being sacrificed by his transfer from Fogo to Bonavista, and it was also asserted that the transfer was a device of Sir Robert Bond's to rid himself of Mr. Coaker. At the time we pointed out that the charge was false,

and that Mr. Coaker's candidature in Bonavista was absolutely voluntary. Mr. Coaker had volunteered to face the great odds, which the figures of the last elections made to loom so large. Mr. Coaker knew the political situation had changed in that district, and that the Union was the strong force there and not the People's Party. He had the quiet confidence which comes from a full knowledge of a situation which was favourable, and he was willing to make the contest in Bonavista Bay, the touchstone of the reality of the strength of the F. P. U. and to take that election as a vote of confidence in himself as President of the Union. His faith in Bonavista has not been misplaced, and his confidence in the outcome has not been mistaken. Indeed the outcome has exceeded his expectations. Anyone present at the great meeting at Bonavista on the night before polling could not help realizing that a great change had come over Bonavista, and that Mr. Coaker and his colleagues were justified in their expectation of a great victory. We have said that the result exceeded the expectations of Mr. Coaker and that is so. It has exceeded his most sanguine expectation. It would have been a great victory to have won by a narrow majority, for that meant turning a majority exceeding 2400 into a minority. But Mr. Coaker expected to do more than this. On the night before polling, he told us he expected to win with a majority of 1500. He has done more and so have his colleagues. Mr. Coaker's majority over Mr. Blandford is 1849. Mr. R. G. Winsor's majority over Mr. W. C. Winsor is 1795. Mr. Abbott's majority over Mr. Morrison is 1871. We congratulate them on their great achievement.

Now, Mr. Editor, we, as well as his poor old mother, his sisters and other brothers, feel this an uncalculated attack on an insane man, and one that might go a long way to prejudice a jury or a court against him. We would therefore ask you to kindly Remember Who Your Authority Was on that matter, and also ask you to be good enough to allow us space in your paper to flatly contradict any such statement. Our poor brother has been noticed by us to have been afflicted mentally for over four years. We were working with him in Sydney at that time and had considerable trouble to keep him from getting low-spirited, and if we could have done so we would have liked to be always near him to cheer and brighten him up as much as possible. We returned from Bell Island on Saturday, the 18th day of October, and on that night the elder brother (Patrick Hare) met James for the first time for one and a half years, and he was told that he (James) had to give up work in Sydney as he could not stand the strain. Patrick said: "Never mind, I will try and get a job for you with us on the Island." He then said: "It's no use, I can't work or I can't go on the street; when I do people are following me, pointing and staring at me and spitting in my face; policemen and all do this." This, Mr. Editor, was enough to show that the poor fellow was insane, and we determined to take him to a doctor for examination, but before we had time to do so the awful affair of Sunday morning, October 19th, took place.

It was hard on us to find newspapers using the poor fellow's affliction for political purposes and claiming him to be an anarchist, &c., and it is doubtful if his aged mother will ever get over the shock she received. Shame on you, Mr. Editor, to try and use this poor fellow's affliction as a stepping stone for your political friends.

We will thank you on behalf of the family if you will give this letter a place in your paper at your earliest convenience.

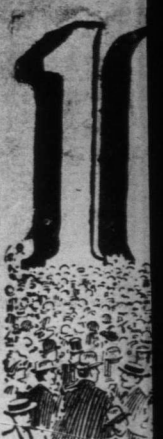

MADRID, Nov. 3. An unknown Spanish steamer foundered off the lighthouse Estaca, the most northerly point of Spain. The crew, numbering 21, were drowned.

LONDON, Nov. 3. The results of the shooting for Lord Roberts' Imperial trophy, by cadets under 16 years of age, have been known. Canada leads, with 75; United Kingdom, second, 74; New Zealand, 64; Transvaal, 62.

LONDON, Nov. 3. The Boy Scouts throughout Britain heard with pleasure yesterday that a son had been born to the Chief Scout, Sir Robert and Lady Baden Powell. By a happy coincidence the event occurred at their residence on the first anniversary of their wedding.

CANSA, Nov. 3. The Government steamer Acadia arrived here to-day, short of coal. She has on board the crew of the steamer Allette, which was abandoned in a sinking condition. The Acadia reports having met the ice, and the captain of the Allette a rough experience. The Acadia after confining will proceed to Sable Island to try and find the alleged uncharted island in that vicinity.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3. Sir Cecil Spring Rice, the British Ambassador, is convalescing at Lake Wood, New Jersey, from a long illness. Since then he has been in disgrace. His selection by the Crown Prince is regarded as a direct slap in the face for the Kaiser. It is stated that the Prince's exile at Dantzig is to continue another year, although it was reported that he was about to relinquish his command there to take over the command of the Potsdam Guards. This arrangement the Kaiser is said to have vetoed.

## Good Roads.

Good roads are a fact in about four American states, and a subject of discussion in forty-six others. A good road is a road which has only two dimensions—length and breadth. A bad road has three—length, breadth and depth. When a bad road has thawed out in the spring and has been rained on twenty-four hours a day for about three weeks it is navigable for canal boats and small stern wheel steamers. In fact, all that a black dirt road needs in April to make it a useful link in our great national waterway system is locks. In portions of Illinois and Iowa the use of stilt and life preservers, among rural mail carriers in the spring is alarmingly prevalent.

A good road is merely a roof over a bad road. When an enterprising state has decided to pull itself out of the mud it roofs over its mud roads with tar and gravel or macadam, and the farmers come to town in wet weather just as carelessly as if they were Noah and didn't care how much it rained.

Good roads were invented about 2,000 years ago by Caesar. Some of his roads are still being used. In France the roads are so good that the country cannot be seen for the dust raised by automobiles, and the humble peasant is getting rich posing for tourists at one franc per exposure.

In England the roads are smooth as floors and aged men sweep them every morning. This should fill this country with shame, except for the fact that aged men in America do not often have to sweep roads for living.

Good roads are useful because they enable the farmer to market his hogs when they are ripe instead of when the roads are navigable by a wagon which isn't fitted with bilge keels and propellers. But they are also useful because they enable the tired man to climb into a nervous automobile and commune with nature far, far away from cabarets and pictures of September morn.

Some farmers speak of good roads with scorn for this reason and insist that they do not want the city ambling past their farms at the rate of 60 miles an hour. This is short sighted. After the city man has worn long hot holes in the country atmosphere for a few years he knows enough about it to buy a farm and settle down when he has worn out. And this enables the farmer to sell the said farm and come to the city.

This world is full of give and take and the farmer who does not give the city man a chance to breathe country air flavored with real estate will never have a chance to take \$300 an acre from him for a nicely equipped farm with all modern improvements, including a 1913 almanac.

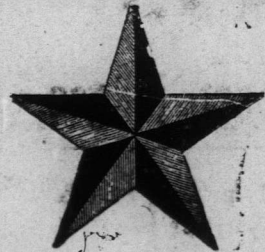

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### Big Tramp Ship in Port.

In Collision with Iceberg and is Badly Damaged.

With her bows crushed in to the bulkhead department, as the result of being in collision with an iceberg, the S.S. Manchester, Commerce, Capt. Couch, crippled slowly into port this morning and reported to be leaking on the port side.

The ship was bound to Manchester from Montreal with a general cargo. She left the latter port exactly a week ago. At three o'clock on last Saturday morning when the ship was eighty miles to the westward of Green Bay, while going through Belle Isle Straits she struck a large iceberg. At the time the weather was clear and fine and lights could be seen for fully 25 miles distant, said Captain Couch. The Second Officer was on watch on the bridge when the vessel struck the floating menace. Captain Couch was consulting with his chart in his own room, and the weather was so beautifully fine, his presence was not required on the bridge. When the Captain was alarmed of the collision he immediately came to the deck, seeing the predicament of his ship and ordered the engines to be reversed.

Capt. Couch told our reporter today that the iceberg was an immense size and was very high out of the water. He cannot understand how the look-out man did not report and attributes the accident to lack of vigilance. The ship was going at full speed when she struck and it can be realized how her bows were stove in, as the result of the head-on collision. No alarm prevailed amongst the crew and Capt. Couch brought the ship into Point Armour where upon inspection it was found that she was leaking on the port side. It was decided to come to St. John's for repairs, and the ship bore up on Saturday last, experiencing a terrific N.E. gale and snow storm the next day. She crippled along slowly, and the pumps were kept going and prevented the water from damaging the cargo.

The Manchester Commerce is now laying in the stream undergoing a survey to find out the extent of the damages done. It is not yet determined whether she will be dry docked for repairs, but it is not improbable that she will.

In connection with the collision a marked feature is that if the quarters of the seamen had been forward instead of aft, there is little doubt but that loss of life would have occurred.

The ship belongs to the Manchester Line, and owned by the Furness Withy Co. She was never here before but her captain was 26 years ago in the "Ontarian" which was disabled and had to go into Dry Dock for repairs. The Manchester Commerce was built in 1900 in West Hartlepool, is 5363 tons gross and 3444 nett.

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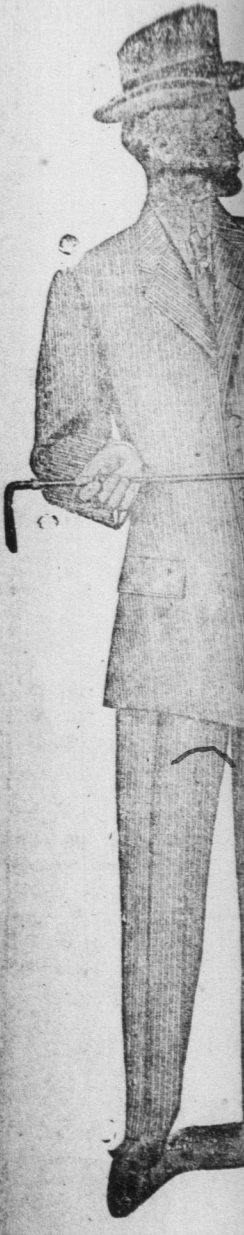

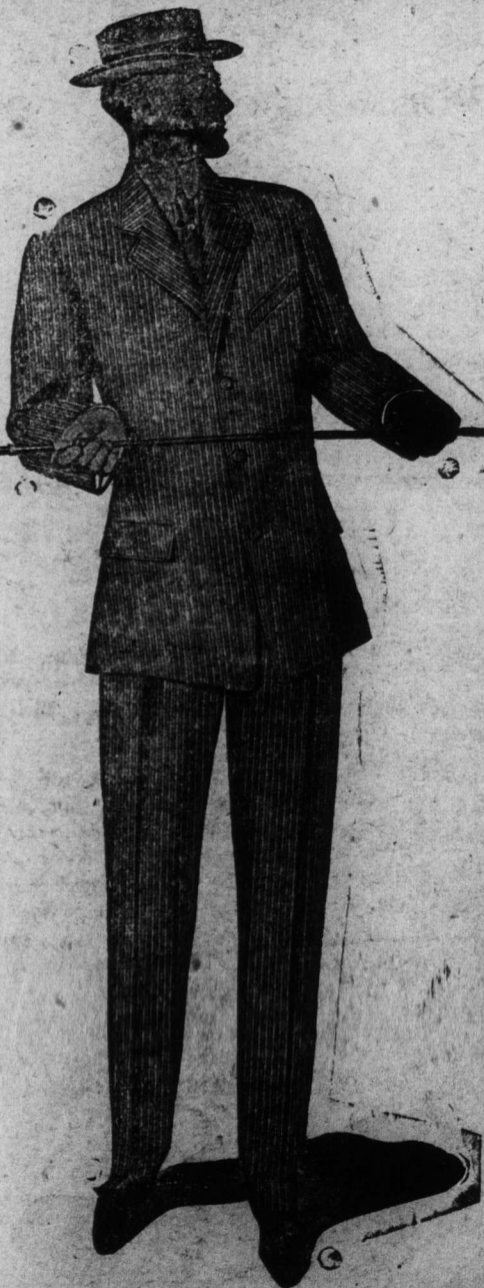

## Society Had Chief Killed.

Convicts Sentence Men to Death in South African Stations—Four Will Pay Penalty—Remarkable Story Told in Court of the Workings of Fraternity Governed by Criminals.

Kimberley, South Africa, Oct. 3.—A sensational story of a native Convicts' Secret Society, the facts as to which are well known to South Africa judges and police authorities, has been unfolded in the course of a murder trial here. Five native convicts were indicted for the murder of a fellow-convict named Jacob Mkaaba, at Dufoitspan Convict Station. The story for the Crown was that Jacob had decided to withdraw from the "Ninivite Society," abdicating the chieftainship, and had persuaded others to withdraw also. For this and for the fact that he was supposed to have carried tales to the Station Superintendent, he was sentenced to death. He resisted endeavors to get him into a certain cell, but eventually went, and was set upon and stabbed to death.

One of the accused was the society's doctor, another a judge, a third succeeded Jacob as chief, the fourth belonged to an opposing faction known as "The Scotchmen," and the fifth was neutral. The Ninivites are a native Convict Secret Society. The evidence showed that they have their own king, chief, general, judge, doctor and other officers, and hold secret courts, sentence fellow convicts to death, and issue the orders for the execution of their sentences.

Judge Lange said that the Ninivites originated in Pretoria Convict Prison, and were represented all over the country. A native witness said that nearly all the convicts in Johannesburg were Ninivites. The deceased had been chief of the society. Secret prison meetings decided on the stabbings, and those appointed to execute orders were liable to punishment if they failed. The witness said the rule was "Once a Ninivite, always a Ninivite." Jacob's death warrant was "verbally signed," and it was ordained that, should the knife not be forthcoming, he should be killed while working on the DeBears floors.

Superintendent Dyason said the Ninivites caused immense trouble in the stations, and although watched continually, held meetings and reported to their king. The head of the society was in Pretoria, and was recognized throughout the Union prisons. Jacob's fellow convicts had recently called him a detective to watch and protect Jacob. Witness added that the lives of the witnesses in the present case would certainly be endangered after the proceedings.

One of the accused admitted stabbing the deceased "under orders from Pretoria," because it was thought that it was through him that two convicts had been shot at the Cindrella Prison. If he (witness) had not killed Jacob, he would undoubtedly have been killed himself. He did it in "self-defence."

Four of the accused were sentenced to death by Judge Lange.

Mrs. Mallory found other pawn tickets concealed on the rafters and all it asserted, bore the maid's name and called for many articles of jewelry silverware and other valuables which the family had missed. Mrs. Mallory called Police Captain Albert Talbot to the house and when he left he took with him Gertrude Opederbecke and locked her up in the local jail. Capt. Talbot and Mrs. Mallory both said that the girl, after being talked to in the Mallory home until after midnight made a statement in which she said that for more than four months she had been taking articles she is said to have detailed, were valued at between \$5,000 and \$6,000, but Mrs. Mallory said that the thefts would amount to much more than that.

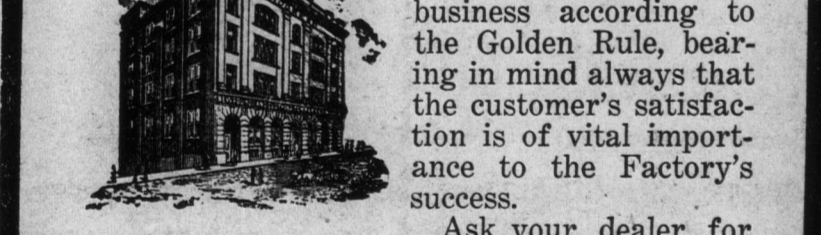

## Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram: LONDON, To-day.

The result of the shooting in Lord Robert's Imperial trophy has been issued. Canada with score 75 wins trophy. The scores are as follow:—Canada 75, United Kingdom 74, New Zealand 64, Transvaal 52. Canadians made more hits than at any previous competition. The competition is an annual one between teams of ten caddies not over 16 years age, representing different parts of the Empire. The shooting takes place in each country some time between January 1, and August 31.

CANSO, Nov. 4.  
The Government steamer Acadia, Commander Anderson, arrived here to-day short of coal. The Acadia has on board the crew of the steamer Allete abandoned in sinking condition at Port Nelson. The Acadia was the last steamer out of Hudson Bay for the season, and had the crew of the Allete not been picked up by the Acadia, they would have had no remain at port Nelson for the winter. The Acadia encountered heavy ice at the wrecked Allete reports a hard experience in attempting to land a cargo of timber. Heavy pan ice coming down the River at Port Nelson ripped large holes seven by four feet in bow, through which water rushed. The ship became unmanageable, and to avoid sinking with the crew, Capt. Robertson headed her near the mouth of the River. Had the Acadia not been in the vicinity great difficulty would have been experienced in saving the crew, as all the boats of the natives along Coast had been hauled up for the winter and the owners had gone into winter quarters. The prospect of having to spend the winter at Port Nelson was a serious one as there were provisions at that point only for natives. Among the crew of the Allete are fifteen Chinamen. On the way down the coast Capt. Anderson of the Acadia, was advised by the Dept. of Marine to proceed to Sable Island and investigate a reported uncharted and recently discovered island off the Eastern end of Sable Island. The Acadia proceeds to-morrow for the Sable Island and after the investigation of the alleged new island story will proceed to Halifax.

MEXICO CITY, To-day.  
Huerta has been told he must resign Presidency Mexico without loss time, and that he must not leave as his successor General Blanquet, Minister of War, or any other member of his officials family, or of the unofficial cabinet whom he might be expected to control. This ultimatum from Washington was conveyed to him by Nelson O'Shaughnessy, American Charge D'Affaires, acting under instructions from the State Dept. Up to last evening President Huerta had returned no answer to it, and as far as could be learned, had guarded its contents from almost all of his official and intimate counsellors. Those who learned of the Washington note regard Huerta's position as one in which he will be forced to give one of the two answers, a refusal point blank to comply with the demand, possibly going so far as to send the diplomatic representative his passports, or the elimination of himself officially. Those most intimate with the President insist that the latter course will not be taken for any reason, chief among which is that such action would be tantamount to submission to rebels. Official Mexico is no longer in doubt that the Washington Administration favors the rebel cause and is convinced that this is the means, adopted by President Wilson and Secretary Bryan to assist Carranza to win. General Huerta summoned to National Palace last night the Diplomatic Corps, but for what purpose was not revealed.

A REPLY TO DR. GRENFELL.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Although it is some time since Dr. Grenfell replied to a letter of mine concerning the case of the travelling sick, I am, even at this distance and late date, desirous of answering his criticisms. It was, originally asked of the Government that better accommodations be afforded on the passenger steamers to and from places like St. Anthony for those requiring medical attention, and, in the case of infectious diseases, that isolation be provided for the protection of the other passengers.

Dr. Grenfell admits the danger of infection in the case of consumption and cancer, but declares that their menace is less than I had suggested. Since there is danger, a question of degree is of no import. We are not concerned with the percentage of sick involved, but with the actual peril of contamination on account of the policy of non-isolation now in vogue. Since Dr. Grenfell admits the element of danger, we need discuss this point no further, but proceed to find remedies for the situation. I am surprised to hear a medical man of his experience belittling the perils of these diseases when here in the United States a movement is on foot to isolate travelling consumptives to such an extent as to require special trains for their use.

Dr. Grenfell is striving to better the condition of the people of the North. His efforts are unselfish and his motives are the best; yet he should not

resent criticism when other eyes see, however imperfectly, room for improvement. We attribute nothing ulterior to his acts and motives, and we hope that ours will be construed just as highly. Nevertheless, in the matter of wharfs and conveniences for the landing of the sick, I fail to understand his attitude. We saw the Prospector twice at St. Anthony resort to the use of small boats to transfer sick people to and from the hospital because of the presence of the Cluett at the dock. Dr. Grenfell states that it is of no interest to the general public whether his supply ship should have been at the wharf at that time, and yet in a preceding paragraph he declares:—"Many cases coming to hospital suffer more during the transference from their homes to the ship and from the ship to the hospitals than they ever do lying aboard in the steamer cabins." We agree with him, and again we ask why the Cluett was in the way.

**On the Stairs.**

Little Tips and Notions for Beautifying One's Home.

"Do you like it?" asked the young bride. "Now tell me honestly, if you have found a fault anywhere."

The matter referred to the furnishing of the new home.

"It is charming!" I genuinely exclaimed. "But why did you miss the staircase?"

Nine out of every ten housewives neglect the appointments of the staircase. The hall is catered for in the ordinary conventional manner, and yet the staircase—through which all must pass to the upper rooms—is, as a rule, given a floor covering, and left to its own devices.

The following hints may enable you to give an air of individuality to your home, and, at the same time, form an interesting feature of your household.

Have your staircase paper of the same shade as that in the hall. Certain women cling rigidly to the dado and frieze type of design. Neither is becoming. A self-colored paper, or a good striped design, matching the hall wallpaper is much smarter.

**In White or Cream.**  
Do away with those dark-brown sidings at the side of the stair carpet. White or cream enamel is much more effective and bright. A little extra work certainly in the keeping clean, but soap and water, a polisher, and an occasional touch with the enamel itself, will bring its own reward.

Many staircases are inclined to be dark, so let your paper be of the sunniest yellow tint to remedy this defect.

Let me tell you of a staircase that looks particularly pleasing. The paint-work is all of cream enamel, the wall-

paper of peacock blue, the stair carpet of a corresponding shade. On a line with the head, all the way up the staircase, are quite small oblong pictures, of equal sizes, with black, polished frames. The pictures are small replicas of some of the most famous paintings, and no visitor passes that staircase without pausing to admire both the pictures and the effect.

The little window on the first landing is hung with dainty cream casement curtains with a peacock blue border, and an artistic blue bowl of fresh flowers can always be found on the window-ledge. You can imagine the charming and restful effect of such a scheme. It was not expensive either. The pictures can be bought at a shilling (or eightpence at the most) each, and the colour scheme is but a matter of taste. Black and white ecstasies of dogs form another striking point in the staircase of a dog lover.

**When Anything Does.**  
Have you ever experienced a shock after ascending a pre-entable staircase to find that, after the first landing has been reached, all interest ceases, and the sid of "anything will do" pervades the rest of the ascent? Don't shroud those upper landing windows in old lace curtains, and artificial plants which deceive no one. A dainty muslin curtain and a fresh plant makes an enormous difference in the effect.

It is the trust economy to purchase the best quality stair carpet within reason, and, if possible, a good felt underlay. This latter, however, can be substituted by newspapers, carefully and evenly laid, old newspapers materially prolonging the life of a carpet.

Always purchase one yard more stair carpet than you actually require; this will enable you to lift the carpet up a few inches as you relax it from time to time, and so give the pattern equal wearing.

All little points these, but just take a look at your staircase, and see if one or two of these hints would improve it.
