A Meeting of the Mission Board was held on the 7th of May, 1861. Present—The Ven. the Archdeacon of York in the Chair, Revs. A. Patmer, E. H. Dewar, A. Stewart, J. Carry, Dr. McMurray, Dr. Fuller, H. Brent, S. Givens, J. G. Geddes, Dr. Read, and Messrs. Bovell, R. B. Denison, Jas. Magrath, J. W. Gamble, C. J. Campbell, and the Rev. Secretary.

The Secretary read the minutes of the prerious meeting, which were confirmed. He then read letters from the following gentlemen:-Rov. T. Parnell, enclosing bond-Rev. J. A Preston, htto-from Secretary of the Bathurst District, enclosing guarantee from congregation, at White Lake-from the same and the Rev. J. S. Lauder, claiming £30 a year for an assistant at Ottawa, that sum having been previously paid direct by the Parochial Branch, and now remitted to the Board; from the Rev. J. Stunnage, enquiring whether the Board would guarantee the stipend to him for another year; from Rev. Dr. Atkinson, claiming £25 for his curate, which had been paid out of local appropriations, prior to sending all to the Parent Society; from James Bromley, Esq, enquiring whether the Society would grant £50 per annum for Mission at Renfrew, if that Mission raised a similar amount; from F. W. Gates, Esq., announcing sale of seven shares W. P. Building Society, and query as to transfer of balance; from Rev. A. Stewart, announcing that he and Sheriff Corbett had been elected delegates from the Midland District, and also, that the District had undertaken to pay their proportion of Rev. G. W. White's salary, up to the 30th of April.

The Secretary read the following report and resolutions, forwarded to him by the Secretary of the Home District:—

The Managing Committee of the Home District Branch met on Wednesday, 24th April. Present— The Rev. Rural Dean Givins in the Chair, the Rev. Messrs. J. Carry, G. Viner, H. Stewart, T. Hodge, R. Arnold, W. Belt, E. Dewar, G. Cox, T. S. Kennedy, James Magrath, Esq., and the Rev. H. C. Cooper, Secretary.

The following resolutions were passed.

1. That whereas the following elergymen of this District, viz.:—The Rev. Messrs. J. Carry, R. Arnold, T. P. Hodge, H. Stewart, and W. Johnson were, previously to the formation of the Mission Board, in the receipt of grants, partly from the District Fund, and partly from the Sustentation Fund, amounting to not less than £57 10s per annum each, this Committee do recommend the Mission Board to pay to each of the aforesaid elergymen the sum of £50 per annum, in lieu of all such grants hitherto received by them; and also, the like sum to each of the following elergymen, viz.:—The Rev. G. Viner, the Rev. W. Grant, and the Rev. R. Harris.

2. That the Committee beg leave to present to the Mission Board, that great uncertainty appears to exist with regard to the application of some of the rules adopted by the Board, and that, in tho the District in which he is situated.

Manitowaning, January 16th, 1861. sending you my report .-- You will be glad to God for the measure of success which has attended

The following are some extracts from my

July 31st, 1860. I went out this evening to visit some Indian families. I had a long conversation with a man who had been very ill in the spring. At one time, scarcely any hopes of his u-timate recovery were entertained. I thought myself that he would not get over his illness. used to visit his tent, which was about eight miles from this place; at such times I took him some food. I read and explained passages of Scripture a prayer to God in his behalf. He was a very attentive listener. At one time he told me, that if ever he recovered, he would endeavour to serve God better than he had done before: he also said that the next time the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered in the church, he would, if he could walk, go up with his brethern to the Lord's Table, and partake of the hely feast This evening he talked in nearly the same strain. He is now well enough to work.

August 29th. I have now finished my portion of the work of Indian translation, which the Rev. Dr. O'Meara and I undertook about three years ago. What we had undertaken to do was to translate the Pantateuch, the Book of Proverbs, and the Prophecy of Isaiah, into the Ojibwa language. December 27th. The Indians belonging to this place had their annual feast this evening in my house. About fifty three were present. The The Dexology superintendent also attended was first sung. Then all sat down to eat. furnished a large portion of what was on the table; the principal Indians supplied the rest. All enjoyed the dinner very much. When all had eaten, I rose up and made a speech. I was followed by four speakers. I shall here give an analysis of two of the speeches that were made. The readers of this report will thereby see how christianity has influenced some of the Indians who live in these parts: they will hear from their own mouths, what their feelings are on some matters of vital importance. Chief Meshequaunga thus spoke, - "My brother chiefs, my brethren, children, I have a little to say to you. To-day I call to mind what we were when we were heathers, when we lived in the wild bush, and roamed about in quest of food. In those days we heard our fathers speak of what took place in times long gone by. They also gave us advice-they told us how we were to live. But they did not know much. A time came when the Missionary reached us, and talked to us; he spoke of the Great Being above; he spread out before us the divine will; he told us what neither we nor our fathers had ever heard. We then embraced christianity; from that time to this we have heard the glad news. We now hear the Gospel. Let us be thankful for this Let us live like good christians."
