ture. This building is known to have been in use as a hostelry for over 200 years, but it is certain that its history dates from a much earlier period even than that. In the 19th century the craze for stucco led to the wonderful half-timbering of the main facade being obliterated with a hideous plaster, but since the war a complete restoration scheme has been carried out, and most of the ancient woodwork to-day stands revealed in its former beauty and harmony. The registers of the Shakespeare Hostelrie for the past 100 years would make absorbing reading, for its roof has sheltered the most eminent members of the literary and artistic world for many generations, besides countless famous statesmen, and other distinguished visitors from the four corners of the civilized world, A never-failing source of delight to newcomers is the system under which all the rooms are named after the plays or characters of Shakespeare. What could be more appropriate, for instance, than "Meas-ure for Measure" as a text for a dining room, or "A Midsummer Night's Dream" as an invitation to sweet re-
