Railway and **Other Matters**.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir .--- I have read with interest, and some amusement, Mr. Morgan's Report on Railway conditions. 1 would like to make a few remarks from an unlearned outport man's point of view.

It is evident that Mr. Morgan espouses the cause of the Reid Nfid. Co, and from his remarks and suggestions, would like to see everything coming their way. He lays particular stress on closing down the branch lines, and increasing the freight rates. He apparently takes the stand that the railway should be used expressly in the interest of the operating company; without regard to the general public, for whose benefit the roads were built. He gives a jumble of figuresprobably taken at random-to justify his remarks. These figures may be convincing to those who do not understand them, but to the average man who observes them closely they have very little bearing on the subject, and to my mind are used only as a blind. He rightly says that wages and material had largely increased, but quietly remarks that raises made in passenger and freight rates, were very slight. Let me quote some of the changes in freight rates. Flour increased from 30 to 60 cents

per barrel, or 100 per cent. Kero Oil increased from 50 to \$1.50 per Cask, or 300 per cent. Pork and Beef increased from 50 to \$1.10 per Barrel, or 130 per cent. Codoil increased 30 to \$1.60 per

Cask, or 533 per cent. Molasses increased from \$2.50 to \$5.00 per Puncheon, or 160 per cent. Codfish increased from 15 to 45 cents per Quintal, or 300 per cent. Surely any man with a sense of justice, and giving an impartial statement would not call these changes small. Within the past year wages" and material have decreased in value,

yet freight and passenger rates are still the same.

If Mr. Morgan wants to show just cause for closing down the branch lines, let him give a convincing detailed statement of earnings and expenditure, let him advise a retrenchment policy, that could be applied to advantage. Strike a balance sheet and show that greater earnings without increased rates are impossible. Then if the adverse balance is too great for the Government to pay compatible with the utility of the road to the public; close it down, and collect from the R.N. Co. for breach of contract.

The monies of the taxpaying public of this unfortunate country are flowing in an unceasing stream into the treasury of the Reid Nfid. Co. together with high passenger and freight rates. are draining the life of the people, while a very poor service is had in return. And yet this man from somewhere comes and tells us to give them more in the shape of increased subidies and higher tariff rates. I would have this man recommend reduction in the large salaries of Directors Reduction in the large staff of employees in the various offices at headquarters, leaving only those who are actually required to do the work, with a fair day's pay for a fair day's work. I would have him suggest that when cars are required at certain sections to load freight that they be sent immediately, and not left on sidings in other sections for an indefinite period, awaiting orders from some party that may require them at some future date. I would have him recommend that in the future, cars with freight for certain points are not sidetracked for weeks, without any apparent cause, while consumers are wondering what had become of their freight. When these suggestions, and many others of like nature are carried out. then, and only then, should Mr. Morgan approach the Government with recommendations for increased tariffs and subsidies. The present condition of the country does not justify higher tariffs, and what is more the theory of high tariff, producing big revenues, has been exploded long ago. Big profits on small turnovers, cannot be had in this age. We are living in a time of small profits and quick returns; and the firm, individual, or Government who does not adhere to this policy will be left behind in the race. The people of this country are now on the verge of ruin. The question with the great majority is to know just how to keep their families from starving. As one who has the interest of the people at heart. I call upon the Government to consider carefully the situation, and do not commit, the country to any policy that may add to the burden of its people; on the recommendation of your Mr. Morgan. 
