#### HELPS TO PRAYER.

The Rector has lately reprinted some Helps to Prayer, originally prepared for Canon Wilkinson's Parish, St Peter's, Eaton Square. These Helps are intended to suggest subjects of intercession, and to aid Communicants in the use of this most valuable privilege—a privilege in which Christ calls upon us to join Him-a privilege, whereby we participate in the very work of Christ upon His mediatorial throne, for "He ever liveth to make intercession for those who come unto God by Him." By virtue of this participation it is a work full of power. If the power of intercession were more fully realized it would not be so little attended to. How could we weary in intercession, if we had faith? How could we ever feel that too much time was given to it, if we remembered that it is the one work in which Christ is unceasingly occupied?

How vast a change would be wrought in the Christian world, if there were a more earnest practice of intercession! There is nothing which we can do to work so great a change in others, as is produced by intercessory prayer. If but two or three earnest Communicants in each Parish were to join in intercessory prayer, there would soon be a revival of spiritual life throughout the whole Church! The power of God in answer to prayer is without limit.

If time were taken from social engagements to spend in prayer for the Church and Parish, what an abundant blessing would be showered down on both, for we know that such prayer is "according to His Will." Great also shall be the personal blessedness of those who thus seek to "strengthen their brethren."

The Clergy will be glad to supply the "Helps to Prayer" to all who ask for them. Copies are kept in the Vestry.

#### THE MISSION.

The services at the Mission Hall on Thursday evenings have been so well attended since the opening of the Mission last October, that the Clergy feel encouraged to make a special effort The number of candidates will be about 50. As the people became familiar with the hymns, the Services became more hearty than many long established Services in our Parish Churches.

It is impossible to forecast the results of the Mission, but this at least may be said: the Gospel has gained a hearing among many who never attend church; more than ninety families have been affected by it; many have been led to make resolution to lead a new life; may not seem large, but they are sufficient to call for thanksgivings from all true Christians, and they will become larger in proportion as earnest prayer is offered up. Indeed there is abundant need that earnest Communicants should be "instant in prayer" for the conversion of the careless, the indifferent, and the godless.

# PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

- 1. Debt, \$3,500 should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
- 2. The completion of improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. \$2,000 is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
- 3. \$650 to pay for the new roof of the Church. The School House roof must also soon be renewed.
- 4. \$800 for the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
- Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$295 only.

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
