In many houses where servants are kept, a personal inspection of these unfamiliar regions would result in the immediate hiring of a man to clear out the offensive matter and a less dangerous mode of disposing of kitchen offal adopted for the future.

The management knows too well the value to Canada, and also to Canadian railways and steamship lines, of having Canadian cattle occupy their present exceptionally favorable position in England; and it would be a suicidal act for it to seek to destroy the advantage thus gained for Canada and Canadian lines of transportation for the sake of the freight on the limited number of actile which could be diverted from United States lines of transportation. SIR: As yours is almost the only journal which dares to discuss the vexed quesprovincial and municipal must take the tion of university consolidation, I would most vigorous measures of prevention that like through your columns to make, from the point of view of the provincial nonsectarian institution, a few suggestions as to the best available solution of the diffi-

I agree with you that for the methodists themselves the most common sense course would be to abolish their arts faculty, depend upon the provincial institution for he secular training of their ministry, and devote all their college expenditure and efforts to improving their theological faculty. But it is not at all likely that this ulty. But it is not at all likely that this will be done. The traditional policy of the methodist church has been to take charge and oversight of the higher education, even of these who were not intended for the ministry, and it is not probable that on any plea this policy will be hastily abandoned. What kind of a compromise, then, is possible as a basis of consolidation?

Before going into this matter in detail, allow me to point out the reason why we en our side desire union. It is that we en our side desire union. It is that we may obtain more funds with which to increase the efficiency of Toronto university and college. If we had the revenue we need we would probably care very little for union, and would take only a languid and theoretical interest in only a languid and theoretical interest in it. The stormy discussion of last year was started by Vice-Chancellor Mulock's statement of the university's and the college's needs and claims, so that we, and not our methodist friends, are responsible for raising the question. So far from blaming Mr. Mulock for this state of affairs I think he did only his plain, obvious duty when he frankly told the public, to whom the university and college belong that the latter are hampered and hindered by want of funds, that the teaching staff is too limited, that the library ard laboratories are not sufficiently extensive, and that the examiners are neither numerous enough nor adequately remunerated. I think all this ought to have been made public sooner, and we might by this time have seen our way to something better.

Allow me also to add that if the methodists only consent to cast in their lot with

it should not make any difference to us whether or not they choose to persist, as a church, in doing secular work. That is their own affair, not ours. If they prefer to spend their money in that way instead of sending missionaries to the heathen, or supporting preaching stations in our own sparsely settled districts, or increasing the salaries of their elergy, we may characterize their policy as unbusinesslike and suicidal, but we are not called upon to make it an objection to

Of course, if the methodists enter

Of course, if the methodists enter into such a scheme as is talked of—such a scheme as is talked of—such a scheme as I am about to sketch—they do so with the expectation of reaping some advantage from the change. They are not, as the promoters of union within their own denomination say, asking for state aid to their college. All they ask is the privilege for their students of attending lectures in Toronto university, which under the scheme would become a teaching corporation. This would relieve them of part of their educational burden, but if they do not choose to throw off the whole of it, that is if they persist in giving in their own college additional tuition of a secular kind, that is their affair, not ours.




