THE new U. S. law which puts directly under control the progress of making citizens is a move toward consistent naturalization laws, took effect Saturday Sept. 29, at every port of entry in the United States. Along the border of Can-ada and Mexico it will mean a lot of extra work for the immigration inspectors. A Canadian, for instance, has never been subjected to an examination of any kind unless his condition physical or financial was bad enough to attract attention. Under the new law it will be compulsory for him to undergo the examination providing he ever expects to become a natura-lized citizen of the U. S. The questions asked relate to his place of birth, the date his business, and his personalty. The examination does not in any way displace the declaration of intention, commonly referred to as 'first papers,' but it is essential to naturalized citizenship.

Up at Exeter there was a fall of eight inches of snow and six inches at Hensall. This was accompanied by a regular oldtime blizzard that did considerable damage to wires. At Lucan there were small flurries of snow, but the wind blew very hard. Goderich seems to have had an old-

fashioned storm. Six inches of snow fell at the lake port and the people up there are going around town in cutters to-day, quite proud of it, too. Many trees were broken down by the weight of the snow, and it has kept the electric light men busy all day repairing the damage that was done to the wires. The ground is covered with snow and presents a real

Vuletide appearance.

Reports from along Lake Erie tell of snowialls all through the district.

weather may be more pleasant for visit-ors. The races had to be called off. As a rule an early show storm of this kind is followed by more agreeable wea-ther, and this will temper to some extent the discomforts attending the early snow. While the local fall was small, the cold was unusual for this time of the year, and was infusial for this time of the year, and caused many of the last year's overcoats to be brought out and put in use.

Woodstock being in line Considerable snow, but more wind, struck these points. Cleveland witnessed one of the earliest storms in years. A neavy wet snow, driven by a high wind, fell all day. It was the most severe storm, according to the telegraph reports since that of Oct 5, 1892. This storm is general along Ohio's lake front.—Free Press.

KILLED ON TRACK.

William Geary Run Down by G. T.R. Work Train.

Strathroy, Oct. 7.—Wm. Geafy, a man about sixty years of age, was instantly killed about a mile from the town here at o'clock to-night. It appears Geary's drove home, while he started to walk down the track and intended picking up coal as he went. He had not gone far, however, when he met a freight train going east and stepped on to the other track. In an instant the work train from London, No. 120, with Conductor Law and Engineer Farr in charge, running at a high rate of speed, was 'upon/him, and killed him instantly. He was terribly mangled, both legs being broken and his chest badly crushed.

Why Barns Take Fire.

J. C. Nelson, a prominent farmer of Pontiac, Mich., advances an explanation for the destruction of so many barns by lightning.

Recently W. E Carpenter, secretary of the Monitor Insurance Co., made the statement that steel hay tracks in the roofs of barns attract the lightning and cause destruction.

Mr. Nelson points out that newly cut hay or grain gives off dampness until the hay or grain is thoroughly cured. The hay or grain is piled in the barns and allowed to cure there, the dampness rises to the roof and as it dries out becomes a gas. Until the hay is thoroughly cured the gas continues to generate.

During a storm the gas is escaping from the barn. The barn is heavily charged with electricity, which comes in contact with the gas, and the next instant the gas inside the barn is exploded the lightning following that course. Mr. Nelson points out a number of instances where barns were suddenly found a mass of flame, all through the interior, during an electrical storm.

CHERRY PECTORAL.

NINE THOUSAND IN DISPUTE. Peculiar Case in Which Geo. Holwell of Thedford is Interested.

of Thedford 18 Interested.

The possession of the sum of \$9,000 is the cause of a peculiar case pending at Osgoode Hall. J. C. Judd, of London, appearing for G. W. Holwell, of Thedford, aged 71, asked to have continued an injunction granted by Judge Macbeth, of Middlesex, restraining Geo. H. Powell, a bank clerk at Exeter, and his father, J. H. Powell from dealing with the money until after the trial. Graft.

Campbellford Despatch: Graft graft! graft!—or, in other words, theft, wholesale robbery and dishon-esty—exists now and has for some time in almost every department of trade and politics in this benighted country. The revelations made within the last year or eighteen months regarding the insurance companies, the trades combines, the railways, the oil, coal and meat trust and canning in-dustries, and the political rascalities perpetrated by both parties, are truly appalling. Nowhere on the whole face of the earth, excepting in this socalled Christian country, are such things tolerated, or are they even pos-

Fraud.

No one is permanently profited by the fraudulent practices. The change for an immediate increase has led many persons to do those things in trade that are pernicious. A little wrong is committed and the full effect of such is not seen until many innocent people 'are inconvenienced Whole currents of trade have been diverted by a pollution from some contributor. This all the producers loose by the shortsighted practices of a few scheming individuals The worst feature of all is that fradulent schemes are laid the most during times of plenty and progress. It is then that competition is also keenest, and a market once lost is gone for a ong time.

In the case of our Canadian apple trade preventive measures cannot be too strictly enforced. Already there are rumors of fraud in the packing trade. Inspectors at Montreal are kept husy, but even then some bad ones are not detected. There are honest packers and good reliable brands, but the wrongdoing of one shipper works incalculable harm to all.

The Government inspectors should be upheld by the farmers in their work in protecting our fruit against wrong packing at the local warehouses.-

The Horse Industry.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture purpose making an investigation of the conditions of horse industry in this province to obtain information as to the best policy to adopt to encourage a more extensive breeding of a better class of borses. At the last session of the Legislature an appropriation was made for this purpose, and now a num-of experts are being sent out who will visit every county in the province and inspect all the stallions used for breeding purposes. The inspectors will begin their work in East Peterborough ot Thursday, Oct. 11th, and will visit Blairton, Havelock, Norwood, Stony Lake, Warsaw, Keene and Westwood.
Their duty will be to note the
number, type, quality and breeding of
all the old stallions and in a general way to brood mares of the district; what conditions have affected or are affecting the quality of the horses, and if the effect is for good whether or not the same conditions could be applied in other sections ; if on the other hand the conditions have not had a good effect what can be done to remove them. They will also, ascertain the views of horsemen generally as to the advisability of a stallion inspection act and receive suggestions as to what can be done to improve the conditions of the horse business generally. Mr-Chas. O'Reilly, Secretary of the Farmer's Institute, will accompany the inspectors on their tour of this district.

A PECULIAR CASE SETTLED. Taylor vs. Greenizen.

The main defence to the action was that the plaintiff was not a holder for value without notice. he having cashed the cheque by paying the money to the Bank of Toronto after the money to the Bank of fronto after cheque was protested, and in any event the cheque was not protested soon enough to satify the law in that respect. Judgment was given for the plaintiff, for the face of the cheque.—Advertiser.



The Russian Crown. The crown used by the Russian czar resembles the dome formed patri-archal miter, which was a favorite shape among the Byzantines. Upon the summit appears a cross formed of five beautiful diamonds, which is also supported by a large spinel ruby, polished, but not faceted. This ruby and cross are supported by a foliated arch composed of eleven great diamonds and rising from the back and front of the base of the crown. On either side of this central arch is attached a hoop formed of thirty-eight large and per fect pearls. The spaces on either side of these arches are filled with leafwork and ornaments in silver, incrusted with diamonds, underlaid with the richest purple velvet. The band which forms the base of the crown is of gold and is ornamented with twenty-eight magnificent diamonds.

great novelists.
