POST AGREE ON MOROCCAN REFORMS

... of the Conference at Algeciras is Now Most Probable.

PRESENTED AN ALTERNATIVE

... Have Now Gone Too Far for France or Germany to Draw Back.

Algeciras, March 8.—The success of the conference on Moroccan reform is described as absolutely secure by the main points of the allotment of bank capital and of the police, are not yet settled, however, run high that these things will soon become an arrangement. THREE INTERESTING EXPERIMENTS FOR THE BOYS.

HERE is a pretty experiment with some needles and a piece of cork illustrating the principles of expansion and contraction by heat and contraction by cooling. Cut an ordinary cork stopper in half. The third needle is there merely as a test, to show you how they move apart and together with the expansion and contraction, as shown by the two figures. Another pretty and quite simple experiment is to have an imitation of a rain-storm in a bottle. Get some Canada balsam and boil it in a flask over an alcohol lamp. Clouds of turpentine drops will form in the upper part of the flask, and if you thrust in a cold glass rod these drops will condense and fall in the bottle like rain. A third simple experiment is one on blackness. You know that no part or any other substance in the world is perfectly black, but there is a way to make a figure appear so that it will look blacker even than black velvet. Paint the inside of a pasteboard box black, or cover it with dead-black cloth. In the lid of the box make a hole, being careful not to make it larger than one-tenth of the surface of the lid. If now you hold the box so that the light will not strike the hole directly and look through the hole into the box the hole will appear intensely black.

Make the hole in the form of a design or an imp or a brocade, and even if you paint the lid black when you look through the hole you will see the figure darker than the dark background. The black produced by this method is called "Chevreul's black" after the Frenchman who invented it. All three of these experiments are instructive, and they will also amuse and entertain your friends.

FASHIONS FOR LITTLE GIRLS.

LITTLE girls of from twelve to fifteen years old are nowadays wearing their hair in one curl down their backs and with large ribbon bows tied at the nape of the neck. Just how those with an abundance of straight hair make it conform so gracefully to that mode of a single, slender curl is something of a mystery, although a hint is abroad that it is through the means of doing up overnight in whole curls. These little contrivances represent a whole host to wrap the hair around and have elastic at the ends for its fastening. They can now be bought at many shops. As soon then as the hair is made to curl it is easy enough to brush it vigorously over a slick about the size of a candle until its smooth and has a high gloss. The prettiest single curls hang just a little below the shoulder. At the same time, the hair about the face is combed up to the top of the head in a modified pompadour, and fastened there with a broad shell pin. The ends are allowed to fall down and blend in with the single curl.

This latter fancy, of course, is fostered by the peanut being such a rarity in Paris. Only one little shop there is known to supply peanuts and they command a high price. Their curious name in French is cackowat. It was an American genius who introduced Maisy Pop into London, and now the number of little shops selling it are spread all over the city. Much the same financial success has been the result as had those who had introduced American soda water at the Paris Exposition. At least it would be a delight to the children if their old friend Maisy Pop should be heralded as wholesome and good for indigestion.

A Successful Experiment in Strawberry Growing Near Duncan.

and keeps forty stock ewes, besides the usual minor details of mixed farming as conducted in that part of the world. There is, however, a hillside with a southwestern slope that is particularly well adapted to the growing of fruit and berries. Near where the house originally stood is an old and sadly neglected orchard which produces fine apples and among the trees is an enormous cherry tree, supposed to be the largest on the island. Farther along a patch of between four and five acres of strawberries may be noticed.

The best jam is, however, made at the time the fruit is picked. No difficulty is ever experienced in procuring pickers for the Indians are always fond of light work where the women and children can earn pretty good wages. As with the apple-pickers, they look forward to the berry-picking every year, and would feel a loss if the business were not taken up.

On Vancouver island it is a surprising fact that one cannot find a score of fruit growers who understand their business and who apply the knowledge in a practical way. The fact that a man has an orchard or that he grows pretty good apples does not make him a successful fruit farmer. He may even take prizes at the local show and yet know little about his business as a Robinson.

The fact that the strawberry growing was successful during Mr. Robinson's life shows that the conditions are suitable, and that when properly looked after the business can be made a dividend-payer.

When the Dominion government sees fit, in its wisdom, to establish the promised experimental station on this island, more money will be obtainable as to the capabilities of the different kinds of soil and the best varieties to plant in each. In the meantime the bureau of information established by the provincial government is in charge of the largest fruit grower on the island.

A Captain of Industry

Sketch of the Career of the Late E. B. Eddy, Canadian Manufacturer. Victim of 27 Fires, But Overcame all Obstacles to Success.

The following is a sketch of the career of the late E. B. Eddy, manufacturer, Hull, Que., whose death recently was chronicled in "The Colonist."

The late Ezra Butler Eddy was born on his father's farm, Bristol, Vermont, August 22nd, 1827, being a son of the late Samuel Eddy, whose ancestors came originally from England and who, by his wife, Clarissa Eastman, was a direct descendant of Miles Standish. The deceased was educated at the district school and entered upon his business career in New York city. Removing to Burlington, Vermont, he embarked in the manufacture of friction matches in 1851. He had a population of about 200 people, and after making matches by hand for a while, established a small factory on the site of the present paper mill. Gradually the industry grew under his genius until it was the largest of its kind in the British provinces.

Removing to Burlington, Vermont, he embarked in the manufacture of friction matches in 1851.

away for days at a time and coming back with orders totalling fifteen or sixteen carloads. He had often travelled Canada from end to end, and was accustomed annually to make a trip of inspection which extended from Halifax to Winnipeg. Between times he would extend his journey to the coast. He had a great talent for organization, was a man of his word, and never bore malice.

His motto was "Canada for the Canadians." Although born in the United States, he was a great Britisher. One day the secretary-treasurer, Mr. Rowley, drew attention to a fine painting of a lion of which he asked Mr. Eddy's acceptance. "The old lion" he called it. "Well, he can't be any more British than I am." In pursuance of what he called his Canadian policy he was a vigorous and able advocate of an export duty upon pulp.

He was honored by his fellow citizens by being returned as member for Ottawa county in 1871, but was defeated by Dr. Daniel. He was also mayor of Hull on several occasions, and many important civic projects were carried out during his regime.

road business. Mr. Eddy did not more greatly admire my efforts in that direction than I did his success in the manufacture of paper. I am afraid Mr. Eddy got his death-blow in 1900, when his works were swept away in the great fire. His indomitable will forced him to rebuild those works, but I shall always think the disastrous fire was responsible for the weakened state of health subsequently. His death is an irreparable loss, not only to Hull, but to the whole of Canada, and his works will long be remembered.

FIGHTING BUGS WITH BUGS.

Montreal Gazette. In the current issue of the Century Magazine there appears a very interesting article by Mr. W. S. Harwood on "Saving California Fruit Crops."

The fruit growing industry of that state has for years been fighting the various forms of insect life injurious to fruit cultivation, and these concerns are now convinced that they have finally demonstrated the only effective manner in which this may be done. The methods in use elsewhere have practically been described.

Sprays, washes, dips and fumigations are cumbersome; they are costly in material, equipment and labor and are often ineffectual. Destruction of the infected tree or shrub has not proven efficacious, because it has only drawn the pest to some other form of plant life. California believes that it has found a better way—the provision of the inevitable "balance of nature."
