WILLIAM REDMOND AND THE IRISH AMERICANS.

A few noisy Irish-Americans are dealing out goods "made in Germany," but they are not representatives of their race, either in the Empire or in the United States. Their fog-shouting, however, does tend to slightly embarrass and deeply anger and disgust the Irish leaders at home. Mr. William Redmond recently contributed a most powerful article to the London "Daily Chronicle," dealing with the attitude of Ireland in the present struggle. Besides her utter aversion to Prussian militarism, Ireland is bound in honor to Britain. Mr. Redmond says:

"But let me now deal with the consideration which is really, after all, the first—that of honour. In this respect we are heart and soul with the Allies. The vast, the overwhelming majority of Irishmen—that is to say, the Irish nation—believes that the passing of Home Rule is, in fact, a real treaty of peace with the British people. For thirty or forty years the Irish representatives in Parliament and on the platform have assured the British that with the restoration of Ireland's Parliament Ireland would truly end the quarrel and work out her destiny in peace and union with England and Scotland and all the Great lands where Irishmen have found a home, and which belong to Irishmen as much as to any one else. Acting on these assurances, given publicly with the cordial assent of the Irish constituencies and the Irish everywhere, the British people have made Home Rule law, and no man believes this can ever be undone. The British have kept faith with wonderful steadfastness, and Home Rule has passed three times in two years. Does any one really imagine that we in Ireland are going to repay trust and faith by welcoming to Ireland the Germans who have, within the last few days, slaughtered helpless women and children and smashed churches in England? No, sir! That is not the way, thank God, of the Irish!

"Finally let me assure all who read my words that the news of the killing of men and helpless women and children by the German attacks upon unfortified and open towns in England has filled us in Ireland with as much indignation as it has filled the people of England."

CANADA'S WAR OUTLAY TO DEC. 31 WAS \$26,231,974.

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—Expenditures in connection with the organization of the Canadian expeditionary forces and a list of the firms to whom contracts for the supply of boots, clothing, saddlery, etc., were given, are the features of a printed memorandum which was tabled by General Sam Hughes, minister of militia, in the house today.

The report also goes into detail in regard to the organization of the first contingent and of the forces which are now in training, or are being raised. It is pointed out in a report by Quartermaster General MacDonnell that 38,000 men were all equipped in six weeks.

A list of expenditures for war purposes up to Dec. 31 last is given as follows:
Pay to troops, \$11,885,107; separation allowances, \$509,949; horses, \$1,721,987; clothing, \$3,809,415; ammunition, \$200,848; field guns, \$1,141,073; rifles, bayonets, \$520,259; motor cars, etc., \$871,023; saddlery and horse equipment, \$325,628; other equipment, \$1,871,602; engineering works, \$520,177; railway transportation, \$1,030,961; ocean transport, \$1,454,281; censors, \$74,320; general, \$284,260; a total of \$26,231,974.

PROTECT CANADA FROM INVASION.

Toronto, Feb. 11.—The Monroe Doctrine, its meaning and its application to Canada and other countries of the American continent, was the subject of ex-President W. H. Taft's address to the Canadian Club at their luncheon this afternoon.

Mr. Taft pointed out that the doctrine was not an international law; merely an expression of policy on the part of the United States. In turning to the doctrine's application to Canada, Mr. Taft pointed out that this country, as a belligerent, must take the consequences, but that Germany, if by any chance successful, would not be allowed to seize Canadian territory. There was even a charge that the doctrine would be stretched or a new policy followed, to protect Canada from even invasion, but that would not have anything to do with the original Monroe doctrine.

AN OMISSION.—The name of Robt. Louis Stevenson, of Mockbeggar, Bonavista, was inadvertently omitted from the list of naval volunteers published in yesterday's issue of the Telegram. This correction, however, does not affect the total as we credited Bonavista with 36 men though we only gave the names of 35.

RUSSIA WILL SELL HER GRAIN STORES TO WESTERN ALLIES.

London, Feb. 10.—An important result of the conference of the Ministers of Finance of Great Britain, France and Russia in Paris, is, according to an article by Dr. E. J. Dillon in the Daily Telegraph, that the vast supplies of cereals now hoarded up in Russia will be sold and conveyed to Western Europe by way of Archangel and Vladivostok.

The cost of conveyance will be cut down to the lowest limits by the introduction of especial freights. This reduction in the cost of transportation, taken together with the low prices of foodstuffs which now rule in Russia, and the exceptionally abundant crops in Siberia, will enable the exporter to sell corn to the Allies at rates which cannot but have a beneficial effect on the markets generally from the consumer's point of view.

"As long as Russia had to keep her foodstuffs within her own boundary other corn-growing countries," Dr. Dillon remarks, "had it in their power to raise prices to their hearts' content. But once the Allies find it to their advantage to draw on Russia's granaries, supply and demand will tend to be equalized and foodstuffs will become proportionately cheaper."

This transaction, which was unanimously agreed upon by the three Ministers, will further have the effect of lightening the burden of Russia's indebtedness and of contributing to a better rate of exchange.

RUSS BARRIERS MAKE WIRE CUTTER USELESS.

All soldiers carry instruments to cut wire but the Russians now make an entanglement in which poles, 20 feet long, are combined with wires to make the barriers impenetrable unless the enemy is provided with axes as well as wire cutters. The Russians also have a new form of shield which proves invaluable when circumstances permit its use. It is of light, hard steel, strong enough to stop rifle and machine bullet, and covers six men abreast. It runs on wheels and is superior to the German shields. Amazing Truces

WHEN SOLDIER ENEMIES HAVE HORNBOBBED TOGETHER AS THE GERMANS AND OURS DID RECENTLY IN FLANDERS.

What President Wilson and the Pope of Rome failed to accomplish, the soldiers fighting in France and Flanders this Christmas—the Tommies, the Flou-Flous, and the Boches—did of their own accord. All the world knows the wonderful story by now. How at first one or two men on either side, greatly daring, peeped above the death trenches at one another, and smiled dumb greetings. How then, by degrees, confidence once established, grew, until both sides were fraternizing, helping to tend one another's wounded, burying each other's dead, and how when these sad and grim tasks were accomplished, they started playing football, shared their little luxuries, forced cigarettes and cigars on each other, and generally had a "high-old time" together.

It sounds amusing strange in these days. But it has often happened aforetime. In the Crimea, for instance, various observers have recorded how, on several different Sundays, a similar truce by consent was arranged. The Russians had tobacco in plenty which our Tommies lacked. These gave their enemies in exchange tallow candles, which were plentiful in the British lines. The Russians did not want them for lighting. They ate them; sucking and biting the tallow from the wicks, as children do sugarcakes.

MAORIS IN THEIR BEST CLOTHES.

One of the queerest informal truces on record occurred during the first Maori War. For three days the Maoris, strongly entrenched in one of their stockaded camps, or "pahs," had been firing at the British, who were similarly entrenched behind their own lines, and who, of course, returned the enemy's fire with interest.

On the morning of the fourth day, which chanced to be a Sunday, our soldiers were amazed to see the Maoris, dressed in their best clothes, come trooping out of their pah, unarmed, and making friendly gestures. Thinking, naturally, that they wished to surrender, an officer hurried forward to meet them, carrying a white flag. But the Maori chief explained that they had no intention whatever of throwing up the sponge. Only they did not wish to fight that day, and hoped that the British felt likewise.

The officer, hardly knowing what to do, demurred at first, but eventually fell in with the suggestion, adding as an afterthought that he was pleased to see that they had so great a respect for the white man's Sabbath. "Oh, it is not that," promptly replied the chief. "The fact is that we have run out of ammunition, and so cannot fight to-day. To-morrow we have a fresh supply coming in. Then we will go ahead again with the war."

"LEND US SOME AMMUNITION."

"Tell you what, though," he resumed, after a moment's pause, struck suddenly by what he evidently conceived to be an exceedingly brilliant idea. "If you will lend us some ammunition we can start again, and the day won't be wasted."

Naturally the officer was obliged to decline this naive proposal, and on reporting the matter he was censured for not at once making the whole lot of them prisoners. His reply was that he would rather be cashiered than take so mean an advantage of a brave and chivalrous enemy, who had trusted him, and who, after all, as their conduct plainly showed, were in some things little more than grown-up children.

Towards the end of the last siege of Paris by the Germans in 1870-71, the custom grew up of observing an informal armistice of about an hour's duration at sundown, when the hungry citizens, or some of them at all events, used to come out and purchase sausages from the Prussians and Bavarians in the advanced trenches at about ten times their normal price. After a while, however, the custom came to the knowledge of Von Moltke, who effectually and promptly put a stop to it by shooting some half-dozen or more of the amateur truce-makers.

Finally, it may be mentioned that during the American Civil War the commanders on both sides had the greatest difficulty in preventing their men from fraternizing after the day's fighting. Even the sentries, in many instances, used to meet together and exchange gossip and "chaws" of tobacco on moonlight nights. But then for course, these men, though nominally enemies, were really brothers, citizens of the same country, speaking the same language.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.
LONDON, Feb. 17.

The Governor, Newfoundland:
The following summary is from General French: Since the success near La Bassée early last week, some further progress has been made. A valuable point was secured without loss on Feb. 13th. The enemy's losses in recent fighting were severe. On the 14th, near Ypres, the enemy captured some trenches; we counter-attacked, recovering the lost ground and capturing prisoners. Similar summaries will be sent twice weekly.

The Admiralty announces that 40 aeroplanes and seaplanes renewed aerial operations in Bruges District. Bombs were dropped on heavy batteries at Ostend, harbour gun positions at Middlekerke mole, and on the locks at Zeebrugge. Eight French aeroplanes attacked the Chistelles aerodrome. It is reported good results were obtained.

The French Government reports a favourable day on the whole front, especially in Champagne, where three kilometres of German trenches and several hundred prisoners were captured.

The Russian Government reports ultimate fighting near Augustowa, where superior German forces are trying to surround the Russian wings. There have been some Russian successes in the Carpathians. In Bukovina the enemy captured Nadworna and crossed the Sereth river.
HARCOURT.
RESULTS OF AIR RAID.
AMSTERDAM, Feb. 17.
A new dirigible balloon recently transferred to Belgium from Frederikshafen is reported to have been destroyed in the Allies' air raid over Chistelles. Heavy damage is reported to have been done at Zeebrugge and Ostend, and many Germans are said to have been killed.
FORCED BACK BY NUMBERS.
PETROGRAD, Feb. 17.
Russian troops have effected orderly withdrawals from all points on their front where their positions were menaced by terrific offensive of Germans and their Austrian allies, was the announcement made here to-day. The withdrawal from East Prussia and Southern Bukovina was caused by the appearance of great opposing armies and not to any decisive battles resulting in Russian defeat, the War Office claims. Military experts assert that Russia's superior resources permit her to adopt a policy of attrition which will result in the ultimate collapse of Germany's offensive because of heavy losses that will necessarily fall upon armies continually attacking. The German claims that General Von Hindenburg has won a great victory in East Prussia, is denied here. It is admitted that the Germans are again advancing upon Oswestl but the falling back of the Russian army is declared to have been due to the appearance

of German forces numerically superior to the Russians, and not to any defeat suffered by them.

PROGRESSING STEADILY.

PARIS, Feb. 17.—(Official.) From the sea to the Oise our artillery has carried on an efficacious shelling, which has dispersed a number of gatherings, blown up caissons and destroyed some trains. To the north of Arras we have taken two lines of trenches and beaten back violent counter attacks. We have made some prisoners and inflicted heavy losses on the enemy. A number of German officers have been killed in the neighborhood of Rheims. Near Lovre, advances made on Feb. 16th, of several hundred metres, have been maintained. In Champagne district we have followed up our gains to the northwest of Perthes, and have captured positions of the enemy on a front of 800 metres. All German counter attacks to the north of Mesnil Les Husles and Beausejour have been repulsed, and we captured a large bomb thrower, several small ones, and made 200 prisoners. This engagement continues. In the Argonne we have made progress in the forest La Grule and maintained our gain notwithstanding two counter attacks and several actions at close quarters, which resulted in heavy losses to the enemy. Between the Argonne and the Meuse we have made progress at divers points. In Alsace we have taken control of ridges which dominate Sadel farm, and we have retained all ground conquered. Our aviators have bombarded the railway stations at Freiburg and Breisgau.

No long waiting; just as soon as the concert is over he will make a contract with some good local baker to provide loaves of bread, and he will supply families with bread, which is the staff of life, as far as ever the money will go. There will be no red tape either in the distribution. The poor soul needing a good loaf of bread will only have to ask for a ticket and go for their loaf. But of course, the public must help. There will be sketches and pictures, patriotic songs, all during Lent, providing the public will rally round and help the good cause. Look out for the great Bread Benefit on Feb. 26th.

A London despatch says:—A member of the Royal Canadian Dragoons just been sent to prison for three months with hard labor at Brampton, in Cumberland, for obtaining board and lodging under false pretences. He turned up at Dumfries in uniform, and told a plausible and detailed story of having quitted a Red Cross hospital, where he had been sent after being in action at Mons. For several weeks the man was given hospitality by the villagers, and was treated as a hero until it was found that he was wanted by the police. On being arrested, he admitted that he was a deserter.

LOST TWO MILLION MEN.

When will the war end? The famous Russian military expert, Colonel Shumsky, in the Russian press, says six months hence. Colonel Roustam Bek, writing to the London Daily Express, says Germany will be beaten at an earlier date. "During six months of the war the German army, according to the most reliable information, lost two million of its best men. These have been replaced by men of the landsturm. It is clear, therefore, that the German army has been getting steadily worse in regard to military quality; after six months Germany will be in a state of such exhaustion that she will be unable to replace her losses even with the most incapable reservists."

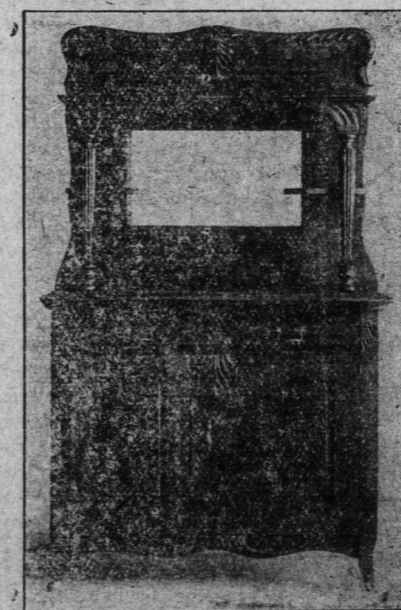

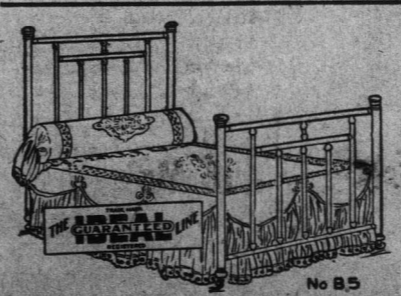

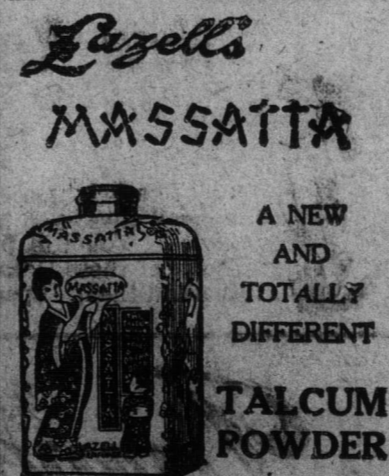
